



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2010

On April 14, 1912, at 11:40 pm, the Titanic struck an iceberg in the North Atlantic. Within four hours, this "practically unsinkable" ship lay on the seabed some 12,600 feet below. Of the 2,228 people on board, only 705 survived. Originally, the Titanic had been designed to have 48 lifeboats on board (enough for all passengers and crew if needed.) However, so great was the confidence of the ship's designers that they reduced this to just 20 lifeboats, apparently in order to prevent the decks from appearing too cluttered. These were enough for about half the people on board. The designers had their priorities tragically wrong. They had placed appearance before safety, elegance before lives. Even as the ship began to sink, passengers were reluctant to leave the apparent security of the liner to take their chances on the open sea in small lifeboats. This meant that many of the first lifeboats to be lowered were more than half empty – a further example of misplaced confidence and wrong priorities.

When the man in the crowd asks Jesus to settle a financial dispute with his brother, Jesus refuses to get involved. He knows that the man's underlying problem isn't this particular squabble over money but lies in his fundamentally covetous mentality. Jesus warns of the dangers of greed, which can lead us to misplace our trust. We can look to wealth and riches for security, but Jesus warns that they will not only let us down but also will lead us to getting our priorities all wrong.

In the parable of the rich farmer, Jesus depicts a man who thinks that life is all about riches. Once he has more than enough, he thinks that his life is complete, that he has nothing more to worry about. He places his trust in wealth to make him happy and fulfilled. Jesus does not accuse the man of being wicked or sinful. He is simply wrong. His wealth blinds him to what is important in life and makes him shortsighted. He thinks that his life is nothing more than eating and drinking and being comfortable. He is the ultimate materialist, and in this he sells himself short. It is as if the man is only worth the sum of his possessions. He is what he owns.

And he is also blind in thinking that this life is all there is; he cannot see beyond the horizon of his own comfort now. His wealth has blinded him to his responsibilities to his neighbor and to God. He is totally self-centered. He talks to no one but himself, and he thinks of no one but himself. His thoughts are all "I," "me" and "my." He has no one to celebrate his good fortune with, and no one he wants to share it with either. His wealth has blinded and isolated him completely.

The farmer's materialist philosophy—which is so prevalent today—tells us that life is all about possessions, money, and status. It makes us poor in those very areas of life which, in fact, should make life worth living: love, relationships, neighborliness and hope for a future beyond death. It also robs us of our true worth as human beings. It tells us that our value is to be measured only by the size of our bank accounts. If we live like that – if our jobs, our status, our money are more important to us than our family, our friends, our own spirit, then we have got our priorities totally wrong. We work to live, not the other way around. We need money for the essentials – but making money is not the essence of life. Life is far richer than that. As the parable illustrates, money cannot save us. St. Paul tells us that greed is in fact the same as idolatry: it is God alone, not money, who provides us with ultimate security and purpose of life.

Like the designers of the Titanic, it is easy for us to get our priorities wrong – to think in terms of what looks good, what appears attractive on the surface. And like those passengers who were reluctant to get into the lifeboats, we can be afraid to let go of what we have been told provides security. Greed blinds us to what is essential. It blinds us to our duty to God, to the needs of others and ironically, it blinds us to our own needs too. It isolates us from our community. Security is not to be found in possessions. We are rich when we put on a new self – the life of Christ. He is the only security we need.

You're free to choose good

What does it mean to be free? For some it's a matter of not being trapped in oppressive circumstances, like an unsatisfying job, a difficult relationship, or an illness. For others it's the ability to find ways to live creatively within those situations. Some say freedom is about having choices. And there are those who think it's simply being able to do whatever they want. Christians believe Christ has freed them to discern what is truly important: to be generous rather than selfish, caring and kind instead of indifferent and cruel, truthful, not false. Use your freedom to choose what is good.

MONDAY, AUGUST 2

FEAST OF EUSEBIUS OF VERCELLI, BISHOP Fighting for the faith

When is a martyr not a martyr? Usually when he or she dies peacefully after a long life, as did today's saint, Eusebius of Vercelli (283-371). Nevertheless, the church honors Eusebius as a martyr because he endured a great deal of suffering. As a bishop during the church's formative years hashing out doctrine and theology, Eusebius struggled against opponents whose ideas about God were contrary to his own. These were not polite discussions. The debates featured fights, kidnappings, and an occasional homicide. Eusebius himself got run out of town. In memory of Saint Eusebius's hardships, work to bring conflicts to peaceful resolutions.

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 28:1-17; Matthew 14:13-21 "And the prophet Jeremiah said to the prophet Hananiah, 'Listen, Hananiah, the Lord has not sent you, and you made this people trust in a lie.'"

TUESDAY, AUGUST 3

Heal our home

Religion is not all about consolation. It also contains a warning intended to shock us out of complacency. The prophets often delivered divine oracles that roughly translated as "all is lost." When it comes to the urgent science of climate change, it may sound like the hurt suffered by our planet is incurable with creeping desertification, pollution of rivers, loss of biodiversity, deforestation, and the increase of natural disasters. All, however, is not lost—yet. But the poor stand to lose first. As a recent papal document says: "If you want to cultivate peace, protect creation."

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 30:1-2, 12-15, 18-22; Matthew 14:22-36 or 15:1-2, 10-14

"For thus says the Lord: Your hurt is incurable, your wound is grievous."

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 4

Don't prejudice the outcome

Religious prejudices and tensions between Jews and their Gentile neighbors are highlighted in the gospel story where a Canaanite woman asks Jesus to heal her daughter only to receive a stern rebuke. Tensions are exposed, but at the end of the day, the Canaanite woman finds a way to break through and Jesus responds with admiration and compassion. The lesson for all of us is to seek the path beyond our own prejudice to the point where admiration and compassion rule the day in our

interactions with others. Let your prejudices be teachable moments! TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 31:1-7; Matthew 15:21-28 "She said, 'Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table.'"

THURSDAY, AUGUST 5

FEAST OF THE DEDICATION OF THE BASILICA OF SAINT MARY MAJOR IN ROME

People, places, and things

As Catholics we celebrate the huge variety of the ways the Spirit moves in our lives, not only sacraments and saints but also buildings and even the chair of Peter! "Things," like holy people, speak to our fundamental belief that God is in everything—people, relationships, events, and the stuff of everyday life. The feast of the Dedication of the Basilica of Saint Mary Major in Rome is one such event: It celebrates one of four papal basilicas in Rome, the largest church in the world honoring God through Mary. Look around at the ordinary stuff of your life—the rocker where you rocked your newborn to sleep, your first electric guitar, the flip-flops your sister gave you. How are these signs of the sacred for you?

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 31:31-34; Matthew 16:13-23 "On this rock I will build my church."

FRIDAY, AUGUST 6

FEAST OF THE TRANSFIGURATION OF THE LORD The sound of silence

In early 1930 Mohandas Gandhi spent several weeks in seclusion to discern how to begin the process of nonviolently extricating India from British rule. By March he had made his decision: He would challenge the so-called "salt laws" that unjustly taxed this essential commodity. Early on the morning of March 12, Gandhi and a small group of followers set off toward Dandi on the sea. Thousands joined them along what came to be known as the Salt March. India's nonviolent struggle for independence had begun. Later Gandhi observed: "In the attitude of silence the soul finds its path in a clearer light, and what is elusive and deceptive resolves itself into crystal clearness." Talking is often overrated. Spend some time in silence today.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Deuteronomy 7:9-10, 13-14*; 2 Peter 1:16-19; Luke 9:28b-36

"And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen."

SATURDAY, AUGUST 7

Unsolved mysteries

Why do some people—habitual criminals for example—choose to do evil? Is it because they don't think they're really doing anything wrong? Or do they feel driven by necessity—like poverty or an addiction? Has their moral compass gone haywire, or are they so cynical as to know what they're doing and embrace it anyway? Christians believe that what God created is good, including human beings. Yet some of God's creatures are so consumed by evil that any glimmer of goodness in them seems to have gone out. Ponder these questions—how would you answer?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Habakkuk 1:12-2:4; Matthew 17:14-20* "Why do you look on the treacherous, and are silent when the wicked swallow those more righteous than they?"
