NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2011

The Jews have always had mixed feelings about being God's "Chosen People." The Psalms reveal the depth and variety of exchange that took place between them and God. Every human emotion is displayed. Is God on our side? Why doesn't he show himself more? Why doesn't he get off our backs? What a good God he is! This flavor of intimacy and concern continues in modern Jewish writing, often with humor and wit. Two things remain clear in the Jewish vision down through the ages. One is that we cannot get away from God. The other is that God demands commitment. This is what being chosen by God means. Our modern western ideas of being chosen are wishy-washy by comparison. Advertising suggests it is a matter of luck or fate. "It could be you," proclaims the advertisements for the Power Ball and Lotteries. Many companies send out unsolicited but ornate envelopes informing us that we have been specially chosen to receive a prize. Keep in mind, there is usually some condition attached that lurks in the small print. Being chosen is linked to the idea of reward rather than responsibility. Unfortunately, this expectation can affect the most important choices in our lives. Partners may choose to marry for what they expect to receive rather than for what they might give. Or, the commitment required to live with another person day after day, in sickness and health, proves too much of a demand, and they run away.

God's choosing presents a much clearer picture. A special relationship is established with the chosen one, and it is that relationship which empowers the chosen to carry out the assignment that goes with the act of election. In Isaiah, the nature of the relationship is defined first of all as that of a servant, but it is a special sort of servant. It is the servant who is honored in the eyes of his Lord and who has God himself as his strength. Through the servant God is glorified, a theme explored at length in John's gospel during the farewell discourse of Jesus to his disciples at the Last Supper. Thus energized by God, the servant will not only reconcile the people of Israel but will be a light for all nations so that salvation may be offered to all. Similarly, Paul, in the first line of his greeting to the church in Corinth, refers to the fact that he has been appointed by God to be an apostle. He, too, has been chosen, and his assignment is that of an apostle, to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ. Again, John's account of the beginning of Jesus' public life puts the accent on his special election through the descent of the Spirit. Just as the Spirit hovered over the waters in the first creation, so the spirit now comes down upon Jesus, is an instrument of God's new creation. Jesus will take away the sins of the world and in turn will baptize with the Spirit—his assignment as the chosen one of God.

We, too, are the chosen ones of God. In baptism the Holy Spirit descends on us and makes us the sharers in God's own life. Our responsibility as chosen ones is to take up the assignments we have just heard of in the life of Jesus, in the life of Paul, and in the life of the servant disciple. We are called to take away the sins of the world, to be apostles, and to be the light of the nations, bringing salvation to the ends of the earth: all daunting tasks. We may be forgiven for trying to flee them or off-load them on to those we consider to be especially trained for the purpose: the clergy and religious. But through our baptism, we are each called to make unique contributions to these assignments. It helps if we can see how in turn they have been communicated to us. As we have received, so shall we give. How have we been enlightened? What brings clear vision and understanding into our lives? What has our experience of forgiveness been? Have we really forgiven others or allowed ourselves to be truly forgiven? Finally, how have we received the good news? What words or images moved or still move us? It is through our own experience of God that God will communicate his presence to others.

The Gospel of John tells us that the Spirit came down and remained on Jesus. The wording is

no accident. At one point or another each of us likely has had a powerful spiritual experience, a genuine "moment of connection" with the divine. Without diminishing the beauty and significance of such experiences, a single "peak experience" does not a spiritual life make. It is the day-in, day-out commitment to practice one's faith that will create a deeply rooted spirituality. The Holy Spirit not only descended on Jesus, it remained with him. The results were evident in Jesus' life, and can be in ours as well.

Today's readings: Isaiah 49:3, 5-6; 1 Corinthians 1:1-3; John 1:20-34

"He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one"

MONDAY, JANUARY 17 FEAST OF ANTHONY, ABBOT Fend off unwelcome guests

The time: around 300 A.D. The place: the Egyptian desert, where Saint Anthony has gone to seek a life of solitude, simplicity, and contemplation. Wearing only a sheepskin, he's finished his day's work of mat weaving and has just eaten some bread and water, his only meal of the day. It's night—his favorite time to pray. Because he is so focused on God, demonic spirits come to him in visions to distract him. Whenever this happens, Anthony fends off the temptation by saying: "If God gave you power over me, come quickly, for I'm ready for you. But if Satan sent you, you had better scatter, for I am a servant of Jesus the Conqueror." Anthony knew when to submit to God and when to stand up to evil, and so should we.

Today's readings: Hebrews 5:1-10; Mark 2:18-22 "He himself is subject to weakness."

TUESDAY, JANUARY 18 WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY United in Christ

Today is the first day of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, which has been celebrated every year at this time since 1908. This year's theme is: "One in the Apostles' Teaching, Fellowship, Breaking of the Bread, and Prayer." Inspired by the spirit of unity in the early church, the theme calls us to remember all that we share as Christians. Not for theologians only, this week of prayer for unity can be expressed in many areas of our lives. We might use this week to pray for and work toward a more inclusive perspective. Consider this thought from Episcopalian priest and promoter of unity Richard Bower: "The call to simplicity and freedom for Christians is the call to move from achievement-oriented spirituality to a life centered on a shared vision of relatedness to people and things, a relatedness of gentleness, or compassion, of belonging to one another."

Today's readings: Hebrews 6:10-20; Mark 2:23-28 "God is not unjust; he will not overlook your work and the love that you showed for his sake."

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 19

Expand the borders of your compassion

For many Catholics it is not a priority to find common ground with other Christians and to remain in loving and respectful relationships with people of all faiths. That's regrettable because only mutual respect and knowledge of one another's religious values and traditions can get us beyond suspicion of those who are "not like us." Confronted by the needs of others, includ-

ing sinners, lepers, and those who were seriously ill, Jesus saw beyond the religious restrictions of his ancestors and brought healing, forgiveness, and empowerment at all times. To overlook human suffering for the sake of religious tradition is nothing less than a sad disease of the heart.

Today's readings: Hebrews 7:1-3, 15-17; Mark 3:1-6 "Is it lawful to do good or to do harm on the sabbath?"

THURSDAY, JANUARY 20

FEAST OF FABIAN, POPE, MARTYR; SEBASTIAN, MARTYR Two for one

As we continue to celebrate the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, we remember two saints—one a pope and one a soldier—who gave their lives because of their belief in Christ. Pope Fabian worked to bring together the many Christian communities in the early church of the third century during a period of great persecution by the Roman Empire. According to tradition, Sebastian was a soldier in the Roman empire who promoted the Christian faith even while working for an emperor who was persecuting Christians. Both Fabian and Sebastian give witness to the fact that laboring on behalf of the Christian faith community is worth our efforts and our lives. In what way can you support and encourage your faith community this day?

TODAY'S READINGS: Hebrews 7:25-8:6; Mark 3:7-12
"Jesus is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them."

FRIDAY, JANUARY 21

Stand and deliver when you hear your name called How many times have you heard the gospel reading in church begin with: "Jesus said to his disciples"? We imagine Christ talking to a group of his followers gathered around him, but he's talking to us, too. What is it to be a disciple? Jesus called his first disciples by name, called them to learn from him, and to go forth to preach and heal. That's what it means to be a disciple: to respond to Christ personally, hear his words and take them to heart, and spread the good news he brings in word and deed.

TODAY'S READINGS: Hebrews 8:6:13; Mark 3:13-19 "He . . . called to him those whom he wanted."

SATURDAY, JANUARY 22 FEAST OF VINCENT, DEACON, MARTYR Suffering and joy go hand in hand

The story of Saint Vincent (d. 304) is one of unflappable calm while being tortured—hard to believe, and even harder to emulate. Yet Vincent and others like him who suffered greatly during their lives have much to teach us. We learn acceptance: As Henri Nouwen noted in Can You Drink the Cup?, joy and sorrow are inextricably mixed, and one cannot be experienced without the other. We become more compassionate: As we tether our suffering to the cross of Christ, we bind ourselves more closely to the love of God and to our fellow human beings. And we discover ourselves: As that old sage Anonymous observed, "Adversity introduces one to oneself." The consolations of suffering are available to all; which will you accept?

TODAY'S READINGS: Hebrews 9:2-3, 11-14; Mark 3:20-21 "How much more will the blood of Christ... purify our conscience from dead works to worship the living God!"

IRA Charitable Gifts are BACK IN BUSINESS

Congress has recently re-authorized legislation that allows you to make charitable gifts from your IRA accounts during 2010 and 2011 without incurring income tax on the withdrawal.

The IRA Rollover provides you with an excellent opportunity to make a gift during your lifetime from an asset that would be subject to multiple levels of taxation if it remained in your taxable estate.

Because Congress acted so late in 2010 to pass this legislation, you can make a gift from your IRA until January 31, 2011 and still elect for it to count as a gift and as your minimum required distribution for 2010. To take advantage of this opportunity for tax year 2011, you must act by December 31, 2011.

To qualify:

- You must be age 70 ½ or older at the time of gift.
- Transfers must be made directly from a traditional IRA account by your plan provider to ST.
 CLETUS PARISH. Funds that are withdrawn by you and then contributed do NOT qualify.
 Gifts from 401k, 403b, SEP and other plans do not qualify.
- Your plan administrator may make the check out to ST. CLETUS PARISH and mail the check to you. But you must postmark the check to us by January 31, 2011 for this tax year, or December 31, 2011 for the 2011 tax year.
- Gifts must be outright. Distributions to donor-advised funds, certain supporting organizations, or life-income arrangements such as charitable remainder trusts and charitable gift annuities are not allowed.

Benefits - Qualified charitable distributions:

- Can total up to \$100,000;
- Are not included in your gross income for federal income tax purposes on your IRS Form 1040 (no charitable deduction is available, however);

Example: Suppose John has \$500,000 in an IRA and he also wants to contribute \$25,000 to ST. CLETUS PARISH. He can authorize the administrator of his IRA to transfer \$25,000 to the parish. The \$25,000 distribution to ST. CLETUS PARISH will not be subject to tax and will be counted toward his annual minimum required distribution.
