NOTES FROM FATHER BOB

PALM SUNDAY 2009

It is not easy to understand all that is happening in today's Gospel, even with the benefit of hindsight and the experience of the Church. How much harder it must have been for the disciples, who found themselves in the very middle of the proceedings. They lurch from the intimacy and trust of the Last Supper to the pain and loneliness in the garden, then on to the confusion and fear of the trial. The fear leads to panic, so they flee, and finally they hear the news that their master is dead.

These are the same men who saw the many miracles worked by Jesus, who realized that he made a difference wherever he went. But on Good Friday they didn't understand what was going on and were afraid for their lives. Nonetheless, for all their lack of faith, courage and fidelity, this was not the end of their relationship with Jesus. Soon after the crucifixion, they realized the full significance of what had happened that day on Calvary, and their lives were changed forever.

In Mark's gospel, Jesus' identity is fully affirmed, not by one of his close disciples, but by one of his executioners. The centurion states, when Jesus dies, that "in truth, this man is a Son of God". Here is a soldier who was not around Jesus during the glory days, witnessing miracles and conversions. But in the death of Jesus he finds something extraordinary, something out of this world. There was obviously something in the way Jesus died which moved the hearts of people who otherwise wouldn't have cared about him. For the centurion the penny drops at the very end. But it is still not too late. There is still an opportunity to follow Jesus. Death has not brought an end to this story; the best is yet to come.

When, in our quieter moments, we sit confused, wondering about Jesus and our faith in him, it is all too easy to think, "If only I had been around 2009 years ago and had known Jesus in the flesh. If only I had been one of his disciples and had seen him cure and preach. If only...then my faith in Jesus would be stronger and my relationship with him would be more real." But the reality is that we just don't know how we would have reacted, had we been around all those years ago. We might well have fled, we might well have sided with the authorities, we might well have shouted: "Crucify him! Crucify him!" The fact that we were not with Jesus during his earthly ministry does not prevent us from coming to know and follow him now.

For many people it is during their days of suffering that they come to realize who this man Jesus is. In our darkness and pain, we can relate to the pain and passion of Jesus and begin to have some appreciation of what he has done for us. By dying Jesus opened the way to the Father and to heaven – for us now, for the people who have gone before us and for those yet to come. His earthly life was limited to a specific period of history, but through his death and resurrection he is now outside time and accessible to us all. We can know Jesus today, because he is the same now as he was 2009 years ago.

As we make the journey with Jesus through this week, let us be sure to take time to deepen our appreciation of what he has done for us. Then, like the centurion, we will be able to proclaim that Jesus is truly the Son of God. It is never too late to meet him.

We are about to begin the most holy week of the year. The next few days signify the core of our belief in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. Do not miss this wonderful opportunity to participate in these grace filled days. Our Easter Triduum begins with the celebration of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday as we remember Jesus' gift of the Eucharist and our call to service; Good Friday reminds us of Jesus' ultimate gift of love through his suffering and death on the cross; Holy Saturday we experience the light of Christ and the renewing waters of Baptism as we celebrate Jesus' glory through his resurrection. Let us join together as one faith community in celebrating God's love for us in Jesus Christ during these most holy days.

PALM SUNDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION Have that empty feeling?

When we think of heroes we usually think of those who save people through their use of power or force, those who establish empires, those who dominate the competition—think Superman, Alexander the Great, Michael Jordan. But Jesus broke the mold when it comes to heroes. He shows us another way to live a heroic life: emptying ourselves in service to others—think Mother Teresa, Saint Francis of Assisi, Archbishop Oscar Romero. The Easter story teaches us that when we pour ourselves out for the sake of others, our resulting "emptiness" allows us to rise to the very heavens.

MONDAY, APRIL 6 = MONDAY OF HOLY WEEK

Try a little tenderness

Images of Jesus and Mary abound, but one in particular speaks volumes about the compassion and affection that characterized their relationship: Our Lady of Tenderness. The iconic image shows the child Jesus nestled in his mother's embrace, his cheek touching hers. It not only warms the heart but calls us to be women and men of tenderness. The church models that when we anoint one another with oil or ashes, when we clasp hands or embrace at the sign of peace. Tenderness is a way of being that allows us to let others know that they matter, that they are loved, however inwardly bruised or broken they may be. In what way might you be called to tender love of another?

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 42:1-7; John 12:1-11 "A bruised reed he will not break, and a dimly burning wick he will not quench; he will faithfully bring forth justice."

TUESDAY, APRIL 7

TUESDAY OF HOLY WEEK - Come! Live in the light!

Jesus makes it clear to Peter and the rest of his disciples that they will follow him. Following Jesus, the light of the world, is the call of all Christians. What does it mean to follow the Lord? The prophet Micah puts it simply: To act justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God (6:8). Unsure you're equal to the task? Take small steps each day toward the light by acknowledging a mistake, forgiving an offense, or letting go of an argument. Soon light will shine from you.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 49:1-6; John 13:21-33, 36-38 "I will give you as a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the end of the earth."

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 8

WEDNESDAY OF HOLY WEEK - We've met the enemy

So how have you done so far this Lent? How many times did you bail out of your Lenten give-ups? How often were you willing to just let it go for the sake of something you *really* liked, or because the situation called for it, or because it just sort of happened? Human nature being what it is, it doesn't take much for us to throw our good intentions under the bus, kind of like Judas tossed Jesus to the wolves. Thirty pieces of silver wasn't a bad payday. But it changed the life of Judas forever. Lent is supposed to be a time when we allow God to change our lives for the good. How are we doing?

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 50:4-9a; Matthew 26:14-25 "What will you give me if I betray him to you?"

THURSDAY, APRIL 9

HOLY THURSDAY - Guess who's coming to dinner

Tonight, Christians worldwide commemorate Jesus' Last Supper, which was a celebration of the Jewish Passover Seder meal that Jews celebrated last evening. Christian adaptations of the Seder meal are growing in popularity as a way to connect with our Jewish roots. Key elements of the Seder include lamb (pesach), unleavened bread (matzoh), bitter herbs (moror), green herbs dipped in salt water, and haroseth, a mixture of chopped apples, nuts, cinnamon, and wine that represents the mortar that Jews used to construct palaces during their Egyptian servitude. Wine is dipped into a common bowl for the four cups of blessing, representing "four different words for redemption, spoken by God to Moses." "Christian" Seders held on Holy Thursday also commemorate the Word spoken by God for redemption of the world.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Exodus* 12:1-8, 11-14; 1 Corinthians 11:23-26; John 13:1-15

"This day shall be a memorial feast for you, which all your generations shall celebrate."

FRIDAY, APRIL 10

GOOD FRIDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION - Life out of death

One of the reasons Jesus was able to die such an inwardly peaceful death is that he understood fully and deeply that he was the Son of God. He lived in keeping with that knowledge and accomplished all that he had come here to do. Thus Jesus was able to die gracefully, without regret, and even forgive those who had crucified him. We are all going to die some day. But rare is the person who, like Jesus, remembers this fact and draws inspiration from it each day. Today and throughout the Easter season we might practice the habit of asking, "What do I want to be true at the end of my life?" and live accordingly.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 52:13-53:12; Hebrews 4:14-16, 5:7-9; John 18:1-19:42

SATURDAY, APRIL 11

HOLY SATURDAY - In service of the light


During the dramatic service of light at the beginning of the Easter Vigil, the priest lights the paschal candle with these words: "May the light of Christ, rising in glory, dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds." What is the darkness in your heart and mind? Now is the time to let go of the hurt, resentment, and anger you feel. Now is the time to allow the light of Christ to shine through you. Jesus suffered, died, and rose again so that you, personally, would experience freedom from all of the burdens you carry—so that you, personally, would know that salvation is yours. Now is the time to unchain your heart and mind.

PALM SUNDAY - THE PASSION

The story of the anointing of Jesus is one of the few stories to appear in all four Gospels. As people begin to grumble about the cost and waste of the perfume, Jesus responds: "You always have the poor with you and any time you want to you can do something good for them."

As we continue our Operation Rice Bowl journey let us remember in **prayer** that we are one human family, regardless of our differences. On Holy Saturday we observe the Easter Vigil and anticipate Christ's triumphant resurrection from the dead. The Sacred Triduum is the apex of our liturgical year, and its glorious fulfillment. Let us observe these days as a special time of prayer and meditation.
