NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

SEVENTH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME 2012

Down through the ages, people have argued about the origins of sickness. One of the main reasons presented for not believing in a good God is his seeming indifference to the suffering of the innocent. Sickness has rarely been considered to be just a physical matter. In much Old Testament thought, and still at the time of Jesus, physical suffering was considered to be punishment, either for one's sins or the sins of one's parents or ancestors.

We may feel we are now more knowledgeable, but in some ways, the pattern remains the same. We may be more reluctant to believe suffering and disease are a result of moral turpitude, although reactions to the appearance of AIDS showed that this belief still slumbers not far below the surface. We are aware that our whole environment affects our health. We do not really know about--but are still fearful of-- the effect of the many artificially created chemicals that are now part of the fabric of our world, whether in our food or drink or just as part of the atmosphere. Whether in the form of nuclear radiation or genetic modification, the evil spirits have taken on more concrete shape. Yet we still struggle to assess accurately the real effect of these toxic additives to our world. Why is one person affected and another not? What is the relationship between the individual psyche and the ability to resist or cope with disease? At this point, we remain a mystery to ourselves, particularly in the interlocking of the inner self and the outer world.

In Mark's Gospel, Jesus finds himself in situations of conflict right from the beginning of his public life. He challenges people's assumptions in each case. If tradition holds that certain powers are reserved for God, Jesus puts himself forward as holding those same powers. And his actions back up his claims. In this first story, the scribes put forward the traditional view. Jesus forgives the paralytic his sins, but the power to forgive sins belongs to God alone. Jesus could have healed the paralytic and sent him on his way, pleasing everyone.

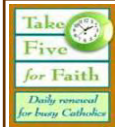
Rather, Jesus forgives the paralytic's sins. We do not know what these sins are. We do know from elsewhere in the gospels, that Jesus does not accept the traditional idea that suffering is punishment for sin, so his aim is not to confirm that belief. Instead, he uses the physical healing as confirmation of his greater power to forgive sin. There is a touch of the sacramental in his action, the physical healing being an outward sign of the inner grace, which has transformed the inner man. Jesus acts not in response to the faith of the suffering individual, but to the faith of those who have brought him. The faith of the community can bring about healing of a member in need. We are asked to consider ourselves not as fragmented and isolated, but as whole (and wholesome) individuals within a community. Jesus is really confronting the mindset that creates both inner and outer loneliness.

The involvement of others in our brokenness and healing is made explicit for Christ's followers in the business of prayer. We pray constantly for those who are ill, and the prayer is for healing. It is also for God's will to be done, for we do not know his ultimate intention. Because of the ultimate mystery of salvation expressed in Christ's own death and resurrection, each Christian believes that neither suffering nor death is the end of the story. They are the events through which each of us learns the meaning of our individual story, and how that story re-enacts and represents the divine mystery first enacted by Christ. It is difficult to bring our belief to bear on life's woes, if we have little real sense of God living through us with his love. His forgiveness of our sin, the binding of us to himself in love, is the necessary prerequisite to our positive understanding and living out of our suffering. Without the ability to see this link, we tend to become lost in our fragmentation and isolation. "Why me?" is the refrain which expresses our confusion about ourselves and our envy of those who are not suffering. This in turn blocks our freedom to bring God's own understanding and love to our situation. We tend to feel overwhelmed and even desperate. The prayer and companionship of others is, then, the essential means to finding that inner wholeness we so much need.

Pass along a peace of advice

Peace activists aren't born; they are inspired by others. Longtime Catholic peace worker Kathy Kelly was introduced to the writings of Daniel Berrigan, S.J. and the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. while a student at a Catholic school during the turbulent 1960s. "The St. Paul faculty," she says, "gently but consistently showed us hero-figures who had tried to confront injustice and cruelty and who believed in love of enemy as well as love of neighbor." Let's make sure children are exposed to more than comic-book action superheroes writ large on theater screens. Let's introduce them to the real heroes, those who have worked tirelessly for peace and justice.

ASH WEDNESDAY; DAY OF FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

Be creative this Lent

Is it Lent already? Yes, which means another season of opportunity to grow in faith. Consider how you might wisely spend the next 40 days by focusing on one thing in your life that needs to change. Try a new spin on the traditional practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Prayer can be engaged in many ways: with words, silence, contemplation of icons—or walking a labyrinth or the Stations of the Cross for the spiritually fidgety. You can "fast" from more than food: Give up

media distractions or idle gossip. Alms can be paid out in other than dollar bills: Offer your time to the lonely, your love to a child.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 23

FEAST OF POLYCARP, BISHOP, MARTYR—Bring it on

You have to admire the early Christian martyrs, not only for their courage but also for the defiance, even confidence, with which they faced dying for their faith. The bishop Saint Polycarp had been a Christian his whole life, but for some reason the Romans waited until he was 86—an unheard-of age in the ancient world—to hunt him down. He refused to flee, and when hauled before a Roman official engaged him in lively debate. When threatened with burning at the stake, his eventual fate, he retorted that while the fires of martyrdom last only for a while, the fires of judgment never go out. Polycarp and other martyrs offer the example of those who reckoned their eternal fate more important than their earthly one.

FRIDAY AFTER ASH WEDNESDAY; DAY OF ABSTINENCE—Not so fast?

One out of six people in the present generation lives in extreme poverty. Not simply below the poverty line established by government organizations: Extreme poverty means living in danger of death because there is no food. By virtue of living in a country where food is made affordable by subsidies and meal programs are available to make up the shortfall, it's easy to forget and hard to imagine the kind of suffering starvation entails. If one in six neighbors were hungry, wouldn't the other five feed that person? Fasting, even abstaining from meat, reminds us that our neighbor is hungry—and of our responsibility to help.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Isaiah 58:1-9a; Matthew 9:14-15 (221)*

"This . . . is the fasting that I wish: . . . Sharing your bread with the hungry, sheltering the oppressed and the homeless."

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 25

SATURDAY AFTER ASH WEDNESDAY

Take the fast track to hunger awareness

Fasting is a spiritual discipline to which we are called during Lent. It not only helps us become more aware of our dependency on God but also aware of those who experience hunger on a regular basis. The U.S.D.A. estimates that tens of millions of Americans are in that very situation. "It is unacceptable," says Catholic Charities USA, "in a nation as bountiful as ours that children, adults, and senior citizens experience food insecurity that puts their physical, mental, and developmental health at risk." Contact your local office of Catholic Charities, Food for the Poor, or a food pantry or soup kitchen to see how you can be part of the solution. CatholicCharitiesUSA.org can help you get started.

Welcome a Campaign Volunteer, Your fellow Parishioner!

Many of you have received requests in the mail concerning your participation in *Living our Faith, Building our Future*. In the coming days and weeks, a campaign volunteer will contact you about this request as we seek parish-wide support for this historic project. When your fellow parishioners call on you, please welcome them with kindness and good will as you consider your gift to the campaign. Some commonly asked questions about the campaign...

Why are we putting the addition in front of the education building instead of in the grass area?

The new addition will have benefits for everyone who is a part of Saint Cletus. The proposed location will be centralized for the school as well as the church and will be connected to the existing education building. By connecting the new building with the existing building Saint Cletus will gain a centralized lobby to greet people entering the school. The centralized location on the campus will also allow for gatherings before and after Mass, while preserving the green space on the east side of the property for its beauty and sports use.

How do I make a pledge and payment?

A deposit of 10% of your total pledge is strongly encouraged at the time of your donation. Knowledge of your participation and your deposit allow the parish to plan more effectively. As you will see, the letter of intent/pledge card allows you to schedule payments over a three to five year period according to your ability (monthly, quarterly, semi-annually, or annually).

I would like to make a pledge; however, our budget is especially tight this year. How can I still participate in the campaign?

The campaign pledge period is structured over three to five years. If necessary, you can pay only the deposit on your pledge (10%) now, and structure payments for your remaining pledge intention, as your situation allows.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

I write to you concerning a most serious matter that negatively impacts the Church in the United States directly, and that strikes at the fundamental right to religious liberty for all citizens of any faith.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services announced on January 20 that almost all employers, including Catholic employers, will be forced to offer their employees health coverage that includes sterilization, abortion-inducing drugs, and contraception. Almost all health insurers will be forced to include those "services" in the health policies they write. And almost all individuals will be forced to buy that coverage as a part of their policies.


In so ruling, the Administration has seemingly ignored the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, denying to Catholics our Nation's first and most fundamental freedom, that of religious liberty. As a result, unless the rule is overturned, we Catholics must be prepared either to violate our consciences, or to drop health coverage for our employees (and suffer the penalties for doing so). The Administration's sole concession was to give our institutions one year to comply.

We cannot—we will not—comply with this unjust law. People of faith cannot be made second class citizens because of their religious beliefs. We are already joined by our brothers and sisters of all faiths and many others of good will in this important effort to regain our religious freedom. Our parents and grandparents did not come to these shores to help build America's cities and towns, its infrastructure and institutions, its enterprise and culture, only to have their posterity stripped of their God given rights. All that has been built up over so many years in our Catholic institutions should not be taken away by the stroke of an administrator's pen. This order reduces the Church to a private club, destroying her public mission in society. In generations past, the Church has always been able to count on the faithful to stand up and protect her sacred rights and duties. I hope and trust she can count on this generation of Catholics to do the same.

Therefore, I would ask of you two things. First, as a community of faith we must commit ourselves to prayer and fasting that wisdom and justice may prevail, and religious liberty may be restored. Without God, we can do nothing; with God, nothing is impossible. Second, I would also recommend visiting www.usccb.org/conscience to learn more about this severe assault on religious liberty, and how to contact Congress in support of legislation that would reverse the Administration's decision.

A letter similar to this is being sent to their people by diocesan bishops around the country. I thank you for your consideration of this unprecedented challenge to religious liberty. You and your families are in my prayers; please keep me in yours.

TALLER DE JOSÉ: LENTEN ALMSGIVING

As we begin the season of Lent, we are invited to a deeper commitment to live our Christian life. We make promises to fast and pray more. We are invited to “give alms,” to share our resources with our neighbors who are in need. This year, the St. Cletus parish community is being invited to share its resources with the neighbors served by Taller de José.

Taller de José is a community resource center, located in Chicago's Little Village, which offers accompaniment to people in need, connecting people to services and services to people. Sponsored by the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph, Taller de José exists to fulfill the mission of Jesus, “that all may be one.” Taller de José offers companionship and personal attention to our under-served neighbors to assist them in navigating the social service system and linking them to the resources and services needed.

The accompaniment ministry provided by Taller de José is more than sitting in an office, listening to people relate their stories, or making a few phone calls. Accompaniment takes place beyond the office, as staff accompanies clients by public transportation...standing in line, waiting in courts, health care facilities, government offices and social service agencies. When accompanying a client, Taller de José is a supportive presence, walking and journeying with them, offering information, direction, advocacy, emotional support and insight. Taller de José does not duplicate already existing services in the ecclesial and civic communities of Chicago, but partners with them to help to alleviate human sufferings caused by, but not limited to, hunger, domestic abuse, addictions, homelessness, sickness, and violence. This Wednesday, February 22, is Ash Wednesday. Ashes will be distributed at all Liturgies. Our Mass schedule is 6:30, 8:00, 9:00 a.m. (School Mass), 6:30 p.m., 7:45 p.m. (Spanish). A Prayer Service will be held at 3:30 p.m. in Church.



LENTEN REGULATIONS

Abstinence from meats is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays of Lent.

Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

The special Paschal fast and abstinence are prescribed for Good Friday and encouraged for Holy Saturday.

By the threefold discipline of fasting, almsgiving and prayer the Church keeps Lent from Ash Wednesday until the evening of Holy Thursday. All of the faithful and the catechumens should undertake serious practice of these three traditions. Failure to observe any penitential days at all or a substantial number of such days must be considered serious.

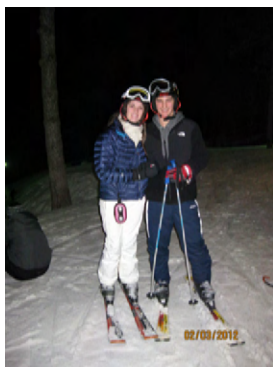
THANK YOU FOR THE FLEECE!
