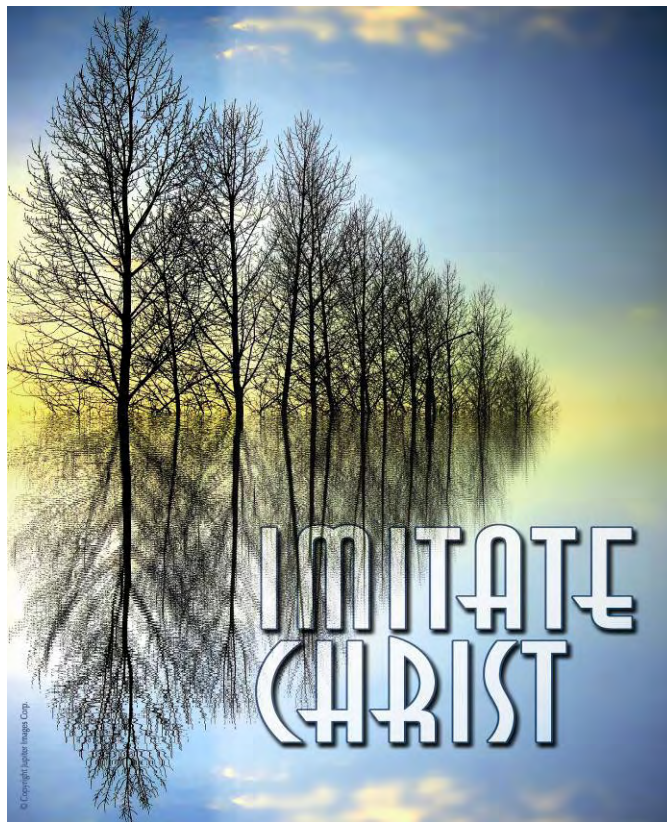



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

SIXTH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME 2012

A French priest, who has spent many years working among people who are down-and-out, paints a poignant picture of what life is like for these friends of his. "They're not noticed," he writes. "They don't interest anyone; they feel non-existent in the eyes of others. As one of them puts it: 'No one actually tells you, but you sense that they'd prefer not to see you; so they don't really look at you. It's a terrible feeling; it fills you with despair.'"

A similar account could have been given of the plight of lepers, in times gone by. Leprosy aroused particular dread because it was both highly contagious and a cause of ritual uncleanness. Detailed regulations, like those recorded in today's first reading, were drawn up to indicate how a leper should be treated. Their effect was to make the sufferer an outcast. This apparently harsh treatment was the only way the community knew of protecting itself from contagion. And, since priests were the leaders of the community, it was they who had to decide whether or not a person had the disease. The diseased person then had to wear torn clothing, leave his hair unkempt, and signal his presence to others – so that they could avoid him – by the cry of "Unclean, unclean."

Is it sheer misery and loneliness that drives the leper in today's Gospel towards our Lord? No doubt he's heard rumors of Jesus' kindly way with the sick and his extraordinary ability to cure them. Well, now that ability will really be put to the test.

The leper sinks down on his knees; he's desperate. "If you want to," he murmurs, "you can cure me." Jesus, we're told, is deeply moved. He's filled with pity or, as some scholars translate, with anger – not of course at the man, but at his disease and its dreadful consequences. In any event, Jesus does what is unthinkable: he stretches out his hand and touches the leper, thereby incurring ritual defilement himself. But how precious that touch is to the leper! It constitutes a breakthrough, a new beginning; he's no longer isolated; at last there's someone who cares for him enough to risk catching his loathsome disease. Then comes the incredible words, which are the passport back to a normal life: "Of course I want to. Be cured." In that instant, the leprosy leaves him.

The healing of leprosy was said to be as difficult as raising the dead. However, Jesus effortlessly accomplishes this apparently impossible task. He now asks the cured leper to go report his cure to the priests and, in the meantime, says nothing to anyone. That really is asking the impossible. Jesus doesn't want people to seek him simply as a wonder-worker, yet there is surely an understanding smile on his face, when he hears that the man is sharing his story with anyone who will listen.

Jesus' touch was important for the leper, but it is also important for us. It's one of those actions that speak louder than words, an action which shows that the Lord is inclusive, not exclusive; he draws people towards him, doesn't send them away; he's not unduly concerned about political correctness.

If, as Paul urges us in today's second reading, we are to take Jesus as our model, we need to ask ourselves how we treat today's lepers, those who are marginalized. How, for example, do we react to ex-prisoners or even to the innocent families of those in prison? Do we pass by those referred to as "unfortunates", as though they didn't exist? How do we, as a community, behave towards the divorced and remarried; do we make them feel unwanted? Are we racist, if only in our thoughts? Can we find it in our hearts to pray, or experience a shred of sympathy, for the real outsider, such as the pedophile? It's not a question of saying that anything goes, but rather of ensuring that we exclude no one from our loving concern.

Some years ago, a woman noticed that one of her colleagues, an alcoholic who had got drunk and made an exhibition of herself at an office party, was now being shunned by everyone. She made a determined effort to speak to this "outcast". All she could say was: "You're not invisible to me, anyway." For the woman who'd been treated like a leper, it was - well - a kind of little miracle. And we too have it in our power, the power that comes to us through our contact with Jesus at Mass, to work similar little miracles for the outcasts of our world.

SIXTH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME; BIRTHDAY OF ABRAHAM LINCOLN — God's ways are mysterious indeed

President Abraham Lincoln knew a thing or two about grief and the struggle to find God within the mystery of seemingly senseless loss. The year 1862 saw the death of his son Willie at the age of 11 of typhoid fever while the Civil War raged, bringing death and destruction to a divided nation. Lincoln struggled to find a divine purpose behind it all. Of the war he wrote: God "could have either saved or destroyed the Union without a human contest. Yet the contest began. And having begun He could give the final victory to either side any day. Yet the contest proceeds." There may be no final, satisfactory answer to the mystery of suffering, but there is a response: compassion. Practice some toward everyone you meet.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 13

Take advantage of the trial period

Everyone experiences difficulties at some point in their lives. No matter how fortunate a person may be, going a lifetime without adversity is next to impossible. The early church from time to time went through trials of a different sort: hostility, persecution, and the general tension of living in a pagan world that did not share its beliefs. These days there is still friction between a life of faith and an increasingly secular world. The response of some is to condemn that world rather than engage it. On this score, however, contemporary Christians can learn from the first ones, who saw in trials the opportunity to grow in virtue and develop their faith.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 14

FEAST OF CYRIL, MONK, AND METHODIUS, BISHOP

Don't get lost in translation

The ninth-century siblings Cyril and Methodius, known as the Apostles to the Slavic people, were particularly sensitive to helping people use their own language and images to experience God and articulate their faith. Pope Benedict XVI spoke about this gift of theirs in 2009: "Each people should make the revealed message penetrate into their own culture, and express the salvific truth with their own language. This implies a very exacting work of 'translation,' as it requires finding adequate terms to propose anew the richness of the revealed Word, without betraying it. The two brother saints have left in this sense a particularly significant testimony that the church continues looking at today to be inspired and guided." How can you translate God's Word effectively in your own day and age?

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 15

Use your imagination

One of the fundamental Catholic beliefs is that God is present in every aspect of creation. This perspective has been called the "Catholic imagination" and is rooted in the teachings of Jesus. When he looked at the ordinary stuff of life—dough, coins, vines, lamps, mustard seeds—he saw how each thing revealed the loving presence of God. Catholics do the same. When we look at a person or object, we are aware that there is more than meets the eye, and that "more" is God. The essence of Catholic imagination is cap-

tured in this passage from *The Little Prince* by Antoine de Saint-Exupéry: "What is essential is invisible to the eye." Practice using your Catholic lenses today. What do you see?

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 16

Use your head

Remember when Jesus got into an argument with Saint Peter and even called him a devil? Actually, Peter "started it" because he thought Jesus was not acting like a proper Messiah, predicting he would be persecuted by the religious authorities! To Peter it didn't make sense; it didn't fit with what he'd been taught. Poor Pete, and poor us. How can Jesus expect us to expect the unexpected? How can we dare to think and act outside the religious box we grew up in? We use our brains and seek to understand before we form opinions, go again and again to prayer, and finally submit to the gospel itself, which like a plumb line, is always true.

FEAST OF THE SEVEN HOLY FOUNDERS OF THE SERVITE ORDER, RELIGIOUS

A noble calling

Imagine seven of the leading citizens of New York, London, or Paris suddenly leaving it all behind and heading to the hills to dedicate their lives to God. That is how the Servite Order was founded in 13th-century Florence, a city flourishing with culture, trade, and political and religious intrigue. In 1240 seven noblemen of the city decided to withdraw from urban life to a solitary place for prayer and service of God. In their monastery they led a life of prayer, work, and silence while in the active apostolate they engaged in parish work, teaching, preaching, and other ministries. God calls all of us to service and prayer; at the end of the day, these are the actions that ennoble us all. How will you serve?

It was up on that mountain that God said the words: "This is my beloved son. Listen to him." This Lent let us listen for the Lord and open our minds and our hearts to his transforming presence.

Co-sponsor Respect for Rights of Conscience Act

On January 20, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) reaffirmed a rule that virtually all private health care plans must cover sterilization, abortifacients, and contraception. The rule is set to take effect August 1, 2012. Non-profit religious employers that do not now provide such coverage, and are not exempt under the rule's extremely narrow definition of religious employer, will be given one year—until August 1, 2013—to comply.

Responding to the announcement, Cardinal-designate Timothy Dolan, archbishop of New York and president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, stated: "In effect, the president is saying we have a year to figure out how to violate our consciences." Cardinal-designate Dolan continued: "To force Americans to choose between violating their consciences and forgoing their healthcare is literally unconscionable. . . It is as much an attack on access to health care as on religious freedom." Noting that the Obama administration "has now drawn an unprecedented line in the sand," the Cardinal-designate urged that the HHS mandate be overturned. "The Catholic bishops are committed to working with our fellow Americans to reform the law and change this unjust regulation." See: www.usccb.org/news/2012/12-012.cfm. Last August, the HHS issued a list of "preventive services for women" to be mandated in almost all private health plans under the new health care law, the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA). The mandated services include sterilization, all FDA-approved birth control (such as the IUD, Depo-Provera, 'morning-after' pills, and the abortion-inducing drug Ella), and "education and counseling" to promote these among all "women of reproductive capacity." HHS's interim final rule allowed only a very narrow exemption for a "religious employer." The January 20 announcement makes this interim rule final.

To correct the threats to religious liberty and rights of conscience posed by PPACA, the Respect for Rights of Conscience Act has been introduced in Congress (H.R. 1179, S. 1467). This measure will ensure that those who participate in the health care system "retain the right to provide, purchase, or enroll in health coverage that is consistent with their religious beliefs and moral convictions." It is more important than ever that Members of Congress be urged to co-sponsor this measure. For co-sponsors, please check **H.R. 1179** and **S. 1467** at: thomas.loc.gov.

MY LIFE'S JOURNEY OF FAITH – STUART HEYES, DEACON CANDIDATE

This third article is intended to offer an insight into the kind of man who is called to be a deacon, the ministry of a deacon, the application process in the Archdiocese of Chicago and how Marlene and I embarked upon this leg of our journey of faith and discernment.

PERSONALITY TRAITS IN A MAN BEING CALLED TO THE VOCATION OF A DEACON

A lively and personal love for Jesus and the church -- the people of God.

A demonstrable desire to help the sick, needy, marginalized etc. in our society.

A thirst to learn and understand more about our faith.

An ability to positively affect those around one as a result of the way they live their life.

A DEACON'S MINISTRY IS THREEFOLD:

- **Ministry of the Word - may include evangelization and teaching.**
- **Ministry of the Liturgy - includes assisting at Mass, preaching, baptizing, witnessing marriages, presiding at wakes, funeral and committal services or other prayer services, etc.**
- **Ministry of Charity and Justice - this practice is the most characteristic of a deacon and requires deacons to address the needs of the poor, marginalized, sick, imprisoned, bereaved, etc.**

SUMMARY OFF THE APPLICATION CRITERIA AND PROCESS FOR THE ARCHDIOCESE OF CHICAGO

Demonstrable ministerial involvement in parish life.

Support of pastor (Fr. Bob) and wife, Marlene, who had to be agreeable to full involvement in the formation program activities.

Stability of lifestyle, moral character, faith life, marriage.

Minimum age 31, residency – Cook/Lake Counties, good health, financially the self-sufficient.

Minimum GED, Virtus training, subject to criminal background checks, psychological testing and marriage inventory/compatibility testing.

Spiritual biographies for each of us were required.

HOW DID WE FEEL ABOUT ALL THIS?

After considerable discussion and prayer, Marlene and I decided to initiate the application process in early January 2008. Seven months later we were accepted for the initial year of discernment, and on August 8, 2008 at the Mass of the Holy Spirit, at U.S.M.L. Mundelein, we were formally accepted as “aspirants.” Here we go.....”Aspirancy”.....the next article!

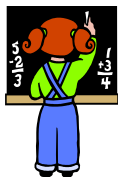
