



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB ...

FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT 2010

For the Jews in Jesus' time, the Mosaic Law was very clear. For example, a woman caught committing adultery was to be stoned to death. Judgment and punishment dominated over forgiveness and mercy. Due to the patriarchal nature of the society, the same punishment did not apply to the man because the woman was seen as inferior and treated as the possession of the man. This understanding of relationships between men and women is scandalous to us today but sadly still reflects the attitudes of some men towards women. Jesus' action towards the woman is dramatic and turns the custom of the Law upside-down.

Jesus forgives the sin of the woman and tells those who surround her not to judge her in the old way. She is to be given a new start and told not to sin again. In his action towards her, Jesus affirms and restores her dignity. He makes a statement about the equality of woman and man in this action. He also places the focus on forgiveness and mercy, not judgment. If we combine this story with the answer to the question, "How many times must I forgive my brother"; we hear Jesus saying, "not seven times but seventy-seven times". This is an infinite number and shows that forgiveness is always waiting as a gift from God. The newness of life offered to the repentant sinner is a cause for celebration and for this reason we have the sacrament of reconciliation.

The Church has always recognized that we cannot judge other persons; that is to be left to God. For this reason, while we can name certain actions as wrong, no one, not even the priest, can judge the fault or culpability of the person who does the wrong. The Church has always taught that mortal sin or being totally cut off from God can only occur when a person freely and with knowledge commits a seriously wrong action. The mystery of the other person means that no-one, except God, can see the freedom or knowledge of the other person. We cannot say that any particular person does not enjoy God's love and is totally alienated from God, in hell. This choice is a possibility because we are free, but God can judge that inner freedom.

Newspaper reports constantly detail the most horrific crimes, including child abuse, murder and violence of various kinds. There are many crimes which cause outrage and provoke angry reactions. While we must name these actions as wrong and protect people and especially children from harm, at the same time we cannot make the judgment about any person's relationship with God. They may be ill, mad, inadequate in human development or not acting freely. It is for God to judge. In justice and to protect others we may send some people to prison or to a hospital, but there is still a duty for the Christian community to care and pray for them.

Judgment is rife in society today – especially of those with criminal convictions. The Gospel is a reminder that we must be careful about labeling people or deciding how they stand before God. Wrong and bad actions must be condemned but people are complex. The Christian is called to remember that repentance and conversion are possible through God's grace.

STATUES COVERED IN PURPLE

You will notice that all the statues in the church are covered in purple cloth this week. There is an old tradition in the Church that from the 5th Sunday of Lent until our Easter celebration all religious images are covered in the church so we can concentrate on the passion and death of our Lord which leads us to the great celebration of our redemption at Easter. Let us use these last days of our Lenten journey to reflect on the sacrifice of that was made for us by Christ that lead to our reconciliation with the Father. These days are opportunities for deep reflection, prayer and conversion of our hearts as true disciples called to reflect Christ to others in our daily lives.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Once again, there is legislation in Springfield that would violate personal conscience by forcing everyone to pay for the killing of the unborn with public money.

The so-called "Reproductive Health and Access Act" has been re-introduced in the Illinois General Assembly as House Bill 6205. You may recall.last year's version of this legislation, which sought to undermine healthcare workers' rights of conscience, nullify the existing regulations of abortion, publicly fund abortions and mandate comprehensive sex education. I had hoped that last year's widespread public opposition, and the inability of the proponents to advance their legislation to a vote, would dissuade policy makers from again proposing such an extreme and out of touch position.

This year's legislation has been amended so that its most egregious demand is the use of public money to pay for all "reproductive health services." These services include abortion, emergency contraception without pregnancy testing, and in-vitro fertilization for all Medicaid recipients, people on state health insurance plans, and any other programs providing state "medical assistance." If this legislation becomes law, money you send to state government to meet the shared needs of society will instead be used to fund abortion and emergency contraception without pregnancy testing. At the very least, to add this kind of expense to the budget now is irresponsible.

House Bill 6205 violates the conscientious objection of many citizens. In 1844, Abraham Lincoln broke with his own party, the often anti-Catholic Whigs, and proposed: "Resolved, that the guarantee of the rights of conscience, as found in our Constitution, is most sacred and inviolable, and one that belongs no less to the Catholic, than to the Protestant; and that all attempts to abridge or interfere with these rights, either of Catholic or Protestant, directly or indirectly, have our decided disapprobation, and shall ever have our most effective opposition." Lincoln's position is as valid today as it was last year and in 1844. The tax dollars of Catholics and many other conscientious people must not be used to subsidize the taking of innocent human life.

Accordingly, I again ask you to make your voice heard in Springfield. Please contact your elected representatives this week and urge them to oppose House Bill 6205. If your representative indicates that they oppose the legislation please thank them.

Let Lent work

"You will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." These words provoked intense controversy when Jesus said them because his hearers—who *already* believed in him—didn't consider themselves unfree! People who are addicted often have no awareness of their disease. They think everyone else has the same compulsions and desires as they do. Often it takes a serious shock, even an intervention, to help

the person see the truth and start heading toward freedom. If we are allowing Lent to do its work of shedding light, of holding our lives against the plumb-line of the gospel, we may at first feel sad or shocked or afraid of what we find, but on the other side is freedom. TODAY'S READINGS: *Daniel 3:14-20, 91-92, 95; John 8:31-42*

THURSDAY, MARCH 25

SOLEMNITY OF THE ANNUNCIATION OF THE LORD God's favor rests on you

How do you get God's favor? Start by becoming "full of grace." It's not as unlikely as it sounds. *Grace* means divine help. If we rely on God and not on people and things—all of which are passing—we're as good as there. When our reliance is truly on God there won't be room for those nagging second thoughts. Imagine a life free of anxiety, fear, doubt, and moral paralysis! That was the life Mary of Nazareth knew, trusting every day that the divine promises to her would be fulfilled. Go on: Take a daily step farther into grace.

Jeremiah and the prophets often spoke out against the injustices of their day, be they injustices against God or the people. Sometimes we can identify with those who are oppressed because we've had experiences of being oppressed. And, as uncomfortable as it may be to consider, sometimes we can identify with the oppressors. It can be we who denounce, who enact revenge, who pick up stones against others. This Lent, be conscious that Jesus invites us to know the full truth about ourselves and take concrete steps—small ones and big ones—to be reconciled with ourselves, with others, and with God.

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 20:10-13; John 10:31-42 "O Lord of hosts... you see the heart and the mind."

LENTEN WEEKDAY

Let's reframe the question

People often ask why the Jewish leaders didn't believe in Jesus. A gospel story gives us one explanation: to do so would have brought destruction down on them from the Romans. The empire tolerated the Jewish religion, but they weren't going to allow a new religion. So for the leaders it was either eliminate Jesus or lose the nation. Hmm . . . not exactly a win-win calculation. What impossible situations have presented themselves to you? Lent is a good time to reframe the questions you face, and with the help of prayer and scripture find just and life-giving solutions.

In this week's Gospel (John 8: 1-11) we are reminded that Jesus' message was controversial in his time and we can still find the challenges in it today. The old ways no longer made sense when life was now seen through a Gospel of love...loving God and loving neighbor.

Have you been challenged in this way throughout the Catholics Come Home evangelization efforts? We all have seen new people at Sunday Mass. Catholics are returning to the Church, some who have been away for more than a decade. It is not for us to judge why they have left or what they need to do to atone for the time they were away, Jesus calls us to simply love them...maybe a new behavior for us, but one that finds its source in the most basic belief of our faith, the Greatest Commandment.

Does this Gospel story hold up a mirror that reflects our faith lives? Are we performing empty actions that should instead keep us in touch with a living God? Do you fast in Lent or attend Mass just to fulfill an obligation or do those behaviors help you to hunger for God and to be nourished by worshipping in your parish community?

The life and teachings of Jesus are always alive and fresh. Jesus challenged the people of his time and he continues to challenge us today.

THE SCRUTINIES

After a period of intense spiritual preparation, our RCIA candidates and catechumens, enter into another time of reflection and preparation. On the 3, 4, and 5th Sundays of Lent, the Scrutinies are celebrated. The rite is celebrated at the 9:30 A.M. Mass when the RCIA are present. The Gospels are from cycle A: the Woman at the Well, the Man Born Blind, and the Raising of Lazarus...

The Scrutinies are meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is. Let us continue to pray for our candidates.


