





NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

“THEY SAW HIS GLORY”



Pilgrims to the Holy Land are unlikely to forget their visit to Mount Tabor. A graceful, isolated mountain in Lower Galilee, it rises almost 600 meters above the valley; its dome-like shape is eye-catching and panoramic views from its summit among the most stunning in the land. One writer has described Tabor as rising “up to heaven like an altar in the greatest sanctuary in the world”. Such imagery, and still more the constant flow of pilgrims throughout the centuries, bears testimony to the fact that Tabor has traditionally been identified as the spot where today’s gospel event took place.

The scene is one where Jesus is deep in prayer while nearby are his three disciples Peter, James and John. They are dozing off – the day has been hot and the climb exhausting – when suddenly they witness an incredible sight. It’s their Master; they’ve seen him lost in prayer before, but never anything like this: his face radiant, even his clothing suffused with light. Then they notice that two other men are joining him. One is Moses, leader and lawgiver of God’s people, and the other is Elijah, the great prophet. (Today, the Franciscan Church on the summit of Mount Tabor is flanked by two side chapels, dedicated to those two Old Testament heroes). More amazing than their presence, however, is their topic of conversation: they are talking with Jesus, says the gospel, “of his passing which he was about to accomplish in Jerusalem”, a “passing” which will involve his death and resurrection.

Peter is awe-struck. “Master,” he exclaims, “it is wonderful for us to be here.” But the words are scarcely out of his mouth when a cloud – a biblical symbol of God’s presence – overshadows them and from the cloud the voice of the Father is heard: “This is my Son, the Chosen One; listen to him.” After that, all is back to normal; “Jesus,” says the gospel, “was found alone”, no longer Jesus ablaze with glory but the familiar Jesus they knew so well. Now they are to accompany him on a journey which will take him to his death in Jerusalem. However, they will never be able to forget, will never want to forget, that astonishing event on Mount Tabor; it had given them a glimpse of Jesus’ real identity as the beloved Son of the Father. It will stand them in good stead in the dark days ahead.

However, as time went by they came to see – and the readings today suggest that we should share their discovery – that there was even more to Mount Tabor than they had realized. For not only had it given them a glimpse of who Jesus was but also of what we, his followers, are destined to be. In the words of St. Paul, “the Lord Jesus will transfigure these wretched bodies of ours into copies of his glorious body”. Some years ago a horrific explosion in Belfast robbed a young girl of an arm, a leg and an eye. She made an amazing recovery, and was married a year later. Many newspapers carried “before” and “after” photographs, showing the incredible transformation that had been worked, thanks to the skill of doctors and nurses. What then may we not expect when the Lord himself is at work, for, as Paul reminds us, God at his disposal limitless power, “the same power with which he can subdue the whole universe”?

As though reflecting on the import of what happened on Mount Tabor, Paul cries out that “our (real) homeland is in heaven”; that’s where we truly belong for we are a pilgrim people and that’s where we shall finally be transfigured into the likeness of our risen Lord. And that’s why our supreme task, especially during these days of lent, is to ensure that we are treading the right path, or, if we are not, to make the necessary adjustments while there is time.

SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT - See beyond the surface

Peter gets the Transfiguration wrong, as he does so many things at first. Upon seeing a glimpse of Jesus' glory, his impulse is to mark the spot, to memorialize it with a shrine. We can understand that, though today we take digital photos and videos, vainly trying to capture a place, a person, or a moment that can never be held—except in the heart. In Lent we remember that our faith is not only a matter of medals, holy cards, a rosary hung from the car's rearview mirror or worn as a necklace. These do not sum up our faith any more than children are their photographs. Tokens remind us of someone or something important; at their best, they move us to an act of love. Those in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults process are not supported only by browsing through photos in our parish directory but by seeing faith in action: on the street, at work, in the homes of believers.

MONDAY, MARCH 1

LENTEN WEEKDAY - Tell it like it is

The biggest saints were often some of the biggest sinners. The difference between them and us may be that they sought liberation through confessing their wrongdoing. Holding onto sin means letting it hold onto us, or as Saint Alphonsus Liguori said, "After we have offended God, the devil labors to keep the mouth closed." The sixth-century monk John Climacus was even more picturesque about it: "Eggs warmed in dung hatch out. Unconfessed evil thoughts hatch evil actions." Don't let the spirit of jealousy, resentment, or dishonesty hatch out! Run, don't walk, to the sacrament that liberates!

TODAY'S READINGS: *Daniel 9:4b-10; Luke 6:36-38*

"Ah, Lord, great and awesome God . . . we have sinned and done wrong."

TUESDAY, MARCH 2

LENTEN WEEKDAY - Understanding God

Although the Pledge of Allegiance has been around since 1892, the words "under God" were not officially added by Congress until 1954. While some have criticized the move as breaching the church-state divide, the notion that we are all under a Supreme Being in fact encourages the egalitarian spirit the United States is known for. The idea that no one is above God reinforces the American belief that no one is above the law either. The sense that we are a people living under God can help us see each other as brothers and sisters and motivate us to work for greater equality and justice for all.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 1:10, 16-20; Matthew 23:1-12*

"You have one teacher, and you are all students."

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 3

FEAST OF KATHERINE DREXEL, VIRGIN - The best of both worlds

Katherine Drexel (1858-1955) went beyond herself in many ways. Beyond her economic class—she gave away millions of dollars of her inheritance to charities. Beyond her race—she founded a religious order of women to help African Americans

and Native Americans. When she was 77, however, her life of service changed to one of quiet and prayer after she suffered a heart attack. Katherine's story shows the importance of both prayer and service, contemplation and action. Find that balance in your own life.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Jeremiah 18:18-20; Matthew 20:17-28*

THURSDAY, MARCH 4

LENTEN WEEKDAY - Be a good steward of yourself

In the season of Lent, tradition calls on Christians to fast. Fasting has a long history, going all the way back to biblical times. Jesus fasted in the wilderness before embarking on his ministry. As a spiritual discipline fasting points to a period of preparation—in Lent, preparation to celebrate the Easter mysteries. It reminds you to clear away distractions and look more closely at yourself and where things come from and where they go. Think of all the "resources" in your life: time, money, food, possessions, even love. Are you using them well? Now's the time to find out.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Jeremiah 17:5-10; Luke 16:19-31*

"I the Lord test the mind and search the heart, to give to all . . . according to the fruit of their doings."

FRIDAY, MARCH 5

LENTEN WEEKDAY - No regrets?

You may be tempted to believe you have "failed" Lent; you might have relaxed your resolutions or Lenten practices. But you should not think that your Lent is over the instant you stumble. The third- and fourth-century church father Saint John Chrysostom reminds us that our task is rather simple: "Have you sinned? Mourn and annul the sin. How toilsome is this? . . . I am not telling you to cleave the oceans, or to navigate slowly into port from the high seas, or to march, or to depart on an endless journey . . . Then what? Mourn the sin." Always be willing to re-evaluate your goals for this Lent, keeping in mind that repentance is all that is asked of you.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 37:3-4, 12-13a, 17b-28a; Matthew 21:33-43, 45-46* - *"Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures: The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone?'"*

SATURDAY, MARCH 6

LENTEN WEEKDAY - Restrain a prodigious appetite

The gospel story of the "prodigal son" provides a vivid illustration of the limits of acquisitiveness and self-indulgence. The son first demands his inheritance from his father while his father is still alive (ouch!). If that weren't enough, he then quickly runs through it in the biblical equivalent of a Las Vegas weekend splurge. Only when he hungers to fill his empty stomach does he come to his senses. In a similar way, feeling a bit of hunger—the effect of the traditional Lenten discipline of fasting—might help us reflect on our own shortcomings and make adjustments and amends as necessary. Consider skipping a meal today for the sake of your spirit.

Using these resources will help you focus on what Jesus asks of his followers...to serve one another through love.

Do you know?

- Bolivia is a country of contrasts. The world's foremost producer of tin, and home to Latin America's second-largest reserves of natural gas, this country has the lowest average income in South America. Bolivia is plagued by drastic inequality, economic polarization, and marginalization of its indigenous people, who represent about 60 percent of the population.
- Rural poverty in Bolivia has steadily worsened during the past few decades, resulting in mass migration to urban centers, where the quality of life is slowly deteriorating. Meanwhile, small farmers face the additional challenges of deforestation, degradation of natural resources and climate change, which alters the seasonal cycles and generates long, unpredictable periods of drought and floods.
- Since 1955, Catholic Relief Services has worked with local partners in the Catholic Church to improve the quality of life of poor Bolivians. Whether providing housing, water and sanitation systems, health services, agriculture assistance, microcredit, or emergency response, CRS works to strengthen the capacity of the communities served to take control of their own development and achieve long-term change.

Catholic Social Teaching focus this week is *Care for God's Creation*: We are called to be good stewards of nature, a gift that God has given us.



ALL ABOUT CHANGE

On this Second Sunday of Lent the scriptures remind us that when we have an encounter with our God, things are bound to change. In the first reading God tells Abram to raise his eyes to the sky, promising descendants as numerous as the stars.
