



# EPIPHANY OF THE LORD 2010

Children singing "twinkle, twinkle little star, how I wonder what you are" are a reminder of the innocence of childhood and the way in which a child captures the wonder and mystery of the world in which we live. For children, the stars have a magical, mysterious character. For an adult, a starlit night in a dark sky can still evoke a sense of wonder. The thought of radio-telescopes penetrating the furthermost points of the galaxy looking for dust and the presence of black holes sweeping up matter in the universe deepen the idea of the mystery in which we live. No wonder for ancient people the star pointed towards God's activity in creation. For the wise men, the sight of the mysterious new star led them to go on pilgrimage to the Christ Child.

The second reading captures the heart of the message of Epiphany. The message of Christ is for all people; the death and resurrection of Christ saves all women and men and offers them the hope of eternal life. All are part of one body whose head is Christ. A light has shone in the darkness; through Christ there is a new meaning to human life and a new promise from God to his people.

The wise men that come bearing gifts help us to understand the person of Christ and the meaning of his birth. This birth is surrounded by mystery in the power and the work of God is active. The star unites the work of God in the heavens and on earth. Three gifts point to the meaning of the person of the Christ Child. Gold is the gift which is a sign of Kingship. Christ reigns over all people as Christ the king. His kingship can be likened to a Shepherd king who cares and tends for his flock, who seeks out the lost sheep and wants to restore it to the fold. Frankincense is the gift which indicates that Jesus is the Son of God. The promise of God is fulfilled; God becomes flesh, lives among people, heals the sick and forgives sin. Myrrh is the gift which points to the fact that the Christ Child will die and be buried. He will be anointed with myrrh at burial. The feast of the Epiphany looks forward to the great celebration of Easter morning when the women come to the tomb and discover that Jesus has risen from the dead. God is triumphant over death.

The wise men worshipped and then returned home by a different route. The poet, T. S. Eliot, writes of the wise men looking back many years later and reflecting on this event. Their life had been changed. While they returned home, they are no longer at home there. The old life had lost its flavor and it seemed stale. The things that had been important now seemed unimportant. Life had been changed. They began to see life in a new way.

At the end of the twelve days of Christmas celebration, we go back to our regular routine of daily life. Putting away the Christmas tree, the decorations and the tinsel is a sign of moving into the New Year. What has changed? At one level, very little. At another level, we have celebrated that the Epiphany speaks of the Good News of the birth of Christ for all people. Many images describe the Christian as a pilgrim, an alien in the world, living in the world but not of the world. The Christian will never be fully at home in the world. For Christians, as people on pilgrimage, the journey continues because there is no lasting city on earth. At the end of the pilgrimage is the joy of eternal life with God. Being a pilgrim is a reminder that the meaning of life has been turned upside-down by the birth of Christ. The Feast of the Epiphany reminds the family of the Church of its true priority; to see Christ's face in one's neighbor and to praise God.

# Dream the impossible

Every inquiry elicited the same response: All ordinations were suspended for the foreseeable future. Undaunted, Neumann wrote to the bishop of New York, who agreed to ordain him. He had to travel halfway across the world to achieve his dream, but he did it. God does not give us dreams we cannot achieve. What dream have you put off because it seemed "impossible"? Today is the day to reconsider taking that first step.

In the love we show others, and others show us, God is present right in front of us. The Christmas and Epiphany celebra-

tions have amply demonstrated God's original love for us. How about returning the favor?

He even got his buddy, Thomas Aquinas, to write a book explaining the Christian faith to Muslims. He believed that love was greater than military might—he couldn't have been too far off because he lived to be 100!

### **Keep your Christmas present**

It is two weeks since Christmas. You remember Christmas—"May your days be merry and bright" and all that. Too often we think of "getting through the holidays" rather than savoring, like fine wine, the implications of "God with us." Our attitude often resembles the routine of the classroom: data traveling from the notes of the professor to the notes of the student without having spent time in the mind of either one. What Christmas celebrates is nothing less than the most radical moment in human history: the leap from the divine to the human, piercing the veil, God taking root in skin and bone and changing our destiny forever. The lights may be packed away, the gifts exchanged, but that's trivia. How have I been changed by these days? In his first letter John evokes "water, blood, and Spirit," a triple, shattering testimony to Jesus as Son of God and to our own eternal life because of him. We need time to take that in.
