

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2011

When children are in preschool or elementary school, it is easier to interest their parents in supporting and taking an active part in daily school life. For a start, the children usually like their parents to be involved in what is happening in their lives. Then quite a number of parents are personally present at the school to bring and collect their children each school day. This regular contact makes school part of their lives, a feature that is increased by the chat and friendships that develop with the other parents who are there and involved. With high school a different scenario often occurs. Teenage children are often embarrassed at their parents' presence, and they want to keep them as far away as possible from their activities, whether work or play. Then the schools themselves usually have much wider catchment areas than the local neighborhood, and parents often feel more daunted by the size of the establishments and their own mixed memories of teenage years. Unintentionally the school can be experienced by parents as hostile rather than friendly territory. It also does not feel as easy to get involved in the more demanding academic and extra-curricular activities offered to the pupils. Parents are no longer gods!

Later on in life a reconciliation of views usually occurs. The parents marvel to see their children emerge as mature adults from their stormy teenage chrysalises, and the children are amazed at how their parents matured so rapidly as well.

St. Paul is aware of how much we put obstacles between ourselves and God. His letter to the Romans explores how even the Law, which should have impressed upon the chosen people their need of grace or salvation, becomes oppressive as they seek a righteousness before God based on their obedience. To live as God wants we need the inner gift of faith, which acts like an internal combustion engine of goodness. The reason for this is because faith is the free gift of God. We cannot earn it. But nor can we separate ourselves from it. Our natural and traditional ideas of God, even today, contain a strong tendency to make God distant and forbidding. Accompanying this belief is a feeling of our own inadequacy and failure. We feel guilty because we cannot bridge the gap, because we cannot live up to what we believe are God's expectations of us. St. Paul forcefully reminds us that this is not the point. Of course we cannot bridge the gap. Of course we are failures. But this does not matter. What matters is the overwhelming love of God for us, revealed in all its compassion and enrichment, in the person of Jesus Christ. Nothing can get in the way of that love, a love illustrated so well in the gospel story of the feeding of the five thousand, where we see Jesus taking pity on the crowds, healing them and feeding them with sheer abundance.

Our spiritual growth can often take a similar track to our human development. During our spiritually teenage years, which do not always coincide with our physical adolescence, we feel the need to separate ourselves from the authority figures in our lives, loving as they may be. Our rediscovery of how they may be a more real presence in our lives, perhaps as more equal or intimate companions, is the true business of growing up. If we find it difficult to think of God in such terms, we need only think of how St. John's Gospel invites us to be friends rather than servants. Our God is stripped of any autocratic powers in the person of Jesus Christ in order to be our healing friend and servant. The bit of us that remains an undeveloped child or teenager finds that difficult to accept. We want God to be dictatorial and distant. That makes it easier for us to keep our distance! We can refuse to believe, and blame God at the same time. God, however, keeps on loving us all the same, a thought consoling to all who wander away and also to those who grieve for their children or loved ones who seem to have turned away from God. Whatever diversions we take in our spiritual journeys, God's overwhelming love is always there. Our openness to that love is what enables us to then become friends and servants to each other in God's image and likeness.

Does that sound like a description of our generation? Actually, it's how many described the 18th century. In that divided age Saint Alphonsus Liguori became the champion of the middle ground. "Nothing else is required than to act toward God, in the midst of your occupations, as you do toward those who love you and whom you love." In good times and in bad, love knows how to behave.

Let's hear a shout-out for humility

You have to admire Moses. Two people close to him—Aaron and Miriam—had started asking why *they* couldn't be prophets, too. To settle the matter God called the three of them out for a talking-to: God trusted Moses, God said—end of argument. What's more, God punished Miriam with an instant case of leprosy. But Moses just as quickly asked the Lord to forgive Miriam. We see something similar when Jesus called Saint Peter to walk out on the water to him. Peter's initial faith sank pretty quickly once he was out on the water, but Jesus caught him before he could go under. It's a virtue to keep faith—and to reach out a forgiving hand to others when they have not kept faith with you.

Get a new perspective

The story of Jesus' encounter with a Gentile woman distraught over her daughter's illness is troubling. Not only does Jesus seem reluctant to help, but he even calls her a dog, as if to dismiss her as not worthy of him. The woman is undaunted and persists, and Jesus not only relents but is profoundly impressed. While we may not like seeing Jesus in this unkind light, the point may be that Jesus—human like us in all things but sin—learns something in a human way. When the wideness of God's mercy confronts cultural prejudice, Jesus matures in his thinking, just as we all do if we are open to the grace of seeing beyond our as-

sumptions.

Saint John Vianney was a member of an endangered species—a French Catholic priest in the aftermath of the French Revolution. Times were difficult and persecution of the church had been heavy, yet Vianney found a way to live his vocation with such devotion that the town of Ars where he was posted attracted thousands of pilgrims a year. It is said that in his final years he put in 16 to 18 hours a day in the confessional. Though he yearned for a life of quiet contemplation, he stuck it out. The lesson for all of us: Our call to serve begins right here, right now.

DEDICATION OF THE BASILICA OF SAINT MARY MAJOR IN ROME Let it snow

The longer a building has been around, the more likely it is to attract legends. Few structures have stood longer than the Basilica of Saint Mary Major of Rome, which dates to the fourth century. Perhaps it is no surprise that this beautiful basilica—the largest in the world to honor the Mother of God—has attracted its share of lore. According to one story, a wealthy Roman couple pledged their fortune to Mary, and she responded with a miraculous summer snowfall, instructing them to build a church on the site. Today, the day of dedication for "Our Lady of the Snows" has sometimes been celebrated with a shower of white rose petals released from the basilica's dome. If a white rose is not at hand, wear something white today to honor the Blessed Mother and the buildings dedicated to her.

Parish Pioneers Invited to Share Memories of Early Days at St. Cletus

TWO YOUNG PRIESTS STOP AT ST. CLETUS TO CHAT WITH FR. MORRISSEY...

I have enjoyed the memories of the pioneer parishioners in "The Canticle." Perhaps I can make a contribution.

I knew and respected Father Gerry Morrissey, the founding pastor. He was 13 years ahead of me in the seminary.

When I would drive by on 55th Street, I saw the parish as a huge place. The Church was new, the rectory about the same. It too struck me as huge. I must have imagined, "This place is going to take a lot of work." I might have thought that I would never want to be pastor of such a giant of a place.

The large parking lot across from the parish building had only one occupant, an appliance store that advertised on TV. Five years later, Jewel replaced it. I saw Charter Bank built and flourish. I later got the bank to give the parish \$1,000 a month for the privilege of parking on our grounds.

One afternoon, a priest friend, Father John McGrath, and I, going past, decided to stop at the rectory to visit Father Morrissey. He was glad to see us. The TV was on in his room and he was smoking a cigar.

We had a good visit and I remember him saying, "I'm a lucky guy to get a parish like this. I just sit around and let the people do all the work." Of course I found out that was not true. He had to work very hard to build this special parish.

At that time, the parish had one associate, Father Ed Fitzpatrick, whom I found out spent hours developing the Cle-teens, an active teen club. He is still remembered by old-timers.

Father McGrath and I stayed with Father Morrissey the balance of the afternoon. When we were leaving, Father Morrissey said, "I'm not far from retirement. Maybe one of you will get this place."

I remember saying something like, "Downtown doesn't even know I exist. I'll probably get a small place in Joliet."
