

A good reason to give up

With today's economy many of us have become well acquainted with sacrifices. We've made small ones like canceling cable TV, and some of us have made significant ones like giving up houses or schooling just so we can make ends meet. While not easy, there is grace to be had by not only making but truly owning the decision to let go of something. It may be the grace of simplifying life, of focusing on what matters. Such grace doesn't mean God wants us to suffer hard times; rather it means that God knows it's tough and is right there beside us, walking with us and encouraging us in even the roughest of times. What grace do you experience in sacrifice?

MONDAY, JUNE 28

It's not about you

When a disciple earnestly promised Jesus he would follow him anywhere, he got a response he may not have been expecting. Instead of a pat on the head and words of praise, Christ said: "The Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." This disciple might have thought, "Why is he talking about himself? I thought we were talking about me!" Jesus, however, was talking about both of them. If you follow me, what happens to me will happen to you. You still want to follow me? Then accept the insecurity it will involve. It's not about you but all of us together, on this sometimes risky journey of living the kingdom of God. Take up the challenge.

TODAY'S READINGS: Amos 2:6-10, 13-16; Matthew 8:18-22 "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head."

TUESDAY, JUNE 29

SOLEMNITY OF PETER AND PAUL, APOSTLES-Flawed but called

It is important to note that Saints Peter and Paul, the two men we call the "pillars of the church," were both flawed and gifted human beings. Peter, the "rock" upon which Jesus built his church, was a simple fisherman who was the first to recognize Jesus as the Messiah and also the first to deny knowing him. Paul, an educated Roman citizen, intended to imprison Christians but ended up becoming a follower of Jesus himself. He was Christianity's first missionary, establishing communities throughout the Mediterranean world. We are each called to live the gospel message. These stories offer reassurance that our weaknesses are not too much for God to overcome.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 12:1-11; 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 17-18; Matthew 16:13-19

"The Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed."

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 30

Pigs outside the box

Don't you hate it when a joke is *so* bad it has to be *explained*? That's sort of like the gospel story where Jesus sends the demons into a herd of swine. To the people of Judea, swine were abhorrent creatures. Pork, you may remember, was forbidden by the commandments of the law. That Judea's non-Jewish neighbors would tolerate demons while the swine would commit suicide rather than live with them is kind of

an ethnic joke on the Gentiles. All in fun, however. The bottom line is to remember that the healing love of God operates outside the box to save both Jews and Gentiles.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Amos 5:14-15, 21-24; Matthew 8:28-34*

"The whole herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and perished in the water."

THURSDAY, JULY 1

Now hear this

Like other prophets in the Bible, Amos found himself between the rock of God's call and the hard place of hostility to his message. "Go, prophesy to my people Israel," the Lord had commanded him, but the priests of the people told him to cease and desist from warning the nation of the disastrous consequences of its unfaithful ways. On top of that, Amos didn't even want the job in the first place. Hey, he said, I was minding my own business tending my flock and taking care of my trees. But if he had to do it—and one can imagine him thundering these words—then here goes: "Now hear the word of the Lord!" What God asks of you may not be what you or those around you expect or even welcome at first. Listening for and following God's words, though, will never steer you wrong.

TODAY'S READINGS: Amos 7:10-17; Matthew 9:1-8 "I am no prophet . . . but I am a herdsman, and a dresser of sycamore trees."

FRIDAY, JULY 2

The tax man cometh

The apostle Matthew was sitting at a customs post when Jesus called him to a life of discipleship. Those who gather revenue for foreign empires through customs fees have never been popular with the locals, and these officials were often associated with graft and corruption. So when the Jewish elders and scribes criticized Jesus for associating with "tax collectors," we can understand their beef—and also see how truly radical Jesus was in calling the outcasts of society to follow him.

TODAY'S READINGS: Amos 8:4-6, 9-12; Matthew 9:9-13 "As Jesus was walking along, he saw a man called Matthew sitting at the tax booth; and he said to him, 'Follow me.'"

SATURDAY, JULY 3

FEAST OF THOMAS, APOSTLE-Start with a good foundation

"The church's one foundation / is Jesus Christ her Lord." So goes the popular hymn. The next layer of that foundation surely consists of the apostles and prophets. These folks risked everything to bring us the message that our God is the one who saves. It's reassuring that such a fundamental layer of church is built on former doubters like Thomas, deniers like Peter, and political traitors like Matthew. If people like that are foundational, there's certainly room in the upper stories of the household of God for the likes of us! Resolve today to be a trustworthy brick in God's house.

TODAY'S READINGS: Ephesians 2:19-22; John 20:24-29 "You are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets."

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

THIRTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2010

As Jesus begins the long journey to Jerusalem where all will be fulfilled, he continues to instruct his disciples. The disciples have just been displaying their ignorance, first by arguing over who was the greatest and then by trying to stop a man casting out devils in the name of Jesus. They felt he should not be doing this because he was not one of them. Jesus now has to rebuke them again when two of the disciples want to smite the Samaritans who have refused to welcome him on his journey to Jerusalem. In their excitement at following Jesus the disciples are caught up in the feelings of power. They want to conquer the world and bring it under his rule. Jesus, through his replies to three potential followers, challenges such sentiments and turns them upside down. At one level Luke's Gospel is the gospel of mercy and compassion for the poor, but it is also the gospel of absolute commitment. The commitment has to be unconditional, free from even the expected norms of social behavior and filial piety. The follower of Jesus has to be prepared to discount both the securities and the duties of custom. This may be the need for shelter and food; it may be the solemn duty to bury our nearest and dearest, the highest in the Jewish list of obligations. The reply Jesus gives plays on the difference between the spiritually dead and the physically dead. The urgency attached to the proclamation of the kingdom is such that even the hallowed rituals owed to the deceased should be left to the spiritually unenlightened so that the disciple may proceed with the task of the gospel. Paul reminds us that to reach such a state of wisdom we need freedom in the Spirit, brought to us by Christ. The focus is always on serving the other in works of love rather than falling back into selfindulgence or power-play.

Few of us are able to work without food and shelter. Few again would feel comfortable at failing to provide the due funeral rites for our families. Yet we are also aware of how our creature comforts and also an over-developed sense of duty or loyalty can get in the way of our openness to the gospel. We want our way to be the only way. We can be fearful of other churches, other faiths, other races, nations or groups. Such ultimately tribal feelings are very strong and can make the gospel a very tough proposition. We have to look carefully at whether loving goodness, justice, and peace are really present in our behavior and practices. In a world that is still filled with injustice and discrimination, it is unlikely that we can claim total integrity in all aspects of our lives. In the world of business we have to question the ethics of the bottom line. In the world of education we have to question the narrowness of standards of achievement and the lack of equal access to educational resources. In the world of employment we have to question discrimination of gender and race. In the world of the Church we have to question whether we practice what we preach. This is why the uncompromising stance of Jesus is so important for our openness to the truth. He asks us where we are caught up in our hidden agendas and where we need his helping hand to have the freedom to work for the freedom of others.
