



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...



EASTER SUNDAY 2010

Have you ever noticed that so many of the crucial moments in our lives often leave us lost for words? We just do not have the vocabulary or figure of speech to express what we have felt or seen at such moments. They can be moments of great delight or dreadful shock; at the extremes of both we are left speechless. Sometimes we even hide such moments from others because we know that we cannot communicate what has happened and feel we will only be untrue to the moment and to ourselves if we try. Sometimes we are just afraid to make the attempt. It is at this point that artists really come into their own. Music and the visual arts can touch on what words will always fail to convey. But we should not underestimate the gift of poetry either, for the poets are our wizards with words, finding ways of communicating the incommunicable. Reading poetry we can find ourselves reacting with exclamations of surprise, with laughter or tears, for how could the poet have known what we consider to be our private secrets? How can they say precisely what we have wanted to say but never found the words? When we discover such works of art, we feel an intense need then to share them with those who are close to us, but it is a risk, for we are not just exchanging casual information. We are opening up the vulnerability of our inner lives, hoping that what we offer will resonate with the others as well. It is an act of great trust. When it works, when there is a new shared appreciation and understanding, our delight increases and a new depth is added to our friendship. We reach a new level of communication and exchange.

Throughout John's Gospel Jesus reveals himself as the one who brings life, the life which comes from the Father and is the divine life itself. In his account of the resurrection of the Lord John brings together the culmination of the offering of this gift and the human response of uncertainty and incomprehension. This is why he highlights the details. The details reveal the different levels of human response and the change from obtuseness to insight. Both Mary Magdalen and the two disciples see the details of what has happened. The stone has been moved away, the linen cloths are on the ground, the cloth which covered the head of Jesus is not with the other cloths but by itself rolled up. Neither Mary nor Peter seems to understand. Mary thinks someone has stolen the body, Peter just takes in the information and stands there dumbfounded. The beloved disciple then enters the tomb. He sees and he believes. What is different in his reaction? We might argue that he interprets the information differently, but why? To begin with John uses Greek words for the verb TO SEE. When Mary Magdalen and Peter SEE, John uses the verb THEORIN, the root for our word THEORY. The implication is that they observe the outer details. The beloved disciple sees more concretely, as though into the heart of the matter. Perhaps because he is the beloved, this disciple is already empowered to see. Scholars sometimes argue about whether the resurrection was an external historical event or a psychological phenomenon in the eyes of the beholders. For John it is both. The Lord is truly risen, but until we have the eyes to see, it may pass our perception by. Mary Magdalen will think Jesus is the gardener until he opens her eyes by calling her by her name. So the disciples are taken into the experience of new life themselves and their lives are then transformed by it. They share in the risen life of their Lord.

The story of the risen Lord and his appearance to his disciples asks us to reflect more deeply on the transforming experiences of our lives. We live so busily and actively that we rarely give ourselves the chance to appreciate the risen dimension of the life that is also being offered to us. The Eucharist is the central moment for our celebration of the risen Lord among us. In a word that struggles to accept meaning at any level, the risen Lord sweeps into the confusion and makes sense even of the humdrum. We will not find the language easy at first, for we are brought up even more than in the past to quantify information as external observers. The recognition that we cannot remain onlookers but only discover the meaning we seek through involvement and engagement demands great trust on our part. The disciples' own mixture of uncertainty and daring is an encouraging pattern for us to follow.

Easter Sunday: Solemnity of the Resurrection of the Lord A good point to raise

"They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." That's what Mary of Magdala wondered when she was the first to find Christ's empty grave. Though she mistakenly thought at first that others had robbed the tomb, her question was important: Where had Jesus gone? It seems he chose to walk the earth again for a while before ascending to the right hand of God. And—let's hope—he continues to walk in each of our lives. Easter Day begins an octave, eight days that remind us that every day is Easter and that we are a people of the Resurrection who believe in love, joy, forgiveness, and life in all forms—including the eternal variety. Show that you believe in what the risen Christ stands for by doling out love, mercy, and kindness in generous portions these eight days and beyond.

Today's readings: Acts 10:34a, 37-43; Colossians 3:1-4 or 1 Corinthians 5:6b-8; John 20:1-9 or Luke 24:1-12 "If you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above."

Monday, April 5

Solemnity of Monday in the Octave of Easter - All in a day

A young monk chided his novice master for having prayed at the Easter Monday Mass, "On this Easter day . . ." "Certainly, you should have sung 'in this Easter season,' "the novice explained. "After all, Easter is over." The wise older priest pointed out—much more gently than deserved—that Easter Day itself lasts eight days, a full week, and only then do we move into the Easter season. Like the obliteration of the reign of death that Easter is, time itself is set on its head. Like the wedding day that, in many cultures, is simply too overflowing with joy to be contained in a single 24 hours, the spirit of hope that is Easter will not be confined. May it rise in your heart this Easter Day!

Today's readings: Acts 2:14, 22-33; Matthew 28:8-15 "This Jesus God raised up, and of that all of us are witnesses."

Tuesday, April 6

Solemnity of Tuesday in the Octave of Easter A place in the heart

Sometimes, in the least suspecting places, we can find miracles. For Mary Magdalene it was a tomb where she had gone to weep and grieve the death of Jesus. But instead she found life! She experienced the risen Jesus and became the first person to proclaim that to the world. Somehow in the midst of her grief and sense of loss, Mary left a tiny space for hope that allowed her to recognize the voice of Jesus as he called her name. The possibility for miracles great and small is with us every day. Leave open a space within your heart—you just may hear your name being called.

Today's readings: Acts 2:36-41; John 20:11-18 "Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord.'"

Wednesday, April 7

Solemnity of Wednesday in the Octave of Easter What do you expect?

The disciples walking the road to Emmaus after Jesus' death were disappointed—they had expected from him something other than what they saw, and they assumed his mission had failed with his death. There is a lesson in that, taught by Jesus later in the same story when

he breaks the bread and opens their eyes: Our expectations can blind us to the blessings right in front of us. Keep your expectations in check and you might find all you could ever hope for, and much more, right in front of your eyes.

Today's readings: Acts 3:1-10; Luke 24:13-35 "We had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel."

Thursday, April 8

Solemnity of Thursday in the Octave of Easter - Be brave

The Acts of the Apostles, which we read throughout the season of Easter, is a riveting account of faith, courage, healings, conversions, and a miraculous escape from prison. It is the story of how God, through the power of the Holy Spirit, intervened in the lives of Jesus' disciples to ensure the spread of his word throughout the world. The courage of the first followers of Jesus is truly inspirational. Take some time to read Acts this month. Then consider: "In what ways is God inviting me to live more courageously? What is keeping me from responding to that invitation?"

Today's readings: Acts 3:11-26; Luke 24:35-38 "To this we are witnesses."

Friday, April 9

Solemnity of Friday in the Octave of Easter - Breakfast anyone?

Meeting friends for breakfast is such a delight. There's something about the morning meal together that makes life feel good. The story of the risen Jesus inviting his friends to breakfast strikes that familiar note of unity and peace. Yet the disciples named in the story were all characters that had crossed Jesus in one way or another: Peter the denier, Thomas the doubter, Nathanael the cynic, and the Zebedee brothers who persisted in their childish sibling rivalry. The morning repast was a reconciliation service—and a nice way to start the day. Let that same spirit of unity and reconciliation begin your day today.

Today's readings: Acts 4:1-12; John 21:1-14 "When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread."

Saturday, April 10

Solemnity of Saturday in the Octave of Easter Do the right thing

Sometimes you have to do what's right even in the face of opposition. Whether it's no reward at best or open hostility at worst, the world around you doesn't always approve of what you know to be the best thing. The apostles ran into the same problem—in fact, they were on both sides of it. When the religious authorities ordered them not to speak or teach in Jesus' name, they refused to obey. On the other hand, when Mary Magadalene came to some of these same disciples with news of the risen Jesus, they did not believe her. Of course it's unwise to always reject what others think of you. But when faced with a difficult situation, ask God for the wisdom and the strength to do what is right and good.

Today's readings: Acts 4:13-21; Mark 16:9-15 "Whether it is right in God's sight to listen to you rather than to God, you must judge."

THE EASTER OCTAVE Sunday, April 4 - Sunday, April 11, 2010

Eastertime lasts fifty days: seven weeks of seven days (seven equals Biblical perfection) plus one day: perfection plus! Like an eight-day Jewish wedding, or a child who can't bear to let go of Christmas, birthdays, and school vacation, the Church celebrates the Easter Octave: "the marriage of heaven and earth," as the Vigil calls Jesus' resurrection; our new members' baptismal rebirth; our renewal of baptismal vows; our hearts' "divine vacation" (Latin *vacare*, "to be empty"), newfound time and space for love of God and neighbor. Make home an Easter garden! Adorn the dining table with a pillar candle (your "paschal candle"), a bowl full of water (ideally, from the parish's baptismal font), a vase of flowers or bowl of sprouting grain with Easter eggs. Even non-singers can handle the three-fold Gospel Alleluia! Let that be your grace before meals, perhaps with a prayer recalling Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35): "Be known to us, Risen Lord Jesus, as you were to the first disciples, in your word, in the breaking of bread, and in everyone we meet."

EXPECT THE UNEXPECTED

We all know what to expect of Easter: lots of lilies around the altar, our "Alleluia" joyfully sung over and over, perhaps a tasty ham dinner later in the day, topped off by some chocolates from the Easter basket. But all of this began, as we hear in today's Gospel, with the "unexpected" when Mary Magdalene found the tomb empty. Indeed, Peter's speech from Acts in the first reading could insert the phrase "you might have expected" at a number of points . . . that Jesus would baptize John, not the other way around . . . that his healing and exorcising ministry would win him acclaim, not death . . . that his resurrection would place him in another dimension, not back at table with his followers. On a day like Easter, a day filled with traditions, customs, and expectations, we are called more than ever to keep looking for God's will in unexpected places, people, and events. In this way we can continue to give witness, like Mary Magdalene and Peter, that Christ is truly risen from dead, and continues to live among us.
