

Peter and Paul were made saints by God's grace, just as you and I

But how can we imitate such perfection? Humanity is anything but immaculate. Our limitations frequently point to our distance from divine perfection. What Mary had, though, is purity of heart: She always sought to understand, open herself to, and follow God's will for her. Her intention was to listen for God's intentions. While we may not be able to achieve Mary's perfection in responding to the promptings of God, we can imitate her willingness to seek God's desires for ourselves.

Parish Pioneers Invited to Share Memories of Early Days at St. Cletus

FORMER SEABEE HELPED ST. CLETUS THROUGH THE YEARS

Long-time parishioner Peter Ference's favorite war story is probably memories from his "Honor Flight" journey with other World War II and Korean War veterans from Midway Airport to Washington DC for a one-day tour of the memorials honoring servicemen and women.

Pete is retired now, living in the house in La Grange that he and his wife, Frances, moved into in 1953. They were married in 1948 and Frances passed away in 2006. During his years at St. Cletus, Peter was an usher, a "counter," a member of Leisure Loafers, and the Holy Name Society in addition to being a member of the Maintenance Committee. He is also an active member of the local American Legion Post.

Pete was an active Maintenance Committee helper and recalled many times he repaired the old pews that had been moved to the new church in 1962 from the original church in Morrissey Hall. One time he crawled under a pew and was attaching a wayward kneeler when a lady came into the church. Fran Callaghan was talking to Pete, who was out of sight, and the woman thought Fran was praying aloud.

Pete likes to remind Fr. Charles Gallagher that he is a few months younger than him. Fr. Gallagher was pastor at St. Cletus from 1971 until 1990. Fr. Gallagher led two tour groups from St. Cletus to the Holy Land, and Pete recalls the pastor's surprise when the group persuaded the hotel's chef to bake a birthday cake for Fr. Gallagher. "The kids at school had made a giant birthday card for Fr. Gallagher, and a couple named Bruno and Angie brought it all the way to the Middle East as a surprise celebration," Pete said.

In more recent times, Pete, Fran Callaghan and Tom McAtee have been invited to local schools to tell history students about World War II in the Pacific as they experienced it. Pete was with the Seabees, the Navy's construction guys who operated heavy equipment as they rebuilt Japanese air strips on the Solomon Islands so that American planes could use the captured fields. The Seabees were trained by both the Navy and Marines so they could defend themselves.

Frances and Peter have three sons: all graduated from St. Cletus School, LT, and on to college. One son lives in La Grange, another in a far western suburb, and the third on the West Coast.

hown below is a picture of the sanctuary as it was originally. The louvers behind the screen reverse red to green and white to purple for the liturgical seasons. The symbols of the Passion occupy the sections furthest from the Crucifix. The symbols of the Resurrection are on either side of the Cross, teaching us that it is the Resurrection which gives meaning to Christ's Passion, and that our sufferings on earth cannot begin to compare with our joy in heaven. The symbols were removed in the late 70s or early 80s. Stained glass windows were added in 2 installments, one side of the church at a time. The wooden pulpit shown was replaced by the current marble on fashioned from pieces of the altar rail when it came down after Vatican II.


