





2011 National Clergy Renewal Program

Cardinal Francis George, O.M.I. has granted me a 5- month Sabbatical, beginning mid June 2012 through mid November 2012. I will be studying in the Holy Land through the Chicago Theological Union Program. My travels will take me first out West to study Native American spirituality, to attend Retreat and to spend some time traveling and visiting old friends. I will then leave for Turkey and Greece to spend time "Walking in the Footsteps of St. Paul" for about three weeks. The next section of my studies will take me to the Holy Land, Jordan, and Egypt for two months of intensive study. The last leg of my travels, before returning home, will take me to Italy to visit Rome and the major shrines throughout that beautiful country.

St. Cletus has received a grant of \$49,035 to enable me to participate in the 2011 National Clergy Renewal Program, funded by the Indianapolis-based Lilly Endowment Inc. St. Cletus is one of 158 congregations across the country, whose minister or priest is taking part in this program, which allows pastors to step back from their busy lives to renew their spirits, for the benefit of their ongoing ministries.

Each congregation is eligible to apply for a grant of up to \$50,000. The grant is to be used to fund the cost of the pastor's Sabbatical Program and to cover any costs to our parish in providing for the on-going duties of ministry during the pastor's absence. The 158 grants this year totaled \$6.8 million. St. Cletus is one of only 7 Catholic parishes in the country to receive a grant this year.

This year's grants include congregations in 40 states. In the mix are congregations of many sizes – some as small as 40 members, others as large as 3,000 present at Sunday worship services. The 2011 class brings to 1,598 the number of congregations to have received clergy renewal grants since 2000.

"We ask these congregations and ministers to consider the question, 'What will make your heart sing?' as they devise their plans," said Craig Dykstra, Senior Vice President for Religion at the Endowment. "They never fail to come up with wonderful and imaginative, yet doable, ways to fulfill their dreams. Their time away has freed them up to pursue personal and professional interests and needs in ways that have given them new energy for ministry."

The Endowment's larger goal is to bolster the good work that America's pastors and congregations accomplish day in and day out, and to reinforce and build upon important work being done on both sides of the pulpit.

I am honored, humbled, and grateful for this once in a lifetime opportunity given to St. Cletus parish and myself by the Cardinal and the Lilly Endowment Inc. National Clergy Renewal Program. I have been in ministry within the Catholic Church for more than 45 years, and have never before had the opportunity to study and travel in the Holy Land or visit the seat of our Church in Rome. Upon my return, I look forward to sharing my travel experiences and newfound knowledge with the wonderful St. Cletus faith community, as I begin my second term as your pastor.

IMPLEMENTING THE REVISED ROMAN MISSAL-TOP TEN WORDS THAT MIGHT GIVE ONE PRAISE

• "Only begotten Son" This text reflects the dogma that Jesus is the only Son of God.

• "I believe" A literal translation of *Credo* - We are proclaiming our personal faith in the

midst of other believers.

• "Incarnate" The Word became flesh in Mary's womb.

• "Consubstantial with the Father" This helps to deepen our understanding the nature of Jesus.

• "Confess one baptism" Confess is used here to men to profess belief in, not our usual understanding

of confess as expressing sorrow for sins.

• "Lord, God of hosts" This is a direct quote from Isaiah 6:1-3.

• "dewfall" Calling on the Spirit to fall on our offering like the dew...

• "Chalice" "The chalice of benediction, which we bless", writes St. Paul, "is it not the

communion of the blood of Christ?" (1 Corinthians 10:16). This seems to

indicate it is more than a cup.

• "Dominions" One of the nine ranks of angels who make sure God's wishes are carried out.

• "Under my roof" In the Scripture reference to the Centurion (Matthew 8:8 or Luke 7:6), he feels

unworthy that Jesus should enter under his roof. This is about our humility as

we come to receive the Eucharist.

Other words to note:

• "ineffable" to describe the power of God that makes us speechless.

• "many" The Latin word when translated is many not all, in the Last Supper narratives

(Matthew 26:28 and Mark 14:24) it is also the word Jesus himself used.

TEN WAYS TO GET MORE OUT OF ADVENT

Here are some simple ways to incorporate traditional Advent practices into your busy schedule.

- 1. Reflect on Advent as a time of waiting. The idea of waiting is not popular in our culture of instant gratification, but it creates in us a new kind of self-discipline that helps us to appreciate the present moment and look to the future with peaceful anticipation.
- 2. Turn your breathing into a prayer. Take a few deep breaths throughout the day and imagine that God's love is flowing through you to every part of your body. As you exhale, let go of tension, worry and anything else that is not God.
- 3. Long for the Lord. Make it a habit of silently praying, "Come, Lord Jesus."
- 4. Unite with Mary. Set aside time once a day to join Our Lady in praying the Canticle of Mary.
- 5. Do something nice for someone every day. It might be an encouraging word, a phone, call, a note of appreciation or a little act of kindness.
- 6. Get rid of grudges. Use advent as an opportunity to let go of any anger or resentment that you might be holding onto.
- 7. Pray for patience. If you find yourself becoming anxious or upset, ask the Lord for the gift of patience. Then make a conscious effort to be a more patient person.
- 8. Offer up something painful or difficult in your life. The best way to transform trials and tensions is to turn them into a prayer.
- 9. Receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Attend your parish penance service and take advantage of the opportunity to cleanse your soul in preparation for the coming of Jesus.
- 10. Think about the special gifts and talents God has given you. How are you using these gifts?



BE WATCHFUL! BE ALERT!

The Liturgical Year begins with the first Sunday of Advent, a time of joyful anticipation of the Incarnation of Jesus, God's love made visible. Advent is a Latin word (adventus) meaning "coming." During Advent, Christians are reminded of the three-fold comings of Christ:

The first advent – Jesus' birth
The re-birth of Jesus in our own lives
The second advent – the final coming of Jesus Christ

This season is not an observance of events that happened long ago, nor a sentimental birthday of Jesus, but rather, a celebration of Jesus Christ, the eternal Emmanuel – God who was with the people in the past and who is with us now and for all time to come.

No one knows the exact date of Jesus' birth. The date on which the Church observes his birth is more of symbolic value than anything, coming 5 days after the winter solstice. Thus we celebrate the Word made flesh, coming to dwell among us as the light of the human race, just after the darkest day of the solar year. Advent takes its meaning from Christ's passion, death, resurrection, ascension, and sending of the Spirit. For 300 years the church celebrated only this paschal mystery. The crib, the cross, and the crown are closely connected.

Once again this Liturgical Year marks a new beginning. The Liturgical Years are based on 3-year cycles: A - B - C. This allows us to hear each of the synoptic (seeing with the same eye) gospel writers. John's Gospel is heard primarily during the Easter season. This year we will be entering cycle B, focusing on the Gospel of Mark. Mark whose gospel does not contain the Infancy narratives, but begins with John the Baptist's announcement of the coming of Jesus. More miracles are recorded in Mark's Gospel than in any other gospel. Mark portrays Jesus as the suffering Messiah, not as the hoped for successful military leader who would establish an earthly kingdom. His message is to announce to all people the Good News that God loves them – a message that still rings true today.

This year in addition to moving to another Gospel writer, we are embracing an opportunity to renew our own worship experience by being more attentive to the words and actions of the Liturgy. As we initiate the new translation, it is important to remember that the key elements of our worship have remained constant since the early Church, when the first Christians gathered on the first day of the week to break bread and share the cup. The words of the Mass often refer us back to the Scriptures. The new translation is intended to help us better connect the words of the Mass to the Scripture readings. The new translation uses a more formal style of expression than we use in ordinary conversation so it will take some adjusting for us and the priests.

FEAST OF THE PRESENTATION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY Presenting Mary

Today's feast takes us back to literature that never made it into the official canon of scripture but was influential in the early church. According to these apocryphal texts, Mary's parents Joachim and Anne, who had been childless, brought Mary in thanksgiving as a young child to the Temple in Jerusalem where she was consecrated to God. She remained in the Temple to be educated in preparation for her role as Mother of God. We do not have to believe that events actually unfolded in that way to grasp the truth that Mary played an extraordinary role in the salvation story, and we can only marvel at her courage in being willing to see her role through to completion. Are we prepared to do the same?

TODAY'S READINGS: Daniel 1:1-6, 8-20; Luke 21:1-4 (503) "This poor widow put in more than all the rest."

FEAST OF CECILIA, VIRGIN, MARTYR

Time for a song

If you're reading this, so far this year you've survived two apocalyptic predictions. One fellow was so sure that Judgment Day was May 21 that he persuaded others to quit their jobs and paper the country with warnings. The other messenger, channeling an alleged ancient spirit, predicted that an earthquake on June 15 would devastate the West Coast. Some continue to root for the Mayan calendar, suggesting that we will run out of time on 12-21-12. But many of us will put our trust in Jesus, who said the day cannot be known. On the feast of the patron saint of music, we'd rather sing a song than whistle in the dark.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 23

FEAST OF BLESSED MIGUEL AGUSTÍN PRO, PRIEST, MARTYR Play your part $\,$

If being Christian were a crime, would there be enough evidence to convict you? There was enough to convict Father Miguel Pro, a newly ordained Jesuit priest in Mexico during anti-Catholic persecution in the mid-1920s. He often "disguised himself as a beggar to baptize infants, bless marriages, and celebrate Mass. He would appear in jail dressed as a police officer to bring Holy Viaticum to condemned Catholics," one account says, and took up collections for the poor in fashionable neighborhoods dressed as a businessman. Captured and

facing a firing squad, like Christ he forgave his executioners. Jesus foresaw persecution and advised, "Be shrewd as serpents and simple as doves." Miguel Pro did whatever it took to bring Christ to those who needed him. What a little creativity could do for our own daily evangelizing!

Live strong

In her book *The Sense of Wonder* Rachel Carson writes that as we age, we need an antidote against "the sterile preoccupation with things that are artificial, the alienation from the sources of our strength." What are our sources of strength? For Saint Andrew, the Vietnamese priest who was jailed and later killed for being a Christian, Daniel waiting in the lion's den, and the Puritans, whose offer of thanks we imitate today, the answer was God. Today, Thanksgiving, is the right day to remember the source of our strength.

Of noble origins and unsurpassed beauty and brilliance, she is said to have announced to her parents that she would only marry someone who surpassed her in loveliness, intelligence, wealth, and social status—a foreshadowing of her eventual commitment to Christ. Executed by the Roman emperor because of her extraordinary success in attracting converts to Christianity, Catherine became patron saint of libraries and librarians as well as all those associated with teaching. Thank someone in your life who brings wisdom and faith together.
