



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB ...

ELEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

It is hard to believe that summer is already upon us. School is out and our many ministry commissions are about to take a respite from regular meetings for a month. Our 4th of July celebration is just around the corner. It is also the time of the year when many repair and improvement projects take place within the parish facilities.

We have several very important projects taking place this summer in connection with our facilities. As you are aware the 2nd phase of the "Lighting Our Way" Project is well under way. This project will complete the safety and security lighting for our parking lot with the addition of a new row of lights that will light the entire parking area of our property. Envelopes in support of this project have been sent to all parishioners in the envelope packets and this project cost of \$59,000 will be funded through your Summer Project donations. The work on these lights will begin soon. It is hoped that we will have only a slight disruption in the parking lot while this project is being completed. The good news is that we will not lose any parking spaces in our lot when this project is completed.

The second project that will be taking place during the summer has to do with the wiring and light fixtures in the church. As you know the church is almost 60 years old and is in dire need of new wiring along with the changing and improvement of the lighting fixtures. We are very fortunate to have received a large bequest from two of our parishioners who designated that the money should be used for improvements of the church building. God provides through these generous parishioners when the need arises. The re-wiring and new lighting fixtures at a cost of approximately \$200,000 will be paid for through these generous bequests. The work on the church electric wiring and new lights will take place over the next couple of months. I have been assured by the contractor that there will be no major disruption of the weekend routine of Masses. Once the work is fully underway the weekday 8:00 a.m. Mass will be moved from the Church to the Kindergarten Room of the School. Notice will be given in advance when this weekday change of location for Mass will take place. All Funerals and Weddings will still continue to take place within the Church itself. Any disruption that we may experience during the summer while this work is being completed will result in new and improved wiring with additional lighting that will enhance the beauty of our worship space within our church. There will be new lighting in the vestibule and all fixtures within the church will be improved. We will, also, see additional lighting to enhance our wonderful mosaic stations of the cross and our sanctuary.

The third major project that is scheduled for this summer is the changing of the electrical connection between the school, church and rectory. Presently the electricity is all fed from a main entry point box on the Stone Avenue side of the school building which feeds all electric service through the school building, then to the church and lastly the rectory. We have had several problems with failure of this system which has resulted in loss of power to all three facilities. It has been strongly recommended by the Parish Maintenance Committee and by Com-Ed that this be changed so that there would be a separate connection of the electricity for the Church and Rectory that does not run through the school building. The new line would run from the side of the church directly out to the street behind the church. This project will cost about \$80,000 and was approved by both the Maintenance Committee and the Parish Finance Committee to be funded out of our parish savings. The project is to be completed either by late summer or in the fall.

As you can see a great deal of important work will be completed this summer to improve, enhance and update the electrical needs of our parish facilities. I ask for your support of these important projects along with your patience for any minor disruptions that they may cause us in the short run. The result will be a much improved and quality system that will serve the parish for the next 60 years. Thank you, once again, for your generous and continued support of the needs of our parish. God will bless your efforts on His behalf a hundred fold.

Put some muscle in your love

Ever notice how many stories there are about Jesus being anointed by a woman during a dinner party? She's anonymous. She's a friend of Jesus. She's a known sinner. These incidents are irresistible. All the senses are involved: the smell of perfume, a trickle of ointment or tears, the complaints of the Pharisees, a woman's uncovered hair drying Jesus' bare feet. One reason it's important to remember these sense-drenched stories is to resist the tendency to over-spiritualize faith and love to the point that they become abstract and as ethereal as cotton candy. The women's robust gestures expressed care for Jesus' physical body, but how do we make our love for Jesus as concrete and real? After all, he is in one sense "gone." Then again, there are those least brothers and sisters of whom he said: Do it for them equals do it for me.

MONDAY, JUNE 14

Try a little kindness

When we observe someone behaving badly, our first response is not usually, "How can I be kind to this person?" Instead we tend to think, "How can I teach him a lesson?" We are afraid that an act of kindness will somehow reward the poor behavior. Yet Jesus demonstrates over and over that nothing could be further from the truth. If we want to be like Jesus, we don't need to perform miracles; we only need to be kind. As Mark Twain remarked, "Kindness is the language which the deaf can hear and the blind can see." Make a commitment to be kind to someone today.

TUESDAY, JUNE 15

Words to live by

The Bible contains two kinds of words: those meant to comfort and those intended to challenge. Prophets like Elijah were commissioned to hand-carry the challenging kind to the seats of power. That is no ministry for the faint of heart, being the one to say to the boss (or parent, pastor, teacher, president): "You messed up. Your policy is hurting people." Nor is it easy for any of us to hear these words directed toward us. The only way we can receive challenging scripture into our hearts is if we first cultivate the spirit of humility. It's true: Sometimes we're wrong!

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 16

Feeling comfortable? Not so fast

Fasting and almsgiving have traditionally been linked as spiritual disciplines. Fasting brings home to us our humanity, spiritual hunger, and basic neediness as creatures. Almsgiving is the natural response to fasting: When we get in touch with our own neediness we are more open to responding to the needs of others. That is why creature comforts, for all their attractiveness, have their limitations. They can stunt

our spiritual growth if we aren't careful to balance them with practices such as fasting and almsgiving. Don't lose sight of the hunger inside you—and all around you!

Prayer. We know it's important, we're drawn to it, but we're not always quite sure what we are doing or if what we are doing is "right." Jesus gives us examples of prayer throughout the gospels, including what we call "The Lord's Prayer." We know the words, but do we know this prayer by heart—that is, do we tune into our relationship with God when we give voice to this prayer? Do we look to see whether we've allowed our relationship with God to flow into all aspects of our day and our life? Try praying Jesus' prayer slowly, savoring each word. Try praying a different translation or your own version of the prayer to spark your imagination. Make this beautiful prayer truly your own.

FRIDAY, JUNE 18

Turn down the night lights

Oil lamps were the artificial illumination of choice during the biblical era. Today electric lights not only illuminate our nightlife they unfortunately create an increasing amount of light pollution. Step outside your home some clear night and count the stars—if you can see any. Only on camping trips or excursions to remote regions do most of us get an idea of what the night sky looked like when Jesus looked up. Factor in energy waste and damage to migratory bird patterns and it's clear as day that light pollution is harmful to God's good creation. Turn down the lights and check out *EarthHour.org* to be part of the solution.

FEAST OF ROMUALD, ABBOT - Find the right balance

Thanks to the technology revolution, we live in an age of tremendous communication possibilities. Yet in this world of constant virtual connectedness, many people still experience profound loneliness and isolation. Perhaps, though, there's another way. In the 11th century Saint Romuald established a kind of monasticism that combined community and solitude. It had opportunities for fellowship but also much time alone for individual prayer. Relationships with others and time for yourself are both human needs, and you don't have to do one at the expense of the other.

ST. ANTHONY OF PADUA

The feast of St. Anthony of Padua, June 13, falls on a Sunday this year, so there is no official celebration of this feast on the Church calendar. We do, however, want to call your attention to the beautiful statue of this great saint that is the latest addition to St. Cletus Church. The statue was discovered languishing in a dusty warehouse in New York, and through the generous donation of one of our parishioners, we thought it deserved a more fitting home in our parish.

For those who may not be familiar with the "Wonder-Worker of Padua," St. Anthony was born in Lisbon, Portugal in 1195, the son of a knight at the court of King Alfonso II. He first joined the Augustinians and was ordained a priest in 1219 or 1220. He joined the Franciscans in 1221 and settled in Padua, Italy a few years later where he developed a reputation for preaching and for helping the poor. He died in 1231 at the age of 36 and was canonized a saint the following year. He was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1946 by Pope Pius XII.

St. Anthony's reputation as a finder of lost items is well-known and well-deserved. Contemporary devotion also invokes him as a finder of lost faith for those alienated from the Church, and as a healer for emotional problems and bodily suffering. St. Anthony enkindles in us the belief that no request is too big or too small for our heavenly friend. Pray to this great saint and trust him to obtain from God many blessings and favors for you and your family.

ST. CLETUS PARISH BUDGET

The 2010 /2011 St. Cletus Parish Budget has been completed, approved by the Finance Committee and submitted to the Archdiocese. We have received comments from our Vicariate representative. These recommendations will be addressed by the staff and reviewed with the Finance Committee. If necessary, a reply will be sent to the Vicariate representative.

Attention is now focused on the end of the year (June 30, 2010) financial issues. Tuition and fees have been collected for all programs and the last of the current year expenses are being accumulated. Sunday Collections are being closely monitored as are church related year-end expenses. The months of July and August will be spent finalizing Financial Reports to be reviewed in detail by the Finance Committee. These reports will be used to prepare the Archdiocesan Annual Report which is typically due August 31st.

One weekend in the fall is chosen to communicate the previous year's results and the current year's budget to the Parish. Generally, a report is published in the Canticle and the Pastor and Chairman of the Finance Committee speaks to the parishioners at each weekend Mass. At this time, questions/comments are always welcomed.
