Notes from Father Bob...

Pentecost 2008

“A Variety of Gifts But Always the Same Spirit.”

Today’s second reading is from a letter of Paul to his friends in Corinth. He explains that it is not even possible “to acknowledge that Jesus is Lord” without the assistance of the Spirit. To put the point positively, it is the active presence of the Spirit that enables us to accept the truth at the heart of Christianity – Jesus is risen, he is truly risen, he is with us, he is Lord.

Paul goes on to say that the Spirit blesses the Church with a variety of gifts or charisms. In ordinary speech a charism means an exceptional natural talent, but as used by Paul it means a special gift bestowed by the Holy Spirit. It is a grace given by God ‘for the common good.’ Such gifts are allotted to the laity just as much as to the ordained. Some are dramatic, such as those of healing or of speaking in tongues; but many are less striking, such as those of teaching, of helping others, of administration. Indeed, every gift we have is a potential charism, something that can be put at the service of all.

Paul insists that the Holy Spirit who is responsible for the rich diversity of gifts in the Church is also responsible for the gift of unity. Many gifts “but the same source, the Holy Spirit”; “all sorts of service to be done but always to the same Lord (Jesus)” and “in all sorts of different ways in different people, (but always) it is the same God who is working in all”. “Just as a human body” says Paul “is made up of many parts and yet remains ‘a single unit’, so, thanks to the Holy Spirit, the Church is one though made up of many different members, each with their own unique gifts.”

An early Christian writer, speaking of the effects of Holy Communion, noted that ‘he (or she) who eats the bread (of the Eucharist) with faith, eats at the same time the fire of the Holy Spirit’. On this Sunday we might consider our own parish community and ask to what extent the ‘fire of the Holy Spirit’ is in evidence here. Is our parish alive? Are people devoting their time, their gifts, their energies to building up of community? Are we open to new ways of doing things or firmly anchored in the past? Are we completely self-centered as a parish or do we look beyond our parochial bounds? Is our unity manifested in genuine friendliness to one another, in readiness to listen to and to serve one another? Does our parish community live in harmony or is it driven by divisions?

Asking such questions can be valuable. But only if we are prepared to ask a supplementary question: “If things are not as they should be, what can I do to improve the situation?” If enough of us were ready to adopt that attitude, who knows what might happen? Might not the Holy Spirit put the finishing touches to our small efforts, bringing about a miniature Pentecost in our midst and so renewing the face of the earth right here at St. Cletus?

We offer our Prayers and Best Wishes for our parish First Communion recipients; our Confirmation recipients; our Mothers on this Great Feast of Pentecost. We are extremely proud of you and wish nothing but God’s endless blessings upon each of you that you may grow in his grace always.

We look to the Holy Spirit this day for signs of grace that will bring you many gifts and that you may be inspired to use these gifts for the honor and glory of our loving God.

May we use this occasion to wish each other “Happy Birthday” as Universal Church, especially the Church here at St. Cletus Parish.

SOLEMNITY OF PENTECOST

Feel the power

When the disciples gathered for the “first” Pentecost, the stage was set for something dramatic to happen. The Jewish feast of Pentecost was a harvest festival but also the celebration of God’s covenants with the Israelites, especially Moses receiving the law at Mt. Sinai. So when the roaring wind of the Spirit swept in, it seemed to be coming all the way from the breath of God that swept over the waters at the creation of the world. And the gift of tongues undid the post-Tower of Babel confusion: now, many languages, but everyone understands. In that first Pentecost God gifted the church with God’s presence, with signs of a new covenant and a renewal of creation that would go out to the whole world. Catch that Spirit today.

FEAST OF NEREUS AND ACHILLEUS, MARTYRS

Not in words only, but deeds

The New Testament Letter of James is not without contention in Christian history. Whatever its authorship, its purpose is clear: to remind us of what is expected in the daily living of those who belong to Christ Jesus. James encourages those who bear trials—perhaps not unlike Nereus and Achilleus, ancient and otherwise unknown martyrs whom we celebrate today. The oppression that most interests James, however, is that which divides the rich and poor, an injustice no Christian should stand for. James is all about faith in action. Sadly, the divide between rich and poor is as true today as ever, even in our own country, and just as wrong.

In a wonderful book called *Our Lady of the Lost and Found*, by Diane Schoemperlen, which Mary lovers should not miss, Our Lady appears to a modern-day unsuspecting Protestant woman. “It’s me, Mary,” she says. “Mother of God.” Not getting a reaction, Our Lady winsomely continues introducing herself with a litany of names by which she’s been known throughout history. Finally, the narrator has the presence of mind to answer: “Hello.” Some of us might do no better. Those who have reported apparitions of Mary have often had a hard time upholding their end of the conversation. Prepare by starting the conversation today.

But the “whole world” is a relative term, and we have all sought it at various times—whether that world is money, influence, or the admiration of our family. Any time we let the ends justify the means, we are seeking to gain the whole world. In what ways have we sought to “gain the whole world” and what has been lost in the pursuit? What small change can we make today to rebalance our priorities?

FEAST OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

Knowing the Beloved

The Catechism of the Catholic Church has this whopping statement to make about Mary: “The Marian dimension of the church precedes the Petrine” (no. 773). In other words, she’s bigger than the pope and has more primacy than Peter. And she, like the Father, can speak of her beloved Son and the need for us to listen to him. Mary knew Jesus in her body just as we know Jesus in our own bodies through the mystery of the Eucharist. From within his words still speak to us when we study the gospels. Wouldn’t today be a good day to listen to what he has to say?

THE GIFTS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel, Knowledge, Fortitude, Piety, Fear of the Lord.

STEWARDSHIP

There is a wonderful old hymn called "*In the Garden*." Perhaps you will remember the first verse and the refrain:

I come to the garden alone while the dew is still on the roses, and the voice I hear falling on my ear, the Son of God discloses. Refrain: And he walks with me, and he talks with me, and he tells me I am his own; and the joy we share as we tarry there, none other has ever known. (C. A. Miles 1913)

We are reminded of Christ's last words: "Remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Mt. 28:20) Christ is indeed our eternal companion. His promise is indeed to walk and talk with us throughout all of our lives; a promise on which we can always rely. When we sincerely decide to be open to Christ's companionship and to live so as to make him proud of us, we will want to show it in our daily living... including our stewardship.
