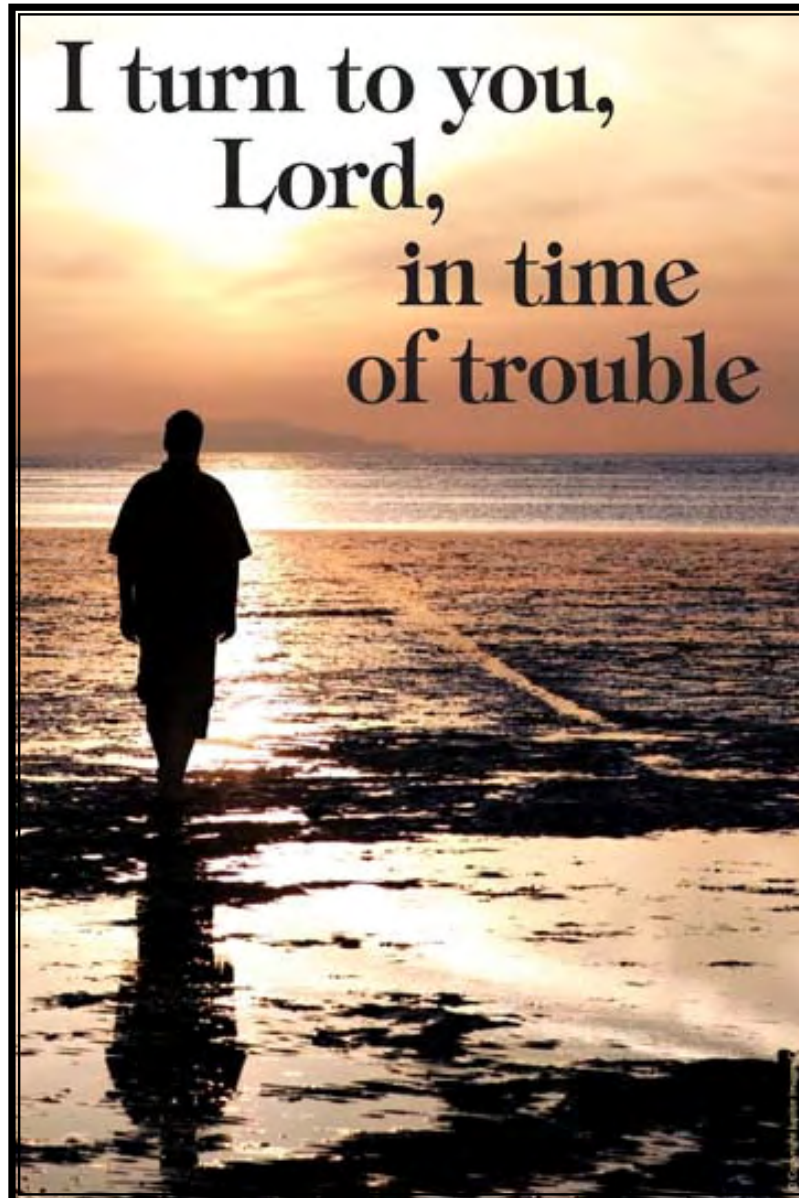

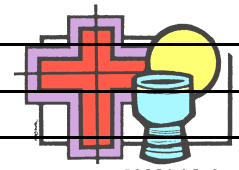

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Is it sheer misery and loneliness that drives the leper in today's Gospel towards our Lord? No doubt he's heard rumors of Jesus' kindly way with the sick and his extraordinary ability to cure them. Well, now that ability will really be put to the test.

The leper sinks down on his knees; he's desperate. "If you want to," he murmurs, "you can cure me." Jesus, we're told, is deeply moved. He's filled with pity or, as some scholars translate, with anger – not of course at the man, but at his disease and its dreadful consequences. In any event, he does what is unthinkable: he stretches out his hand and touches the leper, thereby incurring ritual defilement himself. But how precious that touch is to the leper! It constitutes a breakthrough, a new beginning; he's no longer isolated; at last there's someone who cares for him enough to risk catching his loathsome disease. And then the incredible words which are the passport back to a normal life: "Of course I want to. Be cured." And in that instant the leprosy leaves him.

The healing of leprosy was said to be as difficult as raising the dead. But Jesus accomplishes this apparently impossible task effortlessly. He now asks the cured leper to go at once to report his cure to the priests, and say nothing to anyone in the meantime. That really is asking the impossible. Jesus doesn't want people to seek him simply as a wonder-worker, yet there is surely an understanding smile on his face when he hears that the man is sharing his story with anyone who will listen.

Jesus' touch was important for the leper but it's also important for us. It's one of those actions that speak louder than words, an action which shows that the Lord is inclusive, not exclusive; he draws people towards him, doesn't send them away; he's not unduly concerned about political correctness.

If, as Paul urges in today's second reading, we are to take Jesus as our model, we need to ask ourselves how we treat today's lepers, those who are marginalized. How, for example, do we react to ex-prisoners or even to the innocent families of those in prison? Do we pass by those referred to as "unfortunates" as though they didn't exist? How do we as a community behave towards the divorced and remarried; do we make them feel unwanted? Are we racist, even in our thoughts? Can we find it in our hearts to pray, or experience a shred of sympathy, for the real outsider, such as the pedophile? It's not a question of saying that anything goes but rather of ensuring that we exclude no one from our loving concern.

Some years ago a woman noticed that one of her colleagues, an alcoholic who had got drunk and made an exhibition of herself at an office party, was now being shunned by everyone. She determined to speak to her. All she could say was: "You're not invisible to me, anyway." But for the woman who'd been treated like a leper, it was – well, a kind of little miracle. And we too have it in our power, the power that comes to us through our contact with Jesus at Mass, to work similar little miracles for the outcasts of our world.

Follow the leader

One suspects that Saint Paul's advice, "avoid giving offense," was intended to keep the peace in a politically charged world to stave off criticism of the followers of Christ from either the Jewish or pagan world. Was it what we currently call "political correctness"? When coined, "politically correct" suggested a graceful and profound respect for the sensibilities of others, especially minorities. Unfortunately it has come to suggest an awkward, even laughable wishy-washiness: being so afraid to give offense that one never takes a stand. Paul's advice is hardly bland. He intends for the Christian to seek not his or her own benefit but that of others. Seeking the good in everything and for everyone is anything but bland, but neither is it a call for deadly perfectionism. It is doing neither what is impossible, nor what is expected, but doing the good we can.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 16

PRESIDENTS' DAY

That's a keeper

No president can govern alone or solve the nation's problems single-handedly. We all have a role to play, and it begins with caring about our neighbors and trying to lend a helping hand when times are tough. That way we rise above the selfish, "what about me?" attitude that was Cain's downfall. Be your brothers' and sisters' "keeper"—find a way to help someone who is hurting. In doing so we help our leaders guide the nation on the road to peace and prosperity.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 4:1-15, 25; Mark 8:11-13*
"Then the Lord said to Cain, 'Where is your brother Abel?' He said, 'I do not know; am I my brother's keeper?'"

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 17

Looks like rain

Big floods tend to produce stories. Folks can recall much about the "flood of 2008 or 1996 or 1956 . . ." People in biblical times had heard flood stories, too. But the flood Genesis described was the Big One, the flood to end all floods—almost. God was so angry God decided all of creation was pretty much corrupt and the only solution was to wipe it all out. But in an almost human way God left the door open a crack. Noah got to be the ark that preserved a righteous few, including handy mating pairs of all creatures in order to repopulate the earth once the waters receded. So God's wrath was not final. There's always the possibility of return to God, constantly offered. When the waters of despair, regret, and cynicism threaten to inundate you, remember there's a dove on the way.

"Then the Lord said to Noah, 'Go into the ark, you and all your household, for I have seen that you alone are righteous before me in this generation.'"

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 18

Through the glass darkly

Anyone with severe nearsightedness or otherwise impaired eyesight knows what it's like to try to see without help: Everything's a blur. So they know what a blind person Jesus healed went through after Jesus' two-part healing of him—two-part because after part one he saw only "people looking like trees and walking." After that Jesus

laid hands on him and finished the job. Why this bit-by-bit healing? Why not the instant restoration to health and wholeness Jesus bestowed on other ailing people? Because the return of the man's sight mirrors what it's like to be a disciple of Christ: a gradual process of coming to know and believe in Jesus. What steps can you take toward fuller sight?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 8:6-13, 20-22; Mark 8:22-26*
"Jesus asked the blind man, 'Do you see anything?'" The man replied, 'I see people looking like trees and walking.'"

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 19

God's surrender

Following the flooding of the world, God makes a covenant with humanity to never again destroy the earth by water. To write his promise into the heavens, God tells Noah that he will place his "bow" into the clouds. God has surrendered God's "weapons." Imagine God, bow fallen and palms raised as a sign of peace. These palms, the open palms of his peacefulness, are those into which we will drive the nails of his passion. By setting down his bow, God not only says, "You are safe by me" but also "you will do with me what you will." Consider laying down the weapons you bear and opening yourself up to those around you.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 20

Pride before the fall

Saint John Vianney, ever the practical preacher, had this to say about the spirit of arrogance: "No, my dear brethren, there is nothing that is quite as ridiculous or stupid as to be forever talking about what we have or what we do. . . . This sin is even more to be feared in people who put on a good show of piety and religion." Padre Pio, born nearly a century later, offered this antidote to pride: "All that is good in me I have received from God on loan and I should be a fool to boast of what is not mine."

"Come, let us build ourselves a city and a tower with its top in the sky, and so make a name for ourselves."

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 21

Give God the final say

When we read the newspaper or watch television, we ask ourselves why God allows so much pain and suffering in the world. At the same time we believe that God is involved and present in every individual and every moment. How to reconcile these two seemingly contradictory views? With one word: *faith*. By faith we understand that the events of our lives are rolled, wrapped, enfolded into the unfinished story of creation that is always tending toward the good. The universe is still expanding, the conclusion has not been written, the jury may never return; how can we judge with absolute certainty whether any experience is ultimately good or bad? Like the earth revolving around the sun, it simply is.
