



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB ...

Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Isaiah's version of God's kingdom is of abundance, joy and peace, all the gifts of the Lord. He describes the reign of God using familiar, tangible images, and we can easily grasp what Isaiah describes. It is an immortality that immediately appeals. But Isaiah does not simply describe: he teaches. On the day when we attain the kingdom, we will recognize the Lord's goodness and truly rejoice. For Isaiah, the good things that make up the kingdom are inseparable from the presence of the Lord: "...for the hand of the Lord rests on this mountain".

St. Paul takes a similar approach. For him, the presence of God is everything – strength, life, and salvation. And like Isaiah, his vision of God's kingdom, a gift of the generous God, leads him to give glory to God. Is the vision of Isaiah and Paul the same as that of Jesus?

Today's gospel reading is admonitory. Jesus describes our invitation to God's kingdom, while warning of the dangers of taking it for granted. The kingdom is like a wedding feast, an image of the kingdom used frequently by Jesus. But here the emphasis is not on abundance or on celebration. It is on accepting the invitation so generously extended by God. And here is the warning: immortality, or at least a blissful immortality, is by no means guaranteed. "Many are called," he says, "but few are chosen."

Let's look more closely at this parable. Firstly, it is told to the chief priests and elders, those who perhaps would be most complacent about their own inclusion in God's kingdom. Complacency, to Jesus, is a true enemy of the soul. The first response of those who are invited is to ignore the invitation. The repeated invitation is unambiguous; those invited are compelled to respond this time, and their response is to seize, maltreat and finally kill the servants of the King. The message of Jesus is clear. To refuse the invitation of God can put us in the position of enemies of the kingdom. Ignoring the message is not satisfactory at all.

In the final part of the parable, we see that the invitation of the King is then extended more widely than before, because the original guests refused to attend. But those who do attend are careful to make preparations. Again, complacency is intolerable. The person who turns up at the feast under-dressed, unprepared, is cast out into the darkness. Many are called, some respond, and of those who respond, not all take seriously the nature of the feast.

We cannot afford to take lightly our destiny, in this world or the next. To do so is to neglect the whole purpose of our life. Complacency is truly the enemy of the soul, because we are treating lightly what should be treated most seriously of all: our eternal happiness. If there is a hell for us or for anyone else, it is a hell of isolation that we have constructed for ourselves and for each other. God's constant invitation is an ever-present lifeline to a world of peace and joy.

It is said by dream analysts that each person in our dreams represents an aspect of ourselves; so too in the parables of Jesus. We are the invited guests who choose not to attend; we are those who do not prepare for the feast; and we are those who accept eagerly, prepare, and enjoy the feast. With these possibilities clearly before us, and with God's help, how could we choose ill?

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 12, 2008

TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME A place set for you at the table

That tiny wafer we receive at Communion and the little sip we take from the cup doesn't seem like much of a feast. But look at it this way: As it says in one of the Mass prayers, it's the "foretaste and promise of the Paschal feast of heaven." Our little banquet in church is a sacrament, the visible sign of an invisible reality. What we don't yet see is the fullness and completeness of life to which the sign points, described in scripture as a wedding reception. The nice thing about this wedding is that we are not simply guests—we are the bride!

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 25:6-10a; Philippians 4:12-14, 19-20; Matthew 22:1-14*

"Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, and everything is ready.' "

MONDAY, OCTOBER 13

SUKKOT BEGINS - Pack your bags

As much as setting down roots allows us to experience nourishment and growth, they all the same can make us rigid and insensitive. If we take the biblical history of the Israelites as any example, God clearly believes it's important that God's followers occasionally be uprooted and sent wandering in order to be transformed and find their Lord anew. Today begins the Jewish Feast of Booths (also called *Sukkot*), first celebrated to remind the Israelites of their 40 years of wandering. It is traditional that during this feast Jews should construct a temporary, destructible shelter in which to live, annually uprooting themselves from the comforts and burdens of their daily lives. Imagine your own way to practice this uprooting in the following days.

TODAY'S READINGS: Galatians 4:22-24, 26-27, 31-5:1; Luke 11:29-32

"For freedom Christ has set us free."

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 14

FEAST OF CALLISTUS I, POPE, MARTYR-The saint of second chances Callistus (d. 222) started out as a slave, bungler, and brawler—not the usual career path for a pope. As a slave he lost a sum of money his Christian master had entrusted to him and fled in terror only to be caught later. Sentenced to hard labor, his captors eventually released him in the hope he would work off his debt. But he got into a fight and was imprisoned again. After our hero was once again freed, the current pope, Saint Zephrinus, took note of Callistus and decided to trust him by putting him in charge of a Christian cemetery in Rome. Becoming pope himself, Callistus was known for his mercy and said that even murderers could be admitted to communion after they had done penance for their sin. Perhaps Callistus appreciated the second chances and new trust he had received and wanted to return the favor. Do you give people another chance, and do you make good on those given to you?

TODAY'S READINGS: Galatians 5:1-6; Luke 11:37-41 "For in Christ Jesus . . . the only thing that counts is faith working through love."

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 15

FEAST OF TERESA OF JESUS, VIRGIN, DOCTOR Time for a spiritual checkup

Ever wonder whether you are in good spiritual health? It's easy to assess: If love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control come easily to you, you're in good shape. If hatred, rivalry, jealousy, outbursts of fury, acts of selfishness, and envy are your frequent reactions to events, you're

in need of a spiritual workout. Let Saint Teresa of Avila (1515-1582), reformer and church doctor, be your spiritual trainer. Step one: Recite this Teresian prayer daily: "Let nothing disturb you; Let nothing dismay you; All things pass: God never changes. Patience attains all that it strives for. He who has God lacks for nothing: God alone suffices." Step two: There is no need for a step two if you master step one.

TODAY'S READINGS: Galatians 5:18-25; Luke 11:42-46 "By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control"

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 16 - Knowing ahead of time

It helps to know things will work out before you get started on them. Paying bills is easy when you know the money is there. Getting something fixed is a less anxious experience when you have confidence in the repairperson. So it is with the spiritual life. In all the apparent struggle to believe, live a holy life, and do the right thing, we can forget how much God has already done for us. Saint Paul makes this point many times. We are *already* blessed. We *already* have redemption in Christ. God has revealed God's plan for us and the world and has chosen and adopted us as God's children. All we have to do is to stay close to God and offer praise. God has given us so much and promises to lead us to glory. Knowing that might make the journey a bit easier.

TODAY'S READINGS: Ephesians 1:1-10; Luke 11:47-54 "With all wisdom and insight God has made known to us the mystery of the divine will set forth in Christ."

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 17

FEAST OF IGNATIUS OF ANTIOCH, BISHOP, MARTYR In the arms of Christ

Ignatius of Antioch (c. 35-110) is one of the apostolic fathers of the church, a small group of Christian authors who lived close to the time of Jesus and had personal contact with some of the 12 apostles. It is said that Saint Peter himself appointed Ignatius to be bishop of Antioch. Tradition also has it that as a young child Ignatius had been one of the children Jesus took in his arms and blessed (Matthew 19:13-15). Whether or not historically true, this story signals something each of us can make our own—the image of being held in the loving arms of our Savior. That indeed is a tradition that remains unbroken, from the time of Jesus down to the present.

TODAY'S READINGS: Ephesians 1:11-14; Luke 12:1-7 "Are not five sparrows sold for two pennies? Yet not one of them is forgotten in God's sight."

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 18

FEAST OF LUKE, EVANGELIST - Show and tell

Today we remember and celebrate Saint Luke, author of the Acts of the Apostles as well as the gospel that bears his name. Thanks to Luke we have an original, compelling portrait of Jesus the master who emphasized the importance of prayer and who cared deeply for women and the poor, the outcast, the ill, and the lowly of society. Luke is the only one of the four evangelists whose stated purpose in writing his gospel is so that others would be assured of the truth of their earlier instruction about Jesus. Let us be grateful to parents, teachers, mentors, and others who, like Luke, freely share what they have learned for the benefit of others.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Timothy 4:10-17b; Luke 10:1-9 "The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few."

FOOD PANTRY

A special *THANK YOU* to all who donated time, talent and/or treasure to the October food distribution. As we approach the winter months, especially in such difficult economic times, our need increases. Fortunately so does the generosity of our parish and friends. Our efforts to fill the needed grocery bags for our October Food pantry were met by so many, including our ever faithful parishioners, our friends at Highlands Presbyterian Church, employees and friends of the Catholic Cemeteries, Special food drives were held by Gurrie Middle School, Spring Avenue School, St. Cletus School Cubs and Sox Dress Down Day, and the ongoing sixth grade school students "items of the month" drive also helped. Both the clients and volunteers of the St. Cletus Food Pantry deeply appreciate this show of support from our parish and local community.

As we begin restocking our pantry shelves, here are a few things to remember:

- Our staple items include rice, pinto beans, pasta, pasta sauce, tomatoes, meals in a can/box, soup, peanut butter, jelly, canned fruits and vegetables, tuna, macaroni & cheese, cereal, and paper goods.
- Some favorite extras include coffee, powdered or evaporated milk, oatmeal, juice, crackers or cookies, diapers (especially sizes 4& 5), toiletries, laundry detergent and dish washing soap.
- All non-perishables are greatly appreciated. Please remember to check the expiration dates to avoid out of date goods which we cannot use.
- These items can be dropped off in the designated food bins located in the Madonna della Strada shrine in the Church vestibule. You can bring them when you come to Mass over the weekend, or daily, from 7:45 AM 4:00 PM.
- The Food Pantry distributes groceries from the vestibule of the Church on the second Thursday of each month, from 6:30-8:30 PM. Our next distribution will be on November 13th.

CROP Walk - Don't forget that the annual LaGrange/Western Springs CROP Hunger Walk (Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty) steps off from the 1st United Methodist Church of La Grange on Sunday, October 19th, with registration beginning at 1:00 PM. Together we can make a difference. If you would like to join the Walk or contribute to a Walker, please contact me for details. Thank you.

Society of St. Vincent DePaul - Our initial information/volunteer recruitment meeting was well attended. Thanks to all who came. We are looking forward to meeting soon as a group to determine the needs as perceived in the parish area, as well as discussing sources of funding and how they will be used. BEDS Plus - Six new volunteers took part in our recent Volunteer Orientation Meeting at St. Cletus. Thank you for stepping forward to help support this outreach, whose mission is to provide emergency overnight shelter and to assist the homeless people of West Suburban Cook County to become self sufficient. There is still a need for volunteers. The time commitment is a 4-hour shift once a month for site volunteers, either in the evening/nighttime or day programs. There are also opportunities for support volunteers, ranging from cooking a meal to laundering bed and bath linens to office assistance. "In his use of things, man should regard the external goods he legitimately owns not merely as exclusive to himself but common to others also, in the sense that they can benefit others as well as himself." Vatican II, Modern World

It is good to remember that everything belongs to God. Therefore, it is important for us to recognize that we have an obligation to return a portion of our gifts to God, for all gifts belong to Him and come from Him.
