

# NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

#### Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Someone (Socrates) once said that a life not reflected on is no life at all. In today's gospel, Jesus is asking us to reflect on our lives and see if we have been trying to build up his kingdom. We will know this by the lack of conceit among us. We walk in his kingdom when our actions lead others to believe that living in love is possible. The author of the letter to the Philippians lets us know what the kingdom might look like. In a normal grouping of people there will always be personality clashes, petty rivalries and a certain degree of ambition. The task of any Christian community is to gradually overcome those initial differences, building up trust by the love we share among us. When we rely on only our own resources this will be impossible. Any progress we make in virtue will not be of our own making but is gained for us by the cross of Christ. The proper attitude then is not one of pride but one of gratitude and humility.

Jesus welcomes sinners into his kingdom, saving his condemnation for the Pharisees in their hardness of heart. They are too stubborn to see that they are being called to conversion. In their arrogance they believe they have the fullness of the truth and have no need of any new prophets, or messiahs for that matter. But to those who know their need for forgiveness, those who have fallen but are trying to turn their lives around, Jesus offers the possibility of redemption from past mistakes.

We all spend much of our lives looking after those who have been given to us, our spouse, and our children. It is through this self-giving that we follow the example of Jesus. We come together in the Eucharist, to share our faith, and to draw strength from God and each other. Of course, it can sometimes be difficult to admit that we are in need of help. But reflecting on our lives we could all say that we need the strength of Jesus. Is there anything in our lives that needs to change if we are to be faithful to the example of Christ?

We often fail each other and fail ourselves in word and deed. But we can take courage from the message of Jesus that the first in the kingdom are those we might consider least. It is never too late. Saint Augustine, who spent many years far from Christ, finally admitted his need for forgiveness. He later penned the words: "Late have I loved thee, O beauty so ancient and so new." No one is beyond the power of Jesus and his redeeming love. He proves that love by pouring his life out for us on a cross.

#### Faithful Citizenship

The 2008 elections are quickly approaching and there are numerous issues confronting our country at this time. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in their reflection "Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship" (2004) offers us some questions to consider during the campaign:

- After September 11, how can we build not only a safer world, but a better world more just, more secure, more peaceful, and more respectful of human life and dignity?
- How will we protect the weakest in our midst innocent unborn children? How can our nation not turn to violence to solve some of its most difficult problems abortion to deal with difficult pregnancies; the death penalty to combat crime; euthanasia and assisted suicide to deal with burdens of age, illness, and disability; and war to address international disputes?
- How will we address the tragic fact that more than 30,000 children die every day as a result of hunger, international debt and lack of development around the world?
- How can our nation help parents raise their children with respect for life, sound moral values, a sense of hope, and an ethic of stewardship and responsibility? How can our society defend the central institution of marriage and better support families in their moral responsibilities?
- How will we address the growing number of people without affordable and accessible health care? How can health care better protect human life and respect human dignity?
- How will our society combat continuing prejudice, overcome hostility toward immigrants and refugees, and heal the wounds of racism, religious bigotry, and discrimination?
- How will our nation pursue the values of justice and peace in a world where injustice is common, desperate poverty widespread, and peace is too often overwhelmed by violence?
- What are the responsibilities and limitations of families, community organizations, markets, and government?
   How can these elements of society work together to overcome poverty, pursue the common good and care for creation?
- When should our nation use, or avoid the use of military force for what purpose, under what authority, and at what human cost?
- How can we join with other nations to lead the world to greater respect for human life and dignity, religious freedom and democracy, economic justice and care for God's creation?

#### MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 29

## FEAST OF MICHAEL, GABRIEL, AND RAPHAEL, ARCHANGELS There are angels, and then there are angels

When God needs to communicate something, God frequently calls on angels to carry the mail. In scripture angels announce important events, help people, and at times do God's judgment. They are divine beings, or somewhere in between God's perfection and the material world. In fact this speculation about what they are led in the early church to a hierarchy on which the Archangels, three of whom we celebrate today, are only eighth on the list, just above Angels and one notch below Principalities (the first six, in descending order of wonderfulness, are the Seraphim, Cherubim, Thrones, Dominations, Virtues, and Powers). The arch—"chief"—angels, Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael, appear in Jude 1:9; 1 Thessalonians 4:16; Revelation 12:7; Daniel 8:16, 9:21 and 10:13, 21; Luke 1:11, 26; and Tobit 12:15. Take a look and see what they're up to.

TODAY'S READINGS: Daniel 7:9-10, 13-14 or Revelation 12:7-12a; John 1:47-51

#### TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 30

# FEAST OF JEROME, PRIEST, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Get the message

Saint Jerome (c. 340-c. 420) lived out his famous dictum: "Ignorance of the scriptures is ignorance of Christ." At the encouragement of the pope he made a new translation of the Old Testament into Latin and revised the existing translation of the New Testament. He also wrote commentaries on biblical books, including the prophets. He knew that the more deeply one explores scripture, the closer to Christ one gets. And to get the message of the Bible makes us messengers ourselves, just like Saint Jerome. What can you do to deepen your knowledge and understanding of scripture—and also of God—and pass that along?

TODAY'S READINGS: Job 3:1-3, 11-17, 20-23; Luke 9:51-56 "When the days drew near for him to be taken up, he set his face to go to Jerusalem. And he sent messengers ahead of him."

#### WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 1

#### First things first

Jesus didn't exactly embrace the concept of the traditional family. Rather he preferred to call "family" those who followed him and spread his gospel—in other words, his disciples. For example, when a would-be disciple said he had to first perform the sacred duty of burying his deceased father, Jesus replied, "Let the dead bury their own dead, but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God." Harsh words, but it was his way of saying that those who did not completely respond to his

call were dead—not physically like the father, but spiritually dead. How can you recommit yourself to Christ?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Job 9:1-12, 14-16; Luke 9:57-62*

#### THURSDAY, OCTOBER 2

#### FEAST OF THE GUARDIAN ANGELS

#### Guard against powerful temptation

Saint Augustine once wrote, "There is a certain greatness in the angels . . . every person desires the power of the angels, but their righteousness every person loves not." Who wouldn't want to be able to fly like an angel, perhaps carry a fiery sword or possess magical healing powers? But would we use our supernatural powers to accomplish the will of God, or would we join the swollen ranks of the fallen angels? The temptations of power are many and great; better to let angels take care of the heroics while we keep our feet firmly planted on the ground.

TODAY'S READINGS: Job 19:21-27; Matthew 18:1-5, 10 "Take care not to despise one of these little ones; for, I tell you, in heaven their angels continually see the face of my Father."

#### FRIDAY, OCTOBER 3

#### What to do?

When something bad or difficult happens in our lives, we immediately cry to God, "Why has this happened?" and "When will it be over?" And we would like an answer—today if possible; tomorrow at the latest. Unfortunately, our salvation does not lie in quick resolutions. Instead we need to learn to stand silently before life's great mysteries. We need to learn to hold them without trying to resolve them too quickly. We need to learn to "ponder." Asking questions, demanding answers, complaining, and generally making noise is what we want to do. Standing silently before God is what we need to do. Next time, what will you do?

TODAY'S READINGS: Job 38:1, 12-21; 40:3-5; Luke 10:13-16 "Behold, I am of little account; what can I answer you? I put my hand over my mouth."

#### SATURDAY, OCTOBER 4

## FEAST OF FRANCIS OF ASSISI, RELIGIOUS Less is (so much) more

Franciscans have been trying to get their man out of the birdbath for years. It's charming and sweet to picture him swathed in bluebirds, but even as we haul our pets to church to have them blessed, how about remembering Francis' conviction that amassing things not only damages the planet, it gets in the way of loving God and others? Nearly 40 years ago then-*Newsweek* religion editor Kenneth Woodward was asked what Franciscans could offer the church today. He said their gift was to teach us all "how to live with less, thereby freeing the spirit from slavery to 'things' so that we can concentrate on humanizing (even sacramentalizing) our lives." Franciscans worldwide are not only men and women religious but an entire order of laypeople, all on the front lines. Woodward said their "example must be strong, humble, practical, a practical wisdom of the spirit. . . . Come in not with answers, but with experiments in living on less for more."

TODAY'S READINGS: Job 42:1-3, 5-6, 12-17; Luke 10:17-24 "I give you praise, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, for although you have hidden these things from the wise and the learned you have revealed them to the childlike."

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This weekend we again celebrate Seminary Sunday in all the parishes throughout the Archdiocese of Chicago. The better you know Jesus the more his mystery attracts you. The more you discover him, the more you are moved to seek him. This is a movement of the spirit which lasts throughout life, and which makes the seminary a time of immense promise, a true 'springtime.'"

As our seminarians spend years in formation and discernment, I thank you for your financial contributions which provide them with the environment to "prepare well" to serve God's faithful for years to come. I ask you to pray for them and for those whom God is now calling to the ordained priesthood from among our families and friends.

Finally, I pray that God will continue to bestow on you and your families His choicest blessings for your generosity to the seminarians. You are in my prayers, and I ask you to remember me and our Archdiocese in your prayers each day. Thank you.

#### **Food Pantry**

We need your help! In September, although we served 170+ families, we had to send some away because we ran out of food. As we restock our shelves for the October 9th food distribution, we are mindful that the need in October is traditionally higher than in September. It is a national trend that the number of working poor needing supplemental food pantries is growing, so our challenge to keep up with this need is not unique. We are so grateful for the continuing generosity of our parishioners, for the St. Cletus School 6<sup>th</sup> grade class, who have made the Food Pantry their service project this year, and for the extra help we receive from the First Methodist Church of Western Springs, the Highlands Presbyterian Church, the Scouts, and other local community and school organizations.

At this time we are in need of most of our staples and extra items, including dry pinto beans, rice, peanut butter, jelly, pasta, pasta sauce, macaroni & cheese, canned fruit, canned vegetables, soup, meals in a can/box, tuna, cereal, boxed side dishes, powdered or evaporated milk and paper goods. As always, we welcome all in-date non-perishables, but if you could also add one or more of the most needed items listed above to your shopping list, we'd really appreciate it. Your food donations may be dropped off in the designated food bins in the church vestibule. Thank you for your continuing support for this ministry!
