



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Trinity Sunday 2009

One of life's greatest joys is to watch little children as they begin to explore the world on their own. We can see their eyes gradually open to the wonders around them. They are in to everything, experimenting with touch and taste, and learning to use all their senses. It is a challenging time for parents, especially when they learn to speak and ask the why, the what and the how. Handling their difficult questions is a great skill. It is a case of trying to satisfy their little minds for the moment, knowing that there is so much more to learn and that even then they and we may never fully grasp the mystery.

So, how do we deal with questions about things of which we are not really sure? For example, I may understand a little about jet engines and aerodynamics, but I still marvel that a huge plane manages to take off so gracefully.

Just like children, we adults are surrounded by a wonderful and mysterious world. Although we may reckon ourselves wise in the ways of the world, we are still very much aware of our inability to make complete sense of it all. Often we can give no clear answer, especially to the question, 'why?'. In such moments it is good just to marvel at the mystery and rejoice in the fact that it is.

The word 'mystery' has a rich and deep Christian significance. It is a word that we use, not to avoid thinking about the 'big issues' of faith, but to help us explore our very limited understanding of the nature of God. This is a process which Jesus himself, Son of God but incarnate as a human being with a finite human comprehension, has entered before us.

Jesus was aware of a Father who loved him passionately. He knew that God was no distant landlord unconnected with his life. God was Abba, Father, desiring the love of his children and desiring the very best for each one of them. There can be no logical explanation why God should love his creation so intensely. Our theologians and philosophers may strive for answers, but, in the end, we simply have to acknowledge, Jesus, that is just how God is. That God wants us to be close to him is a great mystery, yet it is also the fundamental truth underlying the faith we profess.

Jesus was not content simply to explain his theory of God the Father. He strove to demonstrate the mystery of God in the building up of God's Kingdom here on earth. He came, not simply to educate us, but to enliven, liberate, and inspire us. He came to fill us with the Holy Spirit, God's uniting love. Just like people who stand amazed at a wondrous sight, Jesus is not content to keep the experience of God as Father to himself. He has no option but to invite other people to marvel at the same mystery. This is the reason for the great commission we witness in today's gospel.

The first command of Jesus is 'to go'; to leave the safe secure world and be active. Our sharing in the mystery of God is not simply a passive wonder, it drives us to leave our isolated worlds and stride forth with zeal in our desire to draw others to experience the same mystery.

Next, Jesus instructs his followers to 'make disciples'. Ideally, before we formalize our adherence to a particular way of life, code of conduct, or belief system, we should have experienced the value of such a commitment. For Jesus the first reality is that people should be introduced to God as father and be so amazed by the encounter that they are then drawn to commit their whole lives to God. Perhaps too often we have tried to force others to accept the 'package' without introducing them to the giver of the gift. When this happens the mystery is reduced to abstract ideas – one-in-three, three-in-one – rather than a vibrant life-giving relationship.

Once we come together in God's family we can teach each other, to witness in word and deed to the mystery of love in our lives: to do what Jesus commands. We become a people who are 'tuned in' to the greatest mystery of the universe.

SUNDAY, JUNE 7, 2009

SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY - Three to go

The sign of the cross is surely the most known and practiced symbol and gesture in Christianity. But when we cross ourselves and say the accompanying prayer, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit," what are we saying, exactly? The short answer is that God is one being in three persons. And that means? One way to understand the Trinity is that God is at the same time beyond us, within us, and among us. But when you start thinking about that, you realize there is no short answer. As a matter of fact Saint Augustine of Hippo wrote 15 volumes on the subject! The Trinity is a foundation of Christian truth. It is also a profound mystery well worth contemplating today.

TODAY'S READINGS: Deuteronomy 4:32-34, 39-40; Romans 8:14-17; Matthew 28:16-20

"Go therefore and baptize all nations in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

MONDAY, JUNE 8

Take a letter

Saint Paul begins his Second Letter to the Corinthians with a blessing from Jewish tradition to the "God of all consolation." His letter is designed to encourage and uplift the struggling early church in Corinth and help it overcome disputes and crises that had embroiled it. The letter is considered Paul's most personal—revealing him to be at varying times encouraging, stern, frustrated with his intended audience. It is a complicated letter, but scholars say it is well worth the effort to gain a fuller understanding of this complex man who profoundly shaped Christian tradition. As we wind up the Year of Saint Paul this month, spend some time reading it.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Corinthians 1:1-7; Matthew 5:1-12 "Blessed be . . . the Father of mercies and the God of all consolation."

TUESDAY, JUNE 9

FEAST OF EPHREM OF SYRIA, DEACON, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Stealing from God's bounty

Although very ancient, originating in the fourth century, Saint Ephrem's works reflect a very modern spirituality. He saw the interconnectedness of all created things, giving rise to the sense that he was a "saint of ecology." And his view of women made him an early champion of the role of women in the church. Saint Paul's understanding of Christ as never "yes and no" but always "yes" is reflected in Ephrem's *Hymns on Faith*: "The boldness of our love is pleasing to you, O Lord, just as it pleased you that we should steal from your bounty." We pilfer from God's bounty of love when we place the care of people and the planet ahead of the rigors of order. Today's Readings: 2 Corinthians 1:18-22; Matthew 5:13-16

"For the Son of God, Jesus Christ, whom we proclaimed among you . . . was not 'Yes and No'; but in him it is always 'Yes.'"

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 10

Don't say "can't"

The preferred translation is "thou shalt not." But any way you say it, can't is a killer word. Saint Paul goes so far as to call the Ten Commandments the "ministry of death"—not to disrespect Moses but to point out that law's natural effect is to set mortal limits. Law is the stop sign that halts us in our tracks, the big *no* beyond which we fear to go. Unlike the Law, which came in glory on Sinai, Jesus

came in humility. And his law of love is the great yes that casts out fear and sets us free.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Corinthians 3:4-11; Matthew 5:17-19 "The ministry of death, chiseled in letters on stone tablets, came in glory."

THURSDAY, JUNE 11

FEAST OF BARNABAS, APOSTLE

Take a chance on faith

It requires both faith and generosity to vouch for another, especially when that person has a less-than-stellar track record. Barnabas was an outsider to the 12 apostles and worked hard to prove himself as a devout and talented orator. Consider then the bravery it took for Barnabas to come to the apostles with their former persecutor Saul of Tarsus and attempt to persuade them that this man, too, ought to be welcomed. In an act of pure faith Barnabas stood beside Saul as a sponsor and thereby united his name with this baffling newcomer. To say the least, this generosity was repaid by the man who would become Saint Paul.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 11:21b-26; 13:1-3; Matthew 5:20-26

"Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them."

FRIDAY, JUNE 12

Death does not become us

The beauty and spirit of each life is held in an earthen vessel that begins decaying the minute it's exposed to air, like some ancient artifact unsealed from a tomb. But Saint Paul, who grappled with the age-old questions of mortality, reassures us that despite our inexorable, and seemingly inglorious, march toward death, those who follow Jesus are actually sharing in the life of Christ. So that with each breath we take, we are infused with the eternal power of the Spirit. That is why we live in hope rather than despair; why we thrive despite the worst afflictions.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Corinthians 4:7-15; Matthew 5:27-32 "For we who live are constantly being given up to death for the sake of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may be manifested in our mortal flesh."

SATURDAY, JUNE 13

FEAST OF ANTHONY OF PADUA, PRIEST, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Help me find—myself

As saints go, Anthony is surely among the most popular. Across Italy he is simply *il santo*, "the saint." But one wonders what the saints think about us when, to their holy chagrin, they are remembered not for their lives of faith but only for what we hope to get from them. Poet Donna Pucciani portrays Saint Anthony as not a little weary of doing our finding for us. In her poem, the saint wonders, "How do you tell them, it's the letting go, not the gathering?" The next time I misplace keys or wallet, umbrella or sunglasses, I might consider what's truly missing in my life and hear Anthony wonder, "How do you tell them, it's the letting go, not the gathering. . . . Better to collect oneself / than all the objects in the world."



ST. CLETUS PARISH BUDGET

The 2009/2010 St. Cletus Parish Budget has been completed, approved by the Finance Committee and submitted to the Archdiocese. Sometime in late summer or early fall, the Finance Committee will review the 2009/2010 budget in conjunction with the June 30, 2009 year-end results. Based on this review, if deemed necessary, the budget will be reforecast and communicated to the Archdiocese.

Attention is now focused on the end of the year (June 30, 2009) financial issues. Tuition and fees have been collected for all programs and the last of the current year expenses are being accumulated. Sunday Collections are being closely monitored as are church related year end expenses. The months of July and August will be spent finalizing Financial Reports to be reviewed in detail by the Finance Committee. These reports will be used to prepare the Archdiocesan Annual Report which is typically due August 31st.

A weekend in September or October will be chosen to communicate the previous year's results and the current year's budget to the Parish. Generally, a report is published in the Canticle and the Pastor and Chairman of the Finance Committee speaks to the parishioners at each weekend Mass. At this time, questions/comments are always welcomed.
