



## NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

### SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"I don't feel that you have understood me." These words capture the difficulty we have in communicating to one another. At times it can be hard to express our true feelings and experiences to another person, sometimes even to ourselves. James and Mary had been experiencing difficulties in their marriage. They did not seem to understand one another any more. Little irritations had begun to become major stumbling blocks in their relationship. Jane and her daughter were no longer able to talk to one another. They just didn't seem to understand each other any more. Maybe a long heart-to-heart talk would sort it out. At times like this, people turn to a counselor or seek advice from someone experienced in communication. If communicating with one another can be difficult, how easy is it to communicate with God? John says his prayers but sometimes he feels that they are only words and do not seem to express his deepest self.

St. Paul is aware of the difficulty of prayer, and the struggle of putting into words the deepest desires of the heart. However, this is not a cause of despair for St. Paul; rather it is an opportunity to trust in God. The Spirit comes to help us in our weakness. Even when we think our prayer is inadequate and the words are not properly expressed, God knows what we want and grace perfects our human attempts. When the words are right, we gain insight into our need; perhaps this is more for our benefit than God's.

Growth in the spiritual life is like learning a new language. Prayer changes with age and maturity. As children, we learned prayers like the Our Father and Hail Mary. These words can become the starting point for a lifetime of reflection and can sum up all the petitions of prayer.

When we pray "Our Father," we begin by recognizing that we are one human family, brothers and sisters in Christ who can address a common Father. Yet we each have a different experience associated with the word father. Different meanings follow. Hopefully, many have experienced a loving relationship with their father. Some have not been so fortunate and a few perhaps experienced violence or neglect from a father-figure. The scriptures remind us that each person's understanding of father is very limited. God the Father in the scriptures is revealed as one like a shepherd who cares for and seeks out any lost sheep, even if that is just one in a hundred. The father is like an elderly man who runs out to welcome home his son who had left home and went off to see the world, fell upon hard times, spent all his money, and returned home penniless. There is no word of recrimination, "I knew this would happen to you, you should have listened to me," but rather his words announce that there will be a party.

Sometimes it is difficult to articulate our deepest needs and the needs of others. God asks only that we do our best and recognize our dependence. Begin by praying in whatever way you want, God understands. Honesty is always important. We might be afraid to tell God that we are angry or hurt. Only when we do this are we honest in prayer. By naming these feelings before God, we grow in the ability to pray.

God desires that each person will find his or her way back to the Father. God is waiting to embrace each person. It is never too late to repent. Jesus promised everlasting life to the repentant thief who asked for mercy; "Today you will be with me in paradise." This promise is there for each person. Jesus warns against the premature judgment of others and advises that judgment should be left to God. This scene does not sit easily in contemporary society. While it may be necessary to send some people to prison as a result of crime, the gospel is a reminder that one of the aims of the criminal justice system is rehabilitation by repentance and conversion. Christians are reminded of this fact in the words of the "Our Father": forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us." This is difficult; we pray for the capacity to do so.

### SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

### Who's in charge here?

"We believe in God... the Almighty," we pray at Mass every Sunday: We believe God to be all-powerful—to think anything less would mean God isn't God. If we look at the world around us, though, we see not only bad things happening to good people but bad things happening to just about everyone. Where is the Almighty in all that? The church's answer has always been that "God grants his creatures . . . the dignity of acting on their own," as the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* says (no. 306). That dignity can go two ways: either working with God to help bring about the reign of God, or not. How can you show your cooperation?

### FEAST OF CAMILLUS DE LELLIS, PRIEST

#### Wounded healers welcome

Poverty, chastity, obedience: These are the typical vows of those in religious communities. When Saint Camillus founded his community he added a fourth: care for the sick. A soldier addicted to gambling in the 16th century, Camillus literally lost his shirt in Naples before he was compelled to turn his life around. Suffering lifelong infirmities, he was attracted to nursing and instituted reforms in health care, emphasizing fresh air, cleanliness, and diet. Camillus also recommended isolating those with contagious diseases and inaugurated the first "military ambulance" by sending his brothers along with soldiers to war. Solidarity with the sick remains a corporal work of mercy.

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 14:5-18; Matthew 12:38-42 (395) "You will see the victory the Lord will win for you today."

### TUESDAY, JULY 19

### All for one and one for all

One of the reasons Jesus was such a compelling person was his certainty that we all come from the same source. He never concerned himself with outward appearances or even blood relationships, but rather with the spiritual reality that we are one—with God and Jesus and therefore always worthy of kindness, respect, and forgiveness. In every single interaction, whether with men or women, saints or sinners, Jesus demonstrated this truth. Put on a new set of lenses today, the kind that confirm we are members of the Body of Christ. What does the world look like? How must you be different?

### WEDNESDAY, JULY 20

### FEAST OF APOLLINARIS, BISHOP, MARTYR

### A perfect storm

Saint Apollinaris, a second-century bishop in Asia Minor, once wrote a letter to the Roman emperor Marcus Aurelius in defense of Christianity in general and his own flock in particular. In petitioning the emperor, Apollinaris did not hesitate to remind him of a recent event. While on a military campaign against a Germanic tribe, Aurelius' army was in danger of dying of thirst—until one of his legions, the 12th, which was made up mostly of Christians, fell to its knees and literally prayed for rain. The sudden storm that followed saved the army and allowed them to defeat the Germans. A grateful Aurelius gave these men the name "Thundering Legion" and eased up on his persecution of Christians. How can you put your life in the hands of God today?

# FEAST OF LAWRENCE OF BRINDISI, PRIEST, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Faith takes creative thinking

Saint Francis of Assisi is often portrayed as a lover of nature and wildlife, and it looks as if a bit of his outdoor spirit rubbed off on Saint Lawrence of Brindisi, a Franciscan priest born in the 16th century. As well as being a brilliant scholar and administrator (and earning the rare honor of being named a doctor of the church), he also had a very high esteem for all of creation: "God loves all creatures in and because of Christ. Christ is the first-born of every creature, and the whole of humanity as well as the created world finds its foundation and meaning in him." We do well to treat all of creation reverently; God expects no less of us.

### FEAST OF MARY MAGDALENE

#### Watch what you assume

Mary Magdalene, the first person to encounter the risen Lord Jesus and the apostle to the apostles who carried this good news to them, might also be the unofficial patron of the slandered. In the sixth century Pope Gregory the Great erroneously assumed her to be the anonymous sinner who wept at Jesus' feet and the seven evil spirits of which Jesus cured her to have been demons of lust. Curiously, in the Eastern Orthodox Church Mary Magdalene was never labeled a prostitute. As a matter of fact there's a tradition that she had always been so holy a woman that the devil thought she might be the one chosen to bring the Christ into the world, and so he beset her with seven demons from which Jesus would free her. Be careful of your assumptions and hasty conclusions.

### FEAST OF BRIDGET OF SWEDEN, RELIGIOUS

### In the spirit of Saint Birgitta: Read

Saint Birgitta was many things: visionary, mother, friend of the sick and poor, and something of a prophetess who was not afraid to rail against kings, queens, and popes. She also had a pretty unique idea: a monastery of nuns that would also have a separate wing for men who oversaw the spiritual care of the women, while a Mother Abbess had the final say over the whole place. The community would have not only nuns and monks but also deacons and lay brothers. In 1546 she actually formed such a monastery in southern Sweden. While the community observed strict poverty, there was no limit on the amount of books the members could have—a good idea then as now. Take some time to check out some good Christian books. Happy reading.

Founded in 1849 by Saint Anthony Mary Claret, a Spaniard who was a missionary arch bishop in Cuba, the Claretians number more than 3,000 priests, brothers, and lay volunteers who can be found in more than 60 countries - even above the Arctic Circle in Russia. They have been active in the United States since 1902 when they first came to work with Mexican field workers and ranch hands in Texas. Eventually they spread to do the same missionary work in Arizona and California. They came to the Midwest following Mexican railroad workers and established the first Hispanic parish of the Archdiocese in South Chicago. American Claretians have served in oversea missions in Central America and the Caribbean, Africa, and South Asia. Our current mission is in the troubled city of Juarez, Mexico.

Fr. Tom Joyce, who will make the appeal, is a native of Chicago now semi-retired. Over the years he has taught history in Washington and Chicago and for two years in Jamaica. For twenty-five years he did "Justice and Peace Ministry" at the 8th Day Center for Justice. He is currently superior of their candidates' house in Chicago.

# Parish Pioneers Invited to Share Memories of Early Days at St. Cletus

TOM REMEMBERS SOME ALTAR BOY LATIN PRAYERS; SON, GRANDSON EACH ATTENDED ST. CLETUS SCHOOL

Tom McAtee, a refugee from SFX, began attending the convenient early Sunday Mass at St. Cletus in 1954. He and Regina joined the parish as newlyweds in 1962; son John was born a couple of years later.

"We were part of the pay/pray/obey crowd until John started school at St. Cletus and Father Gallagher became our second pastor," Tom said.

Regina served two terms on the St. Cletus School Board during the time when Sister Nicholas (Elizabeth Kotre) retired as principal and Sister Jeanne Oursler succeeded her in the position. Regina also volunteered in the school and coached the eighth grade math contest team.

Parish social life included parties in Morrissey hall to celebrate St. Patrick's Day, Oktoberfest, and live music on New Year's Eve. Before one big parish event, Morrissey Hall looked a bit shabby so one Friday night Father McGinnity, Tom Korzeneci, Norm Marchelya, and the McAtees slapped a coat of fresh paint on the walls.

After the changes of Vatican II were implemented, Father Gallagher celebrated one annual Latin Mass for several years. Tom was one of the old altar boys who remembered enough Latin prayers to mumble through the required responses.

Joe Mazzarella and Regina co-chaired the parish's silver anniversary in 1976, with much help from a committee of about 35 parishioners. Bernie Dombrowski, Dale Kalina, and Regina made vestments for the three priests and four deacons then on staff. Some of the stoles made then, still show up on the altar now.

Tom became an usher in the early 1990's and drafted Regina to help one Christmas Eve when they were short handed. Tom and Regina currently lead the usher crew at the Saturday 5:00 p.m. Mass.

A déjà vu moment occurred on Holy Thursday in 2010 when Tom's grandson, Miles, led the procession up the center aisle as his father had 31 years earlier.

Regina is a Eucharistic Minister who distributes Holy Communion to Catholic patients at Advent La Grange Memorial Hospital, as well as to homebound parishioners.

The Augustinian order sent three deacon candidates to St. Cletus for training in the 1970's. Father Cedric Wilson and Tom chaired a committee of parishioners that met with the candidates to critique homilies, make suggestions, answer questions, and lend support.

Regina and Tom McAtee enjoyed the Ed Ward band concert and the 60th Anniversary parish picnic July 3.



# CHRISTIAN FAMILY MOVEMENT INTRODUCED ... PARISHIONERS WHO BECAME LIFE-LONG FRIENDS

"My husband Si and I were married in October 1949, moved to La Grange and became members at St. Francis Xavier, and then we joined St. Cletus in 1951," wrote Mary Rose Seifert of Indian Head Park.

"We have many wonderful memories of St. Cletus in those early years, such as the parish's annual picnic each year, the St. Patrick's Day dances. The Holy Name Society gave a graduation party for each eighth grade class.

"Important in our lives was the Christian Family Movement. We were one of five couples who began this. After several months we expanded to three more groups of five to seven couples.

"As leaders, we met with Father Morrissey, our pastor, and then with our groups to discuss the Gospel reading and plan an action for the month. We had several Cana Conferences for married couples."
