



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2011

SEPTEMBER 11, 2001 - "A DAY THAT CHANGED OUR WORLD"

Today we remember the 10th anniversary of 9-11, which was a day that would change our world forever. Ten years ago today we witnessed the true presence of evil in our world with the horrific events that unfolded in New York City, Washington D.C., and Pennsylvania. It was a day that would become a day filled with shock, horror, fear, loss, and sorrow, sadness and utter disbelief. It would become a day when each and every one of us ten years later would be able to recall exactly where we were and who we were with. It would truly become a day that would change us as a world, as a nation, as a people and as individuals.

Today we remember the 10th anniversary of 9-11, which was a day that would change our world forever. Ten years ago today we witnessed the true presence of goodness, in our world with the heroic events that unfolded in New York City, Washington D.C., and Pennsylvania. It was a day that would become one filled with heroism, bravery and sacrifice, honor and glory, pride and patriotism. It did become a day that each of us would remember for the rest of our lives. It would truly become a day that would challenge our faith, our beliefs, and our ability to forgive.

It is appropriate that on this solemn occasion, we turn our thoughts to today's gospel. For there we hear how Peter asked the Lord if we had to forgive others as many as seven times. "No, not seven times," said Jesus, "but seventy-seven times." Some scholars think he actually said seventy times seven; in other words, four hundred and ninety times! But the precise number matters little, for the point that Jesus is making is that there will never be a time when we no longer need to forgive.

Jesus tells a parable to drive the message home. It's about two servants; the first owed his king ten thousand talents. A "talent" was the largest coin in Palestine; so he owed him "millions", as we might say. There was no realistic chance of his repaying such a monster debt, but, in his desperation, he pleaded that he would do so if only his master would give him time. Incredibly, the king agreed there and then to wipe out the whole debt, because, as the gospel says, he "felt so sorry for him". But see what happens now: no sooner has he left his master's presence than he meets a fellow servant who owes him a hundred denarii, a paltry sum, and demands that it be paid at once. When the debtor pleads that he be given time, not only does the first servant refuse, but he actually attacks him: "He seized him by the throat and began to throttle him." Little wonder that news of this extraordinary ingratitude gets back to the King, and that in due course, the servant gets his comeuppance.

Having told the story, Jesus remarks that this is what will happen to us, who have been forgiven so much, if we fail to show forgiveness to others. He doesn't mean that the Father will not forgive if we refuse to forgive – a kind of tit for tat – but when our hearts are hardened by unforgiveness, they are simply impervious to the forgiveness God offers.

It is easy to nod in agreement as we hear this gospel: it's so obvious that we should be generous in offering forgiveness when God, in sheer generosity, has forgiven us so much more. And yet...and yet...in real life it can be so dreadfully difficult. How do the families of the victims of the horror of 9-11 learn to forgive those who caused them so much pain and loss?

In giving us the "impossible" command to forgive, to forgive and go on forgiving, Jesus wasn't asking us to do it on our own. He waits for us to turn to him, to acknowledge our own helplessness; and when we do, a little miracle happens: we find it possible to forgive not in our own strength but because his own forgiveness is in our hearts. Only through this endless grace of God and our ability to courageously lift up the lives of the victims and heroes of 9-11 in honor and glory, can we find the strength to forgive as God forgives.

SUMMARY OF THE PARISH FINANCIAL REPORT

- Our parish finished the June 30, 2011 fiscal year with an operating deficit of \$107,283. This means that parish expenses exceeded ordinary revenue sources by \$107,283. This operating deficit is an increase over the 2010 operating deficit of \$30,227.
- Sunday, Christmas and Easter collections for the year ended June 30, 2011 decreased by \$43,000 from the previous year.
- The parish made recommended wiring safety and lighting upgrades to the church and parking lot in the 2010 fiscal year due to extraordinary bequests from parishioner's estates and the Lighting Our Way fundraising campaign. The 2011 year did not have similar large bequests and the Lighting Our Way campaign concluded toward the beginning of the 2011 fiscal year.
- Although the Church decreased expenses versus the prior year in most areas, there were expense increases in health insurance costs, building maintenance and technology. The net effect of the parish's cost containment efforts was an overall decrease in Church expenses in 2011.
- The school building suffered significant flood damage in July 2010, near the beginning of the 2011 fiscal year. The associated repairs were paid by insurance.
- St. Cletus School's fundraising campaigns for the year ended June 30, 2011, while remarkably successful, raised \$29,000 less than the previous year. To compensate, the school took a larger withdrawal from the school endowment than in the past.
- Because the school needed an unusually small amount of parish support during the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2010, the parish's required support for the school increased in the year that ended June 30, 2011. Despite the increase, the \$315,584 the parish contributed to support the school's mission during the 2011 fiscal year is less than almost all recent years.
- During the year ended June 30, 2011, the parish's investment account enjoyed substantial unrealized gains. Because these unrealized gains are not part of the normal operations of the parish and because increases in the value of investments can (and do) reverse, they are not included in the parish's \$107,283 operating deficit.
- In order to offset revenue decreases and to pay its bills, the parish withdrew \$211,626 from the parish investment account during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011. The parish does not usually need to withdraw investment funds from its investment account.

After all Masses on September 10th and September 11th, members of the parish finance committee will be available to answer your questions in the Kindergarten room just outside the west doors of the church. 




You get what you give

One of the hardest things to do is to forgive not only when it's easy to forgive but also when it's most difficult. While God's forgiveness and mercy is constant, you still have to accept it, and that means more than an inner spiritual acceptance: It involves active love of both the lovable and also the people who you don't like or don't like you, even your enemies. That kind of forgiveness needs a special kind of love that makes you willing to sacrifice. What goes around comes around. Show mercy, and God will be merciful to you. Your salvation depends on forgiving "not seven times but seventy-seven times"—that is, without limit

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 12

FEAST OF THE MOST HOLY NAME OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY She has that star quality

One of the first happy responsibilities parents have is naming their child. Some choose family names; others opt for a favorite saint, actor, sports figure, or character in a book. Whatever the name, there's often a story that goes with it. The Virgin Mary is no exception. Countless interpretations of the name of Mary have been written over the centuries. One of these dates back to Saint Jerome (around 420). He called her "Stilla Maris," meaning "drop of the sea," the sea being God. "Stilla" was later changed to "Stella" (likely through a copyist's error) and with that the meaning changed to "star of the sea." Today we remember and celebrate all that we have received by calling on Mary's name. May our prayer be one of thanksgiving for our Star of the Sea.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Timothy 2:1-8; Luke 7:1-10 (443) "First of all, then, I ask that supplications, prayers, petitions, and thanksgivings be offered for everyone."

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 13

FEAST OF JOHN CHRYSOSTOM, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Stay "clothes" to Jesus

"No prophet is without honor, except in his home town," Jesus once observed—especially true when the word offends the rich and influential. It was certainly true for Saint John Chrysostom preaching in fourth-century Antioch and Constantinople. Consider this: "Do you wish to honor the body of Christ? [Then] do not pay him homage in the temple clad in silk, only then to neglect him outside where he is cold and ill-clad." While our clothes may not be made of silk, we get the point, and it may very well annoy us. It should.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Timothy 3:1-13; Luke 7:11-17 (444) "If a man does not know how to manage his own household, how can he take care of the church of God?"

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 14

FEAST OF THE EXALTATION OF THE HOLY CROSS Don't be part of a cover-up

The story goes that Saint Helena, mother of the emperor Constantine, discovered Jesus' cross in 326 A.D. while on a pilgrimage in the Holy Land. Moved by the experience of praying where Jesus is said to have been crucified, she arose in holy anger because a building had been erected over the sacred site. She ordered the structure and the ground it stood on to be demolished, and beneath the debris, it is said she found

the cross upon which Jesus was crucified. While some of the facts of this story may be legend, there are also some truths buried within. In what ways have we covered up some of the sacred sites in our own life? How has Christ made a way for us to see our own crosses as pathways to new life?

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 15

FEAST OF OUR LADY OFSSORROWS

Support your local loved ones

The women in Jesus' life came through for him. They supported his ministry and stood by him until his last breath. Our Lady of Sorrows, whose feast we celebrate today, is a symbol of the Christian virtues of steadfastness and hope. Mary's presence at the foot of the cross serves as a reminder that we are never alone—even in our darkest hour and deepest suffering. God does not nor will not forsake or abandon us. Call on God's name, and God will be there to shore you up—just as a mother stands by her son, just as an aunt shows support for her nephew, just as a true friend remains faithful till the end.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Timothy 4:12-16; John 19:25-27 (446) "Standing by the cross were his mother and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene."

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 16

FEAST OF CORNELIUS, POPE, MARTYR AND CYPRIAN, BISHOP, P Don't leave anyone out

Cornelius and Cyprian are remembered and celebrated together because of their united efforts to welcome people back into the church. At the time (ca. 250) there was rancorous and strident debate over how and even whether to allow "sinners" to rejoin the Christian community. One group advocated severe punishment and often permanent excommunication. Cornelius and Cyprian, on the other hand, pushed for leniency grounded in the forgiveness modeled by Jesus. Ostracism can never lead to oneness and wholeness. In honor of Cornelius and Cyprian we might ask ourselves, "In what ways have I excluded others, even briefly, and how can I make amends?"

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Timothy 6:2c-12; Luke 8:1-3 (447) "Lay hold of eternal life, to which you were called when you made the noble confession in the presence of many witnesses."

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 17

FEAST OF ROBERT BELLARMINE, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Let's vote on that

We who have grown up in democratic societies, messy though they are at times, can be grateful never to have had to put up with a monarchy that was believed to be divinely inspired and protected. We can in part thank a learned Jesuit, Saint Robert Bellarmine, for helping put the "divine right of kings" theory to rest. He was among the first of its critics in the 16th century, long before the French and American revolutions ushered in the age of democracy. Be grateful for your political freedom and do your part to safeguard it by being an active and engaged citizen.

Today's readings: 1 Timothy 6:13-16; Luke 8:4-15 (448) "And some seed fell on good soil, and when it grew, it produced fruit a hundredfold."
