



# NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

# SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2011

In his book "Jesus of Nazareth," Pope Benedict XVI tells the fascinating story of a Jewish scholar, brought up with Christian friends and deeply respectful of Christianity, and above all, our Lord. The scholar's own book entitled "A Rabbi Talks with Jesus," tells how he pictures himself in Jesus' company, listening to him, watching him, accompanying him on the way to Jerusalem, and even engaging him in conversation. In one example, he joins the crowd that gathers around Jesus as he is about to deliver the Sermon on the Mount. In his imagination, the rabbi hears the very words that we have just heard in today's Gospel.

And what is the result? He is both attracted and troubled. He is attracted by the purity and loftiness of Jesus' teaching, yet at the same time he is troubled, for he sees that Jesus is claiming equality with God, and for such a pious Jew, that seems a blasphemous pretension. And so finally the rabbi walks away, but rather sadly. Still full of admiration for Jesus, he is unable to accept a claim that to him is incompatible with his Jewish faith. "I now realize," he writes, "only God can demand of me what Jesus is asking."

How right the rabbi was! In his Gospel, St. Matthew portrays Jesus as a new and greater Moses. It was on a mountain, Mount Sinai, that Moses delivered the Law of God. Now it's on a mountainside, in the Sermon on the Mount, that Jesus delivers the new law. When he says, "You have learned how it was said to our ancestors..." his audience knows at once that he is referring to Moses and to the Law that Moses had received from God on Sinai. And when he says, "But I say this to you..." they realize, at once and with some anxiety that he is claiming to be greater than Moses. In fact, he is putting himself on the same par with God; he is claiming to speak with God's authority; and he is daring to adjust God's Law. But it is an adjusting, not a revoking of the Law; as Jesus explains, he has come "not to abolish (the Law and the Prophets) but to complete them," to reveal their deepest implications, to point to the more demanding virtue that they entail.

So, according to the Law, murder is wrong: yes, says Jesus, but so too is anger, which so easily flares into violence; indeed, it is better not to come to worship if you harbor hatred for a sister or brother. According to the Law, adultery is wrong: yes, says Jesus, but so too is looking lustfully at another human being, for that is, at least in intent, a violation of the other. According to the Law, lying under oath is wrong: yes, says Jesus, but the fact that oaths are taken at all is a sign of lack of trust and openness; certainly, between Christians, a "Yes" or a "No" should be all that needs to be said.

Jesus insists that Christian morality means a great deal more than external respectability. The expression "depth psychology" refers to a psychological approach that examines the deepest parts of human experience. What Jesus presents is a "depth morality": a morality that affects us to the depths of our being.

Even in Old Testament times, the Jews did not understand the Law in simply legalistic terms. They knew that it was something more than rules and regulations; they believed that it was God's loving instruction, God's guidance of God's people. And so they would pray, as we did in the response to today's Psalm, "They are happy who follow God's law!"

Jesus himself tells us that in the end, the whole of the Law and the Prophets hangs on the double commandment of loving God and loving our neighbor. Moreover, it is in rising to this twofold love that we prove our love for him. "If you love me," he will tell his friends in John's Gospel, "keep my commandments." This is a hard love—a demanding love. It is true, as the rabbi realized, that only God can make the demands that Jesus makes on us. However, it is also true that Jesus not only makes demands of us, but, because Jesus is God, he also enables us to live out those demands in our daily lives.

# FEAST OF CYRIL AND METHODIUS, BISHOPS Brotherly love

Most Bible stories about brothers take a bad turn. Think Cain and Abel, Esau and Jacob, Joseph and, well, everybody. Other brothers fare better: Peter and Andrew or Zebedee's inseparable sons James and John. In the lives of the saints, siblings often turn out to be allies. Take these two ninth-century brothers of Thessalonica in Greece: Cyril was the brilliant one, Methodius the contemplative. That could have caused conflict, but it didn't. Cyril went to the missions in Slovenia, inventing the "Cyrillic" alphabet to assist his new flock in learning their faith. Methodius joined him later and carried on the work after Cyril's death. Send your sib or a spiritual brother or sister a Valentine's note!

Simple isn't always easy
Being "hard of heart" might be the biblical equivalent of having a thick skull. And most of the time the disciples, God bless them, are guilty as charged. At many points in the gospel accounts they misunderstand, misinterpret, or otherwise mismanage the good news Jesus is trying to communicate to them. They are therefore the perfect role models for all who have followed Jesus since then. The simplicity and clarity of notions such as "love one another" and "do unto others" leaves us looking for an escape clause-it can't be that simple, can it? Try to keep an open mind-and heart.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 6:5-8; 7:1-5, 10; Mark 8:14-21 "Do you still not perceive or understand? Are your hearts hardened?"

# Sometimes truth takes more than a moment

As any teacher can attest, not everyone comprehends a lesson on the first teaching: Instructions need to be repeated. The same holds true for Christian enlightenment: Some people have a sudden moment of clarity when they know Jesus as their savior; others need continual signs before they realize that through Jesus their lives have been restored. No matter how a person reaches

this moment of truth, conversion is the central message of Christianity. We must come to know God, feel the presence of the divine in our lives, and strive for holiness in which we give glory to God and are of service to others. For more on the Christian call to holiness, read or revisit the Vatican II document Lumen gentium.

# FEAST OF THE SEVEN HOLY FOUNDERS OF THE SERVITES, RELIGIOUS Get there with prayer

A good number of religious orders in the church started out as a small group of people looking for a simpler life of prayer and fellowship. Originally a group of seven successful cloth merchants from Florence, the founders of the Servite order started to meet in 1233 to pray and do penance. In time they left their wealthy lifestyles to reside in a dilapidated structure outside the city. Because of their holiness, though, people started coming to them for prayers and spiritual advice, so they moved again, this time to a hermitage on the top of a mountain. Eventually the community grew into an order that today serves around the world. Sometimes it's hard to keep a good thing secret. Make enough time for an inner life of prayer-and then live out that prayer in

# Know what's good for you

From our mothers saying eat your vegetables to our doctors telling us it's time to quit smoking, lose five pounds, or start exercising, taking good care of our physical health is considered a top priority throughout our lives. How does this attitude square with Jesus' teaching about saving and losing our life? Is it possible that some priorities should rank even higher than self-care? Many have concluded so and suffered and died for their faith. Whether we come to the same conclusion, let's recall all who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 11:1-9; Mark 8:34-9:1 "For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it."

# SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 19 FEAST OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY Up, up, and away

Here's a biblical pop quiz: Who was snatched up to heaven body and soul? If you guessed the Blessed Mother, you could be right. Other correct answers would be Enoch (see Genesis 5:24) or Elijah (2 Kings 2:11). Assumptions were a popular form of earthly departure in early literature outside of the Bible, too: Moses was said to be assumed, and an allusion to this tradition can be found in the Letter to Jude, verse 9 (though it's contradicted by the death-of-Moses passage in Deuteronomy 34). If you're looking for the quick route to heaven, "walk with God," like Enoch and


