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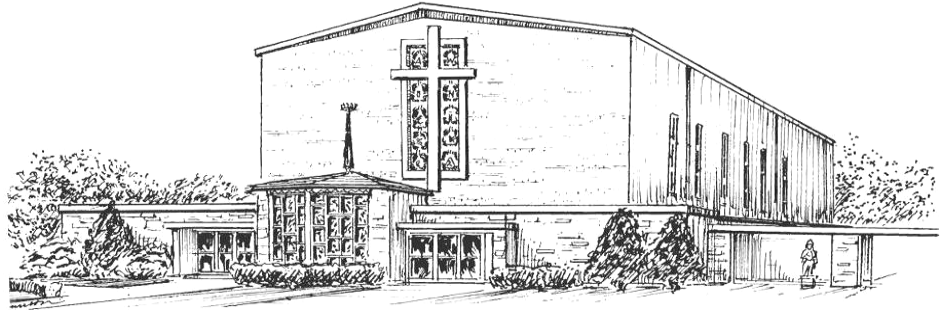

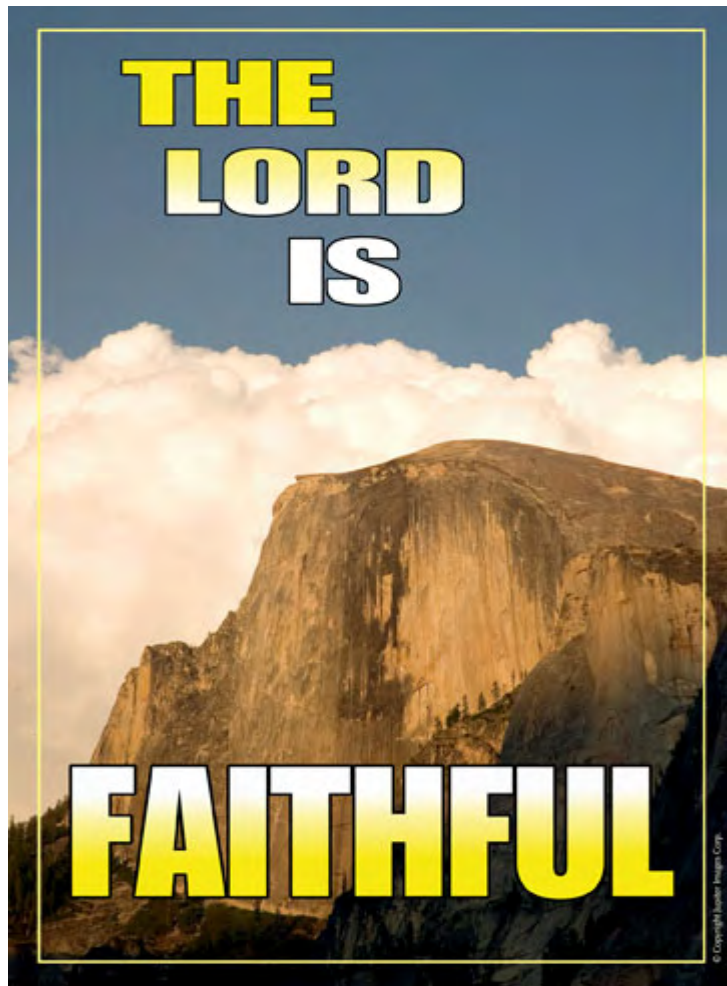

WHO... ME ?? Yes, it is you and me—it is all of us striving to respond to the call, “Come, follow Me.” We affirm this proclamation in the song: “We Are Called.”

This month we particularly focus on that fascinating company of men, women, and children who came from every walk of life and devoted their lives to Christ and his mission. From the poor peasant tilling the soil, to the poverty-stricken slum dweller, to emperors and queens.

Murderers, cutthroats, and robbers who repented of their evil lives are listed next to holy men and women who lived lives of holiness and austerity from early childhood. Men, women, and children: black, white, red, yellow, and brown; clergy and laity; powerful and helpless; eloquent and tongue-tied—all are represented in this glorious company. For the Church, like her Master, ignores the distinctions humans make—class, race, color, position—and acknowledges the real men and women who struggled desperately, sometimes against incredible odds, to live lives to the best of their abilities in the service of the Lord.

Among this varied bunch of personalities, the Church has publicly studied and recognized some of these faith-filled ancestors through a detailed process known as canonization. They have a capital “St.” in front of their name and a feast day assigned to them. We have a small representation of them in our church. We will be offering a brief introduction into their lives throughout this month.

The great majority of holy men and women may remain unknown to us but are no less significant in the eyes of God. They should serve as inspirations to us all that Jesus’ words are not impossible to live by. They show us that no matter who we are or what our talents may be, it is possible for us to put Jesus first. And putting Jesus first will bring us more happiness that we could ever imagine.

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

THIRTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

On occasion, most of us will have the mortifying experience of being proven wrong. The experience is mortifying, because we like to be right about things, and our pride is hurt when we are not. By the same token, it is particularly difficult when our cherished beliefs are challenged, and we are certain that we are not wrong but cannot prove it to our challengers.

This can happen often in matters of faith, but it can also happen in the world of science. Galileo and Einstein, to name two, struggled to communicate their visions of the nature of the world to disbelieving audiences. How could Galileo say that the earth revolves around the sun when the tradition, supported by what people saw daily with their own eyes, proved the opposite? And how could the physics of the world be based on a theory of relativity, as Einstein argued, when one only has to kick a stone to see how solidly everything has its place? How do we express what seems at first encounter inexpressible? How do we make the intangible tangible? How do we talk about the risen life in a world that is firmly locked into a closed understanding of its own possibilities?

The idea of life after death developed quite late in Hebrew thinking. Where Greek influence prevailed, there was some exploration of the idea of the immortality of the soul, but in mainstream Judaism, with its insistence on the fleshy but spirit-filled nature of humanity, it was the idea of bodily resurrection that finally emerged. Among the groups who were active at the time of Jesus, the Pharisees supported the idea of resurrection, and the Sadducees were the “flat-earthers” in opposition. The argument they put forward to catch Jesus came from their Jewish legal background. For example, if a married man died without children, it was the duty of his brother to marry his wife and have children in his place—hence, the challenge about the seven brothers and whose wife would she be in heaven. As with so many other questions put to him in this way, Jesus challenged the terms of the question. Immediately before this incident, we have him avoiding an attempt to trap him as to the source of his authority. Here Jesus chooses to clarify the nature of resurrection. First of all, it is a way of being that is totally different to our present existence, so it is pointless asking questions that pertain to our present limited ways of understanding. At the time of the resurrection, we will all be the children of God and one family, so the giving and taking in marriage will no longer have any sense or place. Secondly, the life of the resurrection comes from God’s promise to his people. Jesus uses one of the Sadducees’ favorite quotes about their links with Abraham to illustrate this. His promise is a promise of life, so this must mean that in some way we will not die. But the risen life remains his gift; it is not a natural progression for all, nor is it a disembodied state of immortality. It is the fulfillment of God’s promise: ultimately a share in God’s own life and glory.

This teaching of Jesus challenges us to reflect on both our relationship with God and how we communicate the idea of resurrection to others. We sometimes talk about God as though he is a puppeteer, pulling our strings but remaining rather detached and unaffected. Sometimes we go even further and feel he may have started the world in motion but since then has lost interest. This may reflect our own desire to find a similarly detached vantage point from which to view the world. But the image of God that Jesus presents to us is very different. He is the God of promises, and his greatest promise is that of a living encounter with him. There is nothing isolated or detached about this God. He is the God of the living, not the dead, and he is passionately involved with his creation. The challenge to us is to be similarly alive and not dead. Where are signs of life in our Christian communities today? We will not be able to prove scientifically that Christ is among us, but then Jesus himself said we would be recognized by nothing other than the love we share among ourselves.

Life goes on

It's November and there's no denying winter now, even if we wanted to try. The birds have flown south, the leaves have changed color and fallen, the flowers have faded and turned to seed, the last of the harvest is in. The liturgical readings mirror nature; our thoughts do the same. It is perhaps easy to become melancholy and disheartened at this time of year, but take a moment today to consider what Jesus tells us: Every person who has ever died is still alive to God. That is an extraordinarily comforting statement when you think about it. Despite all outward appearances, there really and truly is no death.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 8

Lead the way

Disparaging leadership is a national pastime. One of the joys of living in a free country is that we can criticize our leaders without risk or penalty. Two groups frequently targeted by public ire are members of Congress and bishops. Often there are very good reasons for that. We want the people in charge of nation and church to demonstrate all those qualities noted in the Letter to Titus: goodness, temperance, justice. We want to point to our elected leaders with pride and to our religious leaders as holy examples. Wherever you exercise authority, be the leader you wish to see.

FEAST OF THE DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA IN ROME

Rock of ages

If you asked a random group of Catholics the name of the church where the pope presides, many would say St. Peter's Basilica. But the papal cathedral is in fact the Basilica of St. John Lateran. The original church was built in the fourth century on land donated by the emperor Constantine, and the altar was placed over the remains of a wooden table on which Saint Peter is said to have celebrated Mass. Prey to the ravages of pillage, fire, and earthquake over the centuries, the structure has been rebuilt more than once. But it still stands today, a testament to the resiliency of the institution—and the people—it represents.

FEAST OF LEO THE GREAT, POPE, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

First among equals

A mid-fourth-century pope, Leo was the first pontiff to be called "Great" and is said to have embraced his role with "strong conviction of the importance of the bishop of Rome in the church, and of the church as the ongoing sign of Christ's presence in the world." While he saw himself as Saint Peter's successor, he considered other bishops as equals. Leo's chief goal as a careful and dynamic administrator was to be faithful to Christ by preserving the holiness and unity of his body on earth, the church. It is a good day to consider how we use our own

personal authority and power. There is lording it over one another, and there is collegiality and service.

Not in my backyard

When it comes to the kingdom of God, "anywhere but here" seems to be an unspoken sentiment of many of us. Seeing the kingdom of God on earth is a nice idea, but do we really want it right where we live? That might involve some radical changes on our part. We'd have to fully love God and neighbor with our whole selves. Christ warned us about looking for the kingdom elsewhere. It's here and we're called to be part of it now.

FEAST OF JOSAPHAT, BISHOP, MARTYR

The whole and its parts

Christians have become so used to the divisions between their churches and denominations that they often look past efforts to unite the fragmented Body of Christ. Saint Josaphat serves as a good reminder of those efforts. An Eastern Orthodox bishop, he convened a small meeting of other Orthodox bishops in 1595 in an attempt to seek reunion with the Roman Catholic Church (the two churches had been separated for more than 500 years). His endeavor roused so much hostility that he was condemned to the political authorities. The false charge against him was inciting violence to achieve his goal—ironic because he was later murdered by a mob in 1625. Remember that Christ's prayer for his followers was "that they may all be one."

FEAST OF FRANCES XAVIER CABRINI, VIRGIN

Across the sea, across borders

Sometimes God's gentle calling can lead to unimaginable turns in our lives. For Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini that meant going from tilling the soil of her family farm in Italy to building schools and hospitals in the United States. It also meant 30-plus trips across the ocean although she was terrified of water. Her secret? She allowed the love of God and her desire to care for others to trump what seemed like insurmountable obstacles. She felt particularly called to tend to Italian immigrant communities. An immigrant herself, she understood well the hardships of trying to make a home in a foreign land. As our country continues to give voice to issues surrounding immigration, let us pray for the love and courage of Mother Cabrini to make decisions that uphold the dignity of all.
