



# NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

"MARY MOTHER OF GOD" JANUARY 1, 2012

The chiming of the Angelus bell is a long and holy tradition in the life of the Church. At six in the morning, twelve noon, and six in the evening across the world, church and monastery bells ring out the ancient chime, and people pause in the midst of their daily activities to murmur the ancient prayer: "The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary..." Christian people stop to recall the greatest event in the history of time, that God became man in Jesus Christ, born of the Virgin Mary.

In the ancient Christian land of Ireland, this tradition was taken up in the age of modern communications by radio, and then by television. For many years now, and still to this day, at midday and in the evening, the media pauses its programs to transmit the Angelus chimes across the fields of Ireland, and in many a home, people stop their busy lives and join in the silent prayer.

In very recent times, in this age of secularism, pluralism and the Celtic tiger economy, voices have been raised to suggest alteration or even abolition of this Christian practice. So far those voices have not been a majority, and the "prayer pause" has survived. Some good alterations have been introduced, however, in the television transmission. Where, at one time, the screen revealed an icon of the Mother and Child to view during the chimes, in recent times a series of overlapping images have been introduced, showing tranquil scenes of Irish life, of lake and land, farm and field, terrace and town: and the faces of Irish people, young and old, looking up from their work, looking inward and upward.

This holy moment is truly sacred and truly precious. It takes us to another level of life, to stillness and a wonder at it all. It is a moment not only for saying the prayer, but even for not saying the prayer. It is a moment to remember the faces of loved ones, alive or gone before us, near or far away. It is a time to call those faces before our mind and to pray for all those lovely people. It is a time, most of all, to place ourselves before the face of God, and to ask him to reveal his face to us, to let his face shine on us.

At the beginning of Israel's story, in the Book of Numbers, such a wish and such a prayer is made into a blessing for the people. As the people in the desert are formed into a nation under God, and prepare to enter the Promised Land, the priests are instructed on how to call the blessing of God down upon the people. It is the blessing of God's face. The face is our entry point to the world, and also the world's entry point into our inner being. All healthy meetings are meetings face to face. All healthy attitudes involve a mutual seeing, not a staring at others nor a sneaking glimpse. All honest encounters are an encounter of faces. The spirit of the person, the soul, is communicated through the open face. It is through the face that we communicate warmth and affection to others, or withhold them as the case may be. The human smile is the warmest expression of our genuine delight in others, and its warmth and brightness can be felt by the recipient. That is why we plead with God to smile upon us. It is the greatest blessing on earth.

In Jesus, born of Mary, God's ancient promise and blessing is fulfilled. God has revealed his face to us in Mary's child, born at the appointed time. Mary pondered these great mysteries in her heart. What great things the Lord had done in her life, and what privileges she had been given, to be called 'Mother of God.' All generations now have called her blessed, and so we on this day, at the opening of the year.

Mary is Mother of God. And we are children of God. We should never forget it. Not ever. Let the Angelus bell continue to chime and to ring out the joyous news. Happy New Year, everyone! Yes, and more. The blessing of God be upon you – the blessing that comes to us in his Son, born of Mary, and whose name is Jesus.

*Church*, no. 926). That can mean educating young people, sheltering the homeless, presenting gospel values in corporate boardrooms, or caring for persons with AIDS. What are the religious communities in your neighborhood up to?

We live in another era, one in which Catholic schools and parishes are being consolidated, closed, or otherwise changed in many parts of the nation. Each age calls for different gifts but good stewardship is never out of season. Pray that church leaders will be good and faithful stewards of the great legacy entrusted to their care.

"Rarely," wrote one of his Holy Cross brothers, "could a sinner resist the authority of the frail old man who, with tears in his eyes, talked about the Passion of the Lord." Let the story of how Jesus so loved the world that he was willing to give his life for it inspire your own love and sacrifices.

When Raymond of Penyafort (1175-1275) was born, the average life expectancy was around 35 years. Hence, when Raymond joined the Dominicans at age 47, he might reasonably have expected to have only a few more years to live. Instead, he lived to be 100! We don't know how long we have on earth, so we must make the most of every day. That includes preparing for the future. "If you do not make plans, you leave the future an empty field of chance . . . forfeit to your own unpredictable moods," cautions author Robert Grudin in *Time and the Art of Living*. He continues: "The future will do much for us, [but] we must do much for it." What will you do today to prepare for your future?

# MY LIFE'S JOURNEY OF FAITH STUART HEYES, DEACON CANDIDATE

Fr. Bob asked me to write a series of articles about my faith journey, God willing, the next major milestone being ordination, to the permanent diaconate in May 2012.

This is the first of five articles that will explain the background to my diaconate journey and the journey itself since 2007 when I applied to join the Chicago Archdiocese Deacon Formation Program with the support and endorsement(s) of my wife, Marlene, and Fr. Bob.

My journey started some sixty years ago with a mother and maternal grandmother who were spiritual, Anglican and raised me with core values that have guided me throughout my life. At this time religious biases still existed between Protestant's and Catholics in England, as elsewhere where the predominant or state religion was Protestant.

I met Marlene, a Catholic and regular attendee at Sunday Mass, while at University. Being in love with her, I accompanied her to Mass. Interestingly, my grandmother whose life was ebbing away at the time we were engaged and who thought very highly of Marlene (in spite of being Catholic) said to her, "Please don't ask Stuart to convert" – she never did (see later.) We were married in a Catholic ceremony in 1972.

Ten years later our son and only child was attending Catholic school and having his faith formed, with First Communion not far down the road, when I received what I can only describe as "wake up" call from the Holy Spirit. I had been faithfully attending Mass with Marlene (and Haydon since his birth and baptism in 1977) every week and I realized that sadly when he made his First Communion I wouldn't be able to receive the Eucharist with him and his Mom! What was I thinking? I knew then what I needed to do - take instructions to convert.

When I explained my decision to Marlene, she was of course surprised and delighted. So in 1982 I was received into the Catholic Church with Marlene, Haydon, and my Mom all attending. We were also blessed with a daughter, Ruth, just a year later. In explaining my decision to my parents, my Dad was not happy while my Mom was delighted that we would be a one-faith family – she has been supportive of our faith lives ever since and regularly asks about my (our) diaconate journey when we speak. Interestingly, my Dad who passed away recently, had also begun to show great interest in my diaconate journey!!

My business life brought us to the USA in 1988, New Jersey, and then to Burr Ridge in 1992 which is when we joined St. Cletus. With all my travels we didn't do more than attend Mass and contribute for ten years. But in 2002 at a ministry fair we enrolled for training as Extraordinary ministers of the Eucharistic ministers) and have served in this capacity since then. If this is raised in conversation Marlene will tell you "we" didn't enroll - rather that I enrolled "us!"

Following the creation of the Compassionate Care Ministry by Fr. Charles in 2006, he asked us to attend the training sessions and join the ministry. We did as a husband and wife team and have been Funeral Planners and Vigil prayer ministers ever since.

Dorothy Day once recalled St. Bonaventure's remark that after the Lord's long forty days of fasting in the desert, when he was diminished and weak from his struggle, the angels who ministered to him went first to the Blessed Mother's house. There they saw the soup that was on her stove, and took some to the Lord so that he would delight in it even more since his mother had prepared it. "Of course," said Dorothy Day matter-of-factly.

In praying the rosary and savoring the stories of Mary's steadfast love in the face of all suffering, the sick are strengthened by one of our tradition's most shining treasures, and the whole Church is enriched.
