



Former U.S. Poet Laureate Stanley Kunitz died at age 100, soon after publishing *The Wild Braid: A Poet Reflects on a Century in the Garden*. In it Kunitz describes falling in love with language as a child. Finding new words in a family dictionary, he learned meanings but loved even their sounds. "I would go out into the woods behind our house and shout my latest discovery and listen to the words reverberate. I considered it my duty to give my new words to the elements, to scatter them." Do we forget the sheer power of our own words that carry not only meaning but are formed by our very breath, our very selves? The words we "shout" into the world, which we have a duty to shout, are incarnations of our own kindness, joy, compassion, and forgiveness.

Therefore the servant of God ought always to be in good spirits." Being that kind of saint starts with a smile.

FEAST OF AUGUSTINE OF CANTERBURY, BISHOP Canterbury tales

Writing later on the success of his efforts, Pope Gregory the Great said he had sent Augustine "to the ends of the earth." Today you can fly from Rome to London in a couple of hours. Take the handoff

While Paul felt it necessary to defend his status as an apostle from time to time, there's no doubt he was largely responsible for bringing the gospel of Jesus out of its Jerusalem center and spreading it around the Mediterranean area, from which it eventually spread to the whole world, as Christ had intended it to do. The passing along of the Good News of Jesus and the shape the church gives it have been the responsibility of Christians from the first days. They still are today.

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

In Europe during the Middle Ages, the Church was at the center of life and at the center of every town. At the center of almost any city with medieval roots today, you still find the cathedral. When it was first built, the local cathedral would have been the most important and the most ostentatious building in the area. There was a religious point behind making these buildings so grand. Their beauty was intended to make the experience of going into the building like the experience of entering heaven. Stained glass gave the light inside an otherworldly quality; elaborate carvings told stories from the Bible and the lives of the saints; and the roofs and towers reached towards heaven in their dizzying height.

During the Middle Ages, the building of cathedrals was the highest form of art. Highly skilled masons created these great works of art on behalf of their bosses: the bishops and wealthy donors of the area. The local cathedral became a point of pride for the community, and soon people began to vie with each other to create the highest cathedral yet. It became a race, with patrons demanding that their cathedral be built higher than the last. When French bishop Guillaume de Grez commanded his mason, Bernard de Soissons, to add an extra sixteen feet to the height of the choir at his cathedral in Beauvais, the mason did as he was ordered. The new roof beat all the local rivals for height, but sadly the mason and his patron had not worked out their math well. In the year 1284 high winds hit the cathedral, and most of the building collapsed. Today some of the original cathedral still stands, but it remains unstable, held together with ugly girders. The pride and folly of Beauvais stood as a warning to others, and the race for ever-higher church buildings stopped.

All of today's readings have been about building the Church. In the first reading, from the Acts of the Apostles, we hear how the early Church began to organize itself by delegating jobs to different people. In our second reading from St. Peter's first letter, the man that Jesus called his rock and instructed to be the foundations of the new Church tells us all that Jesus is the cornerstone of this new Church. Jesus is the stone around which the whole Church is aligned and made strong. We, too, are given important roles. We are all living stones in this Church of Christ. And our Gospel reading today tells us that Christ is the way to God and that belief in him will enable Jesus' followers to do great things.

Today's Gospel reading comes from the part of St. John's Gospel that contains the teaching Jesus gave to his disciples during the Last Supper. It might seem strange to have a reading today, a few weeks after Easter, with words Jesus spoke on Holy Thursday. But the theme of the reading is about what will happen when Jesus leaves his disciples, and so it makes sense to read it in this time of the Church's year between Easter and the celebration of Christ's ascension into heaven.

Today's Gospel is not overtly about building the Church. But the message to the disciples is about the work they can achieve once Jesus has left them. And that work, we know, is the foundation of the Christian Church. Jesus tells his disciples that he is going to the Father, but that through their faith in him they will be able to perform even greater works than Jesus himself.

By describing himself in today's Gospel as "the Way, the Truth, and the Life," Jesus shows his disciples how to achieve these great things. St. Peter clearly took the message on board, as we heard in his letter today. And the message is the same for us. By keeping Jesus as the center of our lives and building everything around our faith, we, too, can build on Christ and become those living stones St. Peter encourages us to become.

If the French bishop had put Christ at the forefront of his building plans rather than his own foolish pride, his cathedral might have become the great beauty he had envisioned. Think what a beautiful Church this would be if all those who say they are Christians really followed Christ in their hearts and minds.

Christ our Light!

5th Sunday of Easter – May 22, 2011

Perhaps you have been able to see the movie *Of Gods and Men*. Amazing movie! This accurate account portrays several Trappist monks in a monastery in Algiers in the late 1990s. Seven of the monks are murdered by Algerian radicals, apparently with the cooperation of the government. The movie revolves around the life of these men, including their public prayer life. This prayer remains the source and summit of their life which includes providing medical necessities and food for their Muslim neighbors. The viewer is pulled into their life and witnesses how worship empowers individuals to live discipleship.

Encountering Christ has many sources: the holiness of others, the poor, personal prayer. Worship by a community of disciples exposes the twofold reason for worship – to praise God and to empower people to live in Truth and Spirit. Weekly worship places one in a space other than our own agendas, egos and immediate concerns of daily living and family challenges.

Years ago a woman attended Mass but did not go to Communion. So pleasant after Mass, I wondered about her reasons. One Sunday I asked. Her life was full of complicated relationships and behavior. She continued to come to Mass and thirst for the Eucharist. Reconciliation was the necessary antidote. We made an appointment; she wanted some time. Bottom line – she had come to Mass weeks before and the community – no one in particular – was so welcoming. She felt the call to enter into her complicated life with honesty and seek healing. Worship done well invites the stranger and the alienated closer to Him! Worship is about the many individuals gathered and about us gathered as a community. The Risen Lord encounters us when we genuinely – together – worship in His name.

Accept that He is Risen for you! Pray: Christ, be our light!

The Worshiping Assembly at Mass



The celebration of Mass is a corporate act, an act of the whole assembly gathered for worship. All the particular ministries serve this corporate function (GIRM, no. 27). In the Mass, the Church is joined to the action of Christ, the high point both of the action by which God sanctifies the world in Christ and of the worship that the human race offers to the Father, adoring him through Christ, the Son of God, in the Holy Spirit (no. 16). We are joined to this divine action through baptism, which incorporates us into the risen Christ. This action, which lies at the center of the whole Christian life (no. 16) is not initiated by us but by God acting in and through the Church as the body of the risen Christ. It becomes our action only to the extent that

we give ourselves to this mystery of redemptive worship. The liturgy is designed to bring about in all those who make up the worshiping assembly a participation of the faithful both in body and mind, a participation burning with faithful, hope, and charity (no. 18). To the extent that we are able to participate in this way, the work of redemption becomes personally effective for each of us. By such participation, the General Instruction says, we make the actions and prayers of the liturgy our own; we enter more fully into our personal communion with Christ's redeeming act and perfect worship (see no. 54, 55, etc.).

In the celebration of Mass the faithful are a holy people, a chosen people, a royal priesthood: they give thanks to God and offer the Victim not only through the hands of the priest but also together with him and learn to offer themselves. They should endeavor to make this clear by their deep sense of reverence for God and their charity toward brothers and sisters who share with them in the celebration (no. 95). They should become one body, whether by hearing the word of God, or joining in prayers and liturgical song, or above all by offering the sacrifice together and sharing together in the Lord's table (no. 96).

Because the whole liturgy is a corporate act of the gathered assembly (GIRM no. 34; Catechism of the Catholic Church no. 1144), there are certain parts of the Mass that are to be done by the whole assembly, the congregation of the faithful and all the ministers, in order to express the corporate nature of this act. Through these actions, the entire congregation of the faithful joins itself to Christ in acknowledging the great things that God has done and in offering the sacrifice (no. 78). These acts include:

- Listening with reverence to the readings of God's word (GIRM no. 29);
- Engaging in the dialogue of prayer through acclamations, greetings, and responses to spoken and sung prayers (no. 34-37) in a tone suitable to the text (no. 38);
- Joining in an action through common postures and gestures (no. 42);
- Participating in communal silence (no. 45);
- · Because of their baptismal dignity, letting themselves be included in the offering symbolized

- by incensation (no. 75);
- Participating in the greeting of peace as a sign of ecclesial communion and love for each other (no. 82);
- Participating in specific spoken prayers and other texts, namely:
- the formula of general confession during the penitential rite (no. 51);
- the profession of faith (no. 67-68);
- the general intercessions (no. 69);
- the Lord's Prayer (no. 81);
- the prayer of humility before sacramental communion (no. 84);
- Participating in the offering during the Eucharistic Prayer, which is spoken or chanted by the priest, but in which all should join as the Church to offer the "spotless Victim to the Father in the Holy Spirit" and "offer themselves and so day by day to surrender themselves, through Christ the Mediator, to an ever more complete union with God and with each other, so that at last God may be all in all" (no. 79f);
- Participating in liturgical song, because singing is a way of expressing both the corporate nature of the act of worship and the intense union to be achieved between God and the Church in Christ through the Holy Spirit. It is a union so intense and total that it is described as a union between lovers whose nature is best expressed vocally in song (no. 39). Singing is also an act which unifies and focuses the individual (no. 39), thus encouraging that "participation in body and spirit that is conscious, active, full, and motivated by faith, hope, and charity" (no. 18). These songs and acclamations are normally to be sung, in whole or in part, by all the participants:
- opening liturgical song (no. 48);
- Kyrie (no. 52);
- Gloria (no. 53);
- Responsorial psalm (no. 61);
- Gospel acclamation (no. 62);
- Song at the preparation of gifts (no. 74);
- Sanctus, memorial acclamation, and Amen (no. 79, 151);
- The Lord's Prayer (no. 81);
- Lamb of God (no. 83);
- the optional psalm, canticle of praise, or hymn after communion (no. 88).

For those who are properly disposed (no. 80), full, active, and conscious participation is expressed in partaking in the Holy Communion of the Lord, receiving in the one bread consecrated at this Mass the Lord's body and blood, in the same way that the apostles received them from Christ's own hands (no. 72.3).



FOOD PANTRY UPDATE!

We thank them for bringing their CSJ mission of service and unity and their cheerful helping hands to our volunteers and client families. This annual Nazareth tradition saw faculty, staff, members of the Congregation of Saint Joseph and senior students travel to 14 different sites throughout the area to serve those struggling with hard times. Thank you, also to those who take part in our monthly volunteer night at the Greater Chicago Food Depository. Each hour donated "buys" about 62 lbs of food from the depository for our pantry! To date we have been able to purchase the supplementary food we need from the depository with the credits earned from these volunteer sessions and other volunteer hours served by various parishioners. Memorial Day Poppies will be sold May 26, 27, and 28 at various locations throughout La Grange, La Grange Park, Countryside, and Hodgkins by veterans and volunteer members of the Robert E Coulter, Jr, American Legion and Auxiliary in La Grange. American Legion volunteers will accept donations in exchange for a memorial poppy, and all money raised directly supports programs for hospitalized veterans and their families. The La Grange American Legion donated last year's Poppy Days proceeds to Hines Veterans Affairs Hospital and Fisher House, which provides free temporary housing to families of veterans receiving treatment at Hines.
