





NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time 2009

A young man in seminary was struggling with the question of his vocation. He was now in the fourth year of his studies and had some experiences working in a parish and in a local prison. A moderately extrovert kind of person, he also enjoyed a lot of success in his work with young people. His fellow students found him to be very approachable and held him in high esteem. But his success was at the core of his inner struggle. Surely all this good work that now engaged his energies could be done without his being a priest? Lots of good people were doing similar things and with great results. Over the space of two hours one morning he shared his thoughts with his confessor, an elderly priest of great experience. To the student's dismay the priest said very little in response to his pained outpouring, but presented him with a small block of wood with an inscription on it. The inscription read as follows: 'In everything you do, put God first'. The young man embraced this simple message as his personal motto. With his heart and faith focused on God, his life was transformed. He grew as a follower of Jesus.

Faith is God's gift to us. It is not a human achievement. The gospel teaches strongly that it is the Father who draws us to Jesus. In other words the Father enables us to receive Jesus as he really is, namely, the Word made flesh. Today Jesus explains a passage of the Old Testament in relation to himself. This passage is a statement of faith by the People of God about their special relationship with him. They have a sense of their uniqueness as being specially chosen by God out of all the nations on earth. The sacred writings in the Law and the Prophets have convinced them that indeed this is the case. The written words of the Hebrew Bible remain as a permanent proof and reminder that their faith in the one true God is well founded. They are a thankful people, fully aware that they have done nothing to deserve their glorious calling. They know the Scriptures, which teach that a time will come when God will go beyond the written word and will write his Law deep within their heart. God will personally teach each one of them. But John's Gospel claims that this belief is now fully realized in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. Who is willing to accept it? They know him too well. He is a local man whom many may have known from childhood. In spite of the miracle of the loaves which they have witnessed, his claims about himself strain the boundaries of their belief. Yet Jesus persists in his teaching that he has been sent by God in fulfillment of the promise. From now on all encounters with God are intended to be deeply personal experiences of Jesus. Here Jesus invites his hearers to be open to God's movement in their hearts. The Father's gift to them is to believe in Jesus and have eternal life.

Our faith in Jesus is a way of life which includes and affects everything we say, think, and do. Nothing can be excluded. This is why faith can sometimes challenge us deeply. It is quite common to find Christians who live two lives, namely, one for Sunday worship and another for weekdays when life is lived independently of God. But we need to have a single mind about our faith relationship with the Lord.

A personal faith that is centered on Jesus is a truly joyful experience that sets us free. We become teachable and able to hear and receive his word. These are the hallmarks of being a true disciple. His word gives us the wisdom to distinguish what is of true and lasting value from the trivial and passing. It is good sometimes to have a fellow traveler on the way of faith. Whether we see our companion as a confessor or soul-friend the purpose remains the same. This person will allow us the freedom to share our faith, to talk about our experiences as we seek to follow in the footsteps of Jesus. As we share we grow and mature in our relationship with Jesus to whom the Father has drawn us. At the same time we grow in love for our sisters and brothers in the community of the Church to which Jesus has drawn us for fellowship and life.

NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME -

The food of eternal life

On their desert journey the Israelites gathered up and ate the manna that sustained them for their trek to the land of promise. Eventually they did arrive, but also, eventually, they died. Elijah depended on the food and drink that God provided so that he might make it to his destination, the mountain of God. He arrived, yet that prophet also died. John's gospel, though, emphasizes our hunger for God, as constant and basic as our hunger for food, but also a spiritual hunger that will be satisfied only by our being nourished by the body of Christ. Jesus calls himself the bread of heaven not only to keep us going during our turn on the planet but as the taste of heaven so that we who partake "may eat it and not die."

MONDAY, AUGUST 10

FEAST OF LAWRENCE, DEACON AND MARTYR

In imitation of Christ

Little is known of the life of Saint Lawrence, who was martyred under the Emperor Valerian in 258, but what is clear is that he was immensely popular with the Christians of Rome. A basilica was built over his tomb 50 years after his death by the Emperor Constantine, and the anniversary of his martyrdom was kept in Rome as a solemn feast—by the sixth century one of the most important feasts in western Christendom. Saint Augustine said of him in a sermon: "He loved Christ in his life, he imitated him in his death." While not many of us are called to martyrdom, all of us are called to love Christ in our own lives. Find your own way, however modest, to do so in your life.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 11

FEAST OF CLARE, VIRGIN - The stuff of happiness

Isn't it amazing how much stuff we collect in our lives? You move into a house or an apartment with a few things and you think you've got plenty of room. But within a short period of time you've got no place left to put all of it. Saint Clare didn't have that problem. Although from a wealthy family, she embraced a life of strict and total poverty, possessing absolutely nothing for the sake of the joy that comes with possessing only Christ. And joyful she was for nearly 40 years, so much so that she was declared a saint only two years after she died—ironic, when you consider that we collect stuff in an effort to be happy and can never seem to get enough.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 12

FEAST OF JANE FRANCES DE CHANTAL, RELIGIOUS

Multitasking

Jane Frances de Chantal is one of those rare saints who was not only a religious sister but also a mother and a wife. She lived the joys and heartbreaks of family life and later, after her husband died and her children were grown, religious life. She knew what it was like both to pick up after her kids and create and lead an organization. She knew both the affection of close

friends and the despair of dryness in prayer. Say a word of gratitude to the saintly folks around you today—the moms balancing family and work, the deacon ministering from a hospital to a blog and everywhere in between.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 13

FEAST OF PONTIAN, POPE AND MARTYR, AND HIPPOLYTUS, PRIEST AND MARTYR - The odd couple

What may be one of the strangest reconciliations in church history occurred between Pontian and Hippolytus. Pontian became pope in 235 A.D.—just in time for the Roman emperor Maximus' persecution of Christians. He spent most of his reign as a slave in the mines of Sardinia. At odds with two popes (not Pontian), Hippolytus got the idea to have his followers name him pope. But his separation from the church did not prevent him from getting swept up in the same persecution that netted Pontian. Now both in prison, Hippolytus repented and Pontian reconciled him to the church. As today's two saints came to know, forgiveness is always possible, no matter the circumstances.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 14

FEAST OF MAXIMILIAN MARY KOLBE, PRIEST AND MARTYR

Passing the test

Maximilian Kolbe was a Franciscan friar who offered his life in order to save that of a stranger sentenced to die in the Auschwitz concentration camp. Canonized in 1982, he also was honored in 1998 as one of ten 20th-century Christian martyrs commemorated with statues over Westminster Abbey in London. The martyrs represent victims of religious persecution and oppression worldwide. "There has never been a time in Christian history when someone, somewhere, has not died rather than compromise with the powers of oppression, tyranny, and unbelief," said the Rev. Dr. Anthony Harvey, sub-dean of Westminster, when the statues were unveiled in 1998. They responded when their faith was tested. Can we do the same?

SOLEMNITY OF THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY - Our bodies, ourselves

Assumption is obviously a teaching about the Mother of God. But this dogma has much to say about all of us. It affirms the dignity of our bodies and how God is mindful of every hair that falls from our heads. In an era when the idea of the human person is continually under assault—from the arena of public policy to the refugee camps and killing fields of war—Mary's Assumption is a divine response to our deepest fears as well as our greatest hopes about the fate of our bodies. God assures us: *We will be lifted up.*

The program will be entertaining for lovers of music in all genres, and 100% of each dollar donated will support the new Fine Arts Series.

I hope that you will join us for the concert and enjoy the diverse talents of our parishioners. Specific information regarding donations in support of the Fine Arts Series, as well as levels of sponsorship, will be available at the concert. I am also happy to speak personally to anyone interested in supporting this endeavor, even if you are unable to attend the concert. We are all very excited to begin this project; concerts are already being tentatively booked for 2010. Thank you for your continued support of music at St. Cletus; I believe that the Fine Arts Series will be something that St. Cletus will be proud of for years to come.




