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



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT 2010

A teacher once asked her class of ten-year-olds: "What would you do if one day there was a ring at your front door, and when you opened it you found our Lord standing on the doorstep?" One little boy knew what he would do. "I'd run upstairs," he said, "and I'd get the big Bible from my Mom's room, and I'd hand it over to our Lord and I'd say: 'Jesus, this is your life!""

The boy was closer to the mark than his teacher may have realized. Of course, something like three quarters of the Bible was written before Jesus was born—it's the part we call the Old Testament, the part that usually provides the first of our Sunday readings. Naturally, the Old Testament cannot speak directly of Jesus' life and teachings, and yet, without it, our understanding of him would be impoverished; without it, his life's story would have no context; it would seem to have been parachuted in from nowhere. We would be meeting him in two dimensions rather than three, so to say, in black and white rather than in color. St. Paul says that "everything that was written long ago in the scriptures"—he's thinking, of course, of the Old Testament—"was meant to teach us." It has not lost its significance. The point is perfectly illustrated in the readings we've heard today.

In the first, Isaiah, who lived eight centuries before the birth of Christ, looks towards a time when God's people will rejoice in a ruler on whom the Spirit of the Lord will rest, who will rule with justice, who will bring peace, who will fill the country with knowledge of the Lord. The responsorial psalm, also from the Old Testament, of course, takes up the same theme—a coming king who will rule "from sea to sea," who "will save the poor...and the needy," and "have pity on the weak," and in whose days "justice shall flourish."

When we turn to the gospel, there is John the Baptist crying out: "Repent, the kingdom of heaven is close at hand." And if the kingdom is close at hand, so too is its king, the king who was promised long ago, and the promises of the old are about to be fulfilled in Jesus. And so the call goes out: Make ready for the coming of the King! Without the Old Testament, we would never have known how perfectly Jesus fulfills the hopes and yearnings of men and women who lived long before him. It would be like hearing the climax of the story of our salvation without hearing the "lead-in" in the final chapter.

During Advent we are invited to share in the longings and yearnings of Old Testament times so that we may celebrate worthily the birth of the King at Christmas. The infant of the stable is the fulfillment of the whole of the Old Testament, the realization of everyone's hopes and dreams, and he is also destined to come again in glory at the end of time. We are to repent, says John the Baptist: that means that we're to have a change of heart. It may well result in our finding a little extra time for prayer and scripture reading during these days before Christmas, but the main part of the preparation will be the way we lead our daily lives. After insisting that "everything written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us," Paul sets before his readers some very practical consequences of listening to the scriptures: you must live together in harmony, he says, striving "to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you"—apparently squabbles were not unknown among the early Christians! A similar appeal is made to us today: how can we be ready to receive the Prince of Peace if we are not at peace with our brothers and sisters?

But there is something more. Paul speaks of the immense hope that the scriptures bring, for they are centered upon Jesus, who is the God of hope in our midst. And so Paul concludes with a prayer, although unfortunately not mentioned in today's reading, is a beautiful prayer which includes in it such wonderful Christian key words as hope, joy, peace, faith, and the power of the Spirit. It is a prayer that we might make our own on this Advent Sunday. "May the God of hope fill (us) with all joy and peace in (our) faith, so that in the power of the Holy Spirit we may be rich in hope." Amen. (Romans 15:13)

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT - There's still time

Unwrap it—it's "just what you always wanted!" Confront your use and abuse of time. Create and jealously guard little pockets of quiet. Go for a walk in the crisp air. Sit with your address book; picture, pray for, and bless each person you cherish. Turn off the TV, listen to the first part of Handel's *Messiah* and bask in its beauty. Be still. Know God.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 11:1-10; Romans 15:4-9; Matthew 3:1-12 - "The earth shall be filled with knowledge of the Lord."

MONDAY, DECEMBER 6

FEAST OF NICHOLAS, BISHOP

Lean your ear this way

Today many countries in Europe celebrate Saint Nicholas Day, which involves gift-giving, merrymaking, and other festivities. Santa Claus, as well as the British Father Christmas, are figures based on the legends surrounding the generosity of the real Saint Nicholas (270-346). As bishop of Myra (part of modern-day Turkey) Nicholas had many miracles attributed to him and was known for secret gift-giving, such as placing coins in the shoes of those who left them out for him. He is also one of the most widely revered of all saints, honored by Catholic, Orthodox, Anglican, and Lutheran churches alike. Generosity has the power to generate such affection and respect. Practice some today, in the spirit of the season and of Saint Nick!

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 35:1-10; Luke 5:17-26 "The power of the Lord was with him to heal."

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 7

FEAST OF AMBROSE, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Virtue prepares the way

The message is clear: "Prepare the way of the Lord." But how exactly do we do that? Try cultivating virtue, right where you are and precisely through who you are. After all, Saint Ambrose wasn't named the "Honey-Tongued Doctor" for keeping bees. He became patron of beekeepers and waxworkers for using his best asset—fine speech—to prepare a way for God. He also directed his audience to Mary, the Mother of God, the woman who found virtue in each place life took her: "the Virgin within the house, the companion for the ministry, the mother of the temple." In the wilderness of this world, Mary used who she was to prepare a unique path for God.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 40:1-11; Matthew 18:12-14 "A voice cries out In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord."

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 8

SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY - Original blessing

We know today's celebration of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary is important. It's a *solemnity*, after all, and the doctrine is one of only two—along with the Assumption of Mary into heaven—proclaimed infallible by a pope. It's also the patronal feast day of the United States. Why all the attention? Mary, the church teaches, was preserved from original sin since the moment of her conception. This day reminds us of the communion Mary had with God that never was broken and that led to her giving birth to the one, Jesus,

who would overcome the brokenness of sin and bring humanity back into closer communion with God. Like Mary, we, too, can welcome God into our very selves.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 3:9-15, 20; Ephesians 1:3-6, 11-12; Luke 1:26-38

"May it be done to me according to your word."

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 9

FEAST OF JUAN DIEGO, HERMIT Celebrate a home-grown faith

According to Mexican Catholic tradition, Juan Diego witnessed apparitions of the Virgin of Guadalupe in 1531 and persuaded skeptical church officials of their authenticity. Controversy surrounds the authenticity of Juan Diego himself, but even so, many Mexicans saw his elevation to sainthood in 2002 as a symbolic victory in the struggle for greater recognition of their indigenous heritage. The canonization Mass included elements of indigenous rituals, dress, and language. In his homily Pope John Paul II urged Mexican church leaders to incorporate indigenous traditions into religious ceremonies. We are at our best as a church when we cherish the diversity of our roots.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 41:13-20; Matthew 11:11-15 "That all may see and know, all may consider and understand."

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 10

ADVENT WEEKDAY - Apply yourself

What keeps us from acting in the ways we know we should? Or, as God laments to Isaiah, why have we not hearkened to his commandments so that our "prosperity would be like a river"? At this point it doesn't really matter why we are the way we are, or who is to blame for our faults and weaknesses. Perhaps we grew up in difficult circumstances, or surrounded by too much luxury and not enough love. No matter our history, it's time to accept responsibility for our actions. All the knowledge in the world—theological or otherwise—means nothing if we don't act upon what we know. Wisdom is knowledge applied. Take a step toward wisdom today and apply what you know.

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 48:17-19; Matthew 11:16-19 "Wisdom is vindicated by her deeds."

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 11

FEAST OF DAMASUS I, POPE - Become Word wise

Pope Damasus I had a challenging papacy, but among his most significant contributions was his care for the language of faith. Damasus encouraged Saint Jerome to undertake the task of providing an accurate translation of the Bible so that ordinary folks could encounter the Word of God in their own language. Damasus also had a hand in shifting the language of the liturgy from Greek to Latin, again to allow the prayer of the church to be more accessible to people. Today we continue in the spirit of Damasus by having translations of the Bible and the liturgy in many languages and styles. Take some time to explore different versions: a study Bible, an inclusive language Bible, a teen-friendly Bible. And most important, enter into the Word of God alive in our midst.

TODAY'S READINGS: Sirach 48:1-4, 9-11; Matthew 17:9a, 10-13 "Then the disciples understood . . ."



Sunday, December 5, 2010 Two Sides of God

Today's Readings: Isaiah 11:1–10; Romans 15:4–9; Matthew 3:1–12. What could be more tender than the images of peace in today's First Reading from Isaiah? A shoot is frail, easily crushed by a careless shoe. We can't help but feel a little anxiety as we contemplate the real-life precariousness in the image of the lamb lying next to the lion. Yet our compassionate God holds even the most vulnerable in profound care.

What could be more wrathful than the mood of today's Gospel reading from Matthew? "Brood of vipers" and "thrown into the fire" are hardly words of invitation. Few of us would choose the subway seat next to John the Baptist, being slightly leery of the camel's hair jacket and the grasshopper lunch.

How do we reconcile the dramatic contrast? Think of a parent who loves a child intensely. The parent feels a rush of tender compassion for that child and would give life itself if the child were threatened. However, sometimes the child behaves so obnoxiously that the parent must put the "fear of God" into that beloved daughter or son. A severe warning or strict punishment could make the difference between a wasted, dissolute life and one of fruitful, disciplined productivity. Many people are grateful to the demanding teacher, while they quickly forget the more lenient one.

The love of God, like the love of human parents, has tenderness and toughness. Made in God's image, we may recognize both facets of good parenting in these readings.



Monday, December 6 Optional Memorial of Saint Nicholas

Following the European custom, each person places a pair of shoes outside the door tonight. Then a kindly "Saint Nick" fills them with candy or small gifts. Everyone can be a Saint Nick, secretly doing kind deeds for others. What a treat to find beds mysteriously made, trash emptied, or shoes polished! It prepares for the birth of Jesus, who embodies all kindness. Today's Readings: Isaiah 35:1–10; Luke 5:17–26.

Tuesday, December 7 Memorial of Saint Ambrose

Today we remember Saint Ambrose, (d. 397) whose preaching converted many, including Saint Augustine. Reflect on today's First Reading from Isaiah: "Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. / Speak tenderly to Jerusalem. . . ." In what arena of your life do you most need God's comfort? Who needs the comfort you can give? To whom could you speak more tenderly today? Today's Readings: Isaiah 40:1–11; Matthew 18:12–14.

Wednesday, December 8 Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of Mary

Today's Gospel describes the angel's Annunciation of the Lord to Mary. If you have children in your household, dramatize the conversation between the angel and Mary, or act it out with puppets. Adults may reflect quietly: How often has God surprised you with news that at first seemed a disaster, then turned out to be a blessing? How does God call us in the midst of our daily routines? Today's Readings: Genesis 3:9–15, 20; Ephesians 1:3–6, 11–12; Luke 1:26–38.

Thursday, December 9 Optional Memorial of Saint Juan Diego

Around 1531, when Juan Diego's Bishop asked for proof that the Blessed Virgin Mary had appeared to him at Tepeyac, his

tilma, or cape, filled with roses. Mary's image appeared on the cloak, where it can still be seen in Mexico City's basilica. Believers attribute miracles to this glowing figure. Because Mary was brown-skinned when she appeared to Saint Juan, she was seen as a mother to the indigenous people of Mexico, saving them from the profound discouragement they felt after their nation was conquered and they were oppressed. To celebrate this recently canonized saint, decorate your table with fresh flowers or make roses from crepe paper. Today's Readings: Isaiah 41:13–20; Matthew 11:11–15.

Friday, December 10 Leading Us

In today's First Reading, God speaks to his people in exile in Babylon through the prophet Isaiah, asking why they did not listen to him so that they could have avoided this terrible exile, for after all, "I am the LORD your God, / who teaches you for your own good, / who leads you in the way you should go." How is God teaching and leading you? How do you discern what God wants of you? Today's Readings: Isaiah 48:17–19; Matthew 11:16–19.

Saturday, December 11 Honoring Our Lady of Guadalupe

Although the Third Sunday of Advent displaces the celebration of the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe on Sunday, December 12, the feast may be celebrated today or on Monday. Honor Our Lady at home by praying the Canticle of Mary, Luke 1:46–55. Then make these special cookies:

1 cup (2 sticks) soft butter, 1 cup powdered sugar, ½ teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2 cups flour. Combine butter, sugar, salt, and vanilla. Cream until light and fluffy. Mix in flour. Pinch off small pieces of stiff dough and shape into 1-inch balls on an ungreased baking sheet. Bake at 400° for 8 to 10 minutes or until creamy tan in color. Roll in powdered sugar while hot and again when cool. Makes about five dozen.

Today's Readings: Sirach 48:1–4, 9–11; Matthew 17:9a, 10–13.
