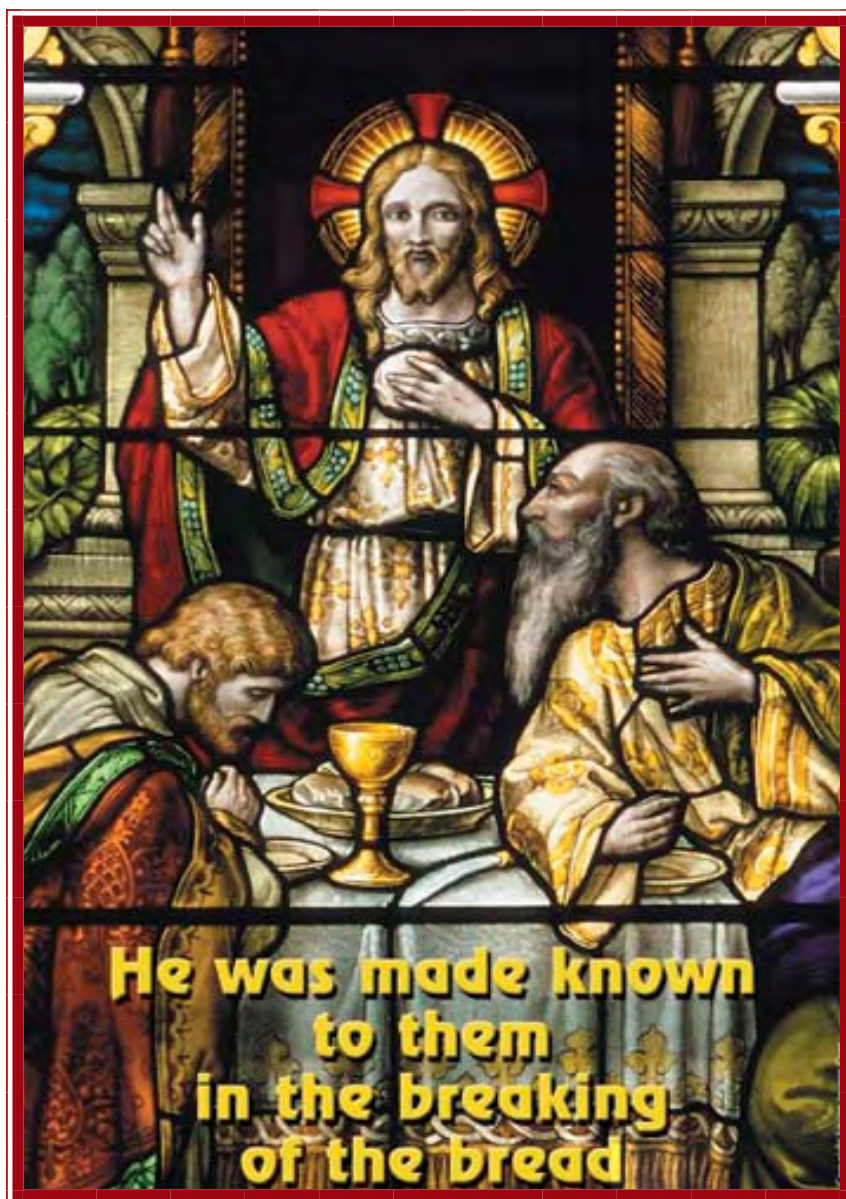

Notes from Father Bob...

Third Sunday of Easter

"Sometimes new worlds unexpectedly slip up over our horizon and catch us off guard. One morning we get up, stand at the foot of our bed, look out the window, and oh so briefly think how good it is to be alive; and for a moment we smile to ourselves before resuming the arranging of our day. Or we sit with a friend at a noonday lunch, telling stories and laughing over what our lives have been; and somewhere in the midst of it all we think to ourselves that what is happening right at this moment is worth all the struggles and tears of life. Or we sit by ourselves in the rare quiet of a house that is hardly ever so, and daydream, and think about what has gone on in this house over all the days and years, and realize that more than living has happened here, that love has, and maturing; and then the back door slams and our day returns to its tumultuous chaos."

"These are all moments of grace, moments when the shadows part if only briefly, and we see more clearly than we ever have before that it's the very presence of God in which we live and move. Then of course the moment disappears, and we'd like to tell someone about it and maybe we try, but in the end our words fall short. After all, how does one find words to explain how for a brief while we walked life with God more consciously than ever before?"

"I find myself wondering if that was part of what took place as Cleopas and his friend found themselves joined by a stranger on their journey from Jerusalem to Emmaus. How could they not know this stranger was Jesus? Maybe the grace of it was that through faith they came to recognize the Lord Jesus among them, and it didn't much matter whether that dawning of light came quickly or slowly. What did matter was that it happened."

"As many have said, life is a journey. Faith, too. And journeys take us to all sorts of unexpected places, or else they're not really journeys. Faith can be one of those unexpected turns in the road that make the journey new."

When we "Make Room for God" in our daily lives we provide the opportunity to recognize the Risen Lord along our life journey.

MONDAY, APRIL 7

FEAST OF JOHN BAPTIST DE LA SALLE, PRIEST

What are the rules again?

Most churchgoing folks are people of good will. We try to perform as God expects of us—like the folks around Jesus. But we’re not always clear on what those expectations are. Some of us are minimalists who hope that not doing anything really wrong is the same as living right. Some are legalists, comfortable with obeying and enforcing moral laws. Some struggle to shed a few more bad habits every year so as to creep closer to the spiritual ideals over a lifetime. Jesus says if we trust in him, we’ll always know what to do.

TUESDAY, APRIL 8

EASTER WEEKDAY - Fresh baked daily

There’s nothing like fresh baked goods. Compared with a cookie that comes out of a box or wrapped in a cellophane value-pack and the verdict is unanimous: Mom’s cookies are simply from another, better universe. The same holds true for the manna that arrived from heaven to feed God’s people in the desert every day. Unlike the bread that goes stale in short order, this daily bread sustained a nation for 40 years. In another generation, the crowds thought Jesus might be the new manna. And they were right. Two thousand years later, he sustains us still.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 9

EASTER WEEKDAY - Letting go and letting God

Most of us have an inner control freak that seeks to grab hold of the conversation, the car keys, or the remote. We wouldn’t mind getting a grip on the economy, world events, and the lives of those we care about while we’re at it. It’s hard not to be able to exercise our will over factors that affect us personally. So why would we voluntarily hand over control of our own lives to another authority? Maybe because Jesus our model did it first. Offer a prayer of confident surrender to God every morning—before world domination tempts you.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Acts 8:1b-8; John 6:35-40*

“I have come down from heaven, not to do my own will, but the will of the one who sent me.”

THURSDAY, APRIL 10

EASTER WEEKDAY - Be you ever so humble

Some synonyms for humility are: meekness, lowliness, poorness, meanness, smallness, unimportance, innocuousness, and submissiveness. No surprise that humility is often seen as a virtue that’s fine for other people, but not for ourselves! When we think of the word *humility*, we’re really thinking of its synonyms.

It takes a humble spirit to admit that we don’t know—whether it’s our way around a new city or our direction in life. Yet if we don’t ask questions, the answers can’t come to us, or we might not recognize them when they do. Today is a good day to ask ourselves what it is that we would like to understand; then actively look for the answer God has surely sent us.

FRIDAY, APRIL 11

FEAST OF STANISLAUS, BISHOP, MARTYR - Who’s in charge here?

Stanislaus was an 11th-century Polish priest who agreed to be ordained bishop only, it is said, at the direct command of the pope. Perhaps he, like many prophets, sensed the fate of those who speak out the Lord’s message. Stanislaus’ mettle was tested when he defied the king who was trying illegally to appropriate land for himself. The king eventually yielded, but the bishop paid for his impertinence with his life. Saint Paul, whose story we begin to read today, like Jesus himself, paid dearly daring to stand against civil and religious authority for the sake of the gospel. Would our world, our city, our neighborhood be safer, more peaceful, more wholesome if we, too, dared to speak truth to power?

TODAY’S READINGS: *Acts 9:1-20; John 6:52-59*

“I will show him what he will have to suffer for my name.”

EASTER WEEKDAY - Invest in what’s eternal

Think for a moment of all the time, energy, and money that you invest in the passing world. All the shopping, the running around, the watching television—it all ends up passing away when the world, *your* world, passes away. But in a story from the Acts of the Apostles a disciple named Tabitha invested her resources in God’s eternal kingdom. So when her world passed away, she had lasting assets waiting for her. Jesus says that our hearts are where our treasure is (Matthew 6:21). If our treasure is lasting, so will our hearts be. A mortal human can only rise to what’s eternal.
