## MONDAY, DECEMBER 24

## Vigil of the Nativity of OUR Lord - Manger scenes

For those of you with Nativity sets, the wait is over: You can finally put Baby Jesus in the manger-unless he's already there. In some families an annual debate centers on when to put the little fellow out. If before Christmas, one side argues, then we're getting ahead of ourselves. If after, the other side says, then you spend all of Advent looking at Mary and Joseph and the other figures staring at an empty crib.

There's something to be said for the wait-until-Christmas-to-put-Jesus-in-the-manger crowd, besides being technically correct: Does not that tiny bed represent an emptiness, a longing, an expectation in us for the presence of God? Nativity scenes work so well because in a sense we join them. We are at the back of the crowd with all the others, peering around a camel or over the shoulder of a shepherd. And with them, our season of waiting has come to end and we have God with us, right before our eyes.

## TUESDAY, DECEMBER 25 <br> Vigil of the Solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord Christ is born in Bethlehem

The story of Jesus' birth has all the hallmarks of a great fictional epic: Good news comes to those in lowly places; they now share a secret that kings will never appreciate. The human race, doomed by its own history, is rescued by the birth of an insignificant infant in an obscure location. Heavenly creatures deliver the message of glad tidings to the most unlikely recipients. Great joy fills the earth. It may sound like classic fiction, but, believe it or not, it's absolute gospel. Give glory to the newborn king.

## FEAST OF STEPHEN, FIRST MARTYR

## Whoever endures to the end will be saved

Long-suffering deacons can take some comfort in today's feast of Saint Stephen, both the church's first deacon and first martyr. The celebration of Stephen's witness of service and sacrifice could not come at a better time: the day after Christmas. Does not Jesus call all Christians to care for the vulnerable and to be faithful to him to the last? Though we have Jesus' birth fresh in our minds, it is to the end of Christ's earthly life that Stephen's death points us. Like Jesus, Stephen at the moment of his death forgave his killers and commended his spirit to God. His imitation
of Jesus serves as an example for deacons and all disciples.
TODAY's READINGS: Acts 6:8-10; 7:54-59; Matthew 10:17-22
"Then Stephen knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, 'Lord, do not hold this sin against them.' When he had said this, he died."

## THURSDAY, DECEMBER 27

## FEAST OF JOHN, APOSTLE, EVANGELIST-Call your first witnesses

 The church celebrates John, the evangelist and the apostle, who were not one and the same. Whichever John we may refer to, the apostle or the author of three New Testament letters and the Book of Revelation, the stories of these disciples help us to see how our faith tradition goes back to people who witnessed Christ, both having personal contact with him and living out their faith in him. They call us to a similar vocation: Know Christ and live as if you do.TODAY's READINGS: 1 John 1:1-4; John 20:1a, 2-8
"We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes and touched with our hands."

## Friday, December 28 - Feast of THE HOLY InNOcents, MARTYRS Not to be overlooked

In 2005 the remains of a preschooler were discovered in a laundry bag next to the Reagan Memorial Tollway in suburban Chicago. The child showed no signs of neglect; it could have been, said an investigator for the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, "a problem with the family or with somebody close to the family. Or it could have been an accidental death and they were afraid to report it." Two years later the identity of the boy remained unknown, and the local Catholic diocese donated a burial plot so the remains could be put to rest. The Center has a database of 2,000 cases and is currently investigating 210 . On this feast of the Holy Innocents, those King Herod had killed in an attempt to eliminate the child Jesus, we remember all the children that fear or malice have left by the side of life's road and pledge to find some way, however small, to help them.

"Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, for Herod is about to destroy him."

## SATURDAY, DECEMBER 29 - MAssACRE AT WOUNDED KNEE

## Dreams yet to be realized

"When the Sun died, I went up to heaven and saw God and all the people who had died a long time ago. God told me to come back and tell my people they must be good and love one another . . . . He gave me this dance to give to my people." A rancher named Wovoka spoke these words in 1889 while describing a dream that inspired the birth of the Ghost Dance. The ritual was meant to heal and sustain Native Americans during their difficult times, but it was seen as an act of aggression among settlers and government agents when the Lakota Sioux at the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota became swept up in the movement. Fear of the Ghost Dance was one of the contributing factors that led to the massacre at Wounded Knee. Help bring about revelations of peace and salvation through your love of all peoples.
