



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Trinity Sunday 2010

We are all fascinated by the mysterious. Children love stories that lead them into a world that taxes their imaginations and enchants them. In the Middle Ages, mystery plays provided a wonderful way not only of entertaining people but also of teaching them about the great biblical stories and the truths of the faith. We still speak about these truths as the mysteries of faith; and indeed after the words of consecration at Mass we are invited to proclaim the mystery of faith.

If you were to define the word "mystery", what would you say? Most of us would probably lean heavily on the fact that a mystery is a doctrine or teaching that ultimately is beyond our understanding, and of course at one level we would be right. But there is also a danger that we may conclude that therefore we can understand little or nothing about such a mystery: That it has to be taken on faith alone. And of all the mysteries of faith, the one about which we may be most tempted to think in this way is surely the Trinity: the mystery of the three Persons in the one God. St. Patrick reminded us that even in nature we see that three can be united in one; and the symbol that Patrick used, the shamrock, has become the symbol of the Irish nation. But can we move our understanding of the Trinity beyond it being a mathematical puzzle? The scriptures to which we have listened today offer us a great opportunity to do just that.

When were you last at play in the presence of God? The book of Proverbs gives us an amazing description of the Wisdom of God, who cries aloud: "I was by THE LORD'S side, a master craftsman, delighting him day after day, ever at play in his presence, at play everywhere in his world."

This is a wonderful image of God: a God at play and delighting to be at play with us too. Although the author of the book of Proverbs had not heard all that Jesus would tell us about his Father and the Spirit, he was able to describe God in this wonderfully attractive way; so different from some of those other images which can lead us to think of God as far away and remote from us. Yet all through the Old Testament the people were aware that theirs was a God who was close to them and involved in everything that happened to them.

In all his letters St. Paul seems almost desperate that his readers should realize that the coming of Jesus has confirmed this truth of the closeness of God. Now, because of Jesus, we can see that we are invited to be part of the family of God. We are his sisters and brothers, and therefore children of God our Father, heirs to the kingdom of God. This is how we are to understand the Trinity: it is God revealing God to us; it is our invitation to live the life of God, to live in a state of grace and ultimately to share God's glory.

Today's feast is one that calls on us to be full of gratitude for our faith and to celebrate with one another God's closeness to us. As we continue with our Eucharist, the great prayer of thanksgiving, we will be reminded that once again we are caught up in the mystery of the Trinity. Soon you will see the priest outstretch his hands over the gifts of bread and wine – the gifts that represent you and me and all our prayers – and the prayer is that the Holy Spirit will come upon those gifts so that Christ may be present among us as our food and drink, uniting us in his life and his love. And what does Christ do? He gathers us and our prayers, and presents us to his Father. All that the Father has is Christ's: he and the Father are one; and his prayer is that we may all be one too,

We are thinking about a mystery and in this life we will never grasp its full meaning, but it is not entirely beyond us. Christ became human so that he could speak to us in our own language about God, and he told us about his Father and the Spirit. And remember, the Spirit leads us to the complete truth.

Peace of the Holy Trinity be with you.

SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY God is all

One of scripture's more powerful messages is that God knows creation literally from the inside out—having created it, that's not surprising!—and has had this intimate relationship since the beginning. Perhaps one of the most beautiful expressions of that sentiment is found in Psalm 139. God is everywhere, both outside—"Where can I go from your spirit?"—and in—"For it was you who . . . knit me together in my mother's womb" (Psalm 139:13-14). Today's celebration of the Holy Trinity reminds us of our rootedness in this God: the Father who created everything, the Son who shows us the Father, and the Spirit who teaches and guides. Join the psalmist in praying, "I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made"!

MONDAY, MAY 31

FEAST OF THE VISITATION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY Share your faith

Two women on a common journey: one in the later stages of life and one just starting out. Yet they meet in the middle, Elizabeth and Mary, to share the same remarkable reality: new life seemingly out of nowhere! And both believed the incredible word that came to them from God, Elizabeth through her husband and Mary from an angel. Sharing their joy produced a song still sung around the world. Today is the feast day of small faith-sharing groups everywhere. Believe the word. Tell the story. Share the joy!

TODAY'S READINGS: Zephaniah 3:14-18a or Romans 12:9-16: Luke 1:39-56

"And blessed is she who believed . . . what was spoken to her by the Lord."

TUESDAY, JUNE 1

FEAST OF JUSTIN, MARTYR - True philosophy

Saint Justin (d. 165) was a true seeker. He had explored ancient philosophies, but none of them satisfied his burning need to discover how people came to know God. When he heard the Christian story, though, he found the answer he had been looking for in what he called "the only sure and useful philosophy." The true knowledge of God, Justin believed, was already in everyone; they just needed to discover it. And if that were so, then non-Christians should be able to find it, too. So Justin spent a good deal of time writing for and speaking with Jewish scholars, classical philosophers, even a few heretics. How can you, like Justin, help others to see the presence of God in their minds and hearts?

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Peter 3:12-15a, 17-18; Mark 12:13-17 "We wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home."

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 2

It's a shame

Shame is a difficult thing to bear. Sometimes shame comes from our own sense of missing the mark, and other times it is stirred by others who feel we've done something wrong or disgraceful. Regardless of the rightness or wrongness of that "something," shame can make us feel small, embarrassed, vulnerable. Saint Paul knew something of shame. He spent the first part of his life attacking Christians. And after he became a follower of Christ, he spent several years in jail, imprisoned by his fellow Romans for preaching the gospel. But on both accounts Paul

relied on God for his strength, to mend his ways in the first case and to continue boldly in the second. How has shame or fear of ridicule or disapproval affected you? What might Paul say to you?

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Timothy 1:1-3, 6-12; Mark 12:18-27 "I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust"

THURSDAY, JUNE 3

FEAST OF CHARLES LWANGA, MARTYR, AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS

Faith in action

Faith is more than what you believe; it should also shape how we act. We see that in the life—and death—of those the church remembers today: Charles Lwanga and his companions. The "companions" in this case were the pages he supervised at the court of a late 19th-century Ugandan king. Himself a Christian, Charles supported the Christian faith of the pages, both Catholic and Protestant, in resisting the monarch who insisted they abandon it. But when the king found the young men resisting him, he started putting the Christians to death, Lwanga included. Charles and his friends lived what they believed in their willingness to sacrifice themselves for it. Their witness calls you to an active faith, too.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Timothy 2:8-15; Mark 12:28-34 "The saying is sure: If we have died with him, we will also live with him."

FRIDAY, JUNE 4

A little levity goes a long way

At times Jesus enjoyed "playing to the crowd." He had fun poking holes in the arguments of the Jewish scribes by turning them inside out, to the crowd's delight. Sometimes we lose sight of the fact that those on the bottom of the social hierarchy loved Jesus because he wasn't afraid to make those at the top look foolish. He often did so simply by showing the proud the silliness of their pretensions. Today is a good day to examine our own pretensions—let's be honest, we all have them—and try to bring ourselves back down to earth a bit. Let's allow Jesus to be the one to elevate us.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Timothy 3:10-17; Mark 12:35-37 "The large crowd was listening to him with delight."

SATURDAY, JUNE 5

FEAST OF BONIFACE, BISHOP, MARTYR - A Christmas tree faith

There is an ancient legend that says Saint Boniface (c. 680-754) invented the Christmas tree. In an effort to convert the people of his diocese from their gods, Boniface chopped down the Oak of Thor, a huge tree that had become a local shrine. Then he designated a little fir tree growing nearby as the new symbol of Christian faith because it was small and humble but its top pointed toward heaven. Our lives may be small and humble, but we're like Christmas trees: our minds and our hearts point toward heaven, our hope and our destiny.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Timothy 4:1-8; Mark 12:38-44 "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury."

FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

Thank you to all who contributed food items or volunteer hours for May's food distribution. Because of your generosity we were again able to serve approximately 200 families. On May 13 we were part of Nazareth's "Circle the City" day, when graduating Seniors provide service to many different outreach efforts in our area. Both our volunteers and our clients greatly appreciated the cheerful helping hand this team of 8 students and teacher chaperone provided as we set up and distributed groceries.

Thank you, also to those who take part in our monthly volunteer night at the Greater Chicago Food Depository. Each hour donated "buys" about 63 lbs of food from the depository for our pantry! To date we have been able to purchase the supplementary food we need from the depository with the credits earned from these volunteer sessions and other volunteer hours served by various parishioners. All sessions are Wednesday evenings from 6-9 PM. The remaining 2010 dates are May 26, June 23, July 28, August 25, September 22, October 27, November 17, and December 15. The Food Depository requires volunteers during these regular sessions to be 13 years old. Ages 16 and older can volunteer self supervised. Ages 13-15 need to have one adult supervisor per four youths. Finally, our pantry shelves are currently in good shape as we continue packing bags for our June distribution. Most needed items include all sizes of diapers, especially 4, 5, & 6, meals in a can/box, canned fruit, boxed side dishes, and extras (such as juice, cooking oil, baking goods, condiments, coffee, tea.) Thank you for adding food pantry items to your shopping lists!

The Food Pantry is privileged to share space with a mighty, small--but growing—organization, known as the St. Cletus Mission Ladies. They always put a smile on my face and admiration in my heart, for the work they do and the fun they have doing it! I know firsthand of the countless dolls, stuffed animals, warm hats, scarves, baby items, lap robes, wheel chair bags which have been happily received by our Giving Tree recipients, Food Pantry clients, and new moms who benefit from Respect Life's annual Mother's Day Baby Shower. However, until recently I didn't know too much about the "etc." a couple of sentences back!

Challenge No. 3: How can we ensure accountability and transparency with our parishioners' money including regular two-way communication with parishioners?

Summary Response:

The parish ensures accountability and transparency with our parishioners through publishing in the Canticle our weekly budgeted needs and informing the parish of the amount of money collected each week. The parish also publishes financial statements in the Canticle twice a year, once in March, for the first six months and a final report for the fiscal year in the fall. Father Bob and the chair of the Finance Committee supplement the written report in the fall by providing an oral presentation of the financial results at all masses. Father Bob, the Finance Committee Chair and members of the Finance Committee are available to answer questions after those masses.

The parish has an active Finance Committee that meets regularly with Fr. Bob, the business manager and the bookkeeper that prepare the parish and school budgets and financial reports. The Finance Committee reviews and suggests improvements to the budgets and financial reports. The committee has observed and approved of the parish's revised collection procedures. The Finance Committee discusses and suggests improvements to the internal controls of the parish each year. The Parish follows the "best practices" established by the Archdioceses of Chicago. This includes policies and procedures for handling collections, budgeting, and reviews of purchases and bank transactions.
