

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT 2011

If genius is supposed to be 90% hard work, then success is 90% good preparation. When we are very young, we imagine that we can do anything and everything! Children, who have just been watching a film or a play, are immediately lost in imitating what they have just seen. It doesn't even have to be a film. It can be driving a car, booting a football, attempting a pirouette or imagining the garden gate is a horse. Each of these skills seems easily attainable to the mind of the child, though their actual execution usually does not live up to the source of inspiration. On occasion, a particular experience catches fire and becomes a passion that, in turn, leads to a lifetime's dedication. Succeeding in any vocation or profession takes time, energy and perseverance, along with that touch of natural skill and initial engagement. We can experience gloomy stages on the journey, when the vision blurs, and we are tempted to despair or change tack. And we do not always achieve what we set out to do.

Sometimes our early obsessions are not meant to be fulfilled. With the wisdom of hindsight, we may realize that our journey has actually taught us much more than we imagined. The failures, the detours, the changed goals, can be as important as final success in the original endeavor. The real art is to enjoy the unexpected fruits of the journey, as well as the intended ones. People in the time of Jesus may have hoped and prayed for the Messiah. What they received moved even their dreams into a different dimension.


Mark begins his Gospel with a bid for credibility. He has to combine the old and the new, for if Jesus fulfills expectations, he also transcends them. Mark very carefully prepares the ground for the telling of the good news. His task is to introduce us to the person of Jesus, who is Christ, the Son of God. What Mark means by these titles will be made clear as the story unfolds. His story's claim to authenticity rests initially on its foundations in the Scriptures. The first person to appear is John the Baptist, who fulfills the role foreseen by the prophet Isaiah. He prepares the way for the Lord, by proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. John's authority is hinted at by his appearance and his habitat. He has the accourrements of Elijah, the one who tradition believes will come as the forerunner of the Messiah; he lives in the desert, the birthplace of the chosen people. His message is simple: repent and be forgiven.

That message remains the same for us. If we wish to prepare for the Lord, we too need to change our hearts and accept forgiveness. The old ways of doing and seeing are not enough. Preparation is, more than anything, learning to remove the objects that interfere with our vision and our openness to the Lord. John ends his announcement, like all good showmen, with the claim that we haven't seen anything yet. He just baptizes with water. The one who is coming after him will baptize with the Holy Spirit. The image recalls God himself, hovering over the waters at the creation of the world. We are left in a state of great suspense, wondering just who is to come. Who is this man whose arrival is couched in the language of a new creation?

We go through many processes of preparation. Our schooling prepares us for adult life. Special training prepares us for jobs and professions. In the Church, we prepare carefully for the celebration of each sacrament. We also prepare for the special events of the Church's year. At this time, of course, we prepare for Christmas. Much of our preparation involves making certain that we have what we need for what we are to do. No wonder our minds can be so overloaded. Have we remembered the presents, the cards, the tree, the food, the drink, the crackers, the invitations...and then what about the poor, the lonely, and the homeless? We all know the heart of the matter can get lost in the rush to get everything done.

Perhaps we should take a leaf out of John the Baptist's book. His preparation was not an overloading, but a stripping down, a getting rid of the baggage we carry. John suggests we enter into a state of stillness and openness, so that we will then be ready to be filled. It is a paradox. How do we prepare for the unexpected? How do we get ready for the unknown? Our practice is often to try to out-give the Great Giver. Instead, we are asked to let go of everything, so that we may be ready to receive. We cannot have open hands if they are full of shopping lists of carefully defined hopes and expectations. We have to give access to the unknown and the unexpected.



WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 7

FEAST OF AMBROSE, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH It's time for some fresh thinking

Like all great leaders, Saint Ambrose was an original thinker. He was an ardent advocate for the poor: "He who sent forth his apostles without gold had not need of gold to form his church. The church possesses gold, not to hoard, but to scatter abroad and come to the aid of the unfortunate." He also avoided rigidity when it was not helpful: "When I am in Milan, I fast; when I am in Rome, I do not." The answers to our current struggles with poverty and diversity are, like the kingdom of heaven, very near. We only need some original thinking to perceive them. In what ways do "the ways things are" cloud our vision? How can we practice seeing with new eyes?

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 40:25-31; Matthew 11:28-30 (183) "They will soar as with eagles' wings; they will run and not grow weary, walk and not grow faint."

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 8

SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

Conceive of this

The angel Gabriel addressed Mary as "full" of grace, with no place in her for sin, and while we are painfully aware that we are *not* full of love—that envy, pride, bitterness, and jealousy are within us as well—as Christians we believe that despite the sin-caused rift between humanity and God, God still chooses in our favor and gives us hope that all may yet be well. God's marvels not only enable virgins or elderly women to have babies but also let you and me respond to grace and ourselves become fertile with compassion and bearers of good news for the world.

ADVENT WEEKDAY

Get to know God's feminine side

Because we use the term "Father" so often to refer to God, we may forget that God is neither male nor female but rather ultimately beyond anything our human concepts and categories can express. Because we use words and images to communicate, however, it is good to remember that we have feminine as well as masculine ones we can use to talk about the divine. Feminine images primarily come from what's known as the Wisdom tradition, found in the latter half of Hebrew scripture in such books as Proverbs, Job, Sirach, and the Wisdom of Solomon. In fact, wisdom, often portrayed as a woman, is mentioned 222 times in scripture, including by Jesus, so be sure to remember her in your own prayers!

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 48:17-19; Matthew 11:16-19 (185) "Wisdom is vindicated by her works."

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 10

ADVENT WEEKDAY

Save a seat at the table

"The peculiar grace of a Shaker chair," Thomas Merton observed, "is due to the fact that it was made by someone capable of believing that an angel might come and sit on it." Merton was mystic enough not only to believe that but to describe to you the angel seated there. For centuries before Jesus, the people of Israel likewise waited for the return of a prophet who seemed more angelic than human: Elijah the wonderworker, who rode to heaven in a fiery chariot. At every Passover the Jewish community keeps a chair for Elijah at the table. How do you make room for the holy?

TODAY'S READINGS: Sirach 48:1-4, 9-11; Matthew 17:9a, 10-13 (186)






