



# NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

#### FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING 2010

"Meals just aren't what they used to be," said the old man. And I think he may have had a point. There was a time, not so long ago, when meals were special occasions—when they provided families and friends with a welcome opportunity to get together; when what was shared was not only food and drink, but more importantly, each other's company. Meals were leisurely events, and the fact that they were usually prefaced by grace was a hint that there might even be something sacred about them. But today, with fast food, self-service, and "meals-on-knees" in front of the TV, they are often little more than the meeting of a basic biological need. Meals are oftentimes hurried, let's-get-this-over-and-get-on-with-something else affairs, and, of course, grace before meals has become a rarity.

So it is difficult for us to appreciate how deeply meals were valued by ancient peoples, including our Lord's own people, Israel. They regarded meals as having a sacred character. Even in Old Testament times, salvation was often pictured in terms of a meal: a wonderful banquet with bountiful food and drink.

Against that background, today's gospel takes on a rich significance, for it tells of an occasion when Jesus fed a huge crowd of over five thousand people with a few loaves and fishes. Everyone had enough and even more than enough to eat, and there were no less than twelve baskets-full of leftovers. The fact that this incident—or one similar to it—is recorded no fewer than six times in the four gospels is a sure indication of its importance. It wasn't simply the miracle that filled the gospel writers with astonishment, but rather the magnificent generosity that marks Jesus' presence. After all, even before the meal began, Jesus had been teaching his audience "about the kingdom of God" and curing "those in need of healing." The multiplication of loaves, like the healings, was an illustration of what the kingdom of God means.

But even that is not the whole story. In giving their accounts, Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John seem to have had in mind what happened on the night before Jesus died. It was then, as today's second reading reminds us, that Jesus instituted the Eucharist; he gave us the Mass; he gave us Holy Communion. The central act of Christian worship for all times would be in the form of a sacred meal, a banquet where his followers would be nourished on his own Body and Blood, and that meal would in its turn be a foreshadowing of the banquet of heaven.

St. Luke seems to go out of his way to show this close connection between the feeding of the five thousand and the Eucharist by the way in which he tells the story: he describes how Jesus took the loaves, blessed them (he did say his grace before meals!), broke them, and gave them (handed them over to the disciples to distribute). Those four actions—taking, blessing, breaking, and giving—are precisely the actions of Jesus at the Last Supper, and, of course, they are the actions that we witness at every Mass. Indeed, you might say that they provide a brief description of the Mass. After the Liturgy of the Word, the priest takes the bread and wine, which represent ourselves and our lives, and offers them to God; then at the consecration, he blesses them so that they become the Body and Blood of Jesus. Later he breaks the bread and, if it were practical, would divide it so that everyone who wishes may receive a portion. Finally, he gives us the bread and wine as our food and drink in Holy Communion.

To celebrate the feast of Christ's Body and Blood is to rejoice and give thanks, because the Eucharist is the sharing in a meal infinitely more wonderful than that which was described in today's gospel. But it is also to experience a challenge. To receive that Body which was given up for us and that Blood which was shed for us is to be called to follow the example of Jesus' total self-giving. To be fed by sacred food is to be strengthened to live lives: lives devoted to God and our brothers and sisters. To be nourished by one who laid down his life for us is to prepare ourselves to make sacrifices. To be invited as a guest to the table of the Eucharist is to be invited to share with others from our abundance.

It is the Mass that matters; yes, that is true, but only if our lives are in tune with the sacred meal that the Mass sets before us.

#### SOLEMNITY OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST THE KING-Love rules

Those with worldly power are seemingly invincible—every comfort, security, and cure is theirs for the taking. That's why the crowds around the cross mock Jesus as a phony. If he *really* had juice, why is he hanging up there? What they failed to appreciate is the divine use of authority: not for self-preservation, but poured out for the sake of others. Think differently. Think love.

#### **MONDAY, NOVEMBER 22**

#### FEAST OF CECILIA, VIRGIN, MARTYR

#### Put some muscle in your faith

Valerian and Tiburtius became converts to Christianity during the third century through the urging and inspiration of Saint Cecilia. They, along with Saint Cecilia, were martyred for their faith. What capital crimes did Valerian and Tiburtius commit against the state? They buried their dead, which was against the Roman law. Burying the dead is one of the Corporal Works of Mercy—deeds that have to do with providing bodily comfort. The others are feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, tending to prisoners, sheltering the homeless, and visiting the sick. In memory of these early martyrs, practice a work of mercy this week.

TODAY'S READINGS: Revelation 14:1-3, 4b-5; Luke 21:1-4 "These follow the Lamb wherever he goes."

#### **TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 23**

#### Take and read

It's National Bible Week. Mary Elizabeth Sperry, associate director for Utilization of the New American Bible, points out that the Bible—actually a library of 73 "books"—includes royal history, prophecy, poetry, love songs, letters, and of course believers' accounts of the preaching and passion of Jesus. Yet, Sperry notes, the "Bible is *not* a history text, a science book, or a political manifesto." The Bible is the record of the faith of people who walked with God—and sometimes did not. We read it to deepen faith, we pray with it to express faith—but we can also study the Bible. Taking an adult-level scripture course or reading a book by someone like Father Raymond Brown will help you to discover scripture's depths.

TODAY'S READINGS: Revelation 14:14-19; Luke 21:5-11 "See that you not be deceived."

#### WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 24

# FEAST OF ANDREW DÛNG-LAC, PRIEST, MARTYR, AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS - Vietnam long divided

Today's commemoration of the Vietnamese martyrs affords an opportunity to reflect on the conflicted historical relationship between East and West embodied in Vietnam. The context is that of 19th-century French imperialism in Southeast Asia that led to decades of strife in Vietnam. "Furthering Catholicism" was sometimes an ideological pretext used by colonial powers to hide their all-too-secular interests, such as the development of lucrative plantations. As we remember those who sincerely sacrificed and died for their faith, let us also make sure the colonial policies that may have contributed to their deaths are a thing of the past.

TODAY'S READINGS: Revelation 15:1-4; Luke 21:12-19 "They will arrest you and persecute you."

# FEAST OF CATHERINE OF ALEXANDRIA, VIRGIN, MARTYR; THANKSGIVING DAY

#### Thanks a lot!

Poor Saint Catherine of Alexandria. Not only did she suffer martyrdom, but her feast day falls on another "feast day," Thanksgiving Day in the United States. Remembrance of her can get lost in the festivities (even though one of the scripture readings for her day talks about "every foul bird"!). Her story is similar to those of many of the Early Church martyrs: a convert to Christianity, she is pressured by others to marry outside her new faith. She ran afoul of the authorities and went to her death rather than deny her faith. Not exactly a tale that goes with the holiday, but as we gather for our own feasts, we can take a moment to remember the sacrifices people have made through the ages and continue to make today for love of God and neighbor.

#### Talking about our generation

Scripture scholars and believers long have puzzled over Jesus' prediction of the approaching end time. The world did not end with the generation who lived at the time of Christ, so . . . was he mistaken? In fact, the word *generation* may be key. Scholars point out that in both Aramaic (Jesus' spoken language) and the written Greek of the New Testament, the word for "generation" can mean either the current crop of folks or an entire race, class, or group of people. In this wider sense, we are all part of the current generation of believers. So it is, as the liturgical prayer has it, that we "wait in joyful hope for the coming of the Lord."

You are probably more familiar with the Bible than you realize. Significant parts of the proverbs, poems, songs, letters, and historical accounts that make up the Bible are embedded into our art, music, literature, and political rhetoric as well as movies and television. Its wisdom and relevance are timeless. Today is the last day of National Bible Week. Consider taking a few moments to open the Bible and see for yourself.

#### GETTING TO KNOW YOU...ST. FRANCES XAVIER CABRINI - FEAST DAY; DECEMBER 22

Do you have pictures of your loved ones at home or at the office? Looking at them, are you reminded of certain characteristics, events, or memories that are associated with their unique personalities? The same may be said of our faith ancestors, some of whose likenesses may be found in the niches of our church. The calendar of saints is like our family photo album, representing men and women from every walk of life, every period of history, and every part of the world. By reading their stories, we re-acquaint ourselves with the lives of some of these holy people whose example serves as an inspiration to us.

On the left (tabernacle) side of the church, a statue of St. Frances Xavier Cabrini may be found. Francesca Cabrini was born in 1850 and grew up in northern Italy, the daughter of a loving, prosperous family. At an early age she was attracted to the work of the missionaries. She set out on her goal and received a teaching certificate and soon gathered around her a small group of women who would soon become the Institute of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart. Her hope was to go to China and the East.

However, Pope Leo XXIII insisted she go West – to the United States. She and her group of 6 Sisters arrived in New York in 1889 with no place to stay and little money. Word spread quickly of their good work and soon hospitals, schools and orphanages were established, initially in Italian neighborhoods, and eventually, throughout all poverty-ridden areas.

In 35 years Mother Cabrini founded nearly 70 institutions for helping the poor, the needy, the abandoned and the ill. She became a naturalized citizen in 1909. She had at terrible fear of water, yet she crossed the ocean 30 times, bringing more Sisters to serve the needy.
