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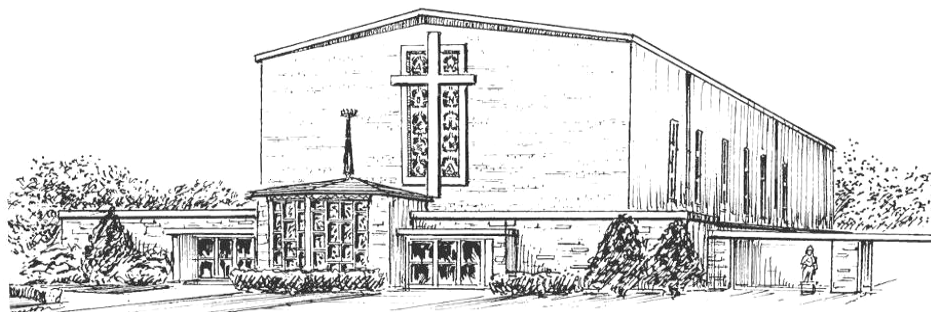

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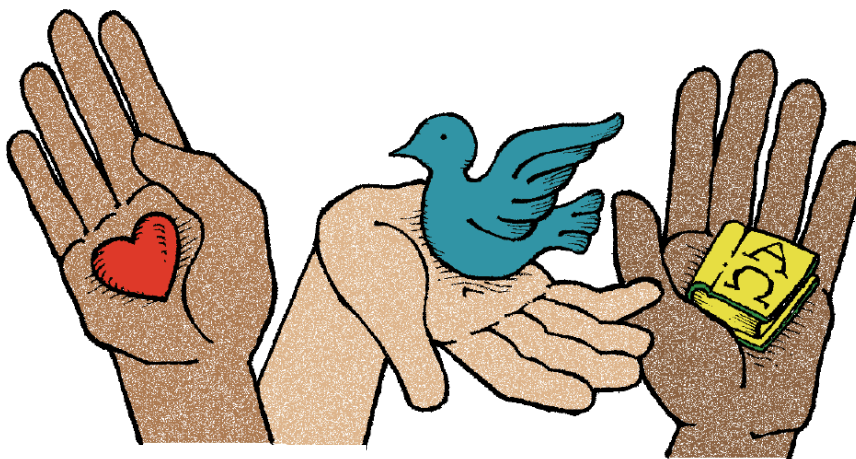

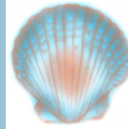

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2011

Can anger be a good and positive reaction for the Christian? An answer of “yes” seems to be contrary to the message, which many people heard as children. Anger was one of the seven deadly sins.

Anger can be a sign of love, when it is a feeling that arises when we see an injustice committed against another person. In this way, anger represents a connectedness with those who suffer, with those who are victims; it is a sign of the need for justice to be re-established. At the same time, anger needs careful reflection, because it may be coming from unresolved personal issues.

In the first reading from the Book of Exodus, we hear that God’s anger will flare up when society treats the widow and the orphan harshly. The people of Israel, through their historical experience of slavery in Egypt, were very conscious of sufferings of people who were oppressed and needed liberation. At the same time, as their economic and social status improved in the Promised Land, there was the danger of forgetting their roots and the experience of slavery. The prophets called them back to this experience, and reminded them of the experience of being slaves. God’s people were called to extend justice to the poorest in society and particularly to those who had no protection or rights. The widow and the orphan were especially marginalized, since they had no male figure to protect them. The justice of people was to mirror the justice of God, who was always concerned for the poor and weak in society.

Love is a very difficult word to understand these days. It has many different meanings. Often it can mean passionate, sexual, erotic, romantic love. Sometimes it can mean affection, like the love of a dog or a pet. The dog responds with faithfulness and fidelity, usually for reward. It can also refer to friendship between men and women. Love, in the gospel, means self-giving love concerned totally for the other, rather than self. Love of neighbor can be described as creating the conditions, which enable others to be themselves and achieve their full potential. It is a love leading to action, which respects, enhances, sees the best in the other, helps others, acts justly, and seeks only the good of the other person. Is this sort of love humanly possible? At first, it might not seem possible. However, it can be lived, but only with God’s help and assistance. The gospel calls for continued striving to love like this, but it does not expect perfection. It is reassuring to know that even the saints were always very aware of their failing to live as God called. Such love is always an ideal, for which the Christian can hope.

It is often said that love begins at home. There is truth in this. Learning to respect and love at home can be most difficult, especially when families continue to change, teenagers mature, and readjustments must be made. Love is always concerned for the good of another; this eventually means giving another freedom, which can be painful. Each person has to live his own successes and mistakes. Love allows this to happen, and is ready to welcome home. The father of the prodigal son must have suffered much when his son went away. While he welcomed him home, he must have still felt both pain and joy when his son returned. The commandment to love can be very difficult.

Love is never satisfied. If love begins at home, it then has to extend outside the home, even to the very margins of society. Who are the weakest and poorest in society? Who are the ones like the orphan and the poor in Jewish society? Are they the asylum-seekers? Are they those fleeing from their homeland because of persecution? Love demands that we respect them, and extend justice to the stranger and foreigner in society. This may need conversion--a change of heart-- as we overcome prejudice and stereotypes. Welcoming others and speaking up for others will often meet resistance and scorn; faithfulness to the gospel calls for perseverance in witnessing to the truth in love. Faithfulness to the gospel will always be rewarded.

Many people enshrine mottoes or slogans, often quoted from great women or men who seem to distill the very essence of what it means to lead a good life. The heart of Jesus' famous answer about the "greatest commandment" would have been familiar to any of his contemporaries: "Love God" and "love your neighbor." But Jesus' genius and his challenge were to make them equivalent. Saint John reiterates Jesus' Great Commandment by bluntly saying that if one claims to be a lover of God without loving one's neighbor, one is simply a liar. From Jesus' perspective, it just can't be done.

Are you free to be?

When Saint Paul spoke of being freed from living according to the flesh and the deeds of the body, he didn't mean so much the physical body as he did the person who lived in a self-centered way and did not feel any dependence on God. Liberty from sin means freedom to be children of God. It was the Spirit—Christ's Spirit—that does the liberating. Jesus also spoke of freedom when he healed people of illnesses and made them free to be full persons. What can you be made free of?

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 25

A labor of love

As the evidence of ecological damage from global warming increases, Christian environmentalism is growing across denominational lines. The movement has solid biblical foundations. Leviticus 25:33 reminds us that the earth is the Lord's and we are only tenants—groundkeepers as it were. According to Genesis 2:15, Adam was put in the Garden of Eden "to dress it and to keep it." None of us can care for the entire earth on our own, but each of us can tend our little stretch of it. Let's be good tenants while occupying it, so the landlord will be pleased with us.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 26

Be the first to make yourself last

In Flannery O'Connor's short story "Revelation," Mrs. Turpin, who considers herself a righteous Christian woman, is forced to sit in a waiting room full of riffraff. She mentally passes judgment on the others until a disturbed young woman throws a book at her, calling her a "wart hog from hell." Shaken, Mrs. Turpin goes home but can't get the insult out of her mind. That evening she goes outdoors to sulk when, in the twilight, she has a vision, a *revelation*: a parade of happy souls "rumbling toward heaven." She and her husband are in the procession, not first but last, their faces showing shock that their judgments have been completely wrong. As the vision fades she sees that in this heaven "even her virtues were being burned away" while "the voices of the souls climbing upward into the starry field [are] shouting hallelujah!"

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 27

Not for the faint of heart

It's way too early to be thinking about Christmas, but it's never too soon to remember the message of Christmas: That Jesus is *Emmanuel*, God-with-us. God is with us, not separated from or against us. It's a truth Saint Paul recognized in his Letter to the Romans. "God is for us . . . What will separate us from the love of Christ?" (Romans 8:31, 35) he asked. His answer: Nothing—no trouble or hardship or power in the world. God's presence has already saved us; the victory is won. God is on our side and wants us to be part of the divine life forever. Let's accept that truth!

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 28

FEAST OF SIMON AND JUDE, APOSTLES

Do as they did

Except for Peter, Andrew, James, and John, we know almost nothing about the apostles other than their names, and even some of these are disputed ("Nathaneal" or "Bartholomew"?). Various traditions have Simon preaching to the Berbers in North Africa and martyred in Samaria—or Edessa in Macedonia, or even England. Likewise tradition places Jude in Idumaea (in the Holy Land), Mesopotamia, and Beirut, and one medieval writer claims he was the bridegroom at the wedding feast at Cana! Yet the genuine legacy of these apostles is the faith that you live by today. If you could plot out a genealogy of faith backward through multiple generations, you would have to come to Simon and Jude—or to other barely known pioneers like them who, when Jesus once said, "Come and see," *went and saw and believed*.

Traditional images of Mary show her "meek and mild": eyes downcast, arms enfolding her son, or hands pressed together in prayer. She stood or sat with the stillness of eternity wrapped around her. If she extended herself at all, it was in arms held downward and outward to her children throughout history calling for her intercession. Recently, new artists are portraying a more active woman—the *Walking Madonna* by Elizabeth Frink, for example: elderly, striding, purposeful, like the many grey-haired ladies who are the backbones of their parishes. Mary still has places to go and things to do. Care to come along?

Parish Pioneer Hank Maday's Legacy Includes HNS Annual Turkey Raffle



Hank Maday became a member of the Holy Name Society early on and was president in 1977-78. He proposed the turnkey raffle as a fundraiser in the early eighties and the raffle continues to be a yearly event for the Society. Hank was very pleased that the members of the Holy Name would donate turkeys to the needy of the parish, and the more that were donated, the happier he became. When Hank died in 2004 the Holy Name Society named the raffle, "The Hank Maday Turkey Raffle."

Although Hank Maday was not a founding father of St. Cletus Parish, he was an active member and contributed much in the seventies and eighties. He moved into the parish in July of 1962 with his wife, Eleanor. He quickly became friends with Father Robert McGinnity. They were both passionate about Notre Dame football.

When Hank's grandchildren began attending St. Cletus School, Hank helped the school as much as he could. The Sisters of St. Joseph taught at St. Cletus and both Hank and Eleanor had a special place in their hearts. Hank worked for a company that manufactured lighting fixtures and he installed the fixtures in the school classrooms.

With the help of Father McGinnity, Bill Engels and Mike Bellovich, Hank installed the lights in Morrissey Hall which was no small feat. He was teased when he had the lights installed in the parking lot because they were "so bright" they rivaled the lights in the Jewel parking lot.

Holy Name also supports school Fundraising efforts. Holy Name has been an active organization here since the parish began 60 years ago.

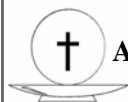
