

Notes from Father Bob ...

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

When Jesus cures the man born blind, he demonstrates that he has come from God, as a light into the world, as a light to scatter the darkness. As a true messenger, he speaks openly and clearly through his words, his deeds and his character. To the newly-cured beggar man Jesus says, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" "Tell me who he is," the man replies, "so that I may believe." Here is the vocation of the Church in a simple sentence. It is to tell the world about Jesus of Nazareth, the light of the world.

Yet Jesus knows that many people will not accept him, that many will actively oppose him. As St. John says, he came as a light, but many would not accept him, because their deeds were dark.

We cannot make people be good, just as we cannot make people believe. But we can "tell" of the goodness of life by living in goodness ourselves. People follow example, and if the example reveals a happy person, people will want to follow.

When the early morning light creeps in at the window, it invites us to begin a new day. Every morning we are called to live in the light, both physically and spiritually. Saint Paul quotes to us an early Christian hymn: "Wake up from your sleep, rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you."

When the light of Christ shines on a person, that person becomes light itself, a pure and simple witness to the brightness and beauty of God. Here is the vocation of a Christian – to bear witness to the light.

"I cannot make you believe it, I was just asked to tell you."

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT - Seeing with the eyes of faith

Did you ever go looking for your glasses when they were sitting right on top of your head? Or search all over the house for your car keys when they were lying on the kitchen table, right where you left them? There are times when we can look right at something and not see it because we don't believe it's there. Take Jesus, for instance. We say we look for him and can't find him. Yet the Bible says he is "near you, in your mouth and in your heart" (Romans 10:8). If you are born of a woman, Christ is in you, wrapped up in your humanity. And there is nothing that can separate you from the love of God you have in Jesus Christ. Seeing may be believing, but in this case believing is seeing.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Samuel 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a; Ephesians 5:8-14; John 9:1-41

"Jesus said to him, 'You have seen him, the one speaking with you is he.' "

MONDAY, MARCH 3

FEAST OF KATHARINE DREXEL, VIRGIN Do-it-yourself faith

Katharine Drexel (1858-1955) was a wealthy young American who became concerned about the plight of African Americans and Native Americans after reading a book called *A Century of Dishonor* by Helen Hunt Jackson. She was moved to donate vast sums of money to their cause. Years later during an audience with Pope Leo XIII, Katharine asked him to send missionaries to aid the Indians in the missions she was financing. The pope responded by saying, "Why don't you become a missionary yourself?" So she did. Katharine spent the rest of her life and her fortune establishing schools and missions for blacks and Native Americans. Is there something we are waiting for someone else to do that we should be doing ourselves?

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 65:17-21; John 4:43-54 "The man with the sick boy believed the word that Jesus spoke to him and started on his way."

TUESDAY, MARCH 4

FEAST OF CASIMIR

Knowing the source of our healing

Imagine Prince Harry of Great Britain—handsome, young, royal—turning his back on national expectations and even those of his grandmother the queen, rejecting trappings, even girlfriends and a suitable spouse, all so that he could lead an austere and studious life focused on the King of kings. Such was Saint Casimir, second son of the king of Austria, who died at 23 and soon after became patron of both Poland and Lithuania. One wonders if Casimir consciously patterned himself on Jesus' frequent defiance of those who upheld the absolute demands of the Jewish Law? It's a good day to consider how often we too easily go along with everyone else's expectations and for what reasons, or for whom, we might just buck the tide.

TODAY'S READINGS: Ezekiel 47:1-9. 12; John 5:1-16 "The religious leaders began to persecute Jesus because he did this on a Sabbath."

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 5

LENTEN WEEKDAY

Put off procrastination

Spiritual author John Shea has authored books of poetry titled *The Hour of the Unexpected* and *The God Who Fell from Heaven*. One of his favorite themes is the sudden ways in which the divine can "break into" our everyday lives, often at the most unexpected moments. Jesus makes it clear that the "hour of the unexpected" not only is coming but has already arrived. Are you ready? If Jesus walked up to you on the street or rang your doorbell, would you be ready to meet him? Would you even

recognize him? Can you be sure he hasn't already approached you today? We do well to prepare every day to meet the Lord. He is always waiting for us to recognize his presence in everyone we meet.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 49:8-15; John 5:17-30 "Very truly, I tell you, the hour is coming, and is now here"

THURSDAY, MARCH 6

LENTEN WEEKDAY - Moses and Jesus: On the same page?

Moses and Jesus have a few things in common. Both have been called saviors and liberators. Moses is the giant of Hebrew scripture, and Jesus is the center of Christian scripture. Moses, in the 13th century B.C., never mentions Jesus, but certainly the reverse is true: Moses comes up in the New Testament at least 80 times, 60 times in John's gospel alone. John even notes that Jesus told his Jewish audience that if they failed to recognize him, it was because they misread Moses. Check out Deuteronomy 18:15-19: Is Jesus the kind of prophet Moses had in mind?

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 32:7-14; John 5:31-47 "If you believed Moses, you would believe me, for he wrote about me. But if you do not believe in what he wrote, how will you believe what I say?"

FRIDAY, MARCH 7

FEAST OF PERPETUA AND FELICITY, MARTYRS; WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

Happy coincidence

The fact that the memorial of saints Perpetua and Felicity this year happens to fall on the World Day of Prayer helps us bring to mind the prayerful presence of women throughout Christian history. Treated cruelly in a Roman prison before being put to death, Perpetua and Felicity are remembered for their prayerful presence and patience in hardship. So impressed was their jailer, Pudens, that he became a Christian, too. World Day of Prayer is a worldwide movement of Christian women of many traditions who come together to observe a common day of prayer each year and who, in many countries, have a continuing relationship in prayer and service. Spiritual women, then and now, can inspire us to pray daily.

TODAY'S READINGS: Wisdom 2:1a, 12-22; John 7:1-2, 10, 25-30 "Is not this the man whom they are trying to kill?"

SATURDAY, MARCH 8

LENTEN WEEKDAY

Take a stand, pay the price

Nicodemus is sometimes known as the "stealth disciple" for only coming to Jesus at night. Being a member of the ruling Sanhedrin by day, associating with a rabbi under surveillance might have been harmful to him professionally. But there came a time when Nicodemus couldn't compartmentalize his loyalties any longer. The chief priests and Pharisees were prepared to condemn Jesus, an act that seemed illegal and even immoral to Nicodemus. Sometimes we keep our own discipleship discreetly under wraps. When our loyalties are divided, will we raise our voices or remain stealth disciples?

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 11:18-20; John 7:40-53 "Nicodemus asked, 'Our law does not judge people without first giving them a hearing, does it?' "

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

CLEARING THE WORRY FROM MY MIND

Jn 9:1-41; Jn 3:14-21; Lk 15:1-3, 11-32 I cannot be afraid to be bold or worry about what others think of me. The man born blind didn't worry about the outcome of his case; he stood up to the Jewish leaders and lectured them. Pray this week to have that attitude and to trust God no matter what.

MONDAY: TAKING JESUS AT HIS WORD

Is 65:17-21; JN 4:43-54 The royal official who asked Jesus to heal his son lived a day's journey away. He headed home, believing, but he must have worried. Can I relate? Have I ever trusted God but had to wait to see the outcome?

TUESDAY: DO I WANT TO BE MADE WELL?

Ez 47:1-9, 12; JN 5:1-16 Jesus could ask me the same question. Do I really want to trust God in everything? What would life be like if I did not worry?

WEDNESDAY: THE SON ACTS NOT ON HIS OWN

Is 49:8-15; Jn 5:31-47 If Jesus could do "nothing on his own," surely I am even more dependent on God's grace to overcome my problems. If worry (or anything else) is cluttering my life, I ask for God's help. I, too, can do nothing on my own.

THURSDAY: ACCEPTING GLORY FROM OTHERS

Ex 32:7-14; Jn 5:31-47 Jesus accuses the Jewish leaders of caring more for one another's approval than for God's. Is that a problem in my life? I ask Jesus to help me seek God first.

FRIDAY: THE GOSSIPS OF JERUSALEM

Wis 2:1a, 12-22; Jn 7:1-2, 10, 25, 30 The pilgrims in Jerusalem were having a great time gossiping about Jesus. Do I worry about what others are saying about me behind my back and want to "set the record straight"? I discuss this with Jesus, who experienced the same problem.

SATURDAY: COMMITTING MY CASE TO GOD

Jer 11:18-20; Jn 7:40-53 Jeremiah was thrown into a cistern and Jesus was made fun of for doing God's work. Doing and saying what is right often lead to persecution and ridicule. Today, I ask God to help me be strong and bold. If I am persecuted, I am in good company.

During the last few weeks we have had a great number of donations come in through the parish. (To date, more than \$3,500). - More than 15 billion bottles of water are sold in the US yearly.
- Many people in these developing countries use about 10 liters of water per day (for drinking, cleaning, cooking, etc.) This is about 2 flushes of the toilet or 2.64 gallons of water.

In some parts of Africa, women and children use about 80% of their daily energy to get water for their families.

Please ponder these facts and talk about them with your families. RCIA CANDIDATES

My name is *Kelly Broderick*: I am a full-time mother of two and part-time child development specialist and family counselor. I decided to pursue my Confirmation with St. Cletus when I found myself increasingly interested in my son's CCD homework and then increasingly befuddled when trying to help him with it.

As my husband and I began to prepare Dylan for his First Holy Communion this spring, it reminded me of my own Communion back in `78 and how that was really the last time I learned anything related to my religion and the teachings of the Bible (outside of a few philosophy and literature classes in college). Due to the fact that I was 8-years old at the time of my last formal religion class, I remembered nothing of real value or meaning when it came to thinking about my faith.

After a brief, but mostly positive experience with a Congregational Church in Lakeview, Chicago, my husband Don and I consciously chose to return to our roots within the Catholic Church. It was at St. Cletus that our 4-year-old daughter was baptized and our 7-year-old son was recently re-baptized in the faith. My husband, a "Cradle Catholic" who received formalized instruction through his teenage years, agreed that we should, and *would*, attend Mass on Sundays with regularity and become the role models we hoped to be for our children...and maybe rejuvenate our own faith and spirituality along the way. This did happen for us and I made the choice to become Confirmed this year with him as my personal sponsor...just thirty years after my peers! We developed a real connection to Father (Pat) O'Neill during this time and found ourselves looking forward to our next chance to be a part of the parish that he serves and so clearly loves. The sharing, exploring, acceptance, and education I have received as a recipient of this transformational process under the direction of Brad, Pat, and my friends at RCIA has been a most rewarding experience for me. The group has provided me a forum, a safe place, to channel the spirituality I always knew was within me into *action* and words and *emotion*. That is truly a gift and I look forward to returning the favor whenever I am able.
