



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB ...

Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time 2009

The word, 'diet', is usually applied to a strict regime of calorie counting. This practice is more common in countries where people are overfed and accordingly overweight. In such situations the body's weight can increase rapidly and the person becomes physically and emotionally uncomfortable. In some countries overeating produces many medical problems. Part of the cure is a balanced diet. Food is necessary for life and a good variety helps to keep us healthy. Today we are aware, more than ever, of the inner goodness in all foods. We know how each food provides us with the vitamins and minerals that are necessary for our good health. We are aware, too, of the social importance of food. Meals, banquets and parties are laid out when we celebrate birthdays, jubilees, anniversaries and other great events. Food is enjoyed most when it is taken in a meal shared with others. To share food is to share life.

In a remote and lonely place a multitude shared food and life to an extent they did not appreciate. In this hour appointed by God to reveal his Word made flesh, the great liberation of Israel from captivity is re-enacted. Just as God had fed the Israelites in the wilderness with manna, so now Jesus multiples the bread and feeds them. Just as God, through Moses, led his people into physical freedom, so now Jesus offers God's people spiritual freedom. On both occasions people gladly received the gift but failed to appreciate the giver. The multiplication of the loaves is but a hint of something greater. We notice that out of a little they all ate as much as they wanted, and that there was even some left over. At this hour, then, the people had a good opportunity to reflect on their spiritual history. Throughout the Hebrew Bible God feeds his people both physically with food and spiritually with wisdom. Both are expressions of his loving care and both are equally important. The wisdom here is the faith and insight which is needed to put people in a right relationship with God. But this particular nourishment is not always appreciated or well received. It is a banquet for which an invitation is given, but the response is not always forthcoming. God's gift always includes the challenge to put him first in all things. It is a blessing to hunger for God. In this gospel scene the physical hunger of the people was but a surface reminder of that deeper hunger by which we yearn constantly for God. Elsewhere in John's Gospel Jesus teaches that his food is to do the Father's will and to complete his work on earth. To hunger for God is to receive God. The hungry heart is receptive to the wisdom of God.

As we get energy and sustenance from food, so we are fed and grow healthy in faith as we hear and receive the word of God in the Scriptures. We are truly blessed that God's nourishing word is proclaimed to us at our regular worship. The Scriptures help us to grow in our knowledge of the Lord and challenge us to adjust our living to his word. But we can never be satisfied, because our knowledge of the Lord is meant to grow day by day. We ourselves can contribute actively to that growth. When did I last spend time studying the Bible? Our hunger for the word of God must never be suppressed or ignored, but satisfied. The more we feed on it the more we will want, because we will discover our huge capacity for God. God's love completes us. We receive God's word in our minds and in our hearts. The Christ-centered person is very open and receptive. The nourishing word always produces good results in that person's life. It brings us close to Jesus and to one another in his body. To know Jesus is to be alive with him. Ignorance is far from bliss. The well-known saying that ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ remains true. But it can also be said that faith-filled knowledge of Scripture will lead us to a deep and loving knowledge of Christ. Now is the time to seek the wisdom that comes from God. Saint Paul speaks of Christ as the power and the wisdom of God. Time spent in bible study is time well spent on ourselves as we dine on the nourishing fare that is God's word. Thanks be to God.

SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Waste not, want not

According to *AmpleHarvest.org*, one out of eight Americans needs food assistance but can't get fresh produce from local food pantries. Meanwhile, an estimated 100 billion pounds of food is thrown away annually in the United States. The website provides a way for food pantries and gardeners with extra produce to find each other. Food pantries can be listed in a central directory so that local gardeners can find them and, garden-by-garden, help diminish hunger in America. Think twice the next time you throw good food away; instead, help multiply the loaves and fishes in your community.

MONDAY, JULY 27

Are we ready for that mustard seed to grow?

Jesus uses the parable of the mustard seed to illustrate that when the reign of God takes root even from the smallest seed, it will grow to great size. But is that what most of us want? Do we really hope to see the establishment of God's reign—where the lowly are lifted up and the mighty are brought to their knees? Scripture scholar John Dominic Crossan points out that in Mediterranean areas the mustard bushes that sprout from tiny mustard seeds are considered weeds—a nuisance to any garden. Hmm . . . how many of us find God's ways an irritant to our best-laid plans? God's reign is messy when judged by worldly standards. Weeds are welcome.

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 32:15-24, 30-34; Matthew 13:31-35 "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed . . . It becomes a large bush."

TUESDAY, JULY 28

Heed the weeds

Anyone who has kept a garden knows that with weeds timing is everything. If the weeds are left to grow for too long, they cannot be pulled without damaging or uprooting the valuable crop. They must grow together or die together. When Jesus compares the world to a field and the righteous to good seeds, the weeds become the actions that lead away from Christ. If we aren't careful, we may find that the weeds have overgrown us and cannot be cleared without doing much damage to our hearts. What weeds can you clear from your life?

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 33:7-11; 34:5b-9, 28; Matthew 13:36-43

"The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man; the field is the world, and the good seed are the children of the kingdom."

WEDNESDAY, JULY 29

FEAST OF MARTHA

Please sit still for a moment

"Martha, Martha!" Whenever someone calls my name twice, I pay attention. It evokes a childish, "What have I done now?" response. But Jesus' double "Martha, Martha" seems like gentle, particular words of care for someone who finds it hard to stop the spinning wheels of her mind and the anxious work of her hands. She knows and trusts her work. While Jesus is kind to her, he sees things quite differently, and he is likewise firm and

clear. What he needs from Martha, his friend, is more akin to what all of us need from those we love: less work and more presence. Because most of us are such good workers, we easily assume that good and hard work is the best we have to offer others—our practical way of caring. It may be this but only to a point. What others really need is more of our time, our attention. That is the "better part" that Jesus says Martha's sister, Mary, has chosen in sitting near Jesus and listening. It's a part we can all choose, and it won't be taken away.

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 34:29-35; John 11:19-27 or Luke 10:38-42 "Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things."

THURSDAY, JULY 30

Always at your side

If you read the biblical story of the Israelites' journey from slavery in Egypt to the land God promised them you'll see the trip was not a smooth one. Conflicts with Moses, their great leader, as well as with their ultimate leader, God, hunger, and other obstacles plagued them along the way. But they made it, and one of the reasons they made it was because no matter what, God stayed with them. God goes with those on the lifelong journey of faith. It's nice to have a traveling companion, isn't it?

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 40:16-21, 34-38; Matthew 13:47-53 "Whenever the cloud was taken up from the tabernacle, the Israelites would set out on each stage of their journey."

FRIDAY, JULY 31

FEAST OF IGNATIUS OF LOYOLA, PRIEST A prayer for generosity

The spirit of giving doesn't come naturally to all of us. Saint Ignatius, the founder of the Jesuits, had a prayer for that, as he did for most things: "Eternal Word, only begotten Son of God, teach me true generosity. Teach me to serve you as you deserve, to give without counting the cost, to fight heedless of wounds, to labor without seeking rest, to sacrifice myself without thought of any reward, save the knowledge that I have done your will." When the giving gets tough, the tough get on their knees and pray for wider hearts.

Mistaken identity

When word came to King Herod about Jesus and what he was doing and saying, Herod mistook him for John the Baptist—whom he had murdered—come back from the dead. Perhaps Herod's error grew out of a fear that John had come back to haunt him or seek revenge of some kind. Fear can lead people to many kinds of misjudgments: avoiding problems, damaging relationships, not speaking out, holding back from taking steps to go forward in life. Move through fear to see clearly and act with courage.

TODAY'S READINGS: Leviticus 25:1, 8-17; Matthew 14:1-12 "At that time Herod the ruler heard reports about Jesus; and he said to his servants, 'This is John the Baptist; he has been raised from the dead.'"


