



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Among Italy's myriad attractions, the city of Florence ranks high. Just blink and you could easily miss a masterpiece in painting, architecture or sculpture. Florence came into its own in the 1400's when it prospered through the textile trade and banking and encouraged the intellectual and cultural rebirth known as the Renaissance.

An exhibition at the British Museum in London 2010 captured the strands of art and prosperity that belonged to the period by bringing together Italian Renaissance drawings by artists who worked under the patronage of the bankers and traders. The beauty and delicacy of these drawings stood in contrast to the rather materialistic emphasis given in a quotation from the journal of a Florentine banker in 1473, which stated, "It is generally said (and it is true) that earning and spending are among the greatest pleasures given to man in this world, and it is difficult to say which one gives greater pleasure."

The Florentine banker was not the first—and obviously not the last—to put so much importance on the pleasures of earning and spending. When Jesus says in today's Gospel, "You cannot be the slave both of God and of money," he goes to the heart of the problem. Earning and spending are necessary, and prosperity in itself is good, but our human condition is such that we can so easily allow ourselves to be enslaved by materialism. When this happens, then money, possessions and the power that goes with them can become "false gods," and this in turn can affect our ways of thinking and behaving. We begin to think only of ourselves and to live only for ourselves. "Community" becomes a "non-word."

Jesus redirects our vision. "Look at the birds in the sky," he says. "They do not sow or reap or gather into barns," and, of course, they do not earn or spend, but neither are they idle. On the contrary, they are always very busy, either gathering twigs or wool for their nests, or laying eggs, or collecting food for their young and feeding them. However, no matter how busy they are and no matter what struggles they have against the elements, Jesus tells us that "not one falls to the ground without your Father knowing." Our heavenly Father cares for them and feeds them.

Jesus also redirects our minds. "Think of the flowers growing in the fields," he says. The beauty of the smallest flower far exceeds the finest garment that human hands can make. Yet, for all their beauty, the flowers last but a short time. The message is similar. If we build our lives on what is here today and gone tomorrow, we shall know only disappointment. But if our lives are given to God, then God will take care of our needs, and we shall find our treasure in heaven.

The Italian Renaissance artists turned their eyes to the birds and the flowers, and so the beauty of the natural world was reflected in their drawings. In the British Museum exhibition there were studies of a cheetah, a partridge, and a princely-looking cockerel. Underpinning every drawing was a common faith in God's love and care for creation, but one series of drawings, in particular, exemplified that faith. These drawings were by Leonardo de Vinci, entitled "STUDIES OF THE INFANT CHRIST AND A CAT" and were impressions of how the infant Jesus would have played with a cat. Leonardo could not have drawn these pictures without first witnessing the special and loving relationship that can take place between children and animals. The cat's sleekness of line and elegance mingle with the child's wonder until the child finally embraces the cat in joy. In a remarkable way it shows the love of God in Christ for every creature, and through its pure happiness, this love can dispel sorrow or anxiety from troubled hearts and minds.

Most of us are like Martha in Luke's Gospel, who was told by the Lord that she worried and fretted about so many things. All that was necessary, he said, was to listen to the word of God. Worry and anxiety about material things can deafen us to God's word; faith and trust enable us to hear the Lord speak to us: "Surely life means more than food, and the body more than clothing!" "Your heavenly Father knows you need them all." If material things are enslaving us, or if we are struggling to make ends meet, may the Lord's words enlighten us.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 27, 2011 EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Avoid a costly error

Prosperity theology, sometimes called the prosperity gospel, is the notion that believers who

confess their faith and are generous with tithes and offerings will in turn be rewarded by God with material riches. Most popular in Pentecostal traditions, it can be heard on some or another television station every hour of the day and night (often while a toll-free number and website address flash on the screen). Be very wary of any teaching that disguises the love of riches behind the veil of such teachings. Jesus warned us that we can only serve one master. Ask yourself which it will be-the love of money or the love of God-around which you will center your life.

Today's readings: Isaiah 49:14-15; 1 Corinthians 4:1-5; Matthew 6:24-34

"No one can serve two masters . . . You cannot serve God and wealth."

Monday, February 28

A user's guide to the Ten Commandments "The Ten Commandments are not multiple choice," a church sign stated. Admittedly we sometimes do pick and choose among them, nonchalantly passing over ones that hit too close to home. But most of the time it may be that we just haven't thought through how they apply to our own lived experience. Here's one way to rediscover the Commandments and be more conscious of living them. Create a chart with four columns. In the first, list the Ten Commandments. In the second, write something from Jesus' life and teaching that relates directly or indirectly to that Commandment. In the third, prayerfully write your own paraphrase of the Commandment. In the fourth, list specific ways that you can incorporate the spirit of the Commandment into your daily life.

Today's readings: Sirach 17:20-24; Mark 10:17-27 "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

TUESDAY, MARCH 1

Pay attention to the fine print

The word everyman (gender specific as it may be) has come to mean an ordinary person or a representative of us all. Saint Peter seems to hold such a position. He's the apostle who blurts out what most of us are thinking but are too polite or ashamed to say. Peter complains, as Jesus talks of coming rewards, "Look, we have left everything and followed you." Jesus' reply is directed toward us as much as to Peter, when we want to know what we've gotten ourselves into. Jesus promises a return, even in this life, of a "hundredfold" of what we have given up-and then adds "with persecutions." Jesus is up-front about both the high cost of being a disciple and the satisfaction of doing in our daily life what he would have done.

Today's readings: Sirach 35:1-12; Mark 10:28-31 "To keep from wickedness is pleasing to the Lord, and to forsake unrighteousness is an atonement."

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 2

Follow the leader

When you hear or read a gospel story it can be easy to overlook the small but important clues the writers are giving you. As a college scripture professor once said, "Every word in the gospels is there for a reason." For example, in Mark's account of Jesus

on the road to Jerusalem, when Christ was trying to make clear just what following him will involve for his apostles, we hear that Jesus "was walking ahead of them"; later he "called them" together to set the record straight. That Jesus was in front of the group doesn't only mean the apostles were keeping a respectful distance; it indicates rather that he is the one to follow. His calling together of his disciples says he's calling you, too to follow him wherever he may lead you.

Today's readings: Sirach 36:1, 4-5a, 10-17; Mark 10:32-45 "The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized."

THURSDAY, MARCH 3 FEAST OF KATHARINE DREXEL, VIRGIN Hold nothing back

Saint Katharine Drexel (1858-1955) could serve as a role model for wealthy philanthropists such as Bill Gates and Warren Buffet today who have pledged to give away half their fortunes. Drexel came from a wealthy family who had instilled in her the idea that wealth is simply loaned to us and should be put in the service of others. But when she petitioned Pope Leo XIII for missionaries to staff the American Indian missions she was financing as a layperson, he suggested she become a missionary herself. And she did, dedicating not only her inheritance but her very life in service to Native Americans and African Americans. Time for us to pony up.

Today's readings: Sirach 42:15-25; Mark 10:46-52 "Go; your faith has made you well."

FRIDAY, MARCH 4 WORLD DAY OF PRAYER You have much to offer

The World Day of Prayer (WDP, www.worlddayofprayer.net) is a worldwide movement organized by Christian women who observe a common day of prayer each year on the first Friday in March. This year's theme comes from WDP women in Chile and asks, "How many loaves have you?" In other words, What are your gifts? What can you share? and With whom? These are important and timely questions to ponder, especially because these days many of us are fixated on what we don't have, what we wish we had, or what we used to have. It is good to be reminded that as long as we are still breathing, we have a loaf-and probably many loaves-to share.



SATURDAY, MARCH 5 FEAST OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY Why do you ask?

Jesus did not suffer fools gladly, even when they happened to be the most powerful members of the religious establishment—the chief priests, scribes, and elders. It is clear that their sly questioning was based not on a genuine desire to learn but rather on a wish to cleverly entrap Jesus with a trick question. Jesus turns the tables on them on more than one occasion, and these gospel stories serve as cautionary tales to all of us never to confuse cleverness with genuine truth-seeking. The truth will set us free. The rest is game-playing.

Today's readings: Sirach 51:12c-20; Mark 11:27-33 "By what authority are you doing these things?"

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

No wonder the Eastern Rite's "Lenten Announcement" sounds surprising: "Let us receive with joy, O faithful people, the divinely inspired announcement of Lent! The Lenten Spring shines forth! Begin the fast with joy! Let us fast from passions as well as food, taking pleasure in the good works of the Spirit, and accomplishing them in love!" Saint John Chrysostom, whose feast is September 13, elaborates: "Do you fast? Give proof by your works. If you see a poor person, take pity. An enemy, be reconciled. A friend gaining honor, don't be jealous." A positive approach! May the saints help us keep such a Lent!


