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



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB ...

SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2011

Unfortunately, aggression is one of our instinctive reactions to difficult situations. However, Jesus' teaching in today's Gospel—part of the Sermon on the Mount—tells us that if we respond to aggression with more aggression, we risk creating an endless cycle of violence. Violence harms our unity, setting one person against another, and making cooperation impossible. Jesus teaches that God's love extends to everyone, and that includes people we might regard as our enemies and people we have excluded from our circle of friends. The Quakers have an expression, "that of God in all of us," which picks up on a theme in all of today's readings: God's Holy Spirit is in each person, and all are deserving of compassion and love.

Jesus left us with a code for life, a lifestyle that seems contrary to much of the thinking and action in mainstream society. It is a lifestyle he lived himself—where everybody is to be shown love and respect. This applies to people who abuse, take endlessly and give nothing in return, and make the lives of others a misery.

It is not only in the spheres of the military, business and politics that aggression and confrontation rear their heads—it is also in the run-of-the-mill of our daily lives. Just think about how aggressive driving can lead to road rage, and how disputes with neighbors can escalate into battles, unless we make a real effort to get along together. Retaliation or "payback" is a strong theme in the film world, and perhaps we are too tolerant of violence in the media. In how many of our homes do we allow violent video games to be played, despite evidence that regular playing risks creating insensitivity towards violence?

The Gospel calls us to reject the belief that aggression is often the best and easiest way to solve problems. Efforts to build bridges with people we don't like or who have harmed us might bring surprising results. If not, then we may take consolation that we are being faithful to the way of living that Jesus expects of his followers. And remember, God may be making something good out of our efforts in some way that we cannot see.

All this does not mean that God never takes sides. Through Jesus, it is clear that God sides with those who are poor, marginalized and oppressed, regardless of the labels we place on them. We are urged to move outside our comfort zones to engage with people we usually ignore and respond to God's call to be peacemakers. This will mean playing our part—however small—in moving the world away from the path of violence and retaliation, perhaps by supporting a Christian peace group. It will also mean tackling our own prejudices and dislikes towards those we come across in our daily lives.

WINTER WEATHER WOES

The recent winter weather provides a double challenge for our parish. When ice, snow, severe cold or winter illness prevents parishioners from attending weekend Masses, our Offertory suffers. This has a direct impact on the funds we have available each week to pay our bills and meet our payroll. The problem becomes even more complicated when we are faced with increased heating, salt, and snow removal bills.

Any extra help that you can give is greatly appreciated. If you do need to miss Mass due to illness or weather, please know how very grateful we are when you drop off your Offertory gift later in the week or include it with your following week's offering. This really helps us keep our budget balanced.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 20, 2011 SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME It can be hard to love

It's easy to love our neighbors when they are friends or family. It gets a little dicier, however,

when our neighbor is particularly unpleasant or has wronged us. How do we reach out in love without duplicity or patronization and also keep ourselves out of the line of fire? Jesus invites us to sidestep the temptation of repaying violence or unpleasantness with more of the same and instead to do the unexpected. He calls us to be creative and take a fresh look at the situation and respond with our best selves. Does this mean we become doormats for another's aggression or irrationality? No, but it does mean being willing to love, trusting that love can make a difference even if it is not returned in kind.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 21

FEAST OF PETER DAMIAN, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Every soul needs a room of its own

Peter Damian (1007-1072), doctor of reform and renewal, theologian, cardinal, and trusted counselor to popes, was above all a man of prayer. He preferred the hermit's life of austere fasts, detachment, and solitude, in which his cell became the "salon" where he conversed with God. In commenting on Peter Damian, Pope Benedict XVI said: Peter's love of monasticism "is also important for us today, even though we are not monks: To be able to be silent in ourselves to hear the voice of God; to seek a 'salon' where God speaks to us; to learn the Word of God in prayer and meditation is the path for life."

TODAY'S READINGS: Sirach 1:1-10; Mark 9:14-29 "All things can be done for the one who believes."

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 22 FEAST OF THE CHAIR OF PETER, APOSTLE Are you asking the tough questions?

For all his infamous failings Saint Peter was a leader who never stopped wrestling with hard questions. One of the earliest involved who could be a Christian: Was Christianity open to Gentiles? For a long time the answer was: No. Only Jews had been followers of Christ. But in Acts 10 Luke recounts how Peter's mind was opened to the fact that anyone could become a Christian. The rest, of course, is history. When communities of any kind stop asking their hard questions, they fall apart. What are the questions in your family, company, neighborhood, or parish? Are you willing to face them?

Today's readings: 1 Peter 5:1-5; Matthew 16:13-19 "Do not lord it over those in your charge, but be examples to the flock."

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 23 FEAST OF POLYCARP, BISHOP, MARTYR Can you believe it?

The second-century Martyrdom of Polycarp records the memorable story of the saint's death in the amphitheater of Smyrna, where he was bishop. For the ancient Romans anyone who didn't believe in the Roman gods or the divinity of the emperor was considered an atheist; if you didn't believe in their "real" gods, then you didn't believe in any god at all. The 86-year-old Polycarp was told to deny Christ, acknowledge the emperor, and say "away with the atheists"—that is, Christians—or be killed. Polycarp, in one of the better comebacks in the history of saintdom,

turned to the audience ravenous for his death and said: "Away with these atheists!" Today, many don't believe in anything at all. How can people of faith reach out to nonbelievers with some Good News?

TODAY'S READINGS: Sirach 4:11-19; Mark 9:38-40 "Whoever is not against us is for us."

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 24

Can you pass this examination?

If we took literally Jesus' directive to pluck out eyes and cut off limbs that cause us to sin, there would be many half-blind and hobbled Christians among us. Or would there? Jesus' exaggeration, "It is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into hell," is a bold underscoring of the fact that we dare not be so naive or blasé as to think sin trivial or beyond our ordinary, humdrum selves. Sin is real, both when it is obvious and ugly and when it is subtle and "isn't hurting anyone." A practical safeguard may be the old daily practice of examining one's conscience at bedtime. In this day where have I compromised and failed? What good have I done or left undone? Maybe being a Christian really does cost an arm and a leg.

Today's readings: Sirach 5:1-8; Mark 9:41-50
"Do not delay to turn back to the Lord, and do not postpone it from day to day."

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 25 Forgive those who fall short

In a 1976 interview that created quite a stir, then-President Jimmy Carter said: "Christ set some almost impossible standards for us." Falling into that category would be the gospel teaching that remarriage after divorce is equivalent to adultery. In an age where divorce and remarriage are quite common, how are we to understand this teaching? Perhaps by referencing a phrase President Carter used just before the above-quoted line: "Because I'm human" Because we are human, our promises—including those exchanged in matrimony—are not always fulfilled. Our imperfect lives are clear evidence of our humanity, just as God's infinite ability to forgive is clear evidence of God's divinity. Forgive someone who has fallen short—and start with yourself!

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 26 FEAST OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY Let the little children come to me

The piety of children can be moving to see. They kneel guile-lessly before holy images and participate in sacraments with great solemnity. They "bring flowers to the fairest" in May and linger by the manger in December. They ask probing questions about the man hurting on the cross before they have the language of faith to understand it. Mary of Nazareth showed this early sense of the sacred, too, at least in the extra-biblical book *The Gospel of the Birth of Mary*, where the young Mary had conversations with angels every day. Maybe we did as well, once. Have you talked to your guardian angel lately?





FOOLISHNESS

Sometimes the idea of repentance seems old-fashioned, naïve, even foolish. But if you're looking for real foolishness, you'll find it in today's readings.

We begin with Leviticus and the admonition, "Take no revenge and cherish no grudge" (Leviticus 19:18). We've heard that message before, of course, so we might forget how far it is from the so-called "practical realities of life." Saint Paul warns us about being practical, though. Whoever considers oneself wise had better "become a fool," because "the wisdom of this world is foolishness in the eyes of God" (1 Corinthians 3:18, 19).

This "foolishness" continues in the Gospel: "Offer no resistance to one who is evil" (Matthew 5:39). In fact, offer the other cheek when you've been slapped. Hand over your coat as well as your shirt. Be like God, who sends sunshine and rain on the bad as well as the good. "So be perfect," says Jesus, "just as your heavenly Father is perfect" (5:48).
