

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...



Second Sunday of Advent 2008

Mark begins his gospel with a bid for credibility. He has to combine the old and the new. If Jesus fulfills our expectations, he also transcends them. Mark prepares the ground for the telling of the good news very carefully. His task is to introduce us to the person of Jesus, who is Christ, the Son of God. What Mark means by these titles will be made clear as the story unfolds. His story's claim to authenticity rests to begin with on its foundations in the Scriptures. The first person to appear is John the Baptist, who fulfills the role foreseen by the prophet Isaiah, preparing the way for the Lord by proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. John's authority is hinted at by his appearance and his habitat. He has the accounterments of Elijah, the one who tradition believes will come as the forerunner of the Messiah, and he lives in the desert, the birthplace of the chosen people. His message is simple: repent and be forgiven.

It remains the same for us. If we wish to prepare for the Lord, we too need to change our hearts and accept forgiveness. The old ways of doing and seeing are not enough. Preparation is, more than anything, learning to remove the objects that interfere with our vision and our openness to the Lord. John ends his announcement, like all good showmen, with the claim that we haven't seen anything yet. He just baptizes with water. The one who is coming after him will baptize with the Holy Spirit. The image recalls the life of God himself hovering over the waters at the creation of the world. We are left in a state of great suspense, wondering just who is to come. Who is this man whose arrival is couched in the language of a new creation?

We go through many processes of preparation. Our schooling prepares us for adult life. Special training prepares us for jobs and professions. In the Church we prepare carefully for the celebration of each sacrament. We also prepare for the special events of the Church's year, at this time of year, of course, for Christmas. Much of our preparation is making certain that we have what we need for what we are to do. No wonder our minds can be so overloaded. Have we remembered the presents, the cards, the tree, the food, the drink, the crackers, the invitations... and then what about the poor, the lonely, and the homeless? We all know the heart of the matter can get lost in the rush to get everything done.

Perhaps we should take a leaf out of John the Baptist's book. His preparation was not an overloading but a stripping down, a getting rid of the baggage we carry. John suggests we enter into a state of stillness and openness, so that we will then be ready to be filled. It is a paradox. How do we prepare for the unexpected? How do we get ready for the unknown? Our practice is often to try and out-give the great giver. We are asked instead to let go of everything so that we may be ready to receive. We cannot have open hands if they are full of shopping lists of carefully defined hopes and expectations. We have to give access to the unknown and the unexpected.

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT The prophet in uniform

Ever bump into your parish priest in the supermarket? You may not have recognized him at first because he was "out of uniform" and out of the context of the church. That's why the gospel takes pains to describe John the Baptist. It was important to know that John was a prophet, an "official" one who dressed and lived and even ate like the prophets of old. Somebody with credentials had to introduce Jesus. After all, the Lord was plain and ordinary, just like everybody else. "Isn't he the carpenter?" people would ask later on in the story. It would be hard to imagine that a construction guy could put together a whole new world.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 8

SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION OF THE BVM Full of grace

What is grace? One way to think of it is anything that comes from God. We can think of it in terms of what we give to God: prayer and worship, service to others, doing God's will. Or what God sends to us: the gift of creation, love, inspiration, consolation, help, and many more graces. Mary had grace in abundance—both what she gave and received. Make today a day of prayer to her—who was full of grace—to intercede for us and inspire us to give and receive God's grace.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 9

FEAST OF JUAN DIEGO, HERMIT

Be comforted

When Juan Diego (1474-1548) was canonized in 2002, he became the first Native American saint of the Catholic Church. The farmer and mat-weaver was in his 40s when Hernán Cortés led the conquest of Spain in 1521, and within three years the first wave of Franciscan monks arrived near Juan's village. Juan and his wife were among the first of the indigenous residents to accept baptism. Despite their age, the couple opened their hearts to a new beginning and readily uprooted themselves to move closer to the missionaries in Mexico City. It's never too late to make a new beginning in your faith.

ADVENT WEEKDAY

On the wings of eagles

Asked what liturgical song most fostered and nourished their spiritual life, the majority of respondents in a 2006 online poll cited "On Eagle's Wings" by Father Michael Joncas. The song, inspired by Isaiah's prophecy and Psalm 91, contains the beautifully crafted refrain:

And He will raise you up on eagle's wings, Bear you on the breath of dawn, Make you to shine like the sun, And hold you in the palm of His Hand. Remember those words of solace whenever your burden feels too areat.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 40:25-31; Matthew 11:28-30 "Those who wait for the LORD shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles."

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 11

FEAST OF DAMASUS I, POPE - The Bible tells us so

The pontificate of Damasus (A.D. 366-384) occurred during a tumultuous period in the early church, with controversies, schisms, and heresies on all sides. Perhaps Damasus' greatest contribution was his insight that a standardized version of the Bible was desperately needed to clear the air. In 382 he commissioned a highly respected scholar named Jerome to revise the Bible into a more accurate and updated Latin version, working directly from the original Greek (New Testament) and Hebrew (Old Testament) versions. Saint Jerome's monumental effort came to be known as the *Vulgate*, meaning "translated into a native language." Even though Latin long ago stopped being a language of everyday use, the Vulgate still holds an honored position in the church.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 41:13-20; Matthew 11:11-15 "From the days of John the Baptist until now the kingdom of heaven has suffered violence, and the violent take it by force."

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 12

OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE; PATRONAL DAY OF MEXICO AND AMERICA Ironing and thinking

Los Angeles-based artist J. Michael Walker has produced one of the most memorable and insightful portrayals of Our Lady of Guadalupe. In his 1996 painting, *Ironing, Thinking*, we see Mary doing just that: busying herself with domestic chores with a slightly careworn expression on her face. In this not-ready-for-prime-time look at Our Lady, she irons her famous cloak of stars while balancing her crown on her head with simple dignity. Our Lady of Guadalupe did indeed come to represent hardworking folk with worn hands. Support the dignity of all who labor.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 13

FEAST OF LUCY, VIRGIN, MARTYR - To see you is to love you

One quality that many, if not all, saints share is the capacity to look beyond the sometimes horrific circumstances of their lives and see the presence of God. They see with their heart. Saint Lucy is certainly among those saints with this ability. Tradition tells us that she was raped then tortured and murdered for being a Christian. Her feast day comes at a good time. Now midway through Advent, we might be feeling the pressures, tensions, and expectations of ourselves and others to conjure up the "perfect Christmas." Today take a moment to pause and adjust your spiritual lenses. Take your eyes off of the glitz of Christmas and focus on the love that came into the world and continues to sustain us all.

TODAY'S READINGS: Sirach 48:1-4, 9-11; Matthew 17:9a, 10-13 "Happy are those who saw you and were adorned with your love! For we also shall surely live."



The Hispanic Ministry of St. Cletus cordially invites the entire community of St. Cletus to celebrate with us during this holy day Season. We begin this year's celebrations with the traditional "Our Lady of Guadalupe Novena" which started on December 3 and concludes on December 11. It is a Mexican religious tradition to greet Our Lady of Guadalupe and to have Mass early in the morning on December 12. We want to keep these traditions alive in St. Cletus, and we would like you to be part of our celebrations. We hope that this year a "new" tradition begins in our community. We invite you to come on December 12 and celebrate with us at the 4:00AM Mass, with Greetings to Our Lady of Guadalupe. Immediately after Mass we will have traditional food and drinks in Morrissey Hall.

At 7:00 PM on December 12, we will celebrate the traditional "Misa de Las Rosas" (Mass of The Roses), with the traditional band of "mariachis". This year it will be a bilingual celebration, and of course, we will be enjoying traditional food and refreshments after Mass. Come celebrate with us, be part of our family and friends. But wait, that is only the beginning, because the fun continues from December 16 with the "Christmas Novena and the Traditional Posadas" through December 24. There will be two actual "posadas" with candies and piñatas; one will be on Sunday, December 21 and the second one on Monday, December 22 both in Morrissey Hall. The rest of the days "aguinaldos" (bags filled with candy) will be distributed.

A Brief History of the Posadas in Mexico

The Origin of the Posada in Mexico

The Christmas Posadas in Mexico, as they are now known, are a longstanding holiday tradition that began during the colonial era. During the period of the Spanish Viceroy, these representations took place in the churches and later in the streets and private homes throughout New Spain, as Mexico was called at that time. Together with the parades and the songs is the posada, a tradition that even today continues to be celebrated in the towns and neighborhoods throughout Mexico. (cont. page 7)

THE ORIGIN IS AN INTERESTING COINCIDENCE.

Similar processions and gatherings were celebrated in Pre-Hispanic Mexico more than 400 years ago. The colonial Spaniards observed that during the wintertime there was an adoration of the Aztec war god Huitzilopochtli, during the month of Panquetzaliztli, that ran from the 7th until the 26th of December, the same as the European Christmas holiday season. During his mission to convert the Americas, Father San Francisco Loyola was one of the first to observe this coincidence. He then came up with the idea to supplant and substitute the Aztec god with Jesus Christ and gradually added in more and different aspects of the Catholic religion while deleting the indigenous practices.

SO WHAT ARE THE POSADAS TODAY?


The Posada is a celebration that represents the journey of Mary and Joseph traveling from Nazareth to Jerusalem searching for a place to spend the night. It takes place from the 16th to the 24th of December. The nine days represent the nine months of Mary's pregnancy. During the parades, the children walk first. The first two represent Joseph and Mary, the following ones are the angels, the wise men and the shepherds. Behind the children are adults who each carry a candle and images of Mary and Joseph. When the procession arrives at the first house, one of the children enters the threshold and asks for posada (habitation for the night) by singing beautiful songs. The inhabitants of the home answer him by also singing songs. The first home "refuses" posada so that the procession can continue to the following house where the same routine takes place. Once they arrive at the third home, there they receive posada and a fiesta begins with a huge piñata which the children break with a long stick. The hosts then offer the guests traditional food and drink such as tamales of meat and sweets as well as champurrado (a delicious mixture of pureed corn and cocoa). The children receive "la colación" of peanuts, cakes, oranges and candies. These posadas continue so that the families and their children can enjoy and conserve maintain religious tradition also union family the and the of and friends. Whether it's a celebration to conserve ancient religious customs, an act of faith or just being able to share in a friendly gathering of friends, neighbors and families, it is interesting to observe how this has developed from the juxtaposition of two very different cultures and religions. Enjoy your holidays! Feliz Navidad para todos!
