



EASTER SUNDAY 2012

The old man had been a soldier of the Second World War, and then a coalminer. When he died, his grave was simple, with a black headstone, bearing his name and the dates of his birth and death. The earth itself is simply grassed over. About a year after his death, his daughter came over from Germany, accompanied by her German husband, and they brought with them a beautiful black lantern, which they placed on the grave. Apparently, it is a familiar custom in Germany to adorn the graves of loved ones with lanterns, and to light candles within them on those special days in November when the dead are commemorated. How poignant, too, that a German son-in-law should place a lantern on the grave of an American soldier. Sadly, however, they never got the chance to light the lantern on that grave, for within a few months of its being placed there, the beautiful lantern was stolen.

This stealing from graves is nothing rare these days. "Is nothing sacred?" someone asks. Apparently not. Yet it remains a most upsetting thing to have anything stolen from a grave. Our loved ones are so precious to us, and their graves are sacred places. Though they are gone from us, we tend their graves and keep them neat and tidy, just as we hold their memory ever dear in our hearts.

On the morning of Easter day, the women who went to the tomb were about to begin the process of tending the grave, by anointing the dead body of Jesus and then re-closing the tomb. How shocked they must have been to see the stone rolled away, and how much more upsetting it must have been for them to discover that the body was not in the tomb. It must have been stolen! "Someone has taken it," Mary Magdalene cried. How sad the women must have felt going back to the disciples to share the terrible news.

This news must be verified, so Peter and John ran to the garden where the tomb is located, and the evidence laid there before them. Grave cloths were left on the ground. The head cloth was rolled up in a place by itself. What does it all mean? What has happened here? This is not the work of grave robbers. Why would they unwrap the body? No. Something stranger still than grave robbery has happened here. This is death robbery. Death has been robbed of its power to devastate and to destroy. Life has returned to this place, to this world, and to our lives.

"Until this moment," the Gospel of John says, "the disciples had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead." Some things are very hard for us to understand. Some things are outside of our experience, and some are beyond our wildest expectations. For many people, some things are beyond the realms of possibility. Rising from the dead is one of those things. It just does not happen. All the evidence tells us that death is pretty final. It is the end of everything. It is our dissolution.

Acceptance of the fact of death is in many ways a mature attitude, a realistic response to the fact of our mortality. Yet there is another response, a rebellion against death, a protest, that Dylan Thomas, the poet, so eloquently expressed when he told us to "rage, rage against the dying of the light." Is it not true that death in so many ways makes a mockery of life? It is almost an insult to all that life hoped to be, for to die is to lose life.

Now, here, on this Easter day, we have the great discovery, the great find. Life wins. Love wins. John the beloved disciple, who was to write so eloquently of life and love, went to the tomb—"he saw and he believed." What he saw was an empty tomb, but he also "saw" more deeply into the mystery of what the empty tomb means. It means that the Lord had risen, and in him the fullness of life has been restored to us. So, even the stealing of a lantern from the grave is not the end of the world. Christ is the light of the world, a light that darkness cannot overpower. St. John saw that for himself on that first Easter morning. May that same Easter light shine on us all today.

In a world still broken, what are the effects of Jesus' Resurrection and the hope of your own? The minister and activist William Sloane Coffin suggests: "Hope is a state of mind independent of the state of the world—so if your heart's full of hope you can be persistent when you can't be optimistic. You can keep the faith despite the evidence, knowing that only in so doing has the evidence any chance of changing. So while I'm not optimistic, I'm always very hopeful." Easter can abide in you as hope. With it, "how can we keep from singing"?

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 2:14, 22-33; Matthew 28:8-15 (261) "God raised this Jesus; of this we are all witnesses."

TUESDAY IN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER

Appearances can be deceiving

When she went to visit the empty tomb, Mary Magdalene became the first of the disciples to see the risen Lord. Yet there must have been something different about his appearance because, until he spoke, she mistook him for the gardener! In your daily life you, too, might often assume that wise or holy people are only found on altars, podiums, or other elevated and prominent places. But do not overlook the gardener, the auto mechanic, the store clerk you encounter today. Wisdom and holiness are found in some unexpected places, but you have to take the time to see beneath the surface. Slow down in this Easter season and really look and listen. You will find the risen Lord in your midst!

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 2:36-41; John 20:11-18 (262) "Jesus said to her . . . 'Whom are you looking for?' She thought it was the gardener."

Tell some stories on each other

The part of Jesus' life relived during Holy Week—his entry into Jerusalem, the Last Supper, his trial, death, and Resurrection—is the de-

fining one of our faith. It states unequivocally who Jesus is and who you are as one of his followers. It is the *raison d'être* of Christians. You hold in your mind defining stories about your loved ones. This Easter Season take some time to think about the stories of those closest to you—in other words, the ones that reveal why you love these people. Then write a letter, make a phone call, or invite them out for coffee and tell them *their* story. It's what Jesus would do.

"Peace be with you": the first words Jesus spoke when he appeared to the apostles after the Resurrection. Though they were terrified and grief-stricken, these four words comforted them and empowered them so that they could go out and spread the gospel. In many ways the work of Jesus centered on the power of peacemaking. According to Saint Paul, in being one with the Body of Christ you accept that you are heirs to the promise of peace and love in the world and have the responsibility to proclaim it far and wide.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 3:11-26; Luke 24:35-48 (264) "You are witnesses of these things."

FRIDAY IN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER

On it goes

It was not enough that Jesus' wondrous deeds were limited to his earthly life; God raised him, and his power extended beyond death. 
SATURDAY IN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER; PASSOVER ENDS IN THE EVENING - Wake up to God

MY LIFE'S JOURNEY OF FAITH - STUART HEYES, DEACON CANDIDATE

CANDIDACY YEAR ONE, FALL 2009 – MAY 2010

For our weekly evening classes three of us attended St. Xavier University, Oak Lawn, while the other eight attended classes at Mundelein – geographically this made sense as we are in Vicariates IV, V, VI while the other seven Northsiders – (Cubs fans but still good guys I've come to realize!!!) are in Vicariates I and II. However, academically it created some issues with how different instructors covered the same syllabus – this issue was addressed at the end of the academic year and now we all attend the same classes at DePaul, O'Hare campus

For the first time ever in this program tests, quizzes, and final exams were introduced. Cardinal George wanted the Archdiocese Deacon Formation Program, now named Institute of Diaconal Studies, to (1) bring the program into closer compliance with the National Directory for Deacon Formation and (2) in doing so ensure that upon ordination deacons were better trained and formed for their ministry than in the past.

As a result we as a class have been at the forefront of these changes, exciting and exacting to be sure, and today this program is the leader in the USA with others looking to it for advice and guidance as they seek to do likewise. Additionally, we all met together at USML Mundelein for (all Day) Saturday classes 2-3 times per month on subjects such as Morality, Mariology, Evangelization, RCIA, Public Speaking, etc.

During aspirancy we aspirants and wives were required to meet in the evening once a month with a Deacon and wife mentor couple for prayer, Scripture study, discussion about our journeys, formation etc. We had the great pleasure of meeting and making great friends during aspirancy with Dcn, Kevin O'Donnell and Anita of St. Fabian's in Bridgeview. Their eldest son, Matthew, will be ordained a priest on May 12th for the Archdiocese.

For Candidacy we were assigned to Dcn Rick Feltes and Annette, St. Linus, Oak Lawn. We have got to know them very well through these last three years. Through this connection our son Haydon met their daughter, Kristen, in the summer of 2010 at a BBQ at our home, apparently they liked each other as they were married at St. Cletus last October – God is Good.

In my next article I'll write about the academics and the internship in a little more detail.

Thank You to those of you who have commented favorably on my articles - my intent is to offer an interesting article while providing some idea of what is asked of a man and his wife who are accepted into the Deacon Formation program.
