



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Third Sunday of Lent 2009

Anger is something that many people are not very good at dealing with. When someone gets angry in our presence, a fairly standard way we have of dealing with it is trying to pretend that we're not there. This is by far the safest way of coping with the situation: if we engage the angry person we may well find ourselves a target. When the person is safely out of the way we ask calm questions like, "What got into him?" Or we make statements like; "She's an angry young woman." Seldom do we try and understand the anger. Nor do we often discriminate between the two main types of anger: an all-consuming kind which ultimately will destroy its owner, and a justified anger which lashes out at an obvious injustice or wrong in the hope of effecting change for the better.

Today it would seem that Jesus, the Prince of Peace, has lost his cool and is acting out of character. If we had imagined Jesus as some saccharine Savior then we are in for a shock here. He takes some drastic action when he sees the abuses that are carried out in God's name and in his Father's house. A supermarket is developing in the precincts of the temple; all the values of this sacred place are being lost or overlooked. The faithful worshippers are becoming easy prey to those who are only out for money.

Jesus can take no more and so takes action. His behavior does not come from a rush of blood to the head, but from zeal for his Father's house. The temple authorities who intervene in the situation appear to be very calm about everything and start asking questions of Jesus concerning signs and what authority he has to do what he has just done. Jesus uses this opportunity to reveal to those around a bit more of his identity. "Destroy this sanctuary and in three days I will raise it up," he says. Most of those listening are probably convinced that he is quite mad. As the authorities point out, it took forty-six years to build the Temple. How then could anyone rebuild it in three days?

Jesus, however, is not talking about a building made of stones, but is beginning to hint at the resurrection. It is only after the event that the disciples put two and two together and realize what he was really saying. Jesus was preparing them for what was to come.

Sometimes injustices are allowed to happen because good people choose not to take any action, or feel that one voice could not achieve very much. One of the drawbacks of living in a consumer society is that the sense of community can suffer or break down altogether. People work hard to earn a comfortable living. This is not in itself a bad thing: people deserve to enjoy the fruits of their labor. The danger is that we settle into such a cozy existence that anything that might encroach on it is just too much of a hassle and an inconvenience. "Life is good here," we say, "so we don't want to rock the boat and we certainly don't want our own boat rocked."

If we are honest with ourselves we will realize that there are situations on our own doorsteps that we tend to turn a blind eye to. It might be an injustice at work, the person who is always getting a raw deal from the management or other employees. It could be something that has happened within the family. There are times when we maybe should get fired up and involved in situations. There are times when the plight of one of our brothers or sisters should become our concern and our problem, be that at home or abroad. When other people see you involved in these situations, you can reveal something of your identity. "I do this or am involved in that because I am a Catholic Christian and my belief in Jesus Christ tells me that what is going on here is wrong." By what we do say, Jesus will be able to reveal who he is to those who have never met him.

DO YOU KNOW?

- Known for such spectacular sites as Mount Kilimanjaro, the islands of Zanzibar and the famed Serengeti plains, Tanzania is also home to more than 120 diverse ethnic groups.
- Despite Tanzania's natural beauty and resources, nearly 20 % of Tanzanians live on less than a dollar a day. Recurring drought and poor farming techniques cause food shortages, and HIV prevalence stands at 7%. The AIDS pandemic has left behind 2 million orphans in Tanzania.
- Catholic Relief Services partners with local community-based agencies to help address these problems through integrated project services, including food and agriculture assistance, education and vocational training, training in essential life skills, protection activities, shelter assistance, counseling and medical care.


