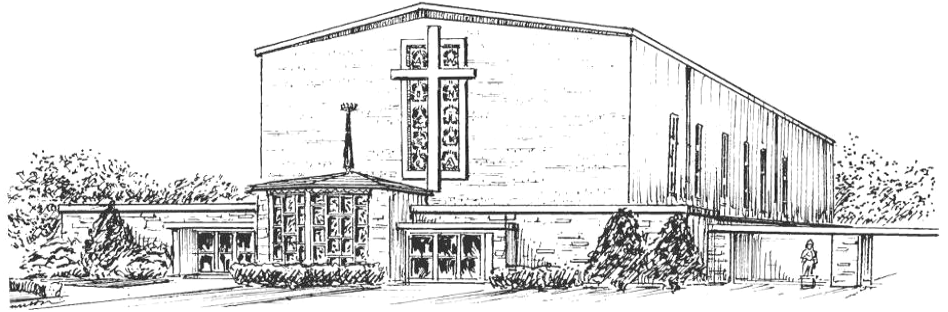

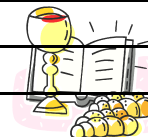

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The story is told of two elderly priests, both nearing the end of their days, who made a pact. Whichever of them died first, he would return and tell the other what life beyond the grave was like. Eventually Fr. Joe died and was buried. Some months later Fr. Bill was sitting in his room. It was Saturday night; he was busy preparing his homily – or was it watching football? In any event, he suddenly became aware of a presence: Fr. Joe was standing there before him. “Joe,” he gasped, “it’s you. Tell me, what’s it like in heaven?” “Well,” replied Joe, “you’d be surprised who’s there.” There was a pause: “And you’d be surprised who isn’t,” and with that he was gone.

It was hardly the answer Bill had expected. Much the same might be said of the man who questioned Jesus in today’s gospel. He didn’t get the answer he expected. Mind you, his question could hardly have come at a more inappropriate moment. Jesus is on his way to Jerusalem, where suffering and death await him, while all the questioner is concerned about is the speculative issue of how many people will be saved: “Will there be only a few?” he inquires, rather pessimistically.

Jesus’ reply must have brought him down to earth. He says in effect: never mind the numbers game;; your task is to work hard – literally, to struggle – so that you’ll be able “to enter by the narrow door” that leads to salvation. You may be a Jew; you may even be Roman Catholic, members of God’s people, but that doesn’t mean you can slip through with the crowd. It’s not enough that you belong to the “in” group. There’s no way through the narrow door without personal struggle.

Then Jesus puts it another way. This time he speaks not of “a narrow door” but of a closed door and God himself is pictured as the owner of the house. When the householder has locked up for the night – a gentle hint that earthly life does not last forever – it will be no use trying to get in by offering excuses, we ate and drank with you, we heard you preaching in the streets. The householder will not be impressed; he will reply: “I don’t know you.” Jesus goes on to speak of the anguish they will suffer, as Jews, if the great Jewish patriarchs, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and the prophets, are all there at the messianic banquet, while they themselves are locked out. More galling still, if they were to see among the insiders, people from the four corners of the globe. That would mean that some of God’s own people had been replaced at the banqueting table by non-Jews, by Gentiles. Those always regarded as first would now be last, and vice versa.

It needs little imagination to translate the message of today’s gospel into a message for ourselves. We have been blessed in the most extraordinary way, even more than the Jewish people of old. We have been baptized; we have been adopted as the children of God; we are members of the Church, God’s chosen people; we have the sacraments to meet our needs at every juncture of life, we have the scriptures to bring us God’s Good News; we have the support of our fellow believers. Here at Mass we cannot forget that we even eat and drink at the Lord’s table. Such blessings ought to fill us with gratitude. The one thing they must not do is lead us to presumption. If we reach heaven, it will not be simply because we are Catholics, or even because we receive the Lord himself in the Eucharist. We shall reach heaven because of the gracious goodness of God on the one hand and our own humble efforts on the other.

On that day, we may discover that the response Fr. Bill received from his friend had more than a grain of truth in it. Looking around the banqueting table of heaven, we may be surprised – by those who are there, and, perhaps, by those who are not. However, as we have been reminded today, our task is not to waste time on pointless speculation. What matters is that, avoiding complacency, we strive to live out our faith in our daily lives while putting all our trust in our God whose love is strong and whose faithfulness endures forever.

I may grow up believing I am owed good things in life because I am white, or black, because I am a woman, or an American, or a Catholic. But scripture makes it clear that simply being a member of a chosen race or having rank upon rank of noble ancestors makes no impression on God. Only one thing does: goodness.

Good living doesn't have to come with a lot of pious packaging. In 1671 Isabel de Flores (also known as Rose) became the first named saint of the Americas. She earned this honor quite simply, without martyrdom, founding an order, ruling a kingdom, or leading an army. Hungering to join the Dominicans, who didn't have a convent in her native Peru, she established a hut in her garden and lived out her vows there. None of us needs to stand on ceremony to embrace a holy way. Become a saint in your own backyard!

Like someone who is tall might have the nickname “Shorty.” Or you might say to someone who is calm, “Don't get so excited.” Jesus and Nathanael (surnamed Bartholomew) exchange such quips. Nathanael makes a “Nazareth joke,” and Jesus replies with an “Israelite joke.” So, the two men of the gospel story are attracted by their mutual sense of humor. This looks like the beginning of a beautiful friendship.

FEAST OF JOSEPH CALASANZ, PRIEST

Spread the wealth of learning

Do poor children deserve the same educational opportunities that children of more prosperous families enjoy? Saint Joseph of Calasanz thought so. But in the 16th century this idea was deemed radical and presumed to lead to social unrest. If the poor received an education, what would they want next? Joseph was ahead of his time in many ways; his friendship with Galileo caused scandal as well. And he was right on the merits of learning altogether. If educating the poor threat-

ens social stability, just see what happens when people remain in ignorance.

Time to wake up

Jesus regularly admonished his followers to stay awake. But how can we stay awake when we don't know if we're asleep? One way to know for sure that we are asleep is when we believe we are right and therefore everyone else must be wrong. When we cannot hear or even imagine another's point of view, we are asleep. On the other hand, when we place our certainty alongside the possibility that we might be wrong, we are awake. An open mind—toward our partner, child, mother-in-law, boss, or non-Christian neighbor—is a sure sign that we are awake. Give some thought today to whatever you are certain you are right about. Have you fallen asleep?

Rise and shine!

The theme of being awake continues from yesterday's gospel reading to today's. Poet Antonio Machado wrote that all of Jesus' directives come down to one simple command: “Wake up!” Consider how much of our daily routine involves sleepwalking through a series of familiar habits. How easy for us to grow numb to the sufferings and injustices others endure, whether from illness, prejudice, violence, or another social ill, when we are only half awake to them. What can we do to stay alert? Involvement in the lives of others, religious and devotional practices, a commitment to be part of the solution, all have their place. As does keeping in mind that life is too precious to be slept through!
