

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...



FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT 2009

It's a rather different spirit that today's liturgy seems to suggest should be ours during the final count-down to Christmas. As the Gospel unfolds its charming story of the meeting between the elderly woman and the teenager, Elizabeth and Mary, we cannot be but struck by several features.

First, there is the beautiful unselfishness of Mary. She, who must still have been coming to terms with the astounding news that she carried within her the long-awaited Messiah, would have been forgiven had she decided to stay at home and dwell upon her wonderful secret. After all, she could always visit her aged cousin Elizabeth later. There would be plenty of time after her own child and Elizabeth's had been born. Instead, she sets out at once "as quickly as she could" on a lengthy journey so that she can see Elizabeth, offer her congratulations, and provide whatever help might be needed.

Secondly, there is the prayerfulness and faith that seem to permeate this whole event. On Mary's side, as she made her long journey into "the hill country" – it would probably have taken her the best part of a week – she must, like any young mother-to-be, have thought constantly of the child within her and, as she did so, she would have raised her mind and heart in prayer and praise. The very fact that she made the journey at all was itself an act of faith; she went because she believed what the angel had told her, both about herself and about her cousin. On Elizabeth's side, as soon as Mary arrives, she, Elizabeth, is "filled with the Holy Spirit" and under that inspiration pours out her soul in prayer: "Of all women you are the most blessed and blessed is the fruit of your womb." (Already we hear the "Hail Mary" in embryo, that prayer which to this day is on the lips of so many people throughout the world.) And Elizabeth goes on to praise the deep faith of her young cousin.

A third striking feature of the Visitation is its unmistakable spirit of joy. Elizabeth tells how her own child had "leapt for joy" in her womb at the presence of the unborn Lord, whose herald he was destined to be. Reading between the lines, it's clear that the joy of the unborn John was a joy shared by both mothers, too. In fact, though this doesn't appear in today's gospel passage, Mary responded with the prayer we know as the Magnificat in which she proclaims that her spirit finds its joy in "God my savior."

The days before Christmas are busy days for us all. We wonder where all the time has gone since we first read one of those warnings about shopping early for Christmas. In fact, the great day when we celebrate the Lord's birthday is now almost here, a mere 5 days away. Yet I believe that there is still time, if we so wish, to prepare a worthy celebration of Christmas. How? By striving, especially today and this week to follow Mary's example: first, by thinking not just of ourselves, but also of others, reaching out to them in loving and practical concern; second, by finding time, making time, if need be, to devote ourselves to a period even if it is only five minutes – of quiet prayer each day in a real spirit of faith; and, third, by entering into the joy which Christ's coming into the world brings with it.

If we strive to do these things, whatever our other festivities (including a Christmas drink) may be, we shall indeed have "a real good time," for ours will surely be the true spirit of Christmastime.

FEAST OF PETER CANISIUS, PRIEST, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH How to get things done

Have you noticed there are only four more shopping days left till Christmas? Better get moving or there won't be enough time to put up the decorations, finish addressing the Christmas cards, get the food prepared, and clean up the house for the guests. Maybe you need to beg the intercession of today's saint, Peter Canisius (1521-1597), who is known as the patron saint of getting things done. He used to say, "If you have too much to do, with God's help you will find time to do it all." Hey, it's worth a try. Otherwise, you might need to call on Saint Jude, patron of hopeless causes!

Leap and be lifted

In these final few days before Christmas it's good to remember just what happened in the coming of Jesus: God reached into our humanity and lifted us into life with God. Mary knew that. In her song known as the Magnificat (Luke 1:46-56), from the Latin translation of its opening words, "My soul magnifies the Lord," she celebrates how the Lord had "looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed." Exaltedlifted up—she exulted: rejoiced, literally "leaped up" in joy to praise what God had done for her and all people. So do a little exulting today: Start or end your day with Mary's words of praise and gratitude.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Samuel 1:24-28; Luke 1:46-56 "He has . . . lifted up the lowly."

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 23

FEAST OF JOHN OF KANTY, PRIEST

Absorb evil

If John of Kanty in 15th-century Poland could have known he would one day be venerated as a saint, he would have been astonished and embarrassed. Although he was a brilliant scripture scholar, he was also a very humble parish priest who had enemies. Even when treated unfairly for years, he could accept unjust blame and criticism without flinching because he believed that he could protect his parishioners and defeat the power of evil by absorbing it into

himself. Some say that is what Jesus did in relation to death—evil's ultimate weapon: He took it into himself, and there defeated it. In a culture of blame like our own, the ability to defuse violence and anger is a rare gift but one we should cultivate more than seeking revenge or proving ourselves right when wronged.

TODAY'S READINGS: Malachi 3:1-4, 23-24; Luke 1:57-66 "See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me."

ADVENT WEEKDAY

Praise the son

Perhaps you've heard the notion of the "father wound," the emotional pain—often accompanied by real-life consequences suffered by a man who does not receive support and approval from his father. Studies suggest that nearly every man in prison will describe his relationship with his biological father in negative terms. John the Baptist had no such problem, judging by the wonderful words of praise his father Zechariah showered upon him at his birth. As we prepare to commemorate and celebrate the birth of the Savior, take a moment to reach out with words of encouragement and support to a son—your own or someone else's. He could use a word of blessing.

SOLEMNITY OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD Unwrap the first of eight gifts

Children carry the hope of Christmas in them through Advent's long weeks. They're full of wonder at the pageantry of the season: colored lights and decorations, carols and stories, Santa Claus and all those lovely wrapped boxes under the tree. When Christmas morning dawns, they can't contain themselves. We might ask ourselves: What have we been waiting for? The church has a gift for all of us: an Octave of joy, eight days to unpack the wonder of this season. Today, unwrap the gift of compassion. If you need some, take some. And then give the rest away. Merry Christmas.

None of us likes our "dirty laundry" aired in public, but, as philosopher George Santayana put it, "Those who do not learn from the past are doomed to repeat it." Accept the gift of wisdom today and learn from your mistakes.

SAINT STEPHEN (first century) December 26

"A man filled with faith and the Holy Spirit" (Acts 6:5): thus Luke introduces Stephen, first of seven deacons chosen by the community for its ministry of charity, first to lay down his life in witness to

Christ. As the church's first martyr, Stephen's life and death mirror the preaching and passion of Jesus, "the faithful witness" (Greek, martyr) (Revelation 1:5). Like Jesus, Stephen works "great signs and wonders among the people" (Acts 6:8). Like Jesus, when falsely accused, Stephen's face radiates angelic serenity (Acts 6:15), though his tongue, like Jesus', is a two-edged sword. As the dying Jesus forgave his executioners, even making excuses for them, then commended his spirit into his Father's hands (Luke 23:34, 46), so Stephen intercedes for his murderers and begs Jesus to receive his spirit (Acts 7:60, 59). How fruitful both passions! The penitent thief inherits Paradise; Saul, who consented to Stephen's killing, is transformed into the fearless preacher Paul. Thus Stephen challenges us to bear witness not in words only, but by Christ-like forgiveness toward all.
