

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2011

Some years ago an elderly woman was being interviewed on television. She explained that she had spent all of her adult life as a nurse. "Tell me," the interviewer asked, "If you could have just one wish, what would it be?" To his astonishment and, I imagine, that of millions of viewers, she replied: "To meet our Lord and hear him say that he thinks I did a good job for him."

A surprising reply, yet, on reflection, just the sort of reply you might expect from a Christian. After all, on the day when we have to give an account of our stewardship, there is only one question that will really matter: "Have I made a success of my life on earth by serving the Lord well?" We're perhaps tempted to think that if only we knew just when that day would be, we'd be ready for it. Paul insists that the day and the hour are hidden. Admittedly, what he has in mind is "the Lord's day," the end of the world, when the Lord will come again. However, Paul's words are equally relevant to the day of our death, the day when the world will end for us. It is shrouded in mystery; no-one can say when it will come. The Lord may arrive as unexpectedly as a burglar – and yet, says Paul, if we live wisely, like "children of light," then we won't be caught unprepared.

Fundamentally, then, Paul's is a positive and encouraging message, and so too is the message of the other two readings. In the gospel, our Lord has a parable for us. It's the story of a wealthy man who, just before going abroad, gathers three of his servants and entrusts to each a number of talents. (Incidentally, in the parable the word "talents" does not mean personal skills but rather silver coins, money; in fact a talent was a considerable sum of money, a small treasure.) The one who had received five talents and the other, who had received two, both traded well and in fact doubled their treasure. The servant who had but one talent became paralyzed with fear, and simply hid the money; he was playing it safe, or so he thought. His master thought differently. On his return, he gave a handsome reward to the first two wise, industrious servants. As for the third lazy, fear-racked servant, the wealthy man withdrew his one talent, and punished him as well. You may have noticed in the first reading, also, that the "perfect wife", as she is called, wins praise because she is wise and industrious, using her gifts well.

The moral could hardly be clearer: this life is enormously important, for what we make of it will decide our future. In the Kingdom of God, the disciple who responds fully to the gifts God has given him or her, and uses them to good effect, will receive still greater ones. Disciples too fearful or lazy to make any efforts, will lose everything they thought they had.


It's easy for us to think that because we may not have much in the way of talents and gifts, we're not very important. However, in the gospel, the servant who came to grief did so not because he had only one talent, but because he didn't use it. The fact is that each one of us, however meager our gifts may seem, has a vital role in God's plan. The idea is neatly conveyed in a prayer by Fr. Michel Quoist, called "The Brick." A bricklayer is at work; the first brick is laid on its bed of cement. Others follow, as slowly the building rises tall and strong. "I thought, Lord, of that brick," says the prayer, "buried in the darkness at the base of the big building. No one sees it, yet it accomplishes its task, and the other bricks need it. Lord, what difference whether I am at the roof-top or in the foundation of your building, as long as I stand faithfully at the right place?"

As long as we are genuinely trying to love and serve the Lord in the lowly events of life, we need not be overwhelmed with fear of rejection. On the contrary, if we are faithful in trying, we can be humbly confident that, at death, the Lord himself will greet us with those most glorious words: "Well done. You have been faithful in small things. Come and join in your Master's happiness."



Be the good steward

In biblical times a *talent* was a measure used to weigh precious metals, a way of expressing economic value. *Talent* is still a form of treasure today—human treasure, our gifts and abilities. How we use our talents will determine the course and meaning of our lives. Stewardship is a biblical concept that calls on each of us to share, in one oft-quoted formulation, our "time, talent, and treasure" with the larger community. How are you contributing to your faith community and society at large? Are you making use of your talents to serve others or simply to build your personal treasury?

Witness for the persecution

Maccabees is of particular interest to Christians because in the early years of the church several Roman emperors conducted persecutions, forcing Christians to give up their beliefs or face death, imprisonment, seizure of their property, and exile. Some decided to pay the ultimate price: martyrdom. A *martyr* is a "witness"; martyrs by their very lives are evidence for the reality of God and their own fidelity to God. Your life, too, has opportunities to show your total commitment to God.

In a generation that sometimes views people of faith as enemies of science and intellectual progress, we might submit Saint Albert the Great as exhibit A to protest this characterization. Albert believed all creation speaks of God, which makes study of the natural world a form of genuine spiritual meditation. He's been described as a scientist by temperament, a philosopher by choice, and a theologian by divine inspiration. Rather than seeing learning as an obstacle to faith, he insisted the truths of revelation have nothing to fear from the use of reason. Appreciate learning as an opportunity to grow in knowledge of God.

Turn down the stereotypes

Womanly is a word that too often has been used by our culture to suggest weakness or inadequacy. Worse, these negative connotations can sometimes lead to derision and oppression. Phrases such as "he/she throws like a girl," though harmless-sounding, reflect this negativity. Yet when we look at the women around us, in the Bible, and in our Catholic tradition, we learn the truth. We find women who exhibit a womanliness that is synonymous with courage, strength, boldness, and savvy. They have led countries, built schools and hospitals, led people to God, and given their lives and their deaths to what they believed in. How can we adjust our own language to be more affirming—and more accurate—about the nature and gifts of women?

The pursuit of happiness

Who can hope to emulate the selfless lives of women like Saint Elizabeth of Hungary, a princess who fearlessly nursed the gravely ill and gave away much of her fortune to the poor? We wonder at her willingness to live such a difficult and demanding life. We are, however, overlooking one crucial detail: She was happy! As Dostoevsky writes in *The Brothers Karamazov*, "We are made for happiness, and anyone who is completely happy has a right to say to himself, 'I am doing God's will on earth.' All the righteous, all the saints, all the holy martyrs were happy." What creates happiness is different for each one of us. If you aren't sure, ask God to lead you to the happiness that is your birthright.

DEDICATION OF THE BASILICAS OF PETER AND PAUL IN ROME; ROSE PHILIPPINE DUCHESNE, VIRGIN

Hold nothing back

"We cultivate a very small field for Christ," said Saint Rose Philippine Duchesne about her mission work in the American West during the 1800s, "but we love it, knowing that God does not require great achievements but a heart that holds back nothing for self." Ironically those unselfishly laboring out of love for God invariably achieve great things and leave lasting legacies. Mother Rose introduced the Society of Sacred Heart to the U.S, and by the turn of the 19th century the sisters had attracted 1,100 members. And those basilicas we celebrate today? Well, St. Peter's Basilica, considered the most magnificent church structure in the world, began as a red rock marking the place where Saint Peter was buried.

Heaven knows

A woman suddenly lost her 25-year-old daughter and was devastated, then a few years later the loss of her husband left her feeling as though every day were torture. What keeps her going is the hope that one day she will be with her spouse and child in paradise. Like all of us, she wonders what heaven will be like. We have a story of Jesus challenged by Sadducees asking him whose wife a woman would be in the resurrection because she had been widowed seven times. A trick question? Perhaps, but however we imagine heaven to be, what we should keep in mind during November as we focus on our beloved dead is that we who mourn are promised comfort by Jesus who is with us always.
