



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

FOURTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2011

Are we saints, or are we sinners? It would seem that we are both at the same time. The good, the bad, and the ugly are all mixed together inside us, and a civil war is often raging in our soul. Saint Paul speaks about this struggle very eloquently when writing to the Romans. "I cannot understand my own behavior," he tells them. "I fail to carry out the things I want to do, and I find myself doing the very things I hate." This part of his nature Paul calls his "unspiritual self." His inmost self—his true self—he describes as his "spiritual self." The human struggle is common to us all. But what will the outcome be? Is it a matter of chance, or is it a matter of choice?

Saint Paul says it is a matter of choice—God's choice of us, and in response, our choice of God. The God who made us is also the God who will set us free. The God who breathed new life into the dead body of Jesus in his resurrection will also breathe spiritual life into us to redeem us from the works of death. So there is no need, no absolute compulsion for us to be wicked or to do the deeds of darkness.

Yet, we cannot be glib or blasé about our lives. We know from experience how alluring evil can be. The story of the serpent in the Garden of Eden is a very seductive image and one of clear reality. Our weakness remains. Our inclination toward selfish and sinful ways does not go away.

In a previous age, the Church was very conscious of this sinfulness of ours and through preaching and the practice of confession brought home to us our need of humility and help. The prayer "I confess" was never off our lips. The classical teaching concerning the "Seven Deadly Sins" remains a powerful warning to us of how our lives can be destroyed by gluttony, sloth, lust, pride, anger, envy, and covetousness.

These sins are the "misdeeds of the body" that Paul speaks about today. Allowing our lives to be ruled by these forces will destroy us. They are deadly to our spiritual lives. The beginning of such self destruction is, perhaps, the sin of pride: that independent spirit that refuses to listen or to learn; that know-all attitude to life that despises others and thinks so highly of one's self.

It was pride that prevented so many people from accepting Jesus when they met him. The Scribes and the Pharisees were the great culprits. By contrast, the humble fishermen of Galilee proved to be wise by their acceptance. Yes, the learned and the clever missed their opportunity. It was "mere children" who really understood the mysteries of life.

Understanding life and living it well will come to us if we learn humility of heart. The journey of life will teach us many things if we are open to what each day brings. Each day is filled with images to guide us such as the image of the humble Messiah, who teaches us the way of peace. He is a model for us and our lives.

As we continue to celebrate our 60th Anniversary as a parish in the Archdiocese of Chicago, we pause to give thanks and reflect on our Nation's birth. May this 4th of July usher in for all in our country a renewed commitment to peace and prosperity. May we never forget the great sacrifices that our ancestors made over the course of our history in helping us to become "One Nation under God, Undivided, with Freedom and Justice for All." We especially remember all the men and women who sacrificed their time, talents, and often their lives for the protection of our freedoms through their military service to our nation. We are forever grateful for each of these rights and freedoms we hold dear and commit ourselves to advocates for and defender of them to all who seek peace and justice in our world.

Have a wonderful weekend of celebration this 4^{th} of July. On behalf of Fr. Gallagher, Fr. Anglim, Fr. Rodriguez, Fr. Baker, and me, we all wish you God's Blessings and Peace.

The rest is easy

We Americans are proud of our work ethic—perhaps too proud. We tend to value our work and busy-ness so much that we forget how to be still enough to hear God's quiet voice. We need leisure—not frenetic vacationing or compulsive recreational activities but simple rest when we can unplug and *think*. Jesus says, "I will give you rest." We may think he means *eternal* rest, but we don't have to wait until we're dead to enjoy it! We need to develop a pattern to "come away and rest awhile." Why not today? Why not every Sunday? The media is full of "new" and flashy ways to avoid stress, but Jesus' invitation is a simple, standing one: "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest."

Have a little faith

Some people seem to be born with the gift of deep faith. They appear to have an intuitive grasp of the spiritual side of life and to know God is always with them. The rest of us must endure long periods of doubt and uncertainty that are only occasionally interrupted by brief moments of spiritual clarity. Whether our assessment of other people's faith is accurate, our time might be better spent considering the state of our own. We could begin by asking, "Where am I on the continuum between faith and doubt?" Is it possible that the Lord is with you and you don't know it? Can you ask God to help you to know it?

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 28:10-22a; Matthew 9:18-26 (383) "Truly, the Lord is in this spot, although I did not know it!"

TUESDAY, JULY 5

FEAST OF ANTHONY MARY ZACCARIA, PRIEST

Forty hours to a renewed spirit

One of the more fervent prayer practices in Catholic tradition is the Forty Hours' Devotion, and Saint Anthony Mary Zaccaria (1503-1539) was a major promoter of it. The devotion involves continuous (or near continuous) prayer for 40 hours before the Blessed Sacrament, which is exposed on the altar. The devotion arose during the Counter-Reformation, a time of church renewal and reform in response to the criticisms of those involved in the Protestant Reformation. If your spiritual life could use some reform and renewal, try participating in a "40 Hours."

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 32:23-33; Matthew 9:32-38 (384) "Jacob said, 'I will not let you go until you bless me.'"

WEDNESDAY, JULY 6

Thy kingdom come

More than anything else, Jesus has one basic message: The kingdom of God is at hand. He proclaimed it had begun and was on its way to fulfillment. In it is everything he was, taught, did, and wants us to learn and do: Love God and one another wholeheartedly, especially those who are deprived in some way. Forgive as God has forgiven you. Be open to a new and different way of seeing the world and acting, one that brings everyone together in God. Are you ready to enter the Kingdom?

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 41:55-57; 42:5-7a, 17-24a; Matthew 10:1-7 (385)

"As you go, make this proclamation: 'The Kingdom of heaven is at hand.'"

THURSDAY, JULY 7

Love is bigger than hurt

Joseph had it tough as the second youngest in a family of 12 brothers. Picked on and hated because he was his dad Jacob's favorite, Joseph ended up sold into slavery by his brothers. After many years of separation from his family, he again meets his brothers, only this time the tables are turned: Joseph is in a position of power, and his brothers are the vulnerable ones. It wouldn't have taken much for Joseph to tap back into those feelings of hurt, betrayal, and rage and respond measure for measure. But he went beyond that, back to the sibling love he so cherished, and reacted with not only kindness but an outpouring of generosity. We, too, have that capacity and power for a love that is bigger than hurt.

Get smart, but keep it simple

Sometimes it may seem that the gospel's call to simplicity doesn't stand a chance. Popular spiritual writer Henri Nouwen expressed this dilemma well: "So often the problems of the world seem so complex and intricate that your word strikes me as embarrassingly simple," he wrote in a prayer that continued, "but you, O Lord, said, 'Be clever as serpents and innocent as doves.' Let me retain innocence and simplicity in the midst of this complex world." That's a good prayer for all of us as we try to balance spiritual life and daily life.

Some say that the Roman Catholic Church in China is actually two churches: one faithful to Rome and the other beholden to the state. The reality is much more complex, though there have been some deep divisions. Many in China felt that the timing of the canonizations in 2000 of the 150 martyrs the church remembers today highlighted China's colonial past—a very sensitive subject for the Chinese people. A year later Pope John Paul II, addressing a group of Chinese and Western scholars in Rome, asked forgiveness for the past failings on the part of Christian missionaries in China.
