



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time 2010

When Jesus spoke to his fellow Nazarenes in the synagogue, they were initially impressed with his words. That is because he began by offering them what they already knew – he began by pointing out the beauty they were already familiar with. He quoted the prophet Isaiah – recalling God’s promise of setting free the captive and oppressed, of giving new sight to the blind, and bringing good news to the poor. They approved of his words, because they knew they were addressed to them. They regarded themselves as the poor in need of hearing good news; they saw themselves as the captives and the downtrodden, who needed to be freed from the oppression of Roman rule. They approved when Jesus spoke to them of God’s promise to set them free.

But then Jesus introduced a new element, and the importance of what he was saying began to sink in to them. Jesus challenged them to see that this wasn’t just a promise for the future, but that it was being fulfilled today – through him. Jesus was identifying himself as the one anointed by God’s spirit to set his people free. And they didn’t like this new thing he spoke. “Who does he think he is? We know him – he’s just the carpenter’s son.” Familiarity breeds contempt.

And Jesus stretched them further by introducing another new element – the thought that God’s love might not be exclusively for them. He offered the vision of God seeking to set free all people – Jew and Gentile alike. He proclaimed a year of favor which extended to all nations – perhaps even to the hated Romans – just as in ancient times God had shown his mercy to Naaman and the foreign widow. Jesus asked them to look again at God’s promises and see them afresh, that they were directed to all who are poor and need good news, to all who are blind, oppressed and in need of liberation. And in so doing, he asked them to see these outsiders, these foreign nations, no longer as enemies, as pagans, idolaters, inferior, but as beloved by God, just as they were themselves.

They resisted the picture Jesus painted for them, they rejected his vision of reality, and they were so threatened by his message that they sought to kill him. Eventually, of course, they would.

Like the Nazarenes, we can refuse to believe that “this text is being fulfilled today.” We can live our lives looking always to the future for God to fulfill his promises, perhaps after death, but not today, not now. Jesus is quite insistent: these things can happen today, if we allow God to work in us. Jesus challenges us to look again at our own lives, our relationships, our work, our daily struggles and joys, and to see in them the presence and beauty of God.

God’s Generosity Reflected in the People of St. Cletus Parish

The people of St. Cletus Parish have always been a true reflection of God’s generosity but most especially during these past few months. The parishioners in the last several months have reduced the budget deficit from \$49,000 to \$10,000 currently; given abundantly to those in need through the parish food pantry and the Giving Tree Program; supported their parish and Christ with their donations at Christmas in the amount of \$210,000; responded most generously (\$11,500) to the tremendous need of the people of Haiti; and continue to support the efforts of all our parish ministries, especially our educational endeavors through our parish school, religious education programs, and our youth programs.

God is truly pleased with your reflection of his generosity. I, as your pastor, am humbled and thankful for your support and efforts on behalf of the Gospel. It is truly a grace filled privilege and honor to be your pastor. I personally thank each one of you for your dedication and commitment to the message and mission of the Gospel.

May God continue to bless your efforts on his behalf and fill you with his abundant graces.

Catholics Come Home

I Proclaim Your Wondrous Deeds



There is a dramatic moment in today's Gospel (Lk 4:21-30). Jesus tried to tell the people of his town the truth about the messiah; that the Old Testament prophecies were fulfilled in him. The listeners did not see the connections between the past and the present moment. On hearing this truth, they were filled with fury and they drove Jesus out of town.

In the recent television ads for Catholics Come Home, you may have heard a true statement that made you uncomfortable. One of the statements seems so large and exaggerated and we don't have the historical perspective to understand the underlying truth. Have you heard the ad that says the Catholic Church **"We founded the college system."**

The contemporary liberal arts course of study is comprised of literature, languages, philosophy, history, mathematics, and science holds the historical truth in that statement. This system was developed in the 5th Century C.E. and defined the education proper to a free man (Latin: liber, "free"), unlike the education proper to a slave. The formula remained unchanged throughout the Christianized Roman Empire of the 5th century until Arabic texts and the works of Aristotle became available in Western Europe in the 12th century.

Another line in that same TV ad states that **the Catholic Church "educate(s) more children than any other scholarly or religious institution."** Did you know that the largest system of Christian education in the United States is operated by the Roman Catholic Church? In the U.S. alone there are 8,500 schools, enrolling 2.7 million students. Most schools are administered by individual dioceses and parishes that also offer Religious Education to children who attend public schools.

Today, as many schools in the Archdiocese prepare for a week that celebrates Catholic Education you may want to share these facts with your family. Be proud of the Catholic Church and all it does to foster the minds and hearts of the next generation.
