



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Ascension of the Lord 2009

We rejoice first of all because of what the Ascension means to Jesus himself. It has two aspects. The one described in today's first reading and the Gospel is the one we tend to think of automatically whenever we hear the word "ascension". It is a visible event; it takes place on the Mount of Olives some forty days after Easter; it is witnessed by the apostles; it leaves them gazing up into the sky in a state of bewilderment.

But in a sense all this is just a sign, a visible way of manifesting to the apostles a more wonderful event that has already taken place at the moment of the Resurrection. Jesus is already exalted; already his body has been glorified, though for some time the glory remains hidden, while he completes the instruction of his disciples.

Once the time of instruction is over, all can be revealed. It's revealed in terms of a cloud which takes him gently into its embrace, hiding him from the disciples' sight; it's spoken of by the gospel writers in terms of his being "taken up to heaven" and being seated "at the right hand of the Father". Of course, Jesus is not some kind of super astronaut, heaven is not a place in the sky and God doesn't have hands; but what can we do when all we have are feeble words with which to express the inexpressible? The fact is that Jesus as man has entered into a new and glorious kind of existence, beyond our understanding.

So on this day we rejoice because our Lord and Master, having lived among us, having suffered, died and risen in glory, has now in his humanity reached his true home with the Father. His humanity has now been drawn into the power and majesty of the Blessed Trinity.

However, there is another reason why this is a day of rejoicing, and it is because the Ascension has extraordinary implications for ourselves. In the first place, as Jesus promised, it is to our advantage that he has disappeared from our sight. For now, through the Holy Spirit, he is more profoundly and more intimately present to us and to the whole of humanity than he ever could be when visibly present on earth. Furthermore, Jesus' Ascension reveals the destiny to which we are all called. Our true home is heaven; united by faith and love with our exalted Lord, we look forward to our final homecoming, to being with Christ in glory. In the lovely words of today's Preface, Christ "has past beyond our sight, not to abandon us but to be our hope...Where he has gone, we hope to follow."

According to today's Gospel, our Lord's final command was to take his message to all creatures and to baptize all who would believe. Because that command has been carried out down through the centuries, you and I have heard the Good News; you and I have received the faith and been baptized. Perhaps today we ought to spend a little time reflecting prayerfully upon our good fortune, realizing again our duty to spread the Good News. Above all we can rejoice that through baptism we have embarked upon a journey to a haven, which is beyond all havens, that home where we shall exult forever with our risen, ascended and glorified Lord.

Our summer project "Lighting Our Way" has begun, the much needed replacement of the deteriorating light poles and standards in front of our church and school buildings. Several of them have become safety hazards due to their poor condition. After careful review, the Parish Maintenance Committee has recommended their replacement. It is our goal to achieve phase one of the project this summer with your much needed help. We are asking each family to donate \$25 or more each month for the next four months. You will find envelopes in your parish envelope packet for this purpose. There will, also, be envelopes available in the pews during the next few months. Your help will allow us to replace the existing light poles and standards, the circuit panel that controls them, and add additional lighting to the walk ways in front of the church with bollard lighting for safety and security. I will speak at all Masses next weekend regarding this important parish project. Thank you for your attention to this need and for your generous support. Together we can indeed "Light Our Way" in 2009.

SUNDAY, MAY 24, 2009

SOLEMNITY OF THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD - God is still with us

The term *ascension* is susceptible to unintended comic imagery of Jesus waving good-bye from a balloon gondola or being lifted on a wire. Another unfortunate connotation is that heaven is somehow "up," while we are left down here. Perhaps such imagery does help us to imagine that in the resurrected Lord, God (heaven) and we (on earth) are united. Having become incarnate in Jesus, God is never only watching from some great distance. "I am *with* you until the end" are the simplest words, but the most profound. There is no need to stand looking at the sky with our jaws hanging open. For Christ is here, as close as our own breath, keeping us alive to carry his presence into our world.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 1:1-11; Ephesians 1:17-23 or 4:1-13; Mark 16:15-20

MONDAY, MAY 25

FEAST OF BEDE THE VENERABLE, PRIEST, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Book your faith

A Benedictine monk, Saint Bede (673-735) lived his whole life in the same monastery where his parents had sent him for his early education. While we know him as the source of much of early English history, he was also a great student of scripture and a teacher. Church history, scripture—these are two important areas to know something about to have a better grasp of your faith. Find some books on the subject, like *A Concise History of the Catholic Church* by Thomas Bokenkotter (Doubleday), and *Invitation to the Old Testament* and *Invitation to the New Testament*, both by Alice L. Camille (ACTA Publications).

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 19:1-8; John 16:29-33 "Now you are speaking plainly, not in any figure of speech! Now we know that you know all things."

TUESDAY, MAY 26

FEAST OF PHILIP NERI, PRIEST - What a guy!

What's not to like about Philip Neri? He was such a happy and loveable child he was called "Jolly Phil." Studying theology and philosophy in Rome, he helped poor children, donated his time to the sick, and was a friend to the troubled and lonely. He helped start an organization of laypeople to take care of needy pilgrims that eventually became a famous Roman hospital. A kind and gentle confessor who drew great crowds, he did silly things like shave off half his beard in order to deflect people's admiration of him. What an example of integrity, perspective, zeal, balance, and joy!

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 20:17-27; John 17:1-11a "I served the Lord with all humility."

WEDNESDAY, MAY 27

FEAST OF AUGUSTINE OF CANTERBURY, BISHOP The other Augustine

Saint Augustine of Canterbury sometimes gets short shrift next to the saint of the same name from Hippo whose dramatic conversion and many writings are well-known in the Christian tradition. But he's worth getting to know. Augustine of Canterbury, a monk and prior of his abbey in Rome, was chosen by the pope to evangelize England. With great reluctance and daunted by the mission at hand (word had it that the Brits were a violent lot), Augustine struggled to carry out his mission. He wasn't always successful in knowing what to do or how to organize the church and unite the various Christian groups. So when we struggle and do not feel up to a task, we can think of

Augustine and trust that God will bring good from even our failures. Today's Readings: Acts 20:28-38; John 17:11b-19 "Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth. As you have sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world."

THURSDAY, MAY 28

EASTER WEEKDAY - Out of many, one

Ever since Jesus prayed that his followers "may all be one," the concept of Christian unity has been easier to agree to in principle than in the real world, where divisions remain. Still, hope remains that the various traditions and confessions of Christian faith might one day overcome their divisions through dialogue and move toward unity. In speaking of the Western and Eastern churches, Pope John Paul II put it this way in an often quoted phrase from his 1995 encyclical *Ut Unum Sint* ("May They Be One"): "In this perspective an expression which I have frequently employed finds its deepest meaning: the church must breathe with her two lungs!" See if you can contribute to efforts in your local area to bring churches together around common causes.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 22:30; 23:6-11; John 17:20-26 ".... That they may all be one."

FRIDAY, MAY 29

EASTER WEEKDAY - When redemption does not compute

The dictionary defines redemption as "the act of saving something or somebody from a declined, dilapidated, or corrupted state and restoring it, him, or her to a better condition." Sounds like the history of Christianity. No matter how far we stray, what sins we commit, or how often we deny God, we are continually offered forgiveness and redemption. Someone once observed that the Christian notion of redemption is incomprehensible to the computer. Sometimes it's incomprehensible to us, as well. Redemption is not logical or predictable, and often we don't deserve it, yet God never ceases offering it to us. All we have to do is receive it. But do we? How are you refusing the redemption that God is offering to you right now?

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 25:13b-21; John 21:15-19 "Jesus said to him the third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' And he said to him, 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep.'"

SATURDAY, MAY 30

EASTER WEEKDAY - Come, Holy Spirit!

For the past few decades going to Mass the evening before "counts" for attending on Sunday or another holy day to follow. That's what the phrase "anticipated Mass" you might see in the church bulletin means. The evening before, the vigil, counts for the next day. It comes from a Jewish way of marking holidays from sunset to sunset. For Christians it serves to make people aware that the religious way of counting days differs from the regular midnight-to-midnight calendar approach. As the sun sets this evening, begin your celebration of Pentecost by reading two of the accounts of how the first disciples received God's Spirit—John 20:19-23 and Acts 2:1-

13—and reflect on what the coming of that Spirit means to you. TODAY'S READINGS: At the Vigil: Genesis 11:1-9 or Exodus 19:3-8a, 16-20b or Ezekiel 37:1-14 or Joel 3:1-5; Romans 8:22-27; John 7:37-39

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In medieval times, one country, Scotland, linked its economy to the liturgy. Four holy days of the church calendar were keyed to the legal year. On these days, rents were due, clergy and servants were paid, and contracts and leases would begin or end. The term days were Pentecost (called Whitsunday), the Feast of Saint Martin on November 11 (Martinmas), the Feast of the Presentation on February 2 (Candlemas), and August 2 (Lammas), a harvest festival. On Lammas day, the first loaf of bread from the summer wheat harvest was given to the village priest. After the Reformation, which swept the Catholic festivals away, the term days were gradually detached from the old feasts. It was only in 1990 that the term days were anchored on the 28th of February, May, August, and November. Today the old Scottish universities are the last holdouts, still naming their terms or semesters after the old festivals. Scottish students today may not know about the liturgical year, but they still call the fall term Martinmas, and the spring session Candlemas.
