



Notes from Father Bob ...

SECOND SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME

"GOD'S CHOSEN ONES"

We too are the chosen ones of God. In baptism the Holy Spirit descends on us and makes us the sharers in God's own life. Our responsibility as chosen ones is to take up the assignments we have just heard of in the life of Jesus, in the life of Paul and in the life of the servant disciple in today's readings. We are called to take away the sins of the world, to be apostles and to be the light of the nations, bringing salvation to the ends of the earth: all daunting tasks. We may be forgiven for trying to flee them or off-load them onto those we consider to be especially trained for the purpose, the clergy and religious. But, through our baptism, we are each called to make unique contributions to these assignments. It helps if we can see how in turn they have been communicated to us. As we have received, so shall we give. How have we been enlightened? What brings clear vision and understanding into our lives? What has our experience of forgiveness been? Have we really forgiven others or allowed ourselves to be truly forgiven? Finally, how have we received the good news? What words or images moved or still move us? It is through our own experience of God that God will communicate his presence to others.

SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - Great teammates

John the Baptist had quite a following even before Jesus arrived on the scene. The two prophetic leaders might have ended up as competitors, sniping at each other and trying to steal away each other's disciples like so many of today's religious leaders seem to do. Instead, they offer a model for mutual respect during this week dedicated to Christian unity. Jesus came to John for baptism. John pointed to Jesus as the greater of the two. Their followers knew and respected one another. We have the role models we need for Christian unity—the rest is up to us.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 49:3, 5-6; 1 Corinthians 1:1-3; John 1:29-34*

MONDAY, JANUARY 21

MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. DAY - Resistance takes discipline Even the most charismatic leaders need followers to bring about their vision, and Martin Luther King Jr. was no exception. Yet the story of these courageous young men and women has largely been left untold—until recently. The 2000 film *A Force More Powerful* documents the intense study and preparation the first civil rights protesters in Memphis and elsewhere undertook. Their training included many practice confrontations with hostile opponents, which resulted in the tremendous self-discipline that nonviolent resistance requires.

King once observed: "The hope of a secure and livable world lies with disciplined nonconformists who are dedicated to justice, peace, and brotherhood." Through what daily action can I place myself among those "disciplined nonconformists"?

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Samuel 15:16-23; Mark 2:18-22 "But the days will come when the bridegroom is taken away from them."

TUESDAY, JANUARY 22

DAY OF PENANCE FOR THE ANNIVERSARY OF ROE V. WADE Remember the us in them

At the heart of *Roe v. Wade*, the U.S. Supreme Court decision legalizing abortion, is the "versus," the antagonism, the eternal contest between "us" and "them." Our great challenge in choosing life over death is less to beat "them" whom we easily demonize as the other side but rather to see those with whom we profoundly disagree as persons beloved by God and saved by the Christ who reminds us, "The Lord does not see as mortals see, the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart." Part of the struggle to uphold the sanctity and value of life must be to draw close enough to the other to actually listen and see, beyond the "versus," another human heart.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Samuel 16:1-13; Mark 2:23-28 "They look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart."

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 23 - Working together to heal the world

In developing countries around the world, missionaries of every Christian denomination work side by side to care for the poor, the hungry, and the sick. Projects that provide water and medical services to remote villages are accomplished every day by people cooperating despite their religious differences. The resistance Jesus encountered in his own healing ministry was because he often had to cross the dividing lines of religion in order to get the

job done. In this Week of Prayer for Christian Unity we may not be able to share the sacrament of communion, but we can share the work of justice, which ultimately is the work of Jesus.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Samuel 17:32-33, 37, 40-51; Mark 3:1-6
"Then he said to them, 'Is it lawful to do good or to do harm on the sabbath, to save life or to kill?' But they were silent."

THURSDAY, JANUARY 24 - The bonds of kinship and friendship

The task of unity among Christians tends to polarize its focus to those on either end of theological or political debates. Reconciliation, however, more often than not comes from the thankless legwork of those caught in the middle. Few could attest to this fact better than Jonathan, who was the beloved friend of David but also the son of King Saul. The lesser known Jonathan found himself a tenuous link between two colossal figures of Israel. Torn between loyalties to his father and to God's new anointed, Jonathan sacrificed his own safety to plead reconciliation. Many of us can relate to such a position, be it within our church, family, or work. Rather than trying to assert your own individual viewpoint, focus on how you can serve as a figure of reconciliation.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Samuel 18:6-9; 19:1-7; Mark 3:7-12 "Jonathan then brought David to Saul, and David was in Saul's presence as before."

FRIDAY, JANUARY 25

CONVERSION OF PAUL, APOSTLE; WEEK OF CHRISTIAN UNITY ENDS Grace without borders

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity ends in the conversion of Paul, a person transformed by an encounter with the Righteous One himself, shaped into a new apostle to the nations. Paul's worldview and religious conviction were not so much reversed as expanded, made more universal in Christ. Proud to be a Jew from birth to death, Paul did not abandon his spiritual heritage but by God's Spirit came to see messianic hope fulfilled in Christ. Paul did, however, forsake his methods for carrying out God's will—coercion and punishment—in favor of Jesus' own practice of invitation and awakening faith in others. Perhaps our images of what Christian unity ought to look like need to be not only Catholic but catholic.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 22:3-16 or 9:1-22; Mark 16:15-18 "You will be his witness to all of what you have seen and heard."

SATURDAY, JANUARY 26 - FEAST OF TIMOTHY AND TITUS, BISHOPS - Be one of the left behind

There are good and bad ways of being left behind. The good way to be left behind, in the Christian context, is to be asked to continue the work of the kingdom of God. In this way, our ancestors in faith have left to us the ongoing work of God, as we will leave it to those who follow after us, and as Saint Paul left it to his friends Timothy and Titus, whom he commissioned to finish what was undone when he left Ephesus and Crete respectively. That's tradition—receiving the faith, caring for it, and handing it on—and we all have a part to play.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Timothy 1:1-8 or Titus 1:1-5; Mark 3:20-21

"I left you behind in Crete for this reason, so that you should put in order what remained to be done."

January 22 is the 35th anniversary of *Roe vs. Wade* when the Supreme Court legalized abortion at any stage. Today 4,400 babies are killed each day by abortion. That is *one million six hundred and six thousand* each year (1,606,000)!

In the message from Our Holy Father, he says "As you, your Bishops and great numbers of the faithful from throughout the United States gather at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception to pray for an end to the tragedy of abortion in your country, I assure you of my spiritual closeness and my sharing in your concern for the continuing holocaust of innocent human lives. This anniversary of the decision which effectively legalized abortion on demand in the United States is a call to people of good will to reflect seriously on the devastating consequences of that step. Now is the time for recommitment to the building of a culture of absolute respect for life from conception to natural death."

STEWARDSHIP

Wrapping Your Gift

If indeed, our participation at Mass includes a gift, it is an appropriate gesture to use our regular weekly envelope as a "gift wrapper." Using your envelope allows you to place your gift in the collection basket in a consistent manner.

Sacrificial Giving and the use of your envelope as a gift wrapper should be a decision that is reflected in regular, consistent giving - not occasional, or just in response to a certain appeal. That consistency is also a part of the practice of our faith and is part of the celebration of the liturgy each and every week. It also allows the parish the latitude to budget effectively.

Forward in Faith

When making a commitment to Sacrificial Giving, we place our trust and security in the Lord - not possessions or the material. It is a matter of moving forward in our own faith - without any guarantees. We give to God first. We turn over our apprehensions and anxieties about unconditional giving to the Lord and trust in Him. Money is not the security that will save us. We must trust in the Lord and move forward in faith.

How do I move forward in faith and what is expected?

You can move forward in faith by making a Sacrificial Gift from your "substance rather than surplus" each and every week in your regular envelope.

The next step is to evaluate your own giving. The ideal would be to be giving 5% of your gross annual income to the parish and another 5% to other charities (world missions, Catholic schools, etc). Recent studies indicate that Catholics give between 1.1% - 1.4% of their gross income. It would be unrealistic to ask people to jump from giving 1% to 5%. Perhaps, you might prayerfully consider increasing your giving by 1% annually (spread out over 52 weeks) until you reach the 5% - 10% level in the future.
