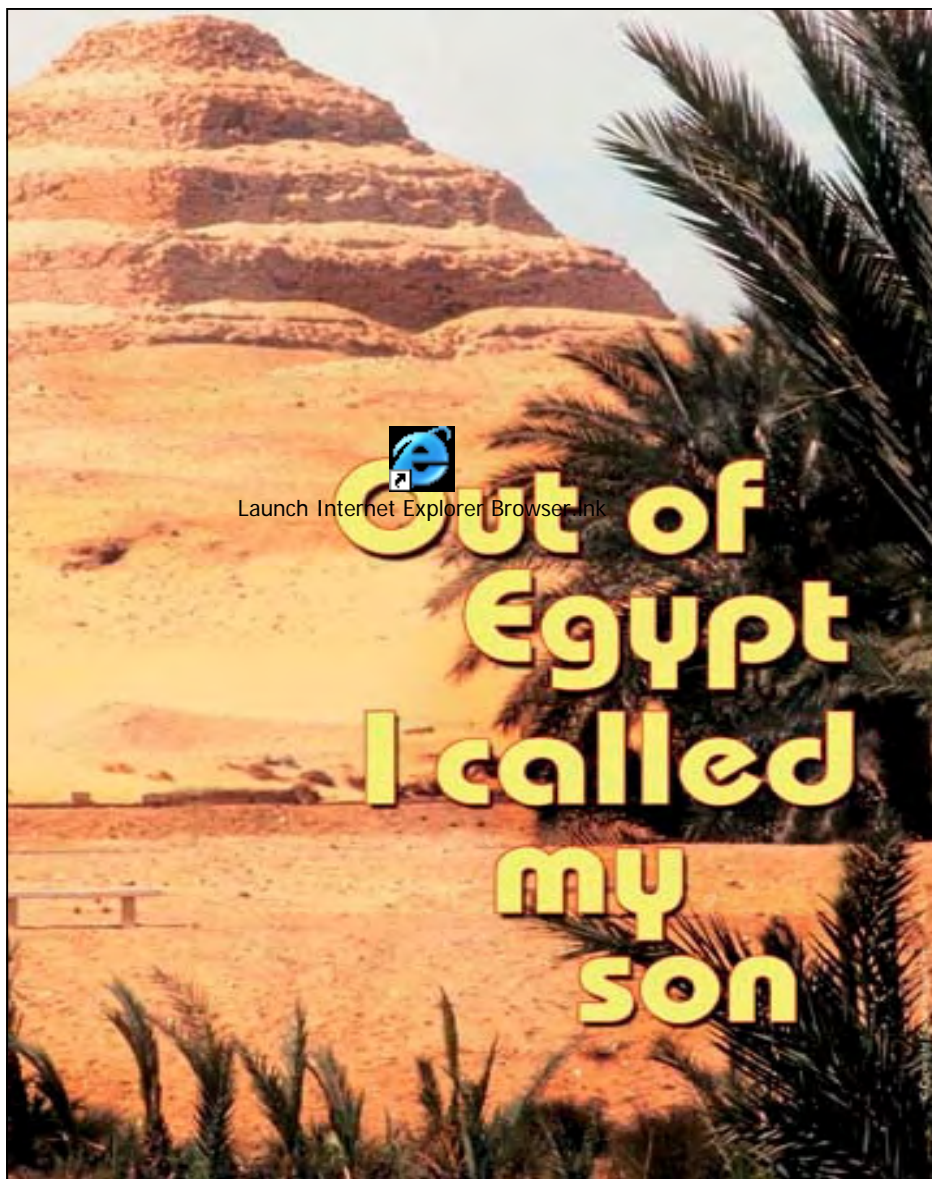

Notes from Father Bob...

FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY

In many ways, families experience the flight into Egypt. It may be to escape persecution and violence. Refugees and asylum seekers, knocking on the door of Europe and the developed world, share in the common humanity of the family of God. As we witness their pain and sadness, the words of St. Paul ring in our ears: "Be clothed in sincere compassion, in kindness and humility, gentleness and patience." The orphan, the widow, the poor and the stranger have a special place in God's love. As Pope John Paul II said during the Jubilee year, "If we recall that Jesus came to 'preach the good news to the poor', how can we fail to lay greater emphasis on the Church's preferential option for the poor and the outcast?" This plea goes out to us and our governments and surely asks us to reflect on how our systems deal with asylum seekers. They must be treated with respect and their cases be examined in the light of justice and charity. Closer to home, the flight into Egypt will prompt us to think of families, usually women and children, seeking safety from domestic violence.

How sensitive is our parish community to all these issues and to the needs of the most vulnerable, especially children and the elderly? May the Feast of the Holy Family remind us of the gift and innocence of children. As a Church, improvements in policy regarding child protection have been needed and are being implemented. They aim to protect children from violence and make the Church a place where protection of the weakest is evident. And then there are the elderly: they deserve a privileged place in the community. God chooses each person in a special and unique way. The message of Christ is that the commandment of love must be visible and active in each family and every community, touching into the lives of each of us from the moment of conception to the day the Lord calls us to himself.

NEW YEAR'S DAY—FEAST OF MARY, MOTHER OF GOD **HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION**

In Jesus, born of Mary, God's ancient promise and blessing is fulfilled. God has revealed his face to us in Mary's child, born at the appointed time. Mary pondered these great mysteries in her heart. What great things the Lord had done in her life, and what privileges she had been given, to be called 'mother of God.' All generations now have called her blessed, and so do we on this day, at the opening of the year.

Mary is mother of God. And we are children of God. We should never forget it. Not now. Not ever. Let the Angelus bell continue to chime and to ring out the joyous news. Happy New Year, everyone! Yes, and more. The blessing of God upon you – the blessing that comes to us in his son, born of Mary, and whose name is Jesus.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 30, 2007

FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY, AND JOSEPH Holy, happy families

We can only infer what the home life of the Holy Family was like. We see them only at key moments: the events surrounding the birth of Jesus, his times at the Temple, and the few occasions when his family appears after Jesus becomes an adult. But it's safe to assume that Joseph and Mary were religious people and created an environment in which their son could cultivate his extraordinary vocation. A recent survey by the Associated Press and MTV found that religion and family are two of the strongest factors contributing to the happiness of people aged 13-24. Happy teenagers need family and religion and are also more likely to have an active faith if they are happy. Happiness and faith can and do go together at home.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 31

SEVENTH DAY IN THE OCTAVE OF CHRISTMAS; FEAST OF SYLVESTER I, POPE; NEW YEAR'S EVE - Old friends remembered

On New Year's Eve, tradition has us questioning whether our old friends should be forgotten, but that goes against the grain with Christians who try to preserve the least detail about those who serve the Lord faithfully. Some, like Pope Sylvester I, have rather sketchy legacies—which is surprising for one of our longest reigning popes (314-335). But we do know that he enjoyed the Roman emperor Constantine's favor and was able to expand the church's influence and dedicate many churches, including the Basilica of St. John Lateran in Rome. Take time to consider your own legacy of faith today, and then raise a glass for all the forgotten Christians who bring their faith into being in each generation.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 1, 2008

SOLEMNITY OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY, MOTHER OF GOD; WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR PEACE - A woman of peace

On a day devoted to both Mary and praying for peace, it is striking to think of how much violence Mary was close to. As a betrothed but unwed mother, she faced the possibility of death by stoning. Then she found out that her child's murder was the desire of the king, who went on to conduct a genocide to accomplish his goal. Finally, she had to witness the violent death of her son. Quite a ride for the sake a child whom people would call the Prince of Peace!

Violence and death, though, are not the whole story, then or now. Peace can grow in the ashes of violence, and new life can come out of death. At least that's what happens in God's way of doing things. Pray for peace today, both for yourself and the world. But don't only pray; do something to help bring peace to conflict.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 2

FEAST OF BASIL THE GREAT AND GREGORY NAZIANZEN, BISHOPS AND DOCTORS OF THE CHURCH Meet the Cappodocians

How's this for a circle of family and friends: One of the brothers of the fourth-century bishop and theologian Saint Basil was Bishop Gregory of Nyssa. Counted also as saints are Basil's grandmother, father, two of his brothers, and his sister. His good friend was Bishop Gregory of

Nazianzus, also remembered today. Basil and his illustrious group came from the Greek region of Cappodocia, which had a tough reputation. They liked to tell the story that when a snake bit a Cappodocian, the snake died. Follow these holy Cappodocians and put some bite in your faith.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 3 - FEAST OF THE MOST HOLY NAME OF JESUS All things new—and old

Catholicism can be kind of like the deck of a ship. Depending on the voyage, different things may be needed: deck chairs, rain coats, blankets, sunblocker. But the things not being used at a given time are never thrown overboard; they're just put in storage until they are needed once again. Feasts of the church's calendar are one of those items. The church revised the calendar in 1969. At that time a feast for the Holy Name of Jesus, which used to be celebrated a day earlier on January 2, was removed. In 2002 this celebration of Jesus' holy name and saving power were restored. So praise Jesus' name today and use it well.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 4 - Let it reign

Who is a *messiah* anyway? In Hebrew the word means "anointed," and in the Old Testament the one God anointed was frequently a king, a holy figure who commanded Israel. Eventually the Israelites started looking to a future king whom God would send, a savior, to restore justice, peace, and security to the nation. And even before the New Testament translated *messiah* into *Christos*—are you starting to see the connection here?—Hebrew scripture suggested that the messiah might have to suffer to accomplish the saving mission.

When Christians got around to calling Jesus the Messiah, they saw in him the one who had come and would come again, giving his life to establish a kingdom in which God's purposes would be accomplished. Christ calls his followers to cooperate with him in building the kingdom he declared.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John 3:7-10; John 1:35-42*

"We have found the Messiah (which is translated 'Anointed')."

SATURDAY, JANUARY 5 - FEAST OF JOHN NEUMANN, BISHOP An offer they couldn't refuse

When Saint John Neumann (1811-1860) found out he was to become bishop of Philadelphia in 1852, wrote a biographer, "He went down on his knees in prayer. Still there and still praying, his brother Redemptorists found him the next morning." He even protested his appointment to the Vatican—to no avail. He became bishop of Philadelphia on his 41st birthday.

Another figure, whom the church celebrated last Wednesday, was also a reluctant bishop, the introvert Gregory of Nazianzus. Both men, however, responded to their calls, Gregory in the great see of Constantinople where he had to face down heresy and John Neumann in Philadelphia where he worked heroically to build up the diocese. Sometimes we need to overcome our personal preferences to work for the good of many.

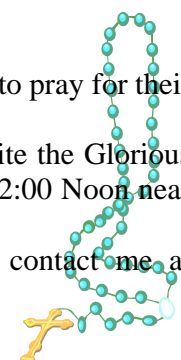
PLEASE JOIN ST. CLETUS ROSARY PRAYER GROUP!

STEWARDSHIP

Many of us would like to make a large gift from our IRA during life but we might need those funds for our retirement. Making Catholic parishes and schools the "payable on death" beneficiary of your retirement account is still a highly effective way to give. It's easy, doesn't involve giving money away during life that we might need some day and has tremendous tax advantages.

IRAs and other retirement plans are wonderful, but when it comes to the IRS, we always have to "pay the piper." Unless you have a Roth IRA, the funds in your IRA or other retirement plan will be taxed when you withdraw them. Not only that, when you leave the funds to individuals at your death, your loved ones will be taxed when they withdraw those funds from your IRA.

There is a way to lessen those taxes considerably while doing tremendous good for others. By making your Archdiocese, parish or school the "payable on death" beneficiary of your retirement plan, money that would have gone to pay taxes instead goes directly to support the Church.

To make the Church the "payable on death" beneficiary of your retirement plan, you can simply phone the company that administers your plan and ask for instructions on how you can change your death beneficiary. DID YOU KNOW...

St. Cletus' bereavement ministry, *Compassionate Care*, began forming in October, 2006. By January, 2007 the first sympathy card was sent. After a lot of meetings, e-mails and brainstorming, this ministry was fully functional in June of this year.

Our teams spring into action with the notice of a funeral.

Our funeral planners help the families prepare the liturgy, helping to select music and readings, and act as a liaison between the rectory and music ministers.

Another group of volunteers attend the wake and lead the attendees in a brief prayer service, offering consolation to our grieving families on behalf of the parish.

Shortly after the death notice, a sympathy card, made by one of our parishioners, is mailed on behalf of everyone in our parish.

A Care Basket of snacks, literature and other items, is delivered either to the funeral home during the wake or to the family's home during the week after the funeral. The baskets are assembled 4-5 times a year as needed, by our basket assembly team.

Phone calls are made several times during the following year by another group of volunteers, just to say hello and to let the families know we care about them.

During the year following a loss, six cards (in addition to the sympathy card) with inserts are mailed to each family by a "mailing team." We send a card at the 3-month, 6-month, 9-month, one year anniversary, at Christmas, and an All Souls Mass invitation. Literature such as *How to Get Through the Holidays When Someone You Love Has Died*, a prayer card with a verse written by one of our parishioners, *Care Notes*, and other informative sheets, are included to help get through that devastating, first year of loss. We also have a team of people who gather monthly to make each card that is mailed.

We're a busy ministry. In all, about 40 people serve the parish in this capacity. But we always have room for more. If you would like to join our ministry, please contact Rita Pawlowicz at (708) 839-0848, or e-mail at CCM@stcletusparish.com.
