



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

A priest visited Richard, an old parishioner, on Christmas Eve and they got to talking about Christmases past. Richard pointed to a black and white photo of a lovely young girl and said: "Christmas is the day she died." We had all her toys wrapped up, but she never got to see them. She wasn't even three. Then they told us we couldn't have any more children. My faith was shaken after that. Sister Monica came to see us, and we talked about it. She said: "I'm going to pray for you every day until you have another baby." And she did. Thirteen years later, we went back to the maternity hospital, and the staff couldn't believe it when my wife Annie gave birth to a baby girl. We gave her the toys we'd kept for our first daughter. You see Father, miracles do happen."

The gospel readings today speak to us of the power of intercessory prayer, the kind of prayer Sr. Monica made for Richard and Annie. Abraham prays for the sinful people of Sodom, asking God not to destroy the just along with the unjust. Beneath the colorful description – more reminiscent of market haggling than prayer – lies the deep conviction of the power of prayer to change things. It is a conviction that Jesus shared. When his disciples asked him to teach them to pray, Jesus taught them the "Our Father," which is simply a prayer made up of five petitions, two concerning God and three for the disciples' own needs. The reason why Jesus has confidence in the power of intercessory prayer is found quite simply in the opening word: "Abba." God is Father – not a remote figure, but one who is intimately close to him. A person who regards God as a "daddy" is someone who has complete confidence that God will act on his or her behalf. Prayer has power to change things when we have that intimate, trusting relationship with God who is Abba.

Prayer for Jesus is never simply about asking for things, it is about having that intimate relationship with God. The disciples ask Jesus to teach them to pray precisely because they see him doing it, so often and with such intensity. They perceive the depth of his relationship with God, and this is what they wish to have also. They want that "Abba experience."

Jesus didn't simply teach the disciples a prayer; he taught them a whole attitude, a way of relating to God. Jesus stresses the importance of persisting in prayer. Even if at times God seems to be like the reluctant friend who is slow to answer, Jesus tells us we need to persevere. Sister Monica's prayer was only answered after thirteen years. And prayer is not like magic, coercing God to do what we want. Despite Abraham's prayer, Sodom was destroyed because it could not muster even "ten good men." However, the prayer did save Lot and his family. If we have an intimate relationship with God, then as well as persevering in prayer, we will also trust God when things do not work out precisely as we would want. He is a loving parent, and we can rely on his goodness. If evil or weak human beings know how to be kind to their children, how much more is this true of God?

The ultimate proof that God wants only good things for his people is in his gift of his very own life, the Holy Spirit. There is nothing more that God can give than to allow us to share in his Spirit, his life. This is pure self-giving.

St. Luke's community was composed largely of Gentile Christians who had none of the Jewish familiarity with prayer, which other early Christian communities had. It is only in Luke's Gospel that the disciples ask Jesus to teach them to pray. This reflects Luke's concern simply to encourage his people to do it. It is a timely message for us today. So much is written and spoken about prayer, but there is no substitute for the actual practice of it. And Jesus' teaching is not complicated. The basis of all prayer is a relationship of trust and intimacy with God. We need to develop a child-like dependence on him, which quite simply expects God to act in answer to our prayers and to give us what we need. Jesus tells us to persevere in prayer and to count on God's kindness. The ultimate proof of God's overflowing generosity is the gift of his Holy Spirit. This is the answer to our deepest longings and our most heartfelt prayer. It is a gift worth asking for.

Embracing this day is easy for those of us who have or had loving parents, but for those of us who didn't experience great parenting, we may find it hard to feel uplifted. Surely, however, we can all celebrate the fact that we have a perfect divine parent who has loved us unconditionally and cared for us unceasingly since before we were born.

MONDAY, JULY 26

FEAST OF JOACHIM AND ANNE, PARENTS OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY - A little goes a long way

A kind word can transform a day. One encouraging adult can redeem a childhood of negativity. An award can reroute a career path. Often it doesn't take much to make a huge difference, just as a pinch of yeast can make a bowl of flour rise into loaves. Not all of us can influence world affairs—but we can each do our part to lessen fear, increase hope, demand justice, call for peace. After all, Joachim and Anne were only two people raising a little girl in an irrelevant place. Yet what they did changed human history.

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 13:1-11; Matthew 13:31-35 "The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed with...flour until all of it was leavened."

TUESDAY, JULY 27

Your thoughts are calling

Jesus never wastes words in the gospels, but we know he wants to make absolutely sure we are paying attention when he concludes his comments with "whoever has ears ought to hear." Jesus knows that we humans have a tendency to tune in and out of our surroundings. Sometimes we are so captivated by our thoughts—last night's conversation, an endlessly repeating song fragment, the stories we continually tell ourselves about the past and future—that although we believe we're listening, and have every intention of listening, we aren't really listening. Make the decision today to pay attention to your thoughts. Are you tuned in or out of your surroundings most of the time? What are you missing?

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 14:17-22; Matthew 13:36-43 " 'Let anyone with ears listen!' "

WEDNESDAY, JULY 28

Hunt for a lasting treasure

Have you ever heard stories of people who spend considerable amounts of time and money in pursuit of a dream—restoring a beautiful home, starting a business or charity, doing something they truly enjoy? Those were the kinds of undertakings Jesus used in some of his parables, except he drew on the activities of his time: a person who buries a treasure in a field and then sells all he has to buy the field; a merchant who finds a fine pearl and sells all he has to buy it. As with his other parables, Jesus used "likes"—the kingdom of heaven is *like* treasure hidden in a field; it is *like* something we would give a lot to have.

Think about the things you are willing to make sacrifices for. Is the kingdom of God like one of them?

Today's readings: Jeremiah 15:10, 16-21; Matthew 13:44-46 "On finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it."

THURSDAY, JULY 29

FEAST OF MARTHA

Remember Martha's message of hope

Martha, Mary, and their brother Lazarus were close friends of Jesus. Martha has come down to us as the original "Type A" personality, the busy one in Luke's gospel who has trouble sitting still when Jesus visits. But she also was a woman of great courage and faith in the face of loss. We can take inspiration from her simple, strong profession of faith in the gospel. Even in the face of her great grief at having lost her brother, she was unshaken in her faith that Jesus was the "resurrection and the life." When a death leaves us feeling devastated, Martha's witness can bring us strength and hope.

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 18:1-6; John 11:19-27 or Luke 10:38-42

"I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God."

FRIDAY, JULY 30

Not exactly what they had in mind

When the prophet Jeremiah stood up to speak in the Temple, he attracted a crowd. And when Jesus taught in the synagogue of Nazareth, the people were amazed—at first. In both cases, however, things turned hostile pretty fast. Those around Jesus could not believe one of their own could speak and act with such authority. For Jeremiah it got even worse: *His* audience wanted to kill him. The message of faith may not always be what we want to hear, but we are called, nonetheless, to listen and follow God's word in all its forms.

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 26:1-9; Matthew 13:54-58 "Where did this man get this wisdom and these deeds of power?"

SATURDAY, JULY 31

FEAST OF IGNATIUS OF LOYOLA, PRIEST

The priceless gift of yourself

"Teach us to give and not to count the cost." These words of Saint Ignatius Loyola summarize the call of the gospel to give of ourselves entirely to God and to living the gospel. That doesn't mean we should all choose religious life or become martyrs—though some of us will be called to those vocations. To give ourselves entirely to living the gospel is to be mindful that each moment gives glory to God. Wonder how to do that? Think about parents of young children. They are excellent models of living Ignatius' words. Children are always pulling on their parents' shirttails, needing help as they grow in love and understanding. Parents constantly give—and give again and again—not counting the cost. May all of us do the same.

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 26:11-16, 24; Matthew 14:1-12 "For in truth the Lord sent me to you to speak all these words in your ears."

LISTENING TO GOD

Familiarity, in the case of the Lord's Prayer, probably hasn't bred contempt in most of us, but it certainly can breed a kind of inertia. The words we speak in prayer run the same risks as all our other human words: they can be spoken hastily, thoughtlessly, carelessly. In a manner parallel to the words we say in the Lord's Prayer—"forgive us as we forgive others"—today might be the day to invite God to "listen to us as well as we listen to you." Today might be the day to listen to the Lord's Prayer with newly attentive ears.

Let us learn from the example of Luke's Jesus, who would not instruct others how to pray until he himself had been a man of prayer. Moreover, listen carefully to the follow-up Jesus gives for the prayer itself. In our quick-fix society we must heed the call to persistence; in a world that puts glib explanations on difficult situations we must continue to seek and knock; in our all-too-humanness, we must be open to the patience, grace, and wisdom of the will of God. Do we want the Lord to listen to our voice? Maybe we can start by listening to God's.


