

### Notes from Father Bob ...

### Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

It's hard for us to imagine what criteria Jesus might have used in selecting the twelve apostles. They were certainly a diverse group of people, from varied backgrounds, and each with their own characteristics. As Jesus' life and mission unfolds, we learn more and more about them: their great acts of faith, their loyalty and enthusiasm; but we also meet their doubts, their unfaithfulness and distress.

If we were looking today to employ people for an important job, we'd probably want strict interviews, good references, and the best qualifications possible. The amazing thing about Jesus is that he chooses people to work with him even though he knows all their faults. Jesus knew the disciples had human failings and fragile lives, but he chose them for who they were. Their willingness to respond, to follow his call, was far more important than any personal worthiness. In the midst of their ordinary lives, Jesus invited them to do extraordinary work and they said "yes". Perhaps they found courage to do this in the very attitude of Jesus himself. Matthew begins by telling us how Jesus saw the crowds and felt sorry for them. This incredible compassion, Jesus' immense love, may have helped shift the focus from their human weakness to the greatness of sharing in God's plan of salvation.

Appreciating more about God's love and less about our own weakness takes time; it was only slowly, that the people of Israel came to trust they were supported more by God's strength, than by their own efforts. Gradually, we too can begin to grasp more fully the truth set before us by St. Paul – that Christ died for us while we were sinners, while we were imperfect. There's a popular poster that shows an image of the crucifixion and states, "I asked Jesus, 'How much do you love me?" Underneath is written, "He replied, 'This much,' and then stretched out his arms and died." As Jesus came into our broken world and conquered sin and death, so he meets us in our broken lives and calls us to discipleship.

Possibly one of the greatest barriers in the Christian life is an unhelpful sense of our unworthiness. We are sometimes so aware of our shortcomings that we ask: Would Jesus really want to call me as a disciple if he truly knew what I was like? Well the answer is "yes." Jesus knows each one of us through and through and he chooses us to follow him and work with him. We are not called because of our talents, useful though these might be in building God's kingdom. No, Christ summons us because he loves us and in loving us opens up the way for us to love and serve him and each other. We could never be worthy enough to earn eternal salvation; this is God's free gift in Christ. Discipleship is about our willingness, not our worthiness.

### **Looking for laborers**

Fathers, wouldn't it be great for your children or grandchildren to land the best job in the world? What a great Father's Day present that would be. How about encouraging them to become a different kind of father—or a sister or brother? A recent survey listed "clergy" as the career choice offering the most job satisfaction. Despite the scandals that have rocked the church, Catholic priests are still among the happiest people on earth, and religious brothers and sisters also have unusually high job satisfaction. Jesus told his disciples to pray for vocations to the ministry of the harvest. Combine your prayers with words of encouragement and some literature from vocation directors or diocesan vocations offices. A lifetime of happiness is all that we could wish for our children.

### Monday, June 16 - Bottomless pockets

People often seek guidance about how to respond to the "spare change" people who camp out on city streets. They also want to know what to do with the mountains of solicitations they receive in the mail. Obviously, if we gave every single time we're approached, some of us would be asking for spare change ourselves before long. But the secret truth we don't like to acknowledge is that most of us could give far more than we do. The best advice I've received is: Give till it scares you. That's the threshold where the faith walk begins.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Kings 21:1-16; Matthew 5:38-42 "Give to everyone who begs from you, and do not refuse anyone who wants to borrow from you."

### TUESDAY, JUNE 17 - Breaking even

The love to which Christ calls us is not a zero-sum game. But we often treat it that way. We are polite to the coworkers who are polite to us. We send birthday gifts to those who remembered ours. Perhaps we only give that amount of affection to our spouses that we can be sure he or she will reciprocate. When we treat people according to the way they treat us, our love is a slave to the wills of others. It can never flow freely. We seek to break even in our love, when all we do is allow the other party to dictate its limits. This attitude is so contrary to the love of Christ, who loves each according to his own will, his own grace. Pray today that your love will flow through the freedom Christ has given us.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Kings 21:17-29; Matthew 5:43-48 "For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have?"

### WEDNESDAY, JUNE 18

### Left holding the bag—or the mantle

Elijah's farewell is less about a prophet's grand exit in an F-4 tornado and more about what remains of him. Like Elisha, the friend and disciple left behind, we may feel the absence of Jesus and overwhelmed by the task he has left us. But Elisha is left with more than memories and a ministry. He has his master's mantle, and a "double share" of his spirit. In our turn on the planet, we, too, may feel our Master has left us on our own, but Jesus assures us that here on earth we will do the same things he did

"and greater besides"—not walking on water or changing water to wine but "righteous deeds," acts of compassion, justice, and forgiveness.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Kings 2:1, 6-14; Matthew 6:1-6, 16-18 "As Elijah and Elisha continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven."

### Note to myself: Become a saint

Sometimes the life of a saint can seem so far beyond our ability to model that we feel defeated before we start. How many of us have thought, "I could get close to God, too—if I didn't have this demanding job, or these children to care for, or this household to manage. Anyone can pray in a monastery!" Saint Romuald, who spent his life in pursuit of solitude, silence, and contemplation, understands our dilemma. He wrote, "The fact that we cannot duplicate their [the saints'] lives does not change the call to us to be totally open to God in our particular circumstances." Yes, we are busy. But God is calling us "in our particular circumstances." How can we be open to God today?

TODAY'S READINGS: Sirach 48:1-14; Matthew 6:7-15 "In praying, do not babble like the pagans, who think that they will be heard because of their many words."

### FRIDAY, JUNE 20

#### Eyes on the prize

Perhaps you have heard of a monastic discipline called "custody of the eyes," which originally was promoted as an aid to chaste living. In our age of total media exposure and graphic representations of sex and violence, we would do well to exercise a measure of this discipline in our own lives. If the eyes are the window to the soul, there might indeed be good reasons to keep the blinds half drawn much of the time. Overexposed eyes can lead to a washed-out soul. Focus on your higher calling and exercise discipline as to where you let your eye wander, for there your heart may soon follow.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Kings 11:1-4, 9-18, 20; Matthew 6:19-23 "The eye is the lamp of the body. If the light in you is darkness, how great is the darkness!"

### As you sow, so shall you reap

"If we are rushed for time, sow time and we will reap time," Dorothy Day wrote in her memoir *The Long Loneliness*. "Go to church and spend a quiet hour in prayer. You will have more time than ever and your work will get done. Sow time with the poor. Sit and listen to them, give your time lavishly. You will reap time a hundredfold. Sow kindness and you will reap kindness. Sow love, you will reap love." How many of us would try to cope with our busy schedules by actually taking time for something not on our to-do lists? Yet if we trust, God will multiply the time we invest in prayer, love, and generosity into a great harvest.

### ST. CLETUS FOOD PANTRY...

**Thank You!** for your generosity in helping us fill 150+ bags for our June food distribution. The struggling economy has affected all of us, and so we especially appreciate your continuing to make it part of your routine to pick up some items for the Food Pantry when you do your weekly grocery shopping. Our pantry shelves have many empty spaces. Here are a few reminders as we begin to restock them:

- During the summer months our food donations fall off somewhat because of people on vacation, etc. However, our need remains constant. Please remember us!
- At this time we have no pasta and a great shortage on these staples: pasta sauce, tomatoes, meals in a can/box, tuna, canned vegetables & fruits, macaroni & cheese, peanut butter, jelly, soup, rice, and pinto beans.
- Each month we try to include a few extras in each pre-packed family bag. We also have a "specials table" from which each family may choose an item or two. Some favorites include coffee, powdered or evaporated milk, oatmeal, juice, crackers or cookies, diapers (especially sizes 4& 5), toiletries, laundry detergent and dish washing soap.
- All non-perishables are greatly appreciated. Please remember to check expiration dates to avoid out of date goods which we cannot use.
- These items can be dropped off in the designated food bins located in the Madonna della Strada shrine in the Church vestibule. You can bring them when you come to Mass over the weekend, or daily, from 7:45 AM 4:00 PM.
- As you tend your gardens, remember that we have a "Share the Wealth" distribution of fresh produce on the days of our August and September food distributions. Watch the Canticle for details.
- The Food Pantry distributes groceries from the vestibule of the Church on the second Thursday of each month, from 6:30-8:00 PM. Our next distribution will be on July 10.


